LETTER FROM A PASTOR

Lent is a season when we explore anxieties. We listen-in to the gospel stories' anxieties of those in administrative power. They worry about the power of the people. We listen-in to the anxieties of those with questions about the meaning of life and their strength within it. We listen-in to the worries about the emerging power of the disciples. Can they advance what they believe is essential to their faith in Jesus? We listen-in to the anxieties of Jesus.

As we listen-in we also see grounding activities.

Water is drawn from a well and poured out in order to quench thirst. Water is very grounding. We see Jesus and the disciples put themselves in nature among the roots and under the trees. Nature is very grounding.

We see wine and bread shared at the table. Eating in community can be very grounding. As we take on the deep and often anxiety provoking questions of life this Lent, there is also an invitation to ground down into calm clarity.


When we ask ourselves how long people with strength and power will scapegoat people with less power - we can take our thoughts to the kitchen sink, filling the sink with warm dish water. We can allow some time to simply wash a couple of dishes as we pray for those who are in need of more power.

When we ask ourselves how we will come into new power for a more faithful response to the life around us - we can take our thoughts to the base of a tree. We can allow some time to appreciate how long growth takes....to reach down and to stretch up.

When we ask ourselves what difference it makes that we are alive - we can take our thoughts to a table with a few friends. In the breaking of bread and pouring into cups there is a grounding promised. As we chew the bread and sip from the cup, grounding is actualized...comfort and confidence.

Together at the Table will be a grounding event during Lent on February 28. It will be an opportunity to come up the walk of our hosts' home - a walk perhaps flanked by roots and trees. It will be an opportunity for chewing, sipping, laughing and holding space. Warm running water will follow for hard working hands. Those that arrive to the hybrid Together at the Table, will also be grounded across distance with special practices for the evening.

Here is to lent and our opportunity to take on the important questions and stay grounded in the practices of Jesus Christ.


Together at the Table





CHRISTIAN FORMATION

Growing Experience & Community

Taylor, Malorie and Leslie are excited to have added up the Christian Formation numbers! While our numbers are modest, we see signs of growth from our 2024-2025 year. Here are some highlights from our four classrooms thus far in 2025-2026 year.

- Pre-K is our highest attended class even with some of our children graduating to the 1-3 grade.
- Attendance in 1-3 grades has grown from 1 to 3 regular attendees. We've had successful retention as young people graduated from pre-k.
- The Preteen class (4-7 grade) has grown from 1 to 4 regular attendees. In part, this is a result of strategic confirmation the prior year.
- Youth (8-12) – no growth on Sunday mornings. A growing cohort (5) on Wednesday evenings, holds possibilities. We hope to build on the Wednesday night strength to grow our Sunday morning community.

She is currently a PhD student in Theology and Ethics in the Religion Department at Baylor University. Her research focuses on embodied religious identity crisis and trauma among clergy in the Reformed tradition, particularly ministers of the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria.


Here is what to expect the Hybrid Ash Wednesday service beginning at 6:00p.m.
