Personal stories were featured in the film as well as noted scholars where Love helped folks stay connected. Scholarship affects change in Biblical translations. One man, Rev. David Fearon (1938 -2023) who served at Norwich UC (1981-1988) challenged the Committee's use of 'homosexual' in 1 **Corinthians 6:9.** 10 years later the New Revised Standard Version changed the translation to 'sexual perverts'! Our world is changing dramatically. God's love is constant and found in between our stories.



The Mohawk Residential School (aka the Mush Hole) ceased as



a school in 1997. It continued to be used for offices until it was declared unsafe. It has been transformed into a

place of learning, reflection and reconciliation. It reopened on September 30 and now stands as both a **memorial** to a dark aspect of Canada's history but also a tribute to the resilience of the survivors. The site has housed The Woodland Culture Centre, open since 1972. It has art galleries , a history museum and a library on the ways folks interacted with Indigenous Nations over the years. Earlier in August, my husband and I attended the powerful film **Nature of Healing** at Six Nations hosted by 6 survivors of the Mohawk Institute - described as a prison for children (15,000) where they lost language, families and culture. Some were kidnapped to be taken to the school. All have dealt with the trauma of the abuse experienced continue to deal with it - but they want their children and grandchildren to know of their resilience. Since 2021 the Survivors' Secretariat (see here) has led investigation into missing children and unmarked burials at the Mohawk Institute. It will be well worth a trip to Brantford to go through the restored site. The plans for Indigenous Peoples Day are related in this CBC story from Hamilton (see here).

The SIXTIES SCOOP

Not every change is good. The amendments to the Indian Act in 1951 (original act was 1876) is such a case. It led to child welfare agencies placing many Indigenous children in foster care. Data is fragmented due to the inconsistent structure of those agencies. Recently, the



Woodstock Library hosted Dr. Cody Groat, assistant professor in the Dept. of History and Indigenous Studies Program,

University of Western Ontario, Mohawk and band member of Six Nations. His father was a survivor of the Sixties Scoop, and his paternal grandparents survivors of the Indian Residential School System including the Mohawk Institute. Cody grew up in Ingersoll.

While Indigenous people are only 10% of the Canadian population, they represent 60-70% of child welfare cases. Clearly, a difference in cultures. Calls for a National Inquiry into the Sixties Scoop are warranted to find the truth of our racial bias. Yes. Every Child Matters. But the administrative structures re privacy and information are deeply troubling.

CREATION STORIES FROM FAITH AND SCIENCE

Most of the seasons of the church year we know: Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, Pentecost and a season called Ordinary Time. There is also Creation season from September 1 to October 4, which begins with prayer for the care of the earth. Timely, to say the least, given that we are in a climate crisis, faced with the task of reversing global warming. The fact that we could set the planet back a billion years, is mind numbing.

The creation theme leads us to two wonder-full sources, one <u>faith source</u> from Genesis and the other from <u>science</u>.

Scholars tell us that the creation story in Genesis 1 was written in the fifth century BCE just after the exile, the most violent time of Israel's history. Israel learned that the land is losable. They were free to go home from exile but where was God? In that context, Genesis 1 was a story of reassurance. God was not absent but the creator of all that was. The author, scholars call "J", tells them, through story, that the world gets messed up because people (Adam and Eve) make wrong choices. Choosing power instead of love gets you a one-way ticket out of Eden, but no one, (Cain), regardless of what he or she has done, gets beyond God's love and care. How awesome.

When I look at creation from science, I am also struck with awesome wonder.

As we know, creation, according to science, was 13.8 billion years in the making. It began with an explosive burst of energy that sent space debris in all directions. For about nine billion years it may have looked like chaos. What turned this **chaos to creativity was gravity. I**

like to think of it as getting together, as <u>making connections</u>. The space dust and rocks were attracted to other dust and rocks; the gases reached out to other



gases. The rocks formed planets, and the gases became suns and stars.

About a billion years ago life on earth was

limited to algae in the waters of the earth. But life is not static, it seeks more complexity. Algae in search of more sun, moved to shallow waters. To get even more light algae attempted to leave the sea to live on land, but there was no soil. Year after year it failed. Algae finally made it to land with the help of fungi which broke down minerals from rocks. After fungi came plants. Decaying plants along with minerals from rocks led to the formation of soil. This creative evolutionary process had begun, from plants to animals to humans.

We are blessed with two stories of creation, one from Genesis 1, the other from science. For me, God's awesome handiwork is in both. For how our earth came to be we look to science. In Genesis we see an author attempting to explain why our world sometimes gets so messed up. He also shows us God stepping into the brokenness with unconditional love.

Today, like never before, we are called to care for the earth. The earth is God's precious gift to us, marked "Fragile. Handle with Care"; words for our time and for all seasons.
