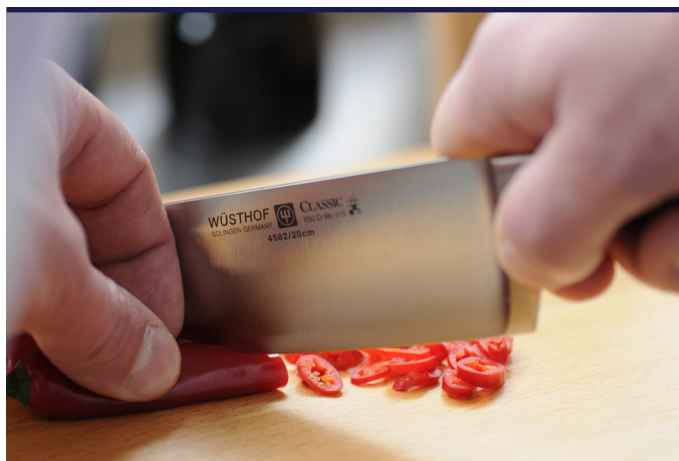

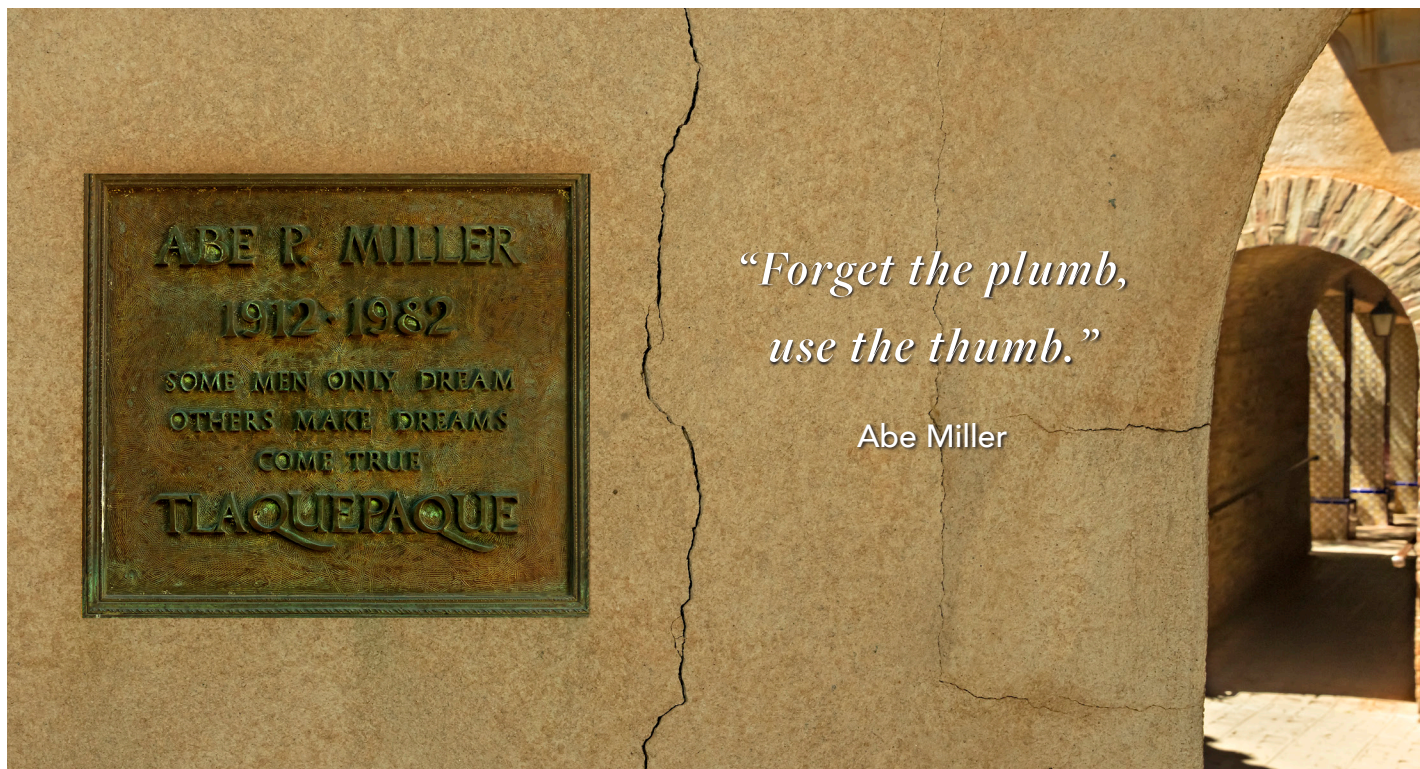

The Abe Miller Story

VISIONARY, DEVELOPER, LOVER OF THE ARTS



In the 1970s Sedona had only one stoplight and the area was mostly an open range, but visionary businessman Abe Miller saw the potential for more. A traveler, Abe had spent time in Mexico where he became enthralled with its vibrant arts scene—in particular, that of a small arts and crafts village outside of Guadalajara that would become our village’s namesake, Tlaquepaque (Ta-la-ka-pa-kee). It was Abe’s dream to establish a place for artists where they could collectively create and sell their work.

At that time, Abe also fell in love with Sedona. In particular a unique piece of property on Oak Creek with a distinctive 100-year-old sycamore grove. He knew he had found the place to bring his arts and crafts village to life. It took two years of being persistent, but Abe finally acquired this piece of land from its owners Harry and Ruby Girard, assuring them that their beloved sycamores would remain untouched (a promise he kept and that we continue to honor today).

To express his vision, Abe collaborated with a gifted and unconventional local architect, Bob McIntyre. As the story goes, Bob, Abe, and Bill Herrick, the contractor, flew Abe’s plane all over Mexico and ventured into small villages to photograph, sketch, and document their look and feel. They studied how they were constructed—the materials, their structural components, detailing and flow—with a goal to build Tlaquepaque as authentically as possible. They photographed thousands of scenes from rural villages and sketched dozens of vignettes of Spanish Colonial architecture.

When Bob and Abe came upon a small village, they would sit and watch for hours, coming to know the importance of how people, gardens, fountains, and trees shaped social interaction in a public space. They carefully studied the architecture. They were soul searching, discovering what life really looked like in rural Mexico and what architectural elements they should embrace, taking particular note of how the patios, courtyards, tiled walls, and plazas created natural gathering places for the villagers to sell their crafts and

minge together. They began to bring artifacts reflecting Mexican culture back to Sedona—iron grillwork, huge carved doors, handmade lanterns, clay pots, and benches were incorporated into the architecture to create the genuine feel and spirit of Tlaquepaque.

In keeping with his unconventional ways, Bob McIntyre purposely hired only amateur artisans and self-trained plasterers, chosen for their heart and enthusiasm for the project. No professional stonemasons were on the crew. He gave tremendous artistic freedom to the workers who “loved to be turned loose on a wall and watch it grow under their hands.” If they weren’t happy with their day’s work, Abe allowed them to tear it down and start over. “Forget the plumb, use the thumb,” was a favorite saying on the construction site. Very little of Tlaquepaque was sketched out on paper. Everything was eyeballed, keeping the basic orders of columns and capitals, but allowing for variables. It was all part of what gave Tlaquepaque its authenticity and unique charm.

❖ THE LEGACY CONTINUES

In 2017 Tlaquepaque North opened its doors. The addition, located on the Northside of Sedona's highway 179, was artfully developed to maintain Abe and Bob's original spirit and authentic design.

Here too, no detail was overlooked. Visitors enter the space through large elegant archways where niches are filled with Tlaquepaque's signature blue ceramic tile work and hand-painted murals. The roofs are covered with terra cotta tiles. Walkways are created with stone pavers that lead you from shop to shop and meet at the center, where you find a graceful stone fountain with its cooling waters and bubbling sounds. Tlaquepaque's giant Sycamore trees and colorful flower beds are interwoven into the space, adding to its inimitable style.

The architect and builders took pains to ensure that Tlaquepaque North gives the impression that it too has elegantly stood here for decades. The result is that visiting is a complete sensory experience while also offering a chance to explore and discover unique artwork, handcrafted and well-curated products, jewelry, and tasty foods and treats. A beautifully renovated former cobblestone home is now the Pump House Station Urban Eatery, one of Sedona's most beloved restaurants. Around the plaza, you will also find the Artists Kitchen, filled with treasures for the kitchen and home, Renee Taylor Jewelry, with more of its exquisite jewelry and art, and Bow Wow Sedona, the finest in fashion, accessories, health, and nutrition for the quad pet set. Look for Cream & Cake Couture too. Located down the steps

by the parking area, here you can enjoy homemade ice cream, shakes, sweets, and cake by the slice.

These carefully curated shops and galleries are not to be missed. So head north from our other location, visit us and see for yourself.

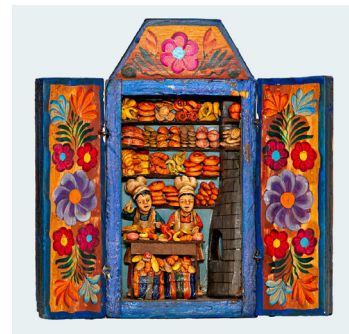
NELLY LOPEZ & JAVIER LOPEZ

Nelly Lopez and her husband, Javier Lopez, are the owners of El Picaflor, the enchanting second-floor shop overlooking Tlaquepaque's Patio de las Campanas. Their name means "hummingbird," and like these vibrant, beautiful flying creatures, El Picaflor is a place of wonders, celebrating artists and traditional crafts from their hometown of Peru and other South American Countries, Central America, and Mexico.

For Nelly and Javier, working with fair trade artisans is essential. It allows them to introduce the unique craftsmanship of these artists to visitors of Tlaquepaque and the area while helping them provide for their families.

Nelly is one of El Picaflor's talented artists, crafting detailed retablos, three-dimensional mini-portable shrines that depict religious, historical, or everyday scenes, and gourd art created with a traditional Peruvian wood burning technique. At age thirteen, Nelly began to learn these crafts from the artisans in her village, later venturing out to Lima, the capital of Peru, to more formally study ceramics and drawing. From this, she developed the desire to give back to those who had helped her and preserve their art forms' beauty and uniqueness.

Nelly eventually came to the United States in the 1990s. Drawn to Tlaquepaque and Sedona for the area's beauty and artist community, she and Javier settled in 1998, opening El Picaflor in 2003. The couple recently launched an online store where, along with the shop, they continue to share the work of their fellow artisans and keep these artistic traditions alive.

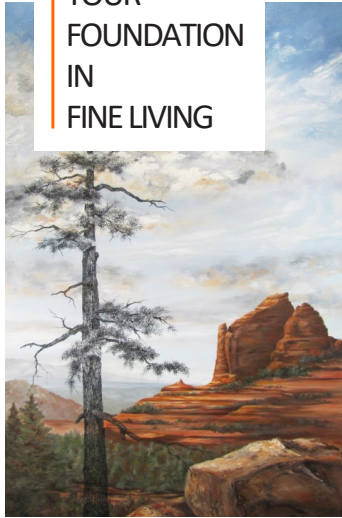

Walking into Carré d'artistes, visitors are drawn in by the bold, contemporary artwork lining its walls. Whether by a local artist, international star, or a newcomer, there are so many beautiful choices it's hard to decide which one to choose. Started almost 20 years ago in Aix-en-Provence, France, Carré d'artistes is the first gallery network in the world and now has thirty locations worldwide, including in the picturesque village of Tlaquepaque off of the Patio del Norte. Like all Carré d'artistes galleries, this one provides a wide variety of original artworks that have been carefully selected by the company's art curators, passionately created by the artist, and priced to be accessible for all.

Carré d'artistes is dedicated to making everyone feel at home in their galleries and abolishing the belief that owning art is only for the wealthy. Utilizing a unique pricing structure dependent upon only one objective criterion, the work's size, the gallery welcomes novices, collectors, and the curious with the goal of helping them find a piece that is just right for them.

Carré d'artistes hopes to instill the desire to become a long-time lover and purchaser of art with each item sold. Whether a painting, sculpture, or illustration, people want to acquire uniqueness. They want handmade, they want authentic things, beautiful things, and Carré d'artistes provides them with this—at accessible prices.

In August 2013 five local, Verde Valley theater women took a reading of a new play to a festival in Prescott. Reinvigorated by the experience and forgetting what they collectively knew about how much work it is, they threw caution to the wind and founded Red Earth Theatre. With backgrounds in performance and education and their shared belief in the role of theatre in improving lives and communities, they set out to create a "home" for performing artists. A place where they can develop, improve, and express their craft through performances that nurture diverse voices, encourage dialogue, and explore the human experience in our communities.

Red Earth Theatre is a nomadic company with no permanent building or space. Tlaquepaque is proud to be one of its location partners, "Partnering with Tlaquepaque perfectly aligns with our goal to provide opportunities for performers as well as to create community around live performance in a way that is affordable. To have a beautiful place in which to perform each month is a great gift."

In the warmer months, you can find Red Earth Theatre performing outdoors at the Patio de las Campanas and in the beautifully intimate Tlaquepaque Chapel in colder months. Each Tlaquepaque location allows people of all ages to enjoy the experience of watching art in the making within an enchanting environment.

The fall season's live performances at Tlaquepaque begin on Thursday, September 16, with *Pink Nectar Cafe*, the show the troupe was one week from opening when the pandemic forced them to postpone. Originally adapted from the late James Bishop's collection of short stories, the show has been reimagined to include projection and live music. It is a combination memoir, mystery guide, and serenade to the intrigues and beauty surrounding Northern Arizona.

Following the first performance, Red Earth Theatre will return the third Thursday each month with performances focused on Halloween, Thanksgiving, and of course, A Christmas Carol.

Red Earth Theatre is primarily a volunteer organization. They believe that the performing arts are vital to create and nurture community for locals and visitors. To meet the goal of providing access for many, the suggested donation at the door is \$10. ONE OF TLAQUEPAQUE'S MOST INTOXICATING EVENTS, OUR DIA DE LOS MUERTOS (DAY OF THE DEAD) CELEBRATION AND THE MARIGOLD MURAL PROJECT ATTRACT VISITORS OF ALL AGES WHO COME TOGETHER TO CELEBRATE AND COMMEMORATE THE DEAD.

Known also as "Old Souls Day" in Mexico, Dia de los Muertos is a millennial old holiday to celebrate lost loved ones. Originally based on the beliefs of the ancient Aztec's, this joyful celebration is now observed around the world.

Tlaquepaque's celebration starts on Wednesday, October 27 at 11 a.m. with the inauguration of the Marigold Mural Project. Visitors are encouraged to paint their tributes on a 26-foot long community remembrance wall. Paints and brushes will be provided on site with the previous years' murals on display for viewing and inspiration. Mural painting will continue daily throughout our Day of the Dead festivities on Calle Independencia from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. with artist Lovejoy onsite to assist you.

On Saturday, October 30 at 4 p.m. the Dia de los Muertos festivities get underway. Tlaquepaque's streets, patios and fountains are magically transformed with traditional decor. It is a sight to be seen with artful vignettes and altars (ofrendas) set up around the village, each one better than the last. Be sure to stop by the Tlaquepaque Chapel to see the traditional bride and groom too.

The wearing of Day of the Dead costumes is strongly recommended for those of all ages. As is the bringing of flowers, personal objects, photos, and candles to leave as an offering on our main public altar. Candles will be available for purchase if needed.

So come walk the grounds, dance and celebrate with others as you enjoy music and entertainment from long-time favorites and fabulous newcomers including Arizona's acclaimed Circus Farm jugglers, acrobats, aerial artists, and daring fire dancers. Activities for kids include sugar skull making and Day-of-the-Dead motif face painting. Several artisan booths vending Day-of-the-Dead merchandise and crafts will be set up. This is a soulful Tlaquepaque celebration not to be missed.

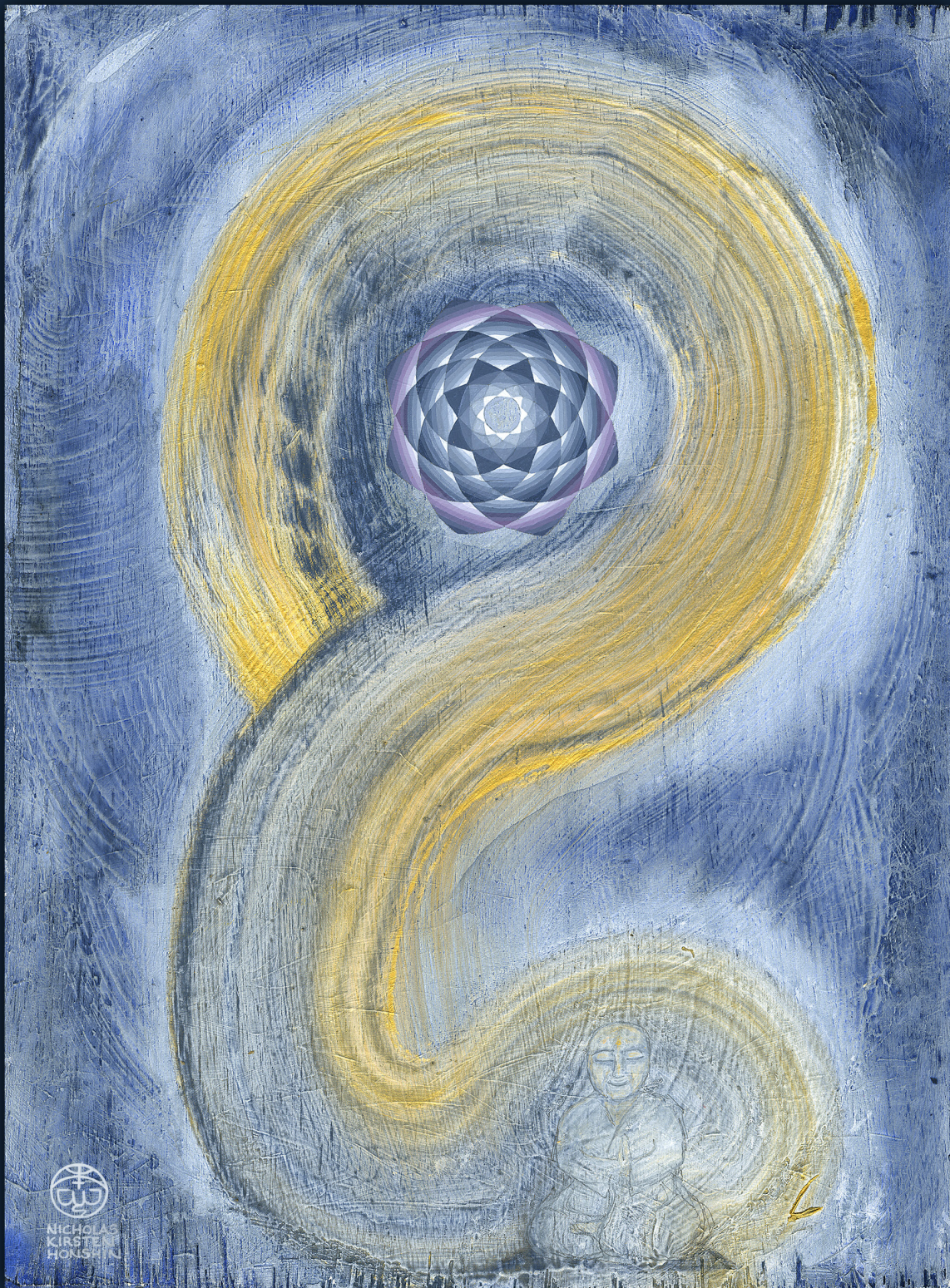

DAY OF THE DEAD TRADITIONS

TLAQUEPAQUE'S DAY OF THE DEAD IS A COLOR-FILLED, EXCITING EVENT WITH GREAT CARE PUT INTO THE DECORATIONS, ALTARS, AND VIGNETTES THROUGHOUT THE VILLAGE. YEAR-AFTER-YEAR, OUR VISITORS GET MORE CREATIVE WEARING ELABORATE CUSTOMS AND BRINGING CAREFULLY CREATED OFFERINGS.

Each traditional day of the dead image, symbol, and object has a unique meaning. Here is a guide:



◀ **Cempasuchil** Strands of fresh or paper marigolds in bright orange or yellow. These Flowers of the Dead, flor de muerto, are believed to attract the deceased.



▶ **Ofrendas** Offerings placed on the altars. They reflect the holiday's mix of Catholicism and ancient practices.



▲ **Papel Picado** Bright-colored cut-paper banners strung across our patios. Each color has a meaning: orange for mourning, green for the young, white for the elderly, red for mothers who died in childbirth, purple for Catholicism, and black for the land of the dead.

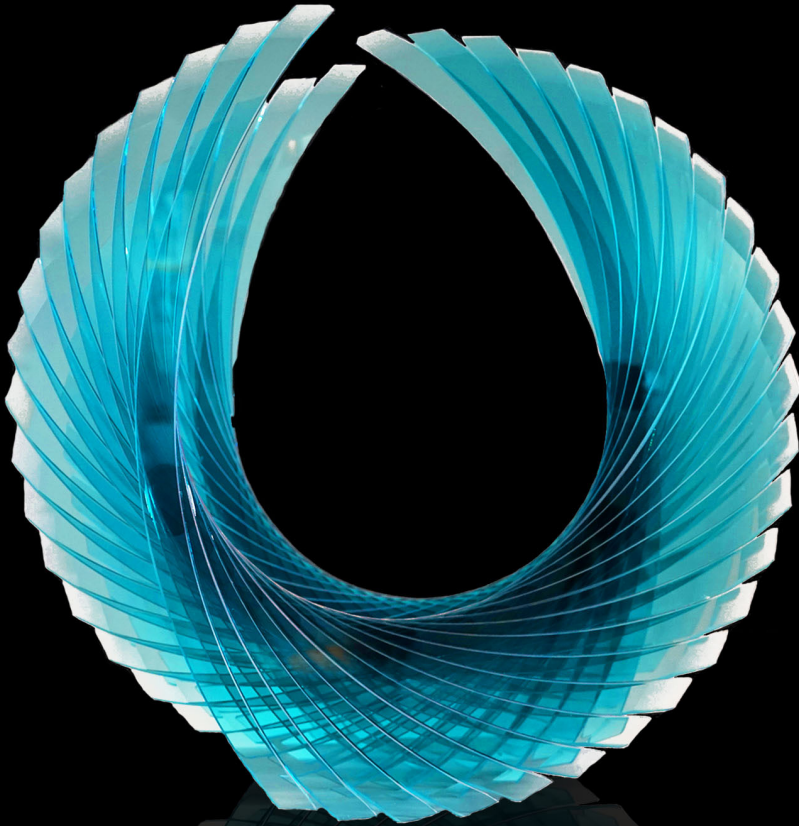


▲ **La Calaca** Clay figurines, such as the bride and groom found in our chapel. They personify death, depicting the departed resuming their everyday lives on this holiday.

▲ **Careteas** Faces are painted and masks and costumes are worn to represent a deceased loved one or just as a personal creative expression.

KUIVATO

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FESTIVAL OF LIGHTS · LUMINARIAS



A 48-year-old tradition, Tlaquepaque's Festival of Lights is its signature winter event. Stop by for an afternoon of holiday music, entertainment, and the lighting of over 6000 luminarias at the tolling of the 5 p.m. chapel bell.

Come by 3 p.m. to enjoy Santa's grand entrance. Talented musicians will be performing throughout the day, including the riveting River of Life Tabernacle Choir, made up of over 80 adults and youths. Special Luminarias to honor cancer survivors will be available for purchase at the Patio Del Norte.

This is the rare opportunity to visit the Tlaquepaque Chapel to hear flautist, Sherry Finzer, and violinist, Jonathan Livingston, play within this intimate environment. Limited seating is available inside; heaters will be set up in the Patio de la Capilla.

A big thank you to Tlaquepaque's shop and gallery owners, as well as to the local Boy Scouts and Sedona Marine Corps, for their help with this event.

Luminarias is a FREE event. Open to all ages, supervised children are welcome.

TREASURES FROM TLAQUEPAQUE'S GALLERIES

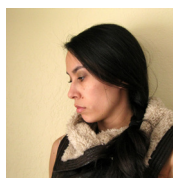

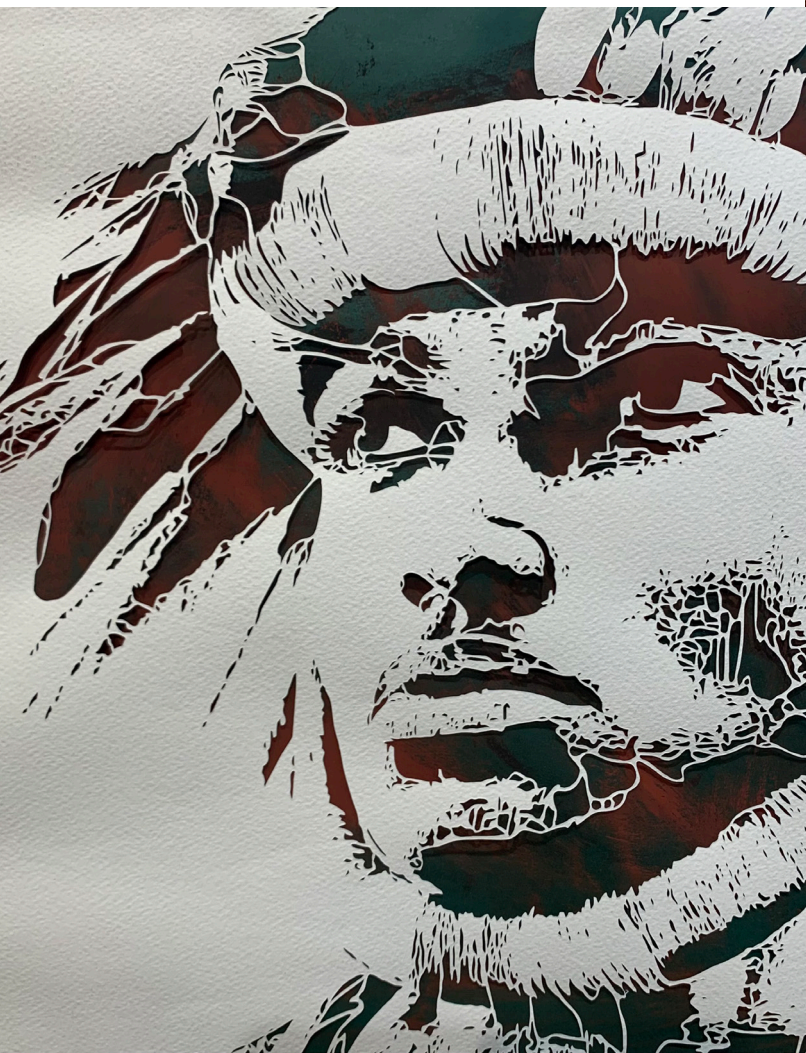

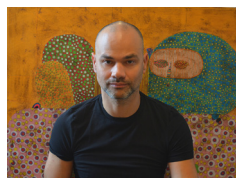

UNDER *the* SYCAMORES

Tlaquepaque Arts and Shopping Village was constructed amid a grove of 100-year-old Arizona Sycamore trees. This robust and handsome tree is found only in a small area of the United States and Mexico. Their majestic beauty is a big part of what attracted Abe Miller, Tlaquepaque's founder, to this unique piece of land stretched alongside Sedona's meandering Oak Creek.

When Harry and Ruby Girard eventually agreed to sell Abe the land (it took over two years for him to convince them), a stipulation of their agreement was that he would cherish and protect their beloved sycamore trees. This is a commitment that the Tlaquepaque team continues to honor today. Of the 200 trees at Tlaquepaque, more than 100 are Arizona Sycamores. Each one is carefully numbered and cataloged to be properly identified and specially cared for to ensure their health and longevity.

Tlaquepaque village was built thoughtfully around these stately trees. You can see this today as you walk the village and Tlaquepaque North. Arizona Sycamores gracefully intertwine with rooflines, grow through walls, and nestle up against buildings. They elegantly canopy many of the cobblestone streets, plazas, and patios, providing shade throughout most of the year and stunningly beautiful bursts of color in the fall. One can even be found reaching up the center of Rowe Fine Art Gallery and skyward through the roof. Nature and architecture growing together in harmony.

Arizona Sycamores have been known to grow 75 to 85 feet tall with a similar size spread of their branches, making them great shade providers. A deciduous tree, these magnificent North American shade trees, also known as the buttonwood tree or the American Plane Tree, lose their

giant star-shaped leaves in the fall before sleeping for the winter. They have a distinct mottled trunk that looks like light-grey camouflage as it exposes the white of the inner bark. Often found along creeks, rivers, and streams like at Tlaquepaque, they aid in preventing erosion. A peek inside their hollowed-out trunk could see you face to face with desert birds and other animals using it for shelter.

To recognize them as you explore Tlaquepaque village, look for the largest, twisting trees on the property with the camouflage-like peeling bark. Once you've found them, take a moment or two to enjoy their awe-inspiring beauty.

Visitors cross Portal Lane and enter through the elegant archway on the western side of Tlaquepaque Village to arrive at Patio de Las Rosas, a delightfully landscaped area of the village that is lush and seasonally scented with the smell of roses.

As with all of Tlaquepaque, special care was taken when this elegant area was built in the 1970s and extended in early 2000. Around the patio's edges, you will find an assortment of enticing galleries, shops, and restaurants, each with its unique curation and craftsmanship. Visitors can also take a break, sit on the bench next to Mustang Pride (an expressive, monumental bronze sculpture by Chris Navarro), under the shade of the sycamore trees, and just take in all the beauty and artistry that surrounds them.

RECIPES TO WARM UP YOUR BODY AND SOUL

As the days get longer, the desire for comfort foods grows, dishes that warm you from the inside out. We asked a selection of Tlaquepaque restaurants' chefs for their favorite recipes for the cooler seasons.



STUFFED PORTOBELLO MUSHROOM

[THE SECRET GARDEN CAFÉ]

Enter The Secret Garden Café and find yourself in a shimmering setting that envelops you in greenery. Sit alongside flower beds and under the abundant shade of towering trees while enjoying healthy fresh cuisine, like this portobello mushroom appetizer.

INGREDIENTS:

4 portobello mushroom caps	¼ cup grated parmesan cheese
1 teaspoon kosher salt	4 cups cooked quinoa
¼ teaspoon black pepper	2 tablespoons olive oil, plus oil to
10 oz chopped spinach	sauté onions
1 small onion, finely chopped	
1 tablespoon minced fresh garlic	

DIRECTIONS:

In a bowl add 2 tablespoons olive oil and salt, black pepper, and oregano. By hand rub the mixture onto the mushroom caps and grill for two minutes per side. Use the remaining olive oil mixture on the bottom of a half sheet pan and line the mushrooms to cook at 350° for about 8 minutes.

In a sauté pan add olive oil, cook the onions until tender. Add fresh chopped garlic and spinach, then add a cup of cooked quinoa and season with salt and pepper. Add the quinoa mixture to the portabella mushroom caps and top with parmesan cheese. Cook for about 5 minutes or until cheese is melted.

ROASTED SCOTTISH SALMON "MIGNON"

[PUMP HOUSE STATION URBAN EATERY & MARKET]

The Pump House serves innovative American cuisine in what was once a private home. This entree gives salmon a meaty fall-winter makeover accompanied by crispy Brussels sprouts, toasted walnuts, dried cherries, and a salad of celery root and green apple.

INGREDIENTS:

6 oz Scottish salmon filet, skin off	1 watermelon radish, thinly sliced
2 cups Brussels sprouts, cut in half	½ cup walnuts, toasted in the oven
1 tablespoon dried cherries	for 5 min
3 cups heavy cream	3 celery root, 2 peeled and cubed for
1 teaspoon sherry vinegar	the sauce, the other peeled and sliced
2 granny smith apples, sliced thin	for the salad

DIRECTIONS:

Butterfly the salmon filet, roll tightly and tie with butcher twine. Season with salt and pepper, sear in a hot pan until a golden brown crust forms. Flip and put into a 400° oven for 8 minutes.

Add the cubed celery root into a sauce pan with cream. Bring to a boil, then reduce to a simmer. Cook until tender. Transfer to a blender, blend on high for one minute. Season with kosher salt and sherry vinegar. Strain through a fine mesh sieve. Keep warm.

Toss the Brussels sprouts with oil, salt, and pepper. Roast at 400° for 10 minutes or until tender.

To plate, mix your sprouts, walnuts and cherries together in a bowl and place on the plate. Set your salmon on top. Spread the celery root sauce around and garnish with the salad of raw celery root, green apple and radish. Yield: 1 Serving

Top off a fall-winter meal with this elegantly delicious chocolate bourbon pecan pie dessert. The touch of liquor adds a little cheer and depth to this chocolaty, buttery pecan treat.

INGREDIENTS:

¾ cup semisweet chocolate
1 cup pecan halves
½ cup corn syrup
½ cup brown sugar
2 whole eggs
Dash vanilla extract
Pinch salt
1 tablespoon bourbon
¼ cup melted butter
1 9" unbaked pie shell (your favorite brand)

DIRECTIONS:

Preheat oven to 275°. Spread chocolate out evenly in unbaked pie shell. Layer pecans over chocolate and set aside. In the bowl of an electric mixer or Kitchenaid, whip together the corn syrup and brown sugar on low speed. In a separate small mixing bowl, whip together eggs, vanilla, salt and bourbon. Add this to the syrup sugar mixture along with the melted butter. Mix until thoroughly combined. Strain mixture over chocolate and pecans in pie shell. Bake for 1 hour rotating once halfway through baking. Remove from oven and let cool to room temperature. Yield: One 9" pie

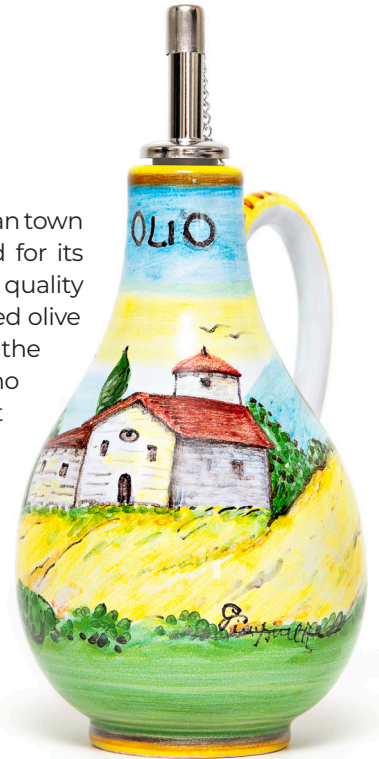

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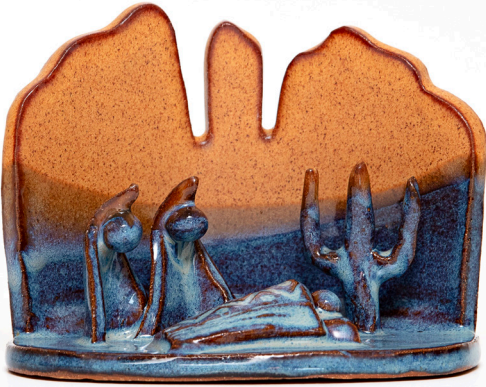

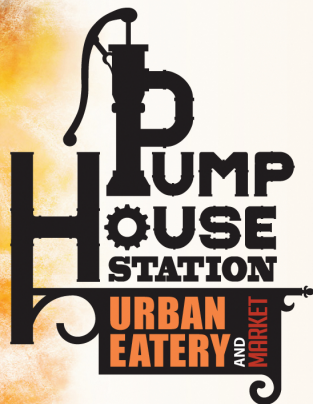

CHAPEL OF THE HOLY CROSS

Visitors can drive to see this beautiful chapel nestled into the Red Rocks of the Coconino National Forest. Commissioned by Marguerite Brunswig Staude, a local rancher, the chapel was designed and constructed in 1956 by the architectural firm Anshen & Allen.

COFFEE POT ROCK

One of Sedona's most iconic and identifiable rock formations, Coffee Pot Rock is simply spectacular in the aftermath of a winter storm.

This panoramic view of the Red Rock-Secret Mountain Wilderness that surrounds Sedona can be taken in from the Airport Mesa Vista Point. It's a great place to watch sunrise and sunset.



DESERT VIEW WATCHTOWER

Take a day trip from Sedona to the eastern end of the south rim of the Grand Canyon to climb the Watchtower and enjoy its stunning views. Designed by Master Architect and Interior Designer Mary Coulter in the spirit of ancient Anasazi structures, this ancient-looking ruin was actually constructed in 1932. The tower is the highest vantage point from which to enjoy views of the southern and eastern edges of the canyon.



RED ROCK CROSSING

A short, easy hike to this location where the waters of Oak Creek run by Cathedral Rock brings visitors to the site known as Red Rock Crossing. As seen in many photographs and old western movies, this location is steeped in spiritual energy, a vortex, and is a sacred spot for the Native Americans.



PINK JEEP TOURS

Pink Jeep Tours offers winter excursions to explore the beauty and ruggedness of the Red Rock landscape. Their open-air jeeps can be chilly in the winter, so be sure to dress accordingly. A conscientious company, Pink Jeep supports the "tread lightly" concept, organizing volunteer efforts supporting the National Parks and establishing a trail conservation team responsible for maintenance and rebuilding.

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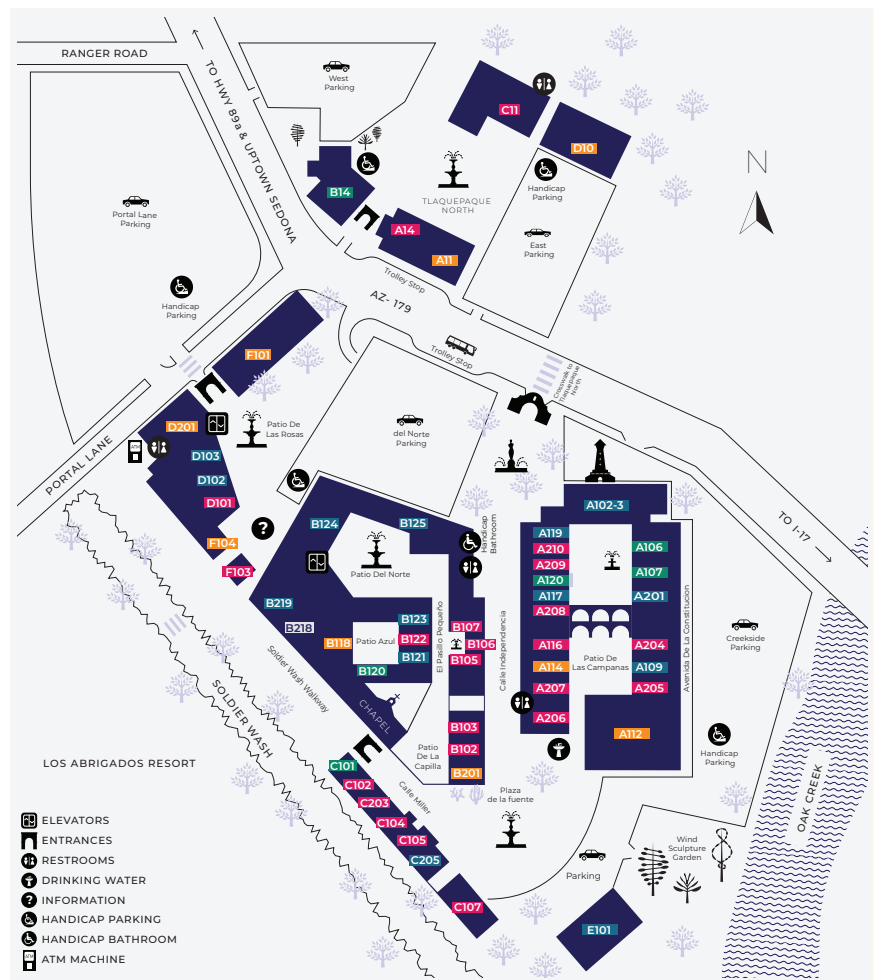

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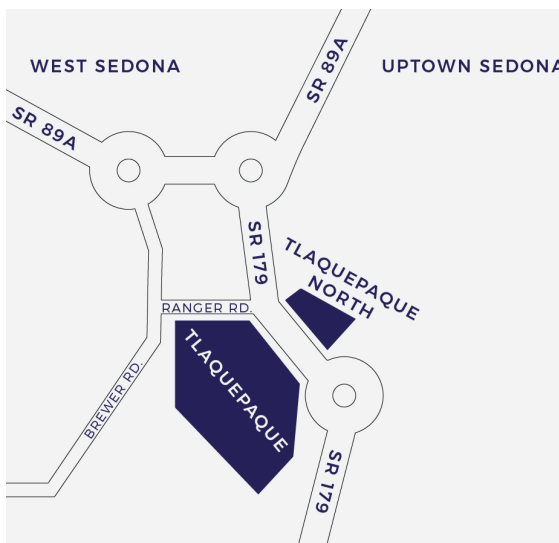

HOW TO GET TO TLAQUEPAQUE ART & SHOPPING VILLAGE



From Flagstaff

Take I-17 South toward Phoenix, Take Sedona, Oak Creek exit (AZ-89A). Drive approximately 25 miles on 89A. Drive through the first two stop-lights and at the third stop-light ("Y" intersection of 89A and State Route 179) make a left hand turn. Continue on State Route 179 approximately .2miles and Tlaquepaque will be on the immediate right hand side of the road.

From Phoenix/Scottsdale Area

Take I-17 North toward Flagstaff, Leave I-17 at exit 298 (State Route 179). Drive 15 miles into Sedona and crossover the Oak Creek Bridge. Tlaquepaque is on the immediate left hand-side of the road.

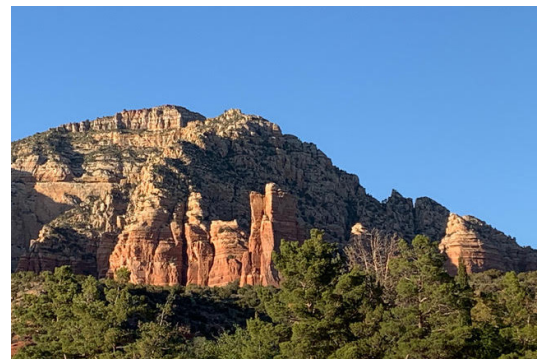
