SCHOOL OVERVIEW

Nemarluk School is a Northern Territory, Department of Education (DoE) school for children who require specialised and individualised educational programs. It delivers preschool and primary school programs. The school motto is "Education for Life". Partnerships with families and carers are essential to enact the motto. The school focus is fostering independent learners who have a positive outlook and are engaged members of their community.

The entry criteria for enrolment at Nemarluk School is in line with the DoE Students with Disabilities Policy (2016). Students must live in the Darwin area. Classes are small and programs are planned and delivered by a Teacher and a Special Education Support Officer (SESO).

Learning programs follow the Australian Curriculum and reflect recommendations from pediatricians, psychologists, therapists and priorities of families/carers.

Some classes are based in other Primary Schools for part of the week as part of our satellite class program. Our Partnering schools are Nightcliff, Millner, Stuart Park, Wulagi, Manunda Terrace, Karama and Wanguri







HISTORY

In July 1986 Nemarluk School was officially recognised as a specialist school in it's own right. It had been administrated by Ludmilla Primary School as a Special Unit since the early 1970s. The first satellite class was established in 1989. There are now 10 satellite classes working in 7 host primary schools. In 1994 the school name was changed from Ludmilla Special School to Nemarluk School. This was to remove the label 'special' and alleviate confusion that had existed with Ludmilla Primary School. The Preschool opened in 1998 and has steadily grown to two sessions a day. In 2006 we celebrated our 20th Anniversary which past Principals, students and dignitaries attended.





In August 2018 we opened our new inclusive playground. It was a project supported by Darwin Business Community and the Department of Education.



In June 2012 we moved to our new purpose built school in Alawa, over the oval from Alawa Primary School.



CRITERIA FOR ENTRY

Children eligible to access Nemarluk School are those who fulfill the following criteria:

Year of Entry	Entry Criteria
Early Years: (Preschool to Year 3)	 Global Developmental Delay confirmed through comprehensive assessment by a paediatrician, and/or psychologist: Deficits in intellectual functions (at or below 2nd percentile) confirmed by both clinical assessment and individualised, standardised intelligence testing, or Other evidence of failure to meet developmental milestones in several areas of intellectual functioning when individual's disabilities prevent standardised assessment, or Deficits in adaptive functioning that result in failure to meet developmental milestones, below 2nd percentile across majority of functioning, and Adaptive functioning deficits indicate significant impairment in several domains - communication, social participation, early learning and development. Requiring extensive adjustments that are highly individualised, comprehensive and ongoing to allow access to, and participation in the curriculum. By age 8, sufficient valid and reliable assessment evidence must be compiled to confirm diagnosis, identify education needs and program development options.
Primary, Middle and Senior years: (Year 4 to Year 12)	 Intellectual Disability confirmed through comprehensive assessment by a psychologist that includes: Deficits in intellectual functions, confirmed by both clinical assessment and individualised, standardised intelligence testing (IQ at or below 2nd percentile) Deficits in general adaptive functioning (standard score at or below 2nd percentile) that result in failure to meet developmental and sociocultural standards for personal independence and social responsibility. Those deficits limit functioning in a wide range of activities of daily life. Extensive adjustments that are highly individualised, comprehensive and ongoing to allow access to and participation in the curriculum are required.

HEALTH PROMOTING SCHOOL NURSE

Working under Northern Territory Health Promotion Framework, Health Promoting Schools Philosophy and an agreement between NT Departments of Health and Education Health Promoting School Nurse offers evidence based health and wellbeing information, as well as education and support to students, families and staff. Sue is Nemarluk's Health Promoting School Nurse.

Role:

- Works to enhance the wellbeing of the school community as member of Wellbeing team
- Assists with Health Emergencies and critical incidents including debrief and risk mitigation
- Is a member of Health Care Team promoting best practice approach to students Health management
- Collaborates with staff, families and external agencies to develop and/maintain school wide Health related programs and promote equity and access
- Provides general toileting advice to staff and families and Continence Assessments for referred students (parents request)

As part of their role all NT HPSNs participate in planning and delivery of DoH School Based Immunisation Program in Middle schools. This program currently runs over 4 weeks twice a year.

MOVE (MOBILITY OPPORTUNITIES VIA EDUCATION)

At Nemarluk the MOVE program focuses on students who have specific individual program goals around learning to:

- SIT to eat, participate in activities, education and even employment
- STAND such as washing at the sink, food prep, and upright toileting
- WALK to move to participate in play or complete tasks (with and without support)
- TRANSITION from bed to chair, sitting to standing, etc. and
- TOIELTING AND HYGIENE WITH DIGNITY (vs. being changed horizontally like an infant)

The program is run by Denielle (Deni) Walsh with guidance from Therapists, Senior Staff and in collaboration with classroom staff.

Student's MOVE program goal/s are part of their Educational Outcomes each year.



SUPPORT STAFF AND SERVICES



HOME LIAISON OFFICER

The Home Liaison Officer, Daryl Preston, supports students to achieve successful educational outcomes, positive wellbeing, and high-level attendance through effective communication and working with students, families, staff, school community members and appropriate service agencies.

- Initiates and maintains communication links between families, students, schools, teachers and service agencies to improve attendance and promote best educational outcomes.
- Partners with families to encourage student engagement through appropriate targeted support, referral and follow-up as required
- Works to enhance the wellbeing of the school community as a member of Wellbeing team.
- Collaborates with local community groups and actively supports individual class groups and school wide activities, programs and events.

THERAPY TEAMS

<u>Children's Development Team:</u> The Children's Development Team (Department of Health) therapists primarily provide a consultative service to school staff and parents/caregivers after a referral request has been accepted. They can assess students, advise families and school staff on areas of individualised programs and student equipment.

CDT therapists are contacted through their office at Casuarina Plaza, Ph 89227283.

NDIS therapists in Schools: Families may request a NDIS registered provider access Northern Territory (NT) Government school to:

- Observe a student in the classroom or in the school environment
- Attend planning for a student's individual learning plan
- Attend meetings to monitor and tailor the support provided to a student
- Provide training/professional learning on school grounds
- Provide support with the management of assistive technology such as standing frames or communication devices
- The school does not have the space or supervision capability to support individual therapy sessions in school

The family and provider must complete and submit a Request to Provide NDIS Services in NT Government Schools and NDIS Service in School Agreement to the school. This form includes family consent and the provider's details.

PROGRAMS AT NEMARLUK

At Nemarluk School we recognise the value of implementing educational programs for students in a range of school and community settings which best suit their individual needs. Programs are planned for students to learn and practice new skills and use them in real life situations. We have a strong focus on learning about the world around us and how to be active valued members of our community.

PRESCHOOL

Nemarluk Preschool opened on 14 April 1998 after advocacy by families of young children with special needs. It is a unique program. Since 2018 preschool has operated 4 days per week, Monday to Thursday. It provides two 3 hour programs - 8.00am to 11.00am and 12.00pm to 3.00pm. Each class of approximately six students has a Teacher, SESO and preschool aide.

The Preschool is a collaborative program involving DoE Early Childhood Intervention and Nemarluk School. Students must meet specific criteria to enrol in the Preschool. These criteria are identified in the DoE "Students with Disabilities Policy 2016". The program structure is based on the Early Years Learning Framework.

The Preschool students participate in a wide variety of early childhood activities including art/craft, gross motor, sensory motor and swimming/hydrotherapy, directed play, self care and morning/afternoon tea.

The Preschool has a close working relationship with Alawa Preschool, providing opportunities for play and age appropriate interaction.

Each student has an Education Plan developed in partnership with families, teachers, therapists, doctors and education advisors. This team meets once a year to share student achievements, information and decide on priority outcomes.

The Preschool provides for children aged from 3.5 years to five years (when they can enter full time schooling). On completion of preschool each student's needs are considered and families can enrol their child in a primary school of their choice or continue enrolment at Nemarluk School.





PROGRAMS AT NEMARLUK



SATELLITE CLASSES

In order to respond to the very diverse needs of our students, Nemarluk School implements programs for a number of our students within local primary schools. These schools are at Karama, Nightcliff, Stuart Park, Millner, Manunda Terrace, Wanguri and Wulagi. At each of these schools, a base classroom is provided and the programs are supported by a Nemarluk School teacher and a SESO. These satellite classes work at the Nemarluk School campus one day per week as well as attend school events such as assembly.

Student placements in these programs are decided in collaboration with families. Decisions regarding the most appropriate placement of each student are based on a number of factors including the number and the needs of students already in the class and the residential address of students. Ultimately it is the Principal's decision.



The teacher from Nemarluk School ensures programs are implemented and is directly responsible to the Principal of Nemarluk School for student wellbeing and programs. However, regular discussions and negotiations with the Principal or leadership team of the host school are undertaken to ensure the operation of the class is in accordance with the policies and procedures of that school.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

Community Awareness Programs - From time to time, students take part in excursions that are learning activities linked to units of work or individual learning priorities. Families are informed of the details and provide permission.

Shopping - This program includes menu planning and shopping to buy the ingredients. It is usually on a weekly basis as part of literacy, numeracy and health programs. Students travel by our school bus, public transport or in staff cars. Some classes purchase morning tea or lunch during the shopping program. Each year teachers contact families about the cost of these programs.

Sport - Many of our students participate in sport and leisure activities within the community. These may include gymnastics, soccer, horse riding, bowling, mini golf, rock climbing, bike riding, bush walking, sailing, and canoeing. They also participate in NT School Sport programs.

Swimming - This program is implemented at the Nemarluk pool and public pools and the instructors are Austswim trained as per DoE policy.

ASSESSMENT, CURRICULUM AND REPORTING



CURRICULUM CONTEXT STATEMENTS

Teaching and learning programs are designed using the Australian Curriculum and are delivered from classrooms within the Nemarluk campus and from our satellite classes within local primary schools. We cater for Early Childhood and Primary stages of schooling for students aged 5 - 12 years with moderate and severe intellectual and/or multiple disability.

Individualised programs focus on school readiness skills, play, social skills, personal care and self-regulation.

The Curriculum Map (pg. 12) provides guidance to staff to ensure students are provided access to learning from across all learning areas of the curriculum over a two year period.

INSTRUCTIONAL MODEL

A whole school instructional model provides an overview of the learning cycle, breaking it up into phases which are used to structure, plan and facilitate learning.

It provides a common language across the school for improving the quality and consistency of planning and practice.



The Australian Curriculum and the Early Years Learning Framework are used to develop individualised programs.

The Whole School Instructional Model outlines our trauma informed pedagogical practices, instructional language and a sequence of learning to ensure consistency of effective teaching and learning practices





ASSESSMENT, CURRICULUM AND REPORTING



EDUCATION PLANS

Each student has an Education Plan that documents their prior learning, current abilities, successful strategies and future educational needs. It identifies three or four focus outcomes from the Australian Curriculum and Early Years Learning Framework. These focus outcomes are reviewed annually.

Review Conference is a very important meeting and required by the school and DoE policy. It is attended by families/caregivers, class teacher, senior staff member and, in specific cases, other professionals or support people if requested by the family. An interpreter will be arranged if requested by the family.

The conference is used to:

- Discuss family and program priorities
- Share student achievements and progress
- Update Health Care Plans, Update the Education Plan and determine the focus outcomes
- General discussion and information sharing.
- A draft Education Plans are sent home before the Review Conference for family discussion.

Education Plan is signed by all parties at the Review Conference. The Education Plan is then implemented by the class teacher.

REPORTING PROCESS

Teachers review the progress of each child on an ongoing basis and are happy to share this with families at any time. However, a formal and comprehensive reporting process is undertaken on a yearly basis.

The process identifies student achievements of their focus outcomes, reports on programs and determines priority learning outcomes for the next 12 months. The process is as follows:

- 1. Observations and evidence are collected by the class teacher, SESO, senior staff and therapists throughout the school year.
- 2. Teachers write the report which is discussed with the school leadership team and signed by the principal/assistant principal
- 3. Reports are sent home at the end of Term 4
- 4.A portfolio of work is compiled by the teacher and the student in term 4 each year. It is a record of achievements and a celebration of learning throughout the year. We encourage families to share this with their child and extended family.




SCHOOL COUNCIL

The School Council is active and involved in school matters. The Council consists of the Principal and elected representatives of families, staff and community. Meetings are held monthly at the school and all families and caregivers are welcome to attend.

COMMUNICATION

Good communication between school and home is essential. Each student has a **communication book** in which the class teacher writes on a regular basis. Families are also encouraged to do the same: what their child has been doing at home, any special family events or any other special information which will help staff to respond as well as possible to the needs, interests and any other important aspects of the student's well-being. Some families prefer **email** or our secure **School Stream** service (see info on back of booklet).



There are occasions when families need to discuss matters with the class teacher. It is best to make an **appointment** so class supervision and location arrangements can be made. Please call in at the office before going to the classroom, as all visitors to the school are required to sign the attendance register in case of emergencies such as fire.

Our **newsletter** is distributed to families in weeks 1, 5 and 9 of each term. The newsletter is focused on the achievements and activities of students, general school information and events that are occurring in the community. It can be emailed or sent in printed copy. It is also uploaded onto the school website. We also use **Facebook** so please 'like' us and join the community.

STUDENT ABSENCES

In order for the school to correctly report student attendance and help keep children safe, please contact the school through the website, communication book or phone if your child is absent from school. Unless notified by family, the school will list any absences as 'un-notified' on the attendance database.



GENERAL



TRANSPORT

Families can **apply** for transport assistance to and from school. Applications are approved by the Public Transport Branch of Department of Planning Infrastructure and Logistics (DIPL). DIPL seeks to provide the appropriate level of transport wherever possible although circumstances may prevent this being provided in all cases. Families can apply for conveyance allowance if they transport their child to school. Conditions need to be met in line with policies.

Applications to vary transport arrangements will take least five working days to be considered. It may not always be possible to fulfill the requests of families.

Buses operate on a strict pick up and set down schedule which cannot readily be changed. Family members or a nominated responsible adult must be present to transfer the student to and from the bus.

Further guidelines for this service are set out in "Transport for Students with Special Needs: Code of Good Practice" A copy of this document is available from the school.

SCHOOL UNIFORMS

Our school uniform is available from the office. There are shirt and short options including a Year 6 specific shirt. Students are required to wear a wide brimmed hat outside and attend school in sensible footwear (sandals or enclosed shoes) that is secure and comfortable. Thongs and slip-ons are not acceptable. Students attending our satellite classes in other primary schools can wear the uniform of that school. The DoE 'Back to School Payment' can be used to pay for school uniforms. At times, the office has limited supplies of pre-loved uniforms. We will be phasing out our old red uniforms as we have a new one being introduced from 2024 onwards.







HEALTHY SCHOOL PROGRAM

The school supports the DoE Canteen, Nutrition and Healthy Eating Policy. Individual student's dietary requirements are accommodated. We are an 'Asthma Friendly', epilepsy/anaphylaxis educated and MAPA trained school. Other priority programs are BSEM, swimming, bike riding, athletics, various team sports, MOVE, sexuality education, Keeping Safe Curriculum, sun safety, croc safety and water safety.



STUDENT HEALTH

Ilt is requested that children not be sent to school when they are unwell as they cannot participate in planned programs. NT CDC **Time Out** chart (sick room and Nurses office) lists various diagnosed illnesses and recommended 'exclusion times'. A medical certificate is required to clear a child's return to school earlier than the listed recommendations.

Undiagnosed illnesses may be infectious and pose a risk to both students and staff and also interrupt learning. Parents could be requested to care for their child at home and/or visit GP for the following:

- fevers (recent temperatures over 38°)
- unexpected diarrhoea
- vomiting
- flu/cold symptoms: coughing, runny nose, excessive tiredness, aching limbs
- persistent red irritated eyes -(possible infective cause)
- erupting skin sores
- pain/unexplained distress

HEALTH CARE PLAN

Medical conditions which impact on school programs are documented in a Health Care Plan (HCP). The HCP overarches medication, cardiac, asthma, diabetes, epilepsy, continence, exercise, oral care, nutrition, oral eating/drinking and PEG feed plans. All plans completed with families, doctors and other health professionals and reviewed every 12 months or updated as necessary

ADMINISTERING MEDICATION IN SCHOOL

STUDENT HEALTH



HEAD LICE

Your child will not be sent home if they appear to have head lice /nits, however, in their interest and also to limit transmission to other students, we will notify you requesting students' hair is checked and appropriate treatment commenced. Once treated your child is free to return to school. Please notify the school if your child has headlice so other families can be sent a general advice slip to check/treat as required.

SUN SAFETY

Nemarluk School promotes sun safety during school activities and excursions. This includes:

- Using available shade for outdoor activities
- Planning activities to reduce time spent in the sun
- Encouraging students to wear protective clothing including hats
- Providing and applying SPF 30+ broad-spectrum water-based sunscreen

HEALTHY EATING

The school promotes the Department of Education's Healthy Eating Guidelines. Please let your child's teacher know of any dietary needs. We understand the challenges many of our students face with sensory issues leading to selective eating. Occupational/Speech Therapy and dietitian advice can be helpful.

Consider limiting the introduction of highly processed foods into your child's diet as these often become preferred foods to the exclusion of more healthy options.

To further support establishing lifelong healthy eating many teachers offer food tasting/shopping/food preparation programs along with lunch programs. Please discuss with your child's teacher.

ORAL HEALTH

Children should be assisted to brush their teeth twice each day and visit the dentist yearly for check-ups from the time their first tooth appears. Limiting added sugar in foods and medicines is also important. Nemarluk staff promote good oral hygiene and work with families to help students develop related skills and knowledge.

Free dental checks and treatment are available from **Oral Health Service NT** at their Casuarina Clinic and a number of Primary School clinics: Call – 89226466 for bookings.

Medicare may pay for essential dental services for some children and adults who are eligible. **Child Dental Benefits Schedule** pays up to \$1,000 over 2 calendar years for children aged 2 to 17 for basic dental services, including dental check-ups, x-rays, cleaning, sealing cracked teeth, fillings, root canals and extractions.

IMMUNISATION

Many of our students have complex health issues making them particularly vulnerable to complications if exposed to various vaccine preventable diseases. We recommend immunisation for all children unless there is a medical reason.

School Leadership Team will also use XUNO to communicate with the whole school community with urgent information if there is a critical incident or emergency.











