PLAY HARD and LEAVE IT ALL ON THE ICE!



Rev. Mark Marshall gave this brilliant sermon at the 100th Anniversary worship at Westminster United Church, Thamesford – "Let's Sing a Hundred Praises" on June 8, 2025. (based on the Pentecost story from Acts 2 and modernizing the inaugural worship of the United Church of Canada.)

"That All May Be One"

The First Period of Game 7 of the Church Union Cup. The Galilee **Disciples** have had a rough go this season - it's surprising they've made it this far. Their coach for the past three years or so has been absolutely killed in the press, but his message seems to be making a comeback. Will he live again? He explains to the team that, even though he must go, he will send another to inspire them - to help lift their spirits and bring them together as a true team. But in this game against the Flying Pharisees, they seem worn, lost even. Can The Disciples get a second 'wind?' Can something 'spark' them to deliver? Can something bring them together to really understand one another? Can this advocate that their coach spoke of give birth to a true team? It's troubled times for the Disciples - we can only hope this new spirit can help them on to victory . . .

Second Period - Well, it was a rough first period. The Disciples almost looked drunk out there, but they assure us they're still in good form. In fact, they promise their second string will be playing as though they're looking 1900 years into the future - 1925 to be exact. It's a whole new team. They've pulled up players from the Methodist, Presbyterian, and Congregationalist farm teams to make this union. It's been a tough slog to bring them together, but, now in this Mutual Street Arena, we're going to see just how much they can lean on each other to make one unified team. They think back to their beloved coach's words - "that all may be one" (John 17:21.) The opposition will bring their A-game and make it tough – trying to divide this new Disciples team, to play to their weaknesses, to challenge them and that for which they stand. Will the Disciples play as a team, carry each other's load, lend a hand, be strong in the power play and rally when they're shorthanded? Only time will tell if they are truly prepared to work together for the win . . .

Third Period Now we're in the third and final period – a real nailbiter of a game! With yet another string of players, we can only ask if these all-new Disciples will keep playing the game they've been playing or if they will respond to everything their opposition is throwing at them and play the same old game, but in new ways. The team looks leaner, maybe even showing some fatigue, or dare we say, age? But they still seem resolved – to follow what their coach told them, to keep their stick on the ice and to play as a team. The puck's about to drop, so let's check in on the action:

Hatred wins the faceoff and the puck is taken up the ice by that strong combo of Fear and Division. Fear takes the shot and Hope makes the save. You have to hand it to The Disciples goalie - Hope gives up but defends never relentlessly. And now Patience and **Integrity** skate away with the puck, beaten by the **Pride and Envy** defense. Now Courage and Empathy defend while Greed and Manipulation have their attempt. It's a real battle between the two forwards, but now **Hope** has the puck. Hope crosses the blue line on a real breakaway. Hope shoots . . .

We interrupt this programming for a special announcement:

Do you ever feel like it's all too much? Like you have a hundred years of toil and strain beating you down? **We have an answer -The United Church of Canada**. **We are striving** (Continued on page 2)

Leave it all on the ice. Trust that God has it all in hand. And come together as we have for over 100 years. Bring your past, hope for the future, but most of all, be present—on the cusp of a new century, together.

St. David's United Church: Faithful Footprints Grant

The Faithful Footprints Grants are designed to reduce financial barriers for energy efficient projects. The goal of the grants is to start the process of de-carbonizing the United Church of Canada buildings across the country.

St. David's United Church recently received approval for a **\$30,000** Faithful Footprints Grant from the UCC. We are helping the UCC reach the goal of 80% carbon reduction in their buildings by 2050. Projects completed at St. David's include:

Replacement of our double-sided LED lawn sign

- Replacement of refrigerator (no freezer)
- Installation of 7- LED Floodlight fixturesparking lot
- Replacement of our commercial gas stove with
 2 free-standing electric ranges



- Installation of 3- LED Floodlight fixtures with 1-RAB Two Head LED Motion Sensor Light-north side of church greenspace
- Installation of motion sensor lights in washrooms
- Lighting upgrade to LED's -entire church except the Sanctuary



 Installation of 2 ductless air conditioners with heat pumps in Kirk Hall.

Thanks to the UCC we were able to reduce the costs of these projects to St. David's by 44.3%!

St David's UC is in the process of cosponsoring to bring his wife and son here. Prayers that Kidane may find work and prayers for safety and wellbeing of Noah and Freweyni.

Salmawit from Sudan who escaped to Egypt (her story is in May 2024 CONNECTIONS here) has been missing since January 15. She was a veterinarian in Sudan and taught English. It is heart breaking that it is common for refugees to be kidnapped and taken back and imprisoned in their home. She is co-sponsored by her cousin Luella and husband Jacob here in Woodstock. Prayers for her safety and well being.

WESTMINSTER UNITED,

THAMESFORD. Fundraising continues for the Syrian family of 5 (single mother and 4 children) who are still in Lebanon. They stay in touch and so far, are safe but constantly hear rockets being fired overhead. We await the next steps from our government.

INDIGENOUS HISTORY AND US

June marked the 100th Anniversary of the United Church of Canada with celebrations like we had never seen before.



June is **National Indigenous History Month** and June 21st is National Indigenous Peoples Day.

Any month is the right one to look at and appreciate the history of a people who have well over 20,000 years of experience living successfully together on this land we call home.

For Indigenous people everything was sacred and connected. Human beings were one with nature. Harmony was foundational. Respect for all living things and for the earth was a sacred task. The land was not "owned" by the people, it belonged to the Creator.

An example of a desire to live in harmony is a story from the 17th century, in the early days of contact between Indigenous people and Europeans. An Indigenous person seeing a French person spanking a child was horrified. Striking a child was breaking a fundamental rule of peace and harmony.

There were rivalries among the Indigenous nations, and armed conflicts over territory; rivalries intensified when alliances were made by the Wendat Confederacy with the French and by the Five Nations (Haudenosaunee) Confederacy with the English. In spite of this, historians see the Indigenous culture as less violent than that of Europeans who settled here.

The forming of Confederacies was a way of reducing conflicts among Indigenous nations. In the Five Nations Confederacy (later Six Nations) the rules for living in harmony and the rules for settling disputes were maintained through oral tradition. This was known as **The Great Law of Peace**. This law changed and was

July 30, 2025 Page 8 of 8 amended over the years, as required, providing a dynamic rather than a static set of rules. For one person to recite the entire law, as occurred on occasion, took three days.

As we know, Indigenous people gave the rest of the world **a glimpse of democracy**. With the Six Nations Confederacy, the Chiefs were chosen by vote with only clan mothers voting.

What could we have learned or what can we now learn from Indigenous history? A great deal, but I will mention two things:

First, gender equality. The Six Nations Confederacy highly valued the work and wisdom of women. Indigenous people were not just decades but probably centuries ahead of us in gender equality. Decisions at the Confederation level were made by both men and women

In contrast the first General Council of the United Church was made up of 350 members, 348 men and two women. It took 11 more years before our church ordained a woman. Historically, we mostly ignored gender equality in the ministry of Jesus. We did not pay enough attention to St. Paul's selection of both women and men for pastoral ministry, or to his indictment of patriarchy (Gal. 5:25).

Second, for Indigenous people, nature was and is sacred. Everything is connected. We are attempting to recover that harmony of life. It is an uphill battle since we are already in a climate crisis.

Also in June 2025, our Parliament rushed through <u>Bill C-5</u> to speed up development. Indigenous groups objected, fearing that environment issues will not be sufficiently considered. It is our hope that this time Indigenous wisdom will be heard, and heeded. <u>Editor Emeritus</u> - Glen Wright, with Indigenous History information
