You'll need colourful cupcake or muffin wrappers which your kids can fold in half, preserving their pretty pleats. They'll then pick a dragon picture to colour in and cut out just the head and tail parts. Next, they'll put these liners on a big sheet of construction paper, one upside down and the next right-side up, so that they look like they're moving. Then, they'll stick the dragon's head to the front and its tail to the back. First, you'll need to resize a dragon picture so it fits inside a mason jar (you can choose any size). Cut it out and set it aside for now. Next, spray some glitter paint on the jar with one coat - just enough to make the picture still visible inside. Take a toilet paper roll and cut it down to two inches, then stick it to the back of the dragon. Now put the dragon in the mason jar, along with a tiny tea light that's battery-powered and remote-controlled (just like you'd use for a nightlight). This will make your dragon look like a shadow on the side of the jar when you turn on the light. My dragon pictures can also be turned into play things called 'paper dolls'. Have your kids colour in, cut out, and trace these drawings against cardstock to make them stronger. They'll then glue two pieces together (the original drawing and its outline) so it doesn't get too flimsy. If they want more fun, they can add some sticks to the back of each dragon to use as handles. If you're planning a birthday party or Game of Thrones marathon, my dragon pictures would be great decorations for your walls or as place settings at your table. You could also shrink them down, put them on cardstock, and use them as cupcake toppers. Another idea is to give each guest their own paper dragon where they can colour in the face, add some strings (like a big mouth), and hang it up like a banner. To make another version of this craft, have your kids draw a long, thin dragon picture which they'll then stick onto a square piece of construction paper. The last step is to punch a hole at the top of the paper and tie on some colourful yarn strings (red, orange, and yellow). This craft lets kids imagine that a dragon is breathing fire! It's great for kindergarteners learning ABCs; you just need construction paper and glue. You make a D shape with one color of paper and attach it to another color, then let the kids draw and cut out the head and tail of the dragon. They stick those onto the D, add some words, and it's done! To make a paper plate dragon, start by making swirls on a big paper plate with a Sharpie. Cut along the line, then let the kids decorate the body and attach their own head and tail. If your kid doesn't like dragons, are they really a kid? You can use these pictures as posters or cut them out for a collage. You can also make suncatchers by printing dragon figures onto transparency paper, filling in lines with colored tissue paper, and hanging them up in the sun. For a spooky effect, hang multiple dragons from an embroidery hoop or branch, making sure they fall at different lengths. Lastly, you can turn these pictures into book covers using your computer skills; just copy and paste the illustration, add some margin space, and print it off! Looking for a fun craft project to share with kids? We've got you covered! To make a beautiful dragon book cover, follow these steps: Start by printing the dragon illustration on paper that's smaller than the book or print it on bigger paper if you have access to a fancy printer. For an older kid, this is a great way to practice their fine motor skills. You'll need lots of sequins and patience - but the result is worth it! Use Elmer's glue to stick the sequins onto the dragon's body, overlapping them slightly for a shimmery effect. You can use one color or mix it up for an extra sparkly look. For younger kids, try making a toilet paper roll dragon instead. Simply wrap the roll in colored paper, add some glue, and cut out a dragon's head, wings, legs, and feet.
