Let's try our best to come to school on time every day. It helps students learn more, enjoy school, and get ready for a bright future!






NT School Survey 2025 – our school results







Count of parent selections for 'I would prefer the school to share information about my child's achievement with me' (Parents can choose multiple options)






















STUART PARK HALLOWEEN PANCAKES



What immunisation you need depends on your Health, Age, Lifestyle, Occupation (HALO).

HEALTH
Health issues such as chronic medical conditions including liver. kidney conditions or diabetes can increase your risk of disease and estra vaccines can protect you.

AGE
The risk of disease varies by age.

LIFESTYLE

Lifestyle like travelling overseas or smoking may increase your risk of diseases and extra vaccines are needed.

OCCUPATION
Some occupations expose you to a greater risk of disease for example: working in health or child care or with animals.

Why immunise?




