### Where Jesus Meets Us

In the Gospel for the Third Sunday of Easter, the risen Jesus meets His disciples in a very ordinary place: by the sea, in the midst of their daily work. After all that has happened—the Passion, the Resurrection, the confusion and the fear—the disciples go back to fishing. And yet, it is precisely there that the Lord comes to them. This is important. Jesus does not wait for perfect conditions or ideal faith. He enters into the ordinary and even into our discouragement. The disciples have fished all night and caught nothing. It is a quiet image of frustration, perhaps even of failure. But at dawn, Jesus stands on the shore and calls out to them. With a simple instruction, He transforms their emptiness into abundance. Then comes the moment of recognition. “It is the Lord!” And everything changes. After they come ashore, Jesus does something strikingly simple: He prepares a meal for them. The risen Lord, victorious over death, serves His disciples. This small, tender act reveals something profound about who God is. He is not distant. He draws near, feeds us, and restores us. And then there is Peter. After his three-fold denial, Jesus gives him the opportunity to profess his love three times: “Do you love me?” It is not a moment of humiliation, but of healing. Jesus does not trap Peter in his past; He calls him forward into mission: “Feed my sheep.” This Gospel speaks directly to us. Like the disciples, we often return to what is familiar when we feel uncertain or discouraged. We may even feel like our efforts bear little fruit. But the Lord stands on the shore of our lives, calling us to trust Him again. Like Peter, we carry our failures. Yet Jesus does not define us by them. He invites us to love Him now, in the present moment, and to follow Him forward. The message is simple but demanding: Christ is risen, and He is not distant. He meets us in the ordinary, fills what is empty, and calls us to love Him more deeply. The question He asks Peter, He asks each of us: “**Do you love me?**” Our answer is not just in words, but in the way we live—especially in how we care for those entrusted to us.

En el Evangelio del Tercer Domingo de Pascua, Jesús resucitado se encuentra con sus discípulos en un lugar muy ordinario: a la orilla del mar, en medio de su trabajo diario. Después de todo lo que ha sucedido—la Pasión, la Resurrección, la confusión y el miedo—los discípulos vuelven a pescar. Y, sin embargo, es precisamente ahí donde el Señor sale a su encuentro. Esto es importante. Jesús no espera condiciones perfectas ni una fe ideal. Él entra en lo ordinario e incluso en nuestro desánimo. Los discípulos han pescado toda la noche y no han recogido nada. Es una imagen silenciosa de frustración, quizá incluso de fracaso. Pero al amanecer, Jesús está en la orilla y les habla. Con una simple indicación, transforma su vacío en abundancia. Luego viene el momento del reconocimiento: “¿Es el Señor!” Y todo cambia. Después de llegar a la orilla, Jesús hace algo sorprendentemente sencillo: les prepara de comer. El Señor resucitado, vencedor de la muerte, sirve a sus discípulos. Este pequeño gesto revela algo profundo sobre quién es Dios. No es distante. Se acerca, nos alimenta y nos restaura. Y luego está Pedro. Después de haber negado a Jesús tres veces, recibe la oportunidad de profesar su amor tres veces: “¿Me amas?” No es un momento de humillación, sino de sanación. Jesús no encierra a Pedro en su pasado; lo llama hacia adelante, a la misión: “Apacienta mis ovejas.” Este Evangelio nos habla directamente. Como los discípulos, a menudo volvemos a lo conocido cuando nos sentimos inciertos o desanimados. Incluso podemos sentir que nuestros esfuerzos no dan fruto. Pero el Señor está en la orilla de nuestra vida, llamándonos a confiar nuevamente en Él. Como Pedro, llevamos nuestras fallas. Sin embargo, Jesús no nos define por ellas. Nos invita a amarlos ahora, en el momento presente, y a seguirlos hacia adelante. El mensaje es sencillo pero exigente: Cristo ha resucitado y no está lejos. Sale a nuestro encuentro en lo ordinario, llena lo que está vacío y nos llama a amarlos más profundamente. La pregunta que le hace a Pedro, nos la hace también a cada uno de nosotros: “**¿Me amas?**” Nuestra respuesta no está solo en palabras, sino en la manera en que vivimos—especialmente en cómo cuidamos a aquellos que nos han sido confiados.

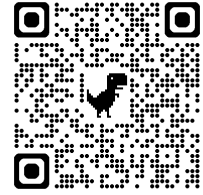
