LETTER FROM A PASTOR

Old First Pres and Emerging First Pres

It is no small thing to be a historic church.

Back in the day, 1855, that is, Kansas was bleeding. The nation would slip into civil war in 1861. Our job, at First Pres, was to be a hub for those folks who were arriving to settle Waco for at least a second time. After the Waco people settled in the 1700s, Europeans arrived and settled beginning in 1849. We were part of that "second settlement" of the community. We have not been perfect. But we have been present.

It is no small thing to be a historic church.

Back in the day, we were constructing, moving and constructing. Once we arrived to this, our 3rd building, between the 1950s and the 1980s, our campus doubled in size. All the while we were developing beauty in the stained glass, triaging tragedies, and hosting ministries for a strong community. We have not been perfect but we have been present.

It is no small thing to be a historic church.

Arriving to today, we feel the tensions of civility and shared governance. We are managing the significant campus that has been bequeathed to us by the generations before. The growing edges of Waco extend away from downtown. In these days, we manage an upstream flow into our congregation. Folks who choose to flow past demographic trends in order to arrive at historic space and historic learning and historic grace. It's not a perfect place but a place for genuine presence and examination of life and faith.

It can be a transformative experience to be part of a historic church.

Emerging toward tomorrow, we see ourselves in the historic past, the crucible-like present and the dawning of tomorrow. Like the stained glass pieced, placed and pained – in. We are assembled in all of our variance, diversity and irregularity. Unlike the glass we are not leaded into place but reassembling each week. Some of you pick a different pew. Others of you take a risk to speak to a person who is new to you. Still others try out new ways to serve. And in all these ways, we pick up God's light just a little differently. We are what we have been. We are emerging. We are participating in something larger than ourselves. We won't have to be perfect, but will we be present in the transformative moments?

History is not held, but imparted for the sake of what is next. It is such a joy to arrive through history and to enter into September 2025 with all of you.

Sign-up in Realm to help provide ice cream, toppings, or drinks. Anyone who brings homemade ice cream is eligible to win the prized Golden Scoop!





CHRISTIAN FORMATION

PreK / Kindergarten

Our youngest learners will explore the Old Testament with the Frolic Preschool Curriculum. Through play, song, and activities, they'll discover that God made the world good, loves them, and cares for them—while growing in faith through kindness, listening, and wonder.

Pre-Teen

Pre-teens will dive into Scripture with the Colaborate Old Testament Curriculum, exploring stories from canon to the rise of Rome. They'll wrestle with big questions, think critically, and connect faith to the challenges of middle school.

1st-3rd Grade

Children will explore Old Testament stories from Adam and Eve to Daniel in the lions' den with the Sparkhouse Curriculum. Through discussion, crafts, and activities, they'll see how God has always been present—growing in faith, building friendships, and learning to live out God's love.

Youth

Youth will explore core elements of faith with the Think. Do. Believe. Curriculum, focusing this fall on prayer, sin, mission, salvation, the Bible, and Christmas—growing a faith that is authentic, thoughtful, and ready to engage the world.

Adult Christian Formation

LETTER FROM A CAREGIVER

I wonder what happened to them, the people we met along the way—the sick, the broken, the injured we came to know in hospitals, ICUs, and rehab units. I wonder who survived; I wonder who found a way to thrive.

I don't know if I have ever experienced the same intensity of emotions, good and bad, as during that time. You feel the joy of survival and the abject fear of the unknown with complete strangers surrounding you. You see others experiencing the same thing, and you come to understand you are the stranger watching people in very intimate personal times.

The ICU at Parkland Hospital was a desperate place filled with desperately ill people and those who loved them. There were no walls, only curtains separating patients and visitors.

Because I was there a lot, and there was little privacy, I watched patients and their people come and go. I saw a young man, 16 or 17, brought in with his mother. He had run his motorcycle into a culvert and suffered major trauma. His mother and father, along with friends from the National Guard, came and talked to him, worked his arms and legs, and encouraged him though he was unconscious. The father was due to be shipped out to Iraq within a week—this was 2005. While consumed by my own fear and grief, I couldn't help but feel for the mother waiting with her catastrophically injured son, knowing her husband would soon be in a war zone.

I wonder what happened to the kid.

The Zale-Lipshy ICU was better. There was a real waiting room and rooms where you could ignore visiting hours if you were quiet. I met the mother of a Texas Tech football player who had broken his neck. He and his mom were veterans of ICUs. Their story gave me a little hope and a lot of fear about the future for Marty and me. I know what happened to this young man. He died about three years later.

Marty went to Pate Rehab in Dallas four months after her second stroke. Clients lived in apartments and were brought daily to the facility. Marty and I stayed with Max, a young stroke survivor, and Campbell, a sweet middle-aged fellow prone to tears. Both were in wheelchairs but further along than Marty. I later learned Campbell passed away not long after going home. I never knew how Max fared.

Then there was the young woman who died at Providence Hospital immediately after childbirth. She was well known, and many gathered in the ICU waiting room. I can't imagine how devastating it must have been to lose her on such an occasion. I wonder how her husband and child are today. We saw countless people—husbands with injured wives, mothers caring for children and aging parents. We saw life, in its beginnings, middles, and endings—the hard, dirty, real journey.

Life can be amazing, singing at the top of your lungs, joyous. It can also be dirty, broken, bloody misery. Real living is both. When you look back on your journey, you remember the people who touched you along the way.

I remember all of their faces. I hope they all have found peace.

Open Table – A Collegiate Ministry and Partnership

Open Table began 3 years ago among local Associate Pastors from First Presbyterian, 7th and James, Dayspring and Calvary Baptist Church. This ecumenical partnership began talks with Baylor University. Together they collaborated to allow Open Table to become a chapel option on Baylor's Campus. Reaching out to Truett Seminary, the local congregations each pledged to hire a part time intern to run the Open Table programming.

The program's attendance grew. It was clear that Baylor students were hungry for a generous theology and fellowship. More enrichment was on the way.

- The ecumenical crew of pastors, from the same 4 churches, folded University Baptist Church into the effort. Together we are now 5 strong.
- A partnership with Cooperative Baptist Fellowship was forged. CBF, excited about Open Table, agreed to provide excellence from their field personnel.
- The Presbyterian Church, USA through Grace Presbytery helped First Waco apply for a significant grant from the ministry development program, 1,001 Worshipping Communities. This 10,000 grant was formally awarded the 1st week of August.

So, the academic year of 2025-2026 is a return to Open Table ministry but with so many more resources than before. We are excited about the possibilities.

We'll keep sharing updates. Thanks for holding the program in your mind, heart and prayer.

The in and out flow, frees the Spirit right up.


Lest she be bottled, she slips into Christ's Cup.
