And speaking of 25 years ago, thank you for recognizing the anniversary of our ministry with you. It's been a fast two and a half decades, to say the least! Blessings upon you for your good nature, forbearance and faithfulness.

The annual financial enlistment campaign gets underway this month. The Budget Committee, Trustees and Council have done their best to put together a budget that reflects the values and vision of the congregation while staying within our financial means; no small task.

About vision and values: the Council recognizes NCC has entered a time of transition as our beloved Pastoral Associate, Ronda Bower, plans to retire in August. Even as there are big shoes to fill, the church's leadership has the opportunity to look strategically at the gifts and needs of the congregation and envision ways to move faithfully into the future. Strategic planning will be on the congregation's agenda in the coming year.

The sanctuary refreshment project remains on the Trustees agenda each month as we discern next steps. The solar panels and the parking lot moved ahead of this project, and for good reasons. The solar panels have reduced our electric bill significantly and the parking lot and sidewalk have been safety and aesthetic improvements. The Trustees are now focused on sanctuary improvements, working out funding and a timeline for the remediation of the tile floor, improving accessibility, installation of nave seating and AV/Livestream improvements.

In September, Sarah Paige joined the NCC staff team as part-time Director of Teen Ministries. Sarah has been a great addition and has already lined up where the 2026 Youth Mission Trip Team will be going. Do pitch in to support our Teen Ministry as you can. NCC has a great group of children and teens whose presence and

Ronda's Remarks—Ronda Bower

"Let mutual love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever." ~Hebrews 13:1-2, 8

You probably notice that in almost all of the advertising I do for events at NCC, I add something like: "This is a great time to invite a friend or neighbor." Inviting others to come to church is important to me. Some of you know that growing up, my family did not go to church. When I was in high school, a friend from school invited me to go to youth group at her church. I accepted and it was the first time I had been inside a church. I found a place where I was loved and accepted by the teens and the congregation. That invitation started me in a life of church work.

Years ago I shared a story in one of my newsletters articles that I heard from a speaker at a conference. It went like this: An older woman, we'll call her Ann, was a long-time member of her church. One day a new family moved into the house next to hers. Ann took over a plate of cookies and introduced herself. She met her new neighbors, a man and woman, 5 children, and another child on the way. Ann enjoyed her time with this family. Through conversation, Ann learned the man and woman were not yet married and the children were from each of their previous marriages. As Ann walked home, she thought of how wonderful it would be for this family to go to her church. Ann went to her pastor and asked him if she could invite the family to church. The pastor encouraged her to do so. Ann asked how she should start and the pastor let her know that she had already started with her plate of cookies. A few days later, Ann took over another plate of cookies to her new neighbors' house and told them about her church and asked them if they would like to go with her to church on Sunday. The woman was very hesitant saying that she was afraid that they wouldn't be welcome because they were not married. Ann reassured the woman that this would not be a problem, and on Sunday morning the family went to church with Ann. The family was welcomed into the church and as time passed, the family became a very active part of the congregation. Their children brought friends to church, and the parents talked to others about what the church meant to them. Years later, at Ann's memorial service, the neighbor was one of the people who spoke about Ann. The woman said how thankful she was that Ann had brought over the cookies and had invited them to go to church with her. Not only had this family that Ann had invited to church become active members of the church, they also had invited many others to church. All from a plate of cookies and an invitation to go to church.
