





Consuming Fire

Our God is a consuming fire, the Scriptures tell us (see Hebrews 12:29; Deuteronomy 4:24).

And in this week's Gospel, Jesus uses the image of fire to describe the demands of discipleship.

The fire he has come to cast on the earth is the fire that he wants to blaze in each of our hearts. He made us from the dust of the earth (see Genesis 2:7), and filled us with the fire of the Holy Spirit in baptism (see Luke 3:16).

We were baptized into his death (see Romans 6:3). This is the baptism our Lord speaks of in the Gospel this week. The baptism with which He must be baptized is His passion and death, by which He accomplished our redemption and sent forth the fire of the Spirit on the earth (see Acts 2:3).

The fire has been set, but it is not yet blazing. We are called to enter deeper into the consuming love of God. We must examine our consciences and our actions, submitting ourselves to the revaling fire of God's Word (see 1 Corinthians 3:13).

In our struggle against sin, we have not yet resisted to the point of shedding our own blood, Paul tells us in this week's Epistle. We have not undergone the suffering that Jeremiah suffers in the First Reading this week.

But this is what true discipleship requires. To be a disciple is to be inflamed with the love of the God. It is to have an unquenchable desire for holiness and zeal for the salvation of our brothers and sisters.

Being His disciple does not bring peace in the false way that the world proclaims peace (see Jeremiah 8:11). It means division and hardship. It may bring us to conflict with our own flesh and blood.

But Christ is our peace (see Ephesians 2:14). By his cross, he has lifted us up from the mire of sin and death—as he will rescue the prophet Jeremiah (see Jeremiah 38:10).

And as we sing in the Psalm this week, we trust in our deliverer.

FAMILY FAITH FORMATION



Kindergarten - 5th Grade

Our Lady of the Assumption and Saint Ann by the Sea's faith formation program is family centered. We aim to foster a community in which parents and catechists journey together to form young disciples. In order to do so, our community must be an open-hearted community that is willing to grow together spiritually. It is our hope that in forming parents and family as the prime examples of how to know and love Jesus, we will not only be forming children, but also inspiring lifelong faith formation.

How does it work?

Family Faith Formation will be a hybrid program that blends in-church and at-home instruction, supplemented with at-church formation activities. Families will gather at least twice a month at church on Sunday afternoons or Tuesday evenings. Once a month, parents and children will come together for a group presentation for parents and children, followed by grade-level instruction for the children and small group instruction and discussion for the parents. Later in the month, parents and children will come together again for grade-level instruction on specific themes (Advent, Lent, Saints, Sacraments, etc.) and small-group faith sharing for parents. Families may choose either the Sunday or Tuesday timeslot for classes.

In between the two at-church classes, parents will be the primary catechists for students through at-home instruction. The presentations at church will include unit overviews to give the parents the keys they need for at-home instruction. The small groups are opportunities for parents to share their experiences with at-home instruction and provide support for one another. While this is a family centered, parent-led experience, no one is catechizing their child alone. The Family Faith Formation program relies heavily on journeying tother as a community.

In addition to the classes, there will also be a supplemental Family Fun Night each month. Rather than formal class-room instruction, these nights bring the theology off the page into a tangible, livable format. Family Fun Nights will include an array of crafts, teaching masses, music, movies, and other engaging activities.

From March-May, Communion II students will have additional retreats in preparation for First Penance and First Eucharist.

How can you help?

We need catechists and volunteers to help this program run smoothly! We will be using the Christ Our Life program from Loyola Press as our primary resource for this program. The program comes with catechist guides and lesson plans, so you don't need to be a theologian or expert to teach.

THE SOLEMNITY OF THE ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY August 15th

What is the Assumption?

The first name of this solemnity was the Feast of Mary, Mother of God. Later, its name in the East carried over, the Dormition (or Falling Asleep) of Mary. In the West, it became known as the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

This solemnity celebrates the fact that Mary's Assumption is "a pledge of the future participation of the members of the mystical Body of Christ in the paschal glory of the Risen Christ." It shows that the Lord "reserves a munificent reward for his humble Servant because of her faithful cooperation with the divine plan, which is a destiny of fullness, happiness, glorification of her immaculate soul, her virginal body, perfect configuration to her Risen Son" (Directory, no. 180). The Mass has a proper vigil, and the solemnity replaces the Mass of the day when it occurs on a Sunday in Ordinary Time.



What does this all mean?

On November 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII declared the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, which the Church celebrates every year on August 15. Simply put, the dogma of the Assumption states that at the end of her life, the Blessed Virgin Mary was taken, body and soul, into Heaven.

While this event isn't reflected in Sacred Scripture, it is clearly part of the Church's earliest observance. In the sixth century, St. John Damascene wrote in one of his sermons, "Your sacred and happy soul, as nature will have it, was separated in death from your most blessed and immaculate body, and although the body was duly interred, it did not remain in the state of death, neither was it dissolved by decay; your most pure and sinless body was not left on earth, but you were transferred to your heavenly throne."

Theologically speaking, death is often understood to be a consequence of original sin. Since Mary was conceived without Original Sin, some theologians have wondered if Mary died or if perhaps she was taken into Heaven without experiencing death. The Catechism of the Catholic Church doesn't answer this question but simply states, "The most blessed Virgin Mary, when the course of her earthly life was completed, was taken up body and soul into the glory of heaven" (no. 974)

The Solemnity of the Assumption reminds us of the unique role that Mary served in the process of our salvation. Although she was without sin, we have the possibility of receiving God's forgiveness for our sins through Christ. Her entry into Heaven prefigures our own hope of experiencing the same eternal life.
