

LETTER FROM A PASTOR

It's in the Wings



Exodus 19:4 and Isaiah 40 are just two places in scripture where strength is likened to wings. Wings are complex things. As human beings, we know something about complexity in the wings. The bones of the wing share names with the bones of our arms and hands: metacarpus, radius, humerus. Our muscles share names: biceps, triceps, thighs, pectorals. Like other birds, Eagles have feathers on their wings.

At its root, the word "wing" means to spread out. In this way, our anatomy in the Body of Christ is in the wings. An Eagle has some 7,000 feathers for various functions of flight, insulation, and body shape. Bones and muscles are necessary features, but the ability to lift and fly is ultimately in the wings. Each feather makes a difference and adds to the possibilities.

This is true in a stewardship season for a community who seeks to be the Body of Christ for a wider world. Each gift provides lift. Each gift adds texture, beauty, and strength. The stewardship committee, session, and I would like to thank you for the way you will consider bringing your gifts and helping us lift our campus, our ministry, and our spirituality to a continued beauty and strength. So much is in the wings and we will feather-in the gifts on November 16!

LETTER FROM A CAREGIVER

My Simple Faith.

Do love. Don't hate.

My simple faith was born from caring for Marty. It was born from my doubt, it was born from my anger, and it was born from my fatigue.

Love bound us early in our lives and at the end of our path together. Through Marty I learned how to really love. When the strokes took her ability to think and care for herself, love didn't wane, it was steady and real.

Marty and I had a good marriage, but it was still two people living life and dealing with all of the pieces and parts of life. Sometimes marriage wasn't much fun, it was hard. Two strokes and a broken Marty reminded me of my love for her. I learned a lot about loving during the hard parts.

After the strokes God and I had a real off-and-on relationship. I was pretty ticked about the whole stroke thing and the caregiving gig stretched on year after year and I got a ringside seat as I watched the wife I cared for diminish more and more as time went on.

As I prayed and talked to God and as God talked to me I began to understand this wasn't a God thing, it was a human thing. God didn't bless me or Marty with a divine plan and God didn't strike her down with the strokes. Delicate, miraculous creations of God broke. As amazing as humans are we break, it happens.

Somehow, through all the stuff, all the angst, anger, and disappointment, I didn't lose faith, I lost complexity.

Loving can be really hard sometimes. There are people I find impossible to love. We are charged with loving them all through those hard times. That, in my simple mind and simple faith, is what we are called to do, love and don't hate.

I once asked several of my friends if there was anyone in their life, anyone they personally knew, they hated. Not just absence of love but hatred. Almost to a person they said no, even though there were a couple of really well thought out hatreds, people who wronged them or loved ones.

We want to love, therefore we must not hate. That's hard. That's my sin.

Okay, I'm getting too preachy, that's not my gig, you have good people to do that. I'm saying that being a caregiver and being a husband of a broken wife changed me in very fundamental ways. My view of the world, my understanding of people, and my faith were all put under immense stress and God shook me by the collar and said, make it simple.

Do love. Don't hate.

REFORM AND REFORMING

Reformed and Always Reforming:



Being Presbyterian means that we are rooted in a particular history and set of traditions. One way that we recognize our distinctive character is through identification of Presbyterianism with the broader Reformed tradition. For the uninitiated, this moniker – 'Reformed' – can be confusing. After all, aren't all Protestant denominations reformed? In its original sixteenth–century use, the term referred to any of the churches and doctrines of the European Reformation that departed from the Roman Catholic Church.

Despite this general usage, the (capital-R) Reformed churches grew to distinguish themselves ever more clearly not only from the Roman Catholic Church but also from other protestant movements.

These Reformed churches originated following the Swiss reform movements of Ulrich Zwingli in Zurich and John Calvin in Geneva. However, the Reformed thinking quickly spread beyond the boundaries of Switzerland.

Succinct definitions of Reformed theology and practice are elusive. Quick definitions are often too narrow to represent the broader tradition – as is the case when Reformed theology is associated exclusively with 'Calvinism.' Conversely, other definitions are too broad to provide a distinctive identity – as is the case when Reformed theology is identified with 'five solas' that most all protestants agree on: scripture alone, faith alone, grace alone, Christ alone, and glory to God alone. Complications of identity and definition aside, Reformed churches have traditionally been marked by such features as an emphasis on the sovereignty of God, the authority of Scripture, the centrality of grace, and commitments to Christian education and societal engagement.

Although the underlying sentiment can be found in much earlier literature, the phrase 'reformed and always reforming' has grown in popularity since the mid-twentieth century as an identity marker for many Reformed and Presbyterian churches. In its common usage, the impulse to be reformed and always reforming admits the finitude of all human endeavors and the ultimate sovereignty of God. It is an orientation anchored in the Reformed tradition while remaining committed to continual self–examination and open to new ways that grace may arrive in each of life's circumstances.

At First Presbyterian Waco, the reformed and always reforming impulse runs deep. We are rooted in the traditions and histories that have shaped our corporate identity. At the same time, we continue the necessary work of self-examination, seeking new opportunities to live more fully as Children of God.

Reformation Sunday will be celebrated October 26 - We will enjoy bagpipes and a celebration of our heritage in the faith.

FRANKLIN ESTATE UPDATE

Thanks to a generous gift left by the late Judy and Bill Franklin First Pres has been able to tend to areas that have needed some extra attention. We wanted to provide an update on what has been accomplished, and what is in the works.

Roof

A total roof replacement was completed a few months ago.
 This roof should last 30 years before needing to be replaced again. This new roof helps to prevent leaks, and helps the church maintain building insurance.



Windows

Starting in October, all the church windows (with the
exception of stained glass and decorative windows) will be
replaced. These new windows will add additional security to
the church, and help with utility costs.



Handbells

 A fifth octave of handbells were purchased, and were fully refurbished. Look forward to hearing the new octave ring in worship soon. These handbells will allow the bell choir to play a full range of pieces, and will allow for expansion of more musical offerings in worship.



Organ Pipes

 The facade of the organ pipes in the balcony have needed to be repaired. Over time they have tarnished and become weak. The plan is to have them fully refurbished and reset.
 This will allow for the balcony pipes to match the look of the chancel pipes, and add more beauty to the sanctuary.



We look forward to keeping you posted on these projects as they continue to move forward. A huge thank you to the Session for their diligent work in prioritizing projects.
