LETTER FROM A PASTOR

So many boxes. Maybe they are recycled and stored in your home for that next time you need to collect a few things together. Maybe they are the boxes that arrive by delivery for Christmas gifts. Maybe the boxes are already full and tucked away for the generations, full of keepsakes and memories. So many boxes to hold, organize, and anticipate our lives.

Civilizations like Egypt, Rome, and Greece used wooden storage boxes. The Chinese invented cardboard in the 1500s, but it was not until 1817 that the first paperboard box was made in England. In 1879 the foldable cardboard box was invented. From wood to cardboard to plastics in the 1950s and 1960s and continuing to today, the intent to store, keep, and share has often required this invention...the box.

Boxes may also be metaphorical. The identity boxes we live in can be packaged tight and sealed. The urge to open our identities to something different can feel like betrayal to what has been treasured. Even so, what is a box if it is not occasionally opened, rummaged, celebrated, sorted, and rearranged? Who we think we "should be" could be likened to a sort of boxing-in by others' expectations. Who we long to be might be likened to the flattened box that waits for the right or maybe even perfect moment...ever stored and sometimes never used. The shame we feel can be boxed. In its gentle uncovering and brushing away residue, we can see it is less shame and more vulnerability. The honor we feel can be boxed as well. Breaking the seal and revisiting the honorable experiences unfurls a whole landscape of memories of those who participated in our experience of honor.

For all the gifts you will unbox this season, I pray it is not only around a Christmas tree. I am reminded of the wisemen of scripture who presented inspirational gifts with lids opened as if to remind us, "Don't box the baby!" That baby would one day and still does remind us not to box ourselves in. Out of the box this December and on into 2026!

CAREGIVING, CARETAKING, CARING

There are concepts that are both very simple and very complex. Caregiving is one of those. We at First Pres Waco have been remarkably blessed for years by the reflections of a caregiver who understood both the simplicity and the complexity. Larry Kinard provided care for his beloved Marty over a period of years. He gave us regular glimpses into the painful and love-filled insights of a caregiver experience and what it means to live the vows "in sickness and in health" with equal devotion and tenderness. He did not sugar coat or obviate the painful truths of devastating illness, the impact on a marriage, and the discoveries of the depth of love that spans "til death do us part." We were privy to their humanity and struggles and inspired by their courage and devotion to each other. Some of us have saved Larry's words of wisdom and transparency of pain that we may live up to the possibilities in our own lives, starting with his admonition to "Do love."

As Larry transitions now to a new chapter in his life, Letter from a Caregiver transitions to Caregiving, Caretaking, and Caring. So many seasons of our lives include caregiving. We will explore together the challenges and the opportunities, the insights and the search for meaning, the experiences of change and the gifts of presence. I will share with you stories of caregiving that have been shared with me through the years of social work practice, hospice visits, and life transitions. We can learn from each other the deep well of courage that grows when we share it with one another.

There are times as well when we engage in Caretaking as we "take care" of and for each other. Many of us have engaged in raising our children in the role of caregivers and then watched them leave to make their way, create their own families, engage in their own lives and live in their own homes. We discover as the parents of adults and as grandparents of their children that there remains opportunity to take care, to provide care, to make a difference in our new roles. Perhaps most important, we have the opportunity to return care to our parents, to be there for them in the years when they need care. I'm not sure there is any more honorable caregiving/caretaking. And here at First Pres, caretaking sometimes extends to friends, to neighbors, to members of our church. I'm thinking of Meal Trains, stork markers planted in yards of homes with new babies, sitting with friends and neighbors in hospital waiting rooms, and showing up at piano recitals and one act plays and so much more.

And then there is Caring as we follow the admonition of Jesus who asked us to love our neighbors as we love ourselves and to understand that everyone is our neighbor. It is caring that forgives when we are hurt. It is caring that gives the benefit of the doubt. It is caring that feels the pain of another and treats them the way we would like to be treated when trouble threatens. It is caring that offers a smile to a sad stranger on the bus. It is caring that forgives the "idiot", I mean person, who cut me off in traffic. (yes...there is a story there.) Caring shows up as grace without asking if it has been earned or deserved.

In the three plus years I have been part of First Pres, I have received significant caring from so many of you. And I have observed love and caring across generations. I have experienced caring in the zoom room and heard caring in the passing of peace, participation in communion, the leadership of children, and the celebration of confirmands. I have felt caring in the waving of adults and children as they greet us in the zoom room. I have known the gift of being fully present in meetings while safely settled at my computer. "See" you each month with caregiving, caretaking, and care insights.


Christmas Eve

ISRAEL PALESTINE CLASS

The Israel Palestine discussion group had a rich 5-week experience in October. Here are some of our reflections.



Munther Isaac writes a provocative collection of books that can be found in the church library: The Other Side of the Wall, Promised Land or Land of Promise and Christ in the Rubble.

Munther Isaac hopes that his books will raise awareness among Christians that there are Christians in Palestine who live as second class members of society. They cannot move about the country freely, and are treated as "less than" the Jewish people in Israel.

We were informed by the plight of Palestinian Christians. These inequities have been unfair, painful, and discriminatory since 1948 with no recognition or movement toward change. Isaac is appealing to American Christians to acknowledge Palestinian Christians and support their equitable treatment in what is also their homeland.

Current events were raging as we read Isaac's books together: The anniversary of the October 7 Hamas atrocities; the relentless bombing of Gaza-including hospitals; the hunger, injury and death of children; the displaced families in tent cities for shelter; the negotiations and periodic releasing of hostages, the eventual declaration of a cease fire; the return to bombing, the inability to get food into Gaza and the subsequent starvation of children. We examined U.S. attitudes toward Israel as informed by scripture and the interpretation of scripture.

One of our members noted the timeless story of blindfolded people trying to understand what they were experiencing from multiple perspectives or experiences.

Collectively, we felt this way over our five weeks of discussion. We thought, how often have we heard one perspective or part of a whole story and accepted the part as defining truth? We all grew in awareness that none of us had been told or were aware of the whole story about the complexities in Gaza, Israel and Palestine. One member of the group noted, "I might not have had the stamina to keep reading the books unless we were in a small group together."

In reading Munther Isaac's books we felt we had a good understanding of his concerns but we wished for a greater education on the evolution of Hamas, on other experiences or perspectives that offered possible solutions or hope, and even what Isaac saw as possible fair and equitable next steps. Even as Israel and Palestine is a complex, trauma-filled problem without a clear cut solution, we felt that we came to a better understanding of how to check our assumptions and continue prayerful information seeking.
