**ISAIAH** is the Bible in miniature (66 chapters in Isaiah, 66 books in the Bible; first 39 deal with sin and judgment; next 27 deal with mercy and grace; both end with a new heaven and new earth).

**JEREMIAH**, a preacher's son, predicts doom and lives to see it. People and nations aren't too different: when backslidden, both often refuse to repent and be restored. Jeremiah's sermons have illustrations; i.e., potter/clay in chapter 18.

Jeremiah weeps over Jerusalem in **LAMENTATIONS** (six centuries later Jesus weeps over the same city). Jeremiah has lost everything but his life (and that is shaky). Yet when he reaches deep inside himself for an answer, he comes to a conclusion (3:23, 24).

The prophet **EZEKIEL** seems eccentric and even has visions that rattle bones (definitely not a bedtime story)! His bizarre behavior is for a reason: People may forget what they hear but not what they see.

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
