Integrative Method of Worship

There are many styles of worship. At First Presbyterian, our worship style, generally, is a traditional reformed service with liturgy, confession and classic Christian hymnody. Even with our traditional emphasis, we believe that relevant worship in the 21st century provides space for congregants and visitors to do integrative spiritual work. By this, we mean that our daily experiences inform and affect our theology and vice versa. In worship at First Presbyterian, we are striving to integrate experience and theology so that we feel responsive and genuine in our faith as we live our daily lives. Worship planning is anchored and planned around the sermon or the sermon series. Series are planned to address any one of four areas: mission of the church, life of the church family, Biblical literacy and current hot topics. We strive to be balanced and thoughtful in what is offered for your prayer and reflection. However, because integration and responsiveness is the goal, we will often address sensitive issues. Prayers and confessions are written by our pastor. Our Children's Spirit Box time is the opportunity for children to have a choice and voice in worship. We welcome you, as you are, to each worship service at First Presbyterian. Integrative work is not easy. It is not always comfortable, but it is essential to a vital church. Please feel free to reach out to our pastor with your questions.



PASTOR LESLIE KING

This year might be characterized as both at the front lines and in the balcony. Front line work takes us into the management of details and experiencing relationships.

- Visiting members during ordinary days and during times when life becomes more intense remains an important privilege. This is the grounding work of ministry, and I continue to learn so much from my visits with each of you. Thank you for making slow time to be your pastor.
- This year has included the redevelopment of communities for youth and children. This is tier work of listening to parents, inviting adults to shepherd the communities on Sunday morning, and Wednesday night and finally encouraging the young people to bring their gifts and fill their church home with energy. This work is slow but progressing. Front line work has also happened on Baylor Campus in the expansion of Open Table, our chartered ecumenical organization with
- On Baylor Campus in the expansion of Open Table, our chartered ecumenical organization with Calvary, Dayspring, 7th and James and University Baptist Church. We Presbyterians are holding our own in this collaboration with energy and resources. Securing the grant from 1001 Worshipping Communities of our denomination, we brought 20,000.00 in programming money to Open Table to better serve a generous theology among Baylor students.

Balcony work is attention to the big picture of life and cultural trends.

- Prayer connections in our Realm platform remain a balcony picture of the array of congregational experiences that give rise to joy, sorrow, grief, and personal transformation. It is a privilege to create a hub for our congregational awareness and the mystery of prayer that supports and sustains our church family and its wider community. Not unrelated to prayer
- connections is the task of preaching, writing weekly liturgy, and establishing educational opportunities. This, too, is balcony work as we consider world circumstances and the intersection of faith, politics and questions of meaning and purpose in our own lives. The ability to write and construct is very related to the visiting of bullet point one above. Neurodivergence is a current example of cultural curiosity. We were able to take an opportunity with Grace
- Presbytery to be an early adoption cohort that considers neurodiversity in worship. The congregation continues (after decades of work with autism) to show strong support for this subject. We look forward to bringing this balcony issue of science and culture into the frontlines of our experience as a church family.

A REPORT FROM

CONGREGATIONAL LIFE

Major Accomplishments for 2024-2025: Successfully had two Dinners for 8 (February 1 and July 19), Beer & Hymns (March 23), Ice Cream Social (September 7), Pig Roast (October 11), All Church Retreat (November 7-9) and Caroling and Soup (December 20). We began emailing reminders to Coffee Fellowship hosts.

Significant Learnings for 2024-2025: Dinners for 8 has more engagement during the spring and fall than in the summer.

PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

Presbyterian Women FPC met monthly from September to May for Bible study, understanding the wider PW mission, and fellowship, including celebrations during Advent and at the end of the year. The Bible study, a PCUSA publication, was titled "Let Justice Roll Down," focusing on environmental and economic justice. Leslie King facilitated the Jessons.

PW/FPC made monetary contributions to three offerings of the PW/PCUSA and collected funds to support three local organizations related to the environment – Urban Reap, Hunger Free Community Coalition, and Meals on Wheels. The membership grew this year after a concerted effort to recruit all FPC women to become active members. There were approximately 30 active members (as listed on Realm). PW also proactively increased its visibility in the congregation with a Moment for Mission during worship. Having more members maintains the sustainability of the group!

ADMINISTRATION

- **AutoInsurance:** Worked with Shane to identify a new provider for auto insurance following cancellation of prior policy.
 - Oil and Gas Top Lease: Entered negotiations related to an unsolicited offer of an oil
- and gas top-lease relating to a mineral interest owned by the church. The proposed lessee is currently producing with horizontal wells on both sides of our lease. Roane Lacy, with Session approval, developed and made a counter proposal for payment of \$350/acre for a 3-year paid-up lease and an option for a two-year extension for the same amount and a royalty of 1/4 or 25%. There was no response to this counter, and no further contact was received.
 - **Property and Liability Insurance:** Worked with Facilities and Finance to identify and obtain affordable property and liability insurance coverage from a new provider following the non renewal by the former carrier, which abandoned the Texas church property insurance market.
 - **Elevators:** Working with facilities and finance to address issues related to unmet needs for maintenance and repair of our elevators, or whether to revise or terminate and replace the existing provider. This project is still in the discovery phase.
 - Child Safety: Continued updating a list of steps to be taken and required action items
- to be satisfied to comply with our expectations as well as the requirements for Child Protection of the Presbytery and the laws of the State of Texas. Detailed information to further describe and explain these steps and requirements is contained in a full policy document, on file.
- **Energy contract:** The company we used last time is working to provide sample agreements from several suppliers to give us a head start on making a choice quickly since when daily bids come out, they expire at 4:00 PM (not sure which time zone) that day. We are also considering whether, notwithstanding the advice that increased summer energy expenses are not the best gauge of future pricing, it may be wise to lock in a steady price now rather than wait.
- **Policies:** Consider creation of policies for conflict-of-interest reports, whistleblower processes, and document destruction.

WORSHIP

Communion was celebrated each week of the year at our 8:30 worship service. This service is growing in numbers for both adults and young people. Communion was celebrated in November (2024), February, March, May, June, July, August, September, and October at the 10:30 service and at the Church Retreat at Mo-Ranch in November. Communion was also celebrated on Christmas Eve 2024 and Maundy Thursday 2025. We continue to streamline and find more efficient ways to recruit and train communion servers, for instance, through new visual diagrams and more robust clean-up instructions.

We were honored to celebrate the baptisms of Remi Bartley, Lukas Preddy, Phoenix, and Brianna Harren.

A variety of liturgists have played integral roles in worship over the past year, and our new Director for Congregational Life is seamlessly moving into worship leadership. We are grateful for guest preachers who have contributed in a variety of ways over the past year, including Dr. Neil Messer, Dr. Taylor Holleyman (prior to his employment), and Dr. Devan Stahl.

This year we held special services of Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Pentecost, Reformation Sunday, All Saints and Christmas Eve. We try out new ideas for special worship services; for instance, this year, we included the opportunity for members of the congregation to write prayers on ribbons to wave during Pentecost Sunday. Additionally, Youth Sunday, Confirmation Sunday, and Children's Sunday continue to be bright spots for our congregation as young people emerge as leaders.

We are grateful to the music team for their work and leadership. Special thanks go to Chancel Choir Director, Austin Ingalls, and Organist, Becky Ward, for their leadership in coordinating service music. Thanks to Amy Goodman for direction and development of the St. Cecilia bell choir. Last, but not least, thank you to Tricia Anderson, our 8:30 accompanist, who brings innovation and spiritual attention to our worship.

We are continuing to work on making the Zoom community as integrated with the service as possible. Leslie often shares chats from the Zoom room with the congregation to remind them of the contributions from these congregants. We are grateful to members of the streaming team for their tireless efforts to bring us together during worship services and to Our Hybrid House for continuing to propose ways to include remote members.

Franklin Estate Endowment portion allocated for capital projects provided the necessary funds to accelerate the scheduling of full roof replacement and office and 1950s classroom wing window replacement.

- Parsons Roofing, with a bid of \$97,518, was chosen in January 2025 to fully replace the church buildings' roofs. Facilities Committee members hosted a preconstruction meeting on January 27, 2025, which helped create a positive environment and reliable communication between all involved during the life of the project. The project began on February 25, 2025, and was completed in late March 2025. Corbell Enterprises LLC, dba Gather & Co, with a bid of \$151,543, was contracted in July 2025 to replace about 116 windows in the office and 1950s classroom wings. The project includes adding eight egress windows in various rooms located in the basement and first floors. The work commenced the week of October 6, 2025.
- The upper story of the Christian Formation wing received a lifted ceiling and a restored ceiling. This significant project replaced HVAC vents and allowed for restored lighting to enhance the space.
- Humidity problems in the building were remedied with the installation of a dehumidifier.
- Alden Organ Company is engaged to restore the balcony organ façade beginning in October 2025.

Ongoing flooding issues in the Fellowship Hall kitchen and stage area culminated in two plumbing improvements on September 15, 2025. Mike Staas Services was retained for \$830 to secure the existing, but no longer needed, grease trap and repair a clean-out in the men's restroom. The plumber piped through the grease trap, after removing the plastic housing of the pit itself, and filled it in with sand and structural rebar, and concrete. After multiple rainfall seasons presenting with flooding generated from the vicinity of the grease trap, it is hoped that the removal of said grease trap will remove the flooding issue entirely. However, the next rainfall season will be integral to determining if this is the final solution.

Significant Learnings for 2024-2025:

To the benefit of the church herself, and all her patronage, it was important for the Facilities Committee to lean on other members with experience in other trades to ensure solid ground and efficient communication and expectations between contractors and staff.

Mr. Chip Somerville, an experienced attorney, was integral in reviewing contractor bids and proposals to help determine the best contractor for each capital project. His expertise in contract law benefited the committee in choosing the right fit and advocating for the church in an educated and compassionate manner.

Mr. John Plaskett, an experienced mechanical engineer, was integral in reviewing the existing condition of the Fellowship Hall kitchen flooding issues, preparing a possible solution and the subsequent retention of Mike Staas Services to conduct the work needed to mitigate the existing grease trap.




A REPORT FROM **FINANCE**

The Finance Committee of First Presbyterian Church Waco has held a meeting proceeding each of the monthly Session meetings. The Committee consists of church members, Phil Hering, Chip Somerville, Donna Black, Lyndon Olson, Senior Pastor Leslie King, Church Treasurer Mark Harren, and Operations Manager Shane Montoya.

The Committee reviews the monthly and YTD budget, balance sheet and income statements prior to the monthly report to the Session, with attention to all-church income and expenditures by various Session committees serving the church's mission. In addition, the Committee reviews the expenditures of maintenance, and capital improvements, which have been determined to be necessary by other Session committees or the Senior Pastor. This past year, we worked closely with the facilities committee to allocate the Franklin Estate gift and will secure a Review of Agreed Upon Procedures from Capin Crouse Financial Services.

The Finance Committee solicits an annual next-year budget request from the Session Committees, reviews, and uses the Church Treasurer's predictions for revenue projections, makes adjustments as deemed prudent, and presents to the Session for approval. With ongoing careful analysis, the Church has maintained a positive financial outlook for years, with dedicated and committed members. While being a downtown church with a 120+ year-old building presents unique challenges, the Finance Committee is prayerfully convinced that First Presbyterian Church can continue to provide and serve God's people on the corner of 11th and Austin Ave., now and forever.

A REPORT FROM **PERSONNEL**



Major Accomplishments for 2024-2025:

Throughout the year, the Committee assisted with updating employee job descriptions and providing feedback concerning suggested staffing structures. The Committee also supported our Pastor, Head of Staff, as she helped navigate staff enrichment: Austin Ingalls accepted into Princeton Theological Seminary's Master of Theology with an emphasis in Justice and Public Life, and Shane Montoya begins a leadership cohort program with the Lewis Center for Church Leadership.

The Committee worked with the Associate Pastor Nominating Committee throughout the year to offer support as the APNC worked to find the best candidate. The Committee assisted in developing a Congregational Life Director position description, worked with the Treasurer to provide a salary for the new position, and provided support to our Pastor, Head of Staff as she navigated the conversation with our Presbytery to call a Congregational Life Director candidate with the intent for the candidate to pursue ordination. The Committee was pleased Dr. Taylor Holleyman accepted the position.

The Committee completed annual reviews with each staff member, and we discussed goals with employees as a part of their review as well. The Committee has continued to be a sounding board and attempted to be a support to Leslie, as the Church continues to see changes and challenges in being fully staffed, as the church saw turnover in staff positions. In addition, the Committee has worked with the Treasurer to propose a personnel budget for 2026, which invests in our staff through raises. The Committee hopes to challenge the congregation to look at the need for a full-time Director of Christian Formation in the coming year(s).

Significant Learnings for 2024-2025:

Learned from the continued challenges of staffing structures for the Church as it continued to be in flux due to staff departures and changes.

Gratitude:

Gratitude for the entire staff that continues to help the Church grow and continually adapt to the ever-changing landscape of being Church in the world, especially grateful to Leslie and her strong leadership. In addition, gratitude for the Associate Pastor Nominating Committee, as that committee worked to find an outstanding candidate.

OUTREACH

MajorAccomplishments for 2024-2025:

The Outreach Committee's accomplishments in the past year include:

- Funds distribution to 8 Waco-based organizations, with grants totaling \$40,000.00. Our Outreach theme for 2025 has been "mental wellbeing," and grants were allocated in part according to applicants' engagement with this theme.
- Monthly "Service Saturdays" working with our Outreach partners. These included on-site
 workdays, collection drives, and Easter and Christmas offerings. Our partners include the
 Carter Blood Center, China Spring Cares, Compassion Ministry, the Cove, Habitat for
 Humanity, South Waco Elementary, and Talitha Koum. The 2024 Christmas offering went to
 Montreat, NC, flood relief. The 2025 Easter offering went to the Family Abuse Center.
- Selection of "displacement" for our 2026 Outreach theme. Grant application forms will be circulated to Outreach partners and posted on the FPC website later this month. \$673 from on-hand assistance was used to provide bus tickets and one hotel stay for
- individuals in need. Additional funds donated by the congregation were used to supply emergency buckets for flood relief efforts.

Significant Learnings for 2024-2025:

This year, Outreach has had productive (and continuing) conversations regarding:

• Balancing (1) our commitments to existing outreach partners with (2) the potential for attracting new partnerships. This tension is felt most acutely during our grant distribution process. We wish to continue supporting organizations we have supported for years, and our past "by invitation" process helped to ensure that virtually all applicants receive some funds. A more open application process would dilute the impact of funding but might allow FPC to foster new partnerships that better align with our annual themes. This year, we will send out our usual invites but also post the application on FPC's website without further publicity. The committee will reflect on whether this approach is preferable after the application cycle has concluded. Related to the previous item, the committee seeks to clarify the procedure for assessing grant applications and allocating funds.

Gratitude:

Outreach would especially like to recognize the work of outgoing moderator, Sarah Lieber, for her expert, energetic leadership last year, and particularly for shouldering additional responsibilities following the departure of Associate Pastor, Rev. Chris Palmer. We also thank Dr. Leslie King for stepping into Chris's role in the interim. We welcome the new Director of Congregational Life, Dr. Taylor Holleyman, and appreciate his quick, thoughtful acclimation to the committee's work. A final thanks to all of our members for their joyful advocacy connecting FPC to the Church's larger mission.

A REPORT FROM **DIACONATE**

MajorAccomplishments: The Deacons began the year by orienting to the space of FPC. There was an overview of what it means to arrive on a Sunday morning to usher, but also what it means to arrive on any given day or event that one might not be ushering.

- **Prayer Committee:** The committee includes a group of 4 deacons who have dedicated attention and detail to sending prayer cards to members that are on our prayer request list, along with sending cards to home-bound members, noting the impact it made on those who can't physically arrive. The committee has sent over 200+ cards this year, with more to come for the remainder of the year. The committee has dedicated time to prayer, and explored ideas of what prayer can be and look like for our congregation.
- Power of the Pen (POP): The Committee includes a dedicated group of 11 member correspondents
 who have, to date this year, provided 418 birthday, anniversary cards, and supportive correspondence
 to First Pres members.
- **Hybrid House (HH):** The Committee is one of the newly created committees of the diaconate, providing monthly opportunities on Zoom for members to build relationships, while using the Zoom technology one Sunday evening a month. Participants have included First Pres members, and regular visitors who now live out of state, as well as homebound adults, persons/families with illness, families with neurodivergent children who need a sensorially managed worship experience, and members who live in Texas at a distance that prohibits in-person attendance. Several long-term First Pres members living at a distance have reconnected with First Pres for support through illness and for funeral/remembrance planning (Dee Blinka, Stanton Koehne).
- **Agape:** The committee beautifully coordinated the services for at least 3 people this year. This included ushering and coordinating meals.
- **Stork Committee:** The committee delivered and managed the stork to the Palm residence in February. The committee looks forward to 2 more babies next year, so far.

Major Learnings: Deacons explored significant concerns around an active incident plan. Members were invited to attend a safety training, which was then simulated during a Diaconate meeting. It did raise concern over the intensity, but went to the Session. Deacons explored what it would entail to create and launch our own church app. It was determined that Realm would remain the database for financial and biographical information for church members. **Gratitude:** The Diaconate recognizes that ushering is an ongoing development of teamwork. They give gratitude and thanks to ad-hoc ushers, with appreciation for their arrival and presence. Ushering was done this year in choir robes, with children/youth, and with Deacons who bring their children alongside, which makes a statement. Giving and counting the contributions from the congregation is precious. The Diaconate gives thanks to those who have contributed to the Deacons Closet, as it regularly provides for greater community members who arrive.

CHRISTIANFORMATIONCOMMITTEE & YOUTH ADVISORY BOARD

Major Accomplishments for 2024- 2025:

Our Christian Formation classes: 2024 was marked by the major accomplishment of building the scaffolding for communities of youth and children.

- Teachers returning to a broad-based classrooms for Sunday morning Christian Formation. Children and families were still flexing their Sunday morning muscles to build back the habit. With some frequency, teachers arrived at an empty classroom, but adults were returning to the commitment of holding space for children from pre-K to teenagers. Their arrival during these uncertain Sundays would make all the difference for our 2025 experience.
- The 2024-2025 Confirmation class strategically decided to include a younger cohort of confirmands in order to build social bonds among the young people for the sake of the youth group and pre-teen and youth Christian Formation.
- An intergenerational return to Wednesday night programming with meals, conversations and nursery was great energy in the Fall of 2024. It was less energetic in the Spring of 2025.
- Some of our children completed the Certificate Program and rose to the opportunities of church leadership like: Ringing the bell tower bell, serving communion and leading in service.
- Traditional programming, like Children's Sunday, Posada and a Youth Christmas party, were successfully planned and completed.

2025 experienced a loss of momentum in the spring. But we recognized that this is part of the development process. Even so, Youth Sunday was wonderfully attended and invested in by our youth. The Easter Egg Hunt on Palm Sunday was attended by over 100 people. It was also a highlight to welcome confirmands into membership at the end of April. And it was our first time to take a small but mighty crew of adults and youth to Frontera De Cristo in Augua Prieta, Mexico, along the New Mexico border. The trip was celebrated in worship in mid-July. The fall launch of 2025 has enjoyed renewed attendance in our classrooms and momentum from our families. Youth Wednesday night programming has returned with renewed interest from the youth and commitment from a strong volunteer base. The future is looking very bright as we continue to develop our congregational muscle for a strong Christian Formation program that holds a unique place in Waco, Texas.
