Office Notes 5 I remember the summer afternoon I was in my car, moving between visits to church members, and tuning in to AM 1120 to listen to Jack Buck and the Cardinals. As it turned out, the game had been called for rain. KMOX (the Mighty Mox as it was called) had picked up Rush Limbaugh doing his syndicated broadcast. Within 10 minutes I was appalled and embarrassed. I listened as long as I could and then turned it off in stunned disbelief. It didn't matter if I agreed or disagreed with his politics, I was shocked that someone so mean-spirited had been given 50,000 watts to shock his listeners and insult anyone who disagreed with him. Over the years I would, out of habit or hoping to hear a baseball game, tune in to KMOX. I moved from disbelief, to feeling offended, to confusion and disappointment that the legacy of long-time general manager (and faithful Christian) Robert Hyland had been hijacked. "Things can't get much worse than this," I recall thinking. I have never been more wrong in my life.

Thirty years later the fraying social fabric has been ripped to shreds and the veneer of civility damaged beyond recognition, at least in many public arenas. People seem drawn to cruelty and downright meanness as moths are to a flame. Honestly, it's easy to get caught up in it and behave like those with whom we disagree or by whom we are appalled. Politics, always a grown-up game, has descended into the theater of the grotesque; like an open mic night for thugs and bullies. Not only do they seem to turn their backs to one another they refuse to look for common ground, much less the common good. Yes I know we elected them.

We admire businesses and entrepreneurs not for being successful while also paying a fair wage and playing by the rules, but for making billions of dollars by any means they can with few ethical guard rails.

Religion — particularly our brand of Christianity - once thought to be a sanctuary for people with differing views to come together and embrace (or at least get through) our differences, has lost the middle and seems to tilt only one way or the other. The Christian faith has lost much of its appeal, not because religion is archaic (which it/we/I may be) but because we hardly resemble to the world what and who we claim to be. To be fair, almost all of society's' most venerated institutions have been deconstructed and muted by circumstance and sometimes it seems by intent.

Enamored of this cruel, crude theater we overlook the effects of bombastic, amped up, 24 hour a day hateful — often threatening - rhetoric, particularly on those who are the most emotionally vulnerable. Keep dangling the electric wire long enough and eventually some people will grab hold. Add to the tendencies toward isolation magnified and commoditized by technology — particularly among young males - and we have a recipe for profound loneliness, misery and, at the extremes, violence and murder. It is no longer only someone's character being assassinated, it's someone's daughter, mother, husband or son.

Think what you will about what happened at UVU on September 10th, a conspiracy of the left or of the right, but we should recognize Charlie Kirk, and too many others have been victims of hate that has been legitimized by the extremes of a society where the middle ground is eroding. Will it come to a point when only the poles exist, when we can only abhor and wish harm on those whom we don't like; with whom we disagree? I wonder and worry.

Lest you think this is an old preacher's rant about the good old days, I want to mention I was around for the assassination of a couple Kennedy's, Martin Luther King Jr., and Vietnam war protests. Those weren't great times either.

My point isn't to suggest the world going to hell in a handbasket. In fact, I believe deep down in my bones the message of Christ is the hope of the world and our banner to carry. The church has a place and an important voice. We have, or can have, a disproportionate influence on just what sort of society we live in and will hand to our children and grandchildren. And we don't need 50,000 watts or a cable channel or a Tik-Tok account (though those might help), we only need some disciples who are willing to keep at our lives in faithfulness and hope armed with the most powerful message in human history.

So keep broadcasting in word and deed, dear sisters and brothers, the good news that love wins. ~Duayne

"Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up." - Galatians 6:9 (NIV)

If you were at church on Fall Fest Sunday, you heard, or saw, the Bible verse above quite frequently. It is the theme of NCC's new program year. It was also the theme of September's Messy Church, using the children's book "Have You Filled a Bucket Today? by Carol McCloud. If you have not read or heard this incredible children's book I encourage you to stop by the children's section in your local library, or Google the title and listen to one of the many YouTube videos of the book being read. The premise of this book is that everyone carries an invisible bucket that holds good feelings and positive emotions. When people act kindly or show love, they "fill" another's bucket, and this also fills their own bucket. Conversely, "dipping" or acting meanly or unkindly empties someone's bucket and doesn't fill your own. The core idea is that showing kindness, respect, and care fosters happiness for both the giver and receiver, making it a practice for building positive relationships and a happy community. My favorite page of the book tells us that bucket filling (or doing good) is fun and easy to do, that it doesn't matter how young or old you are, it doesn't have to cost money, and it doesn't have to take much time. My hope is that we don't become weary of being bucket fillers. How have you been a bucket filler today?
