Our School Fees

Although Catholic schools receive some government funding, school fees constitute an essential proportion of the school income. The inability to pay school fees shall never be the reason for the non-enrolment or exclusion of any child from Sacred Heart. Confidential arrangements can be made with the Principal if there are financial difficulties. Families on Health Care Cards receive a substantial discount on fees and no child is turned away because they can not pay fees.

Fees are payable to attend the school and these will be discussed at the enrolment interview or upon request from the school administration.

About Our School

Goomalling has a population of approximately 550 and is located 130km northeast of Perth. Goomalling is in the Central Wheatbelt and relies heavily on the surrounding farms for employment. The town has its own hospital that operates around the clock and has excellent sporting facilities including a swimming pool, netball/tennis courts, lawn bowls, golf course, gym and an oval with night-time lighting.

Sacred Heart Catholic School was founded in 1912 by the Presentation Sisters from Geraldton and was known as the Presentation Convent. In its early days, the school boasted a girls and boys boarding school. With the withdrawal of the Sisters in 1986, the proud tradition and success of the past continued with the service of a caring and dedicated staff under the direction of the Archbishop of Perth who, together with the other WA Bishops, has authorised the Catholic Education Commission to determine major policies. The school celebrated its 110th birthday in 2022.

Our Communication

Communication between school and home is vital for the transfer of essential information about individual students and about general school issues.

Parents wishing to speak with their child's class teacher can ask teachers for a suitable interview time or ring and make an appointment. Parents are encouraged to see class teachers whenever the need arises or simply to touch base with how their child is progressing.

Communication, from the school to home, takes place in a number of ways:

- a weekly **Parent Memo** emailed each Friday afternoon to help families organise themselves and prepare for the following week
- **SMS text messages** in case of emergency or urgent information
- **Emails** which contain further information
- **Paper documents** when signatures are required
- **SeeSaw** to share information about teaching and learning
- a regular **Newsletter** made available on the school website

Parents are provided with other formal opportunities to meet with Class and Specialist Teachers including child/parent/teacher meetings and learning journeys. Dates for these events can be found on the Term Planner sent home each term.

Parent Teacher Conferences

In Term 1 and Term 3 Sacred Heart Catholic School conduct parent teacher conferences to discuss your child's progress before we enter into the official reporting cycles.

In these meetings teachers show student work samples and take parents through the learning journey of the their child, so far in the year. Each session runs for around 15-20 minutes, after school. Parents will be emailed with available times over three days and will need to book a time that suits you, via a link provided.

Reporting to Parents

Sacred Heart Catholic School reporting takes place in Term 2 and Term 4. These reports are made available on SEQTA to parents, twice a year - Semester One Report and Semester Two Report.

SeeSaw

Our Code of Conduct

- By using assessment to inform instruction, we enable children to go beyond what they already know, understand or can do in order to build new knowledge, understanding and skills.

- For learners to reach their potential, they need to feel safe and welcome in the community, that their voice is valued and that they have a strong sense of belonging.

The foundational document for teaching and learning at Sacred Heart Catholic School, is the school Vision for Learning. This is the driver of our curriculum design.

Our Curriculum

At Sacred Heart, learning is facilitated through a developmental approach that is underpinned by our school Vision for Learning and Early Years Charter. We provide a relevant, comprehensive and varied curriculum to suit all student needs, interests and abilities. Religious Education is our first Learning Area. Literacy and Numeracy are both taught as whole school blocks and reflect the WA Curriculum. Languages (Auslan), Science, Visual Arts, Music and Physical Education are all taught as specialist areas for all students from Pre-Primary to Year Six and in some cases Three Year Old Kindy to Year Six. Our school uses many whole school approaches to learning to ensure consistency and continuity of the teaching and learning program.

Term Overviews

Term Curriculum Overviews are sent home in Week 3 of each term for each class. Parents and carers are asked to look at the overview to ensure you are informed about what your child is learning. Term Overviews are also uploaded to the school website.

Reporting to Parents

Semester One and Semester Two Reports are made available to parents on SEQTA each year. Parents are provided with other formal opportunities to meet with Class and Specialist Teachers including child/parent/teacher meetings and learning journeys. Dates for these events can be found on the Term Planner sent home each term.



Our Learning

Homework

Teachers will outline the School Homework Procedures at the Open Classroom Afternoon which is held early in Term One. Parent support is needed to ensure homework is completed regularly. Please communicate with teachers if your child has any challenges with homework.

MiniLit and Reading Support

Sacred Heart School uses the Minilit Literacy Support Program for students who may be experiencing some difficulty with reaching the desired outcome for Reading. The Program is for children in Year One to Year Three.

Technology

Technology is integral to the teaching and learning programs offered at Sacred Heart. IT complements student learning and student engagement. IT is integrated through learning areas, where appropriate. We are very fortunate at Sacred Heart to provide our students with a one-to-one program utilising iPads to allow students the very best opportunities possible. We value a layered approach to the use of information technology to ensure students are exposed and confident with the use of a range of appropriate technologies necessary to equip them for 21st Century learning.

Music

Music is an integral part of the school curriculum because it is considered to be part of the total education of children. The aim is to create an atmosphere where children can develop an appreciation and enjoyment through singing, movement, listening, instrumentation, and music appreciation. At an extra cost, students can access instrumental lessons privately – outside of school hours.

Physical Education

All the children, from Four Year Old Kindy to Year Six will have PE on Wednesdays. Sport uniforms will need to be worn on this day. The students will be taught explicit PE skills to assist them with participation in a range of sport games. Children will participate in swimming lessons, swimming carnival, athletics carnivals, cross country, and a variety of sport clinics. Our long-term goal with the teaching of PE and sport is to encourage children to participate in sport for life, as a healthy lifestyle choice.

Library

The School Library is available to children each week to borrow books and for teachers to use for lessons. The children are all encouraged to borrow each week from the library and a cloth Library Bag is required for this purpose. Please look after the library books as they come home and report any damage or loss of books to the School Office.

Secondary Education in the Wheatbelt

Sacred Heart Catholic School enjoys a positive and supportive relationship with St Joseph's School in Northam. Sacred Heart Catholic School is a feeder school to St Joseph's Northam meaning children who attend our school have a place at St Joseph's in Northam in Year Seven, providing they submit an enrolment by the end of the Year Four. This relationship means that your child can remain at Sacred Heart until the end of Year Six before moving to St Joseph's to continue their secondary Catholic education.

Our Little Possums

Three-Year-Old Kindy

8.30am -11.30am on Tuesday and Thursday

This program is not funded by the government and must be paid for per child. Children must have turned three before they can attend.

Four-Year-Old Kindy

8.30am to 3.05pm

Monday, Wednesday & Friday

Children can be enrolled in the Four-Year-Old Kindy program if they turn four before 30 June that year.



At Sacred Heart our staff recognise that children in the Early Years of school (from 3-year-old Kindy to Year Two), have unique learning needs to the rest of the student cohort. Our early years teaching and learning programs utilise our school's Early Years Charter; aligned with our school values, mission, vision and strategic plan.

Our Early Years Charter

RATIONALE

Sacred Heart Catholic School Early Years Learning is a Christ-centred, Catholic environment that recognises family as the first educators of their children. At Sacred Heart, children are nurtured, respected and valued as individuals in a safe, enriching and supportive environment which meets children and families at their point of need.

OUR PHILOSOPHY

We believe each child is created in the image and likeness of God. A collaborative approach to faith formation between the Parish, school and families is vital in developing and nurturing each child's emotional, social and spiritual wellbeing.



We believe each child's God-given gifts should be supported and developed within a meaningful and inclusive environment which caters to their individual needs and unique abilities. We provide an environment that supports quality relationships, enables each child to feel a sense of belonging, whilst encouraging each child to reach their full potential to become the best person they can be.

LEARNING IN THE EARLY YEARS

We believe learning occurs when a child feels connected to others, themselves and the natural environment. Play-based pedagogy encourages agency, confidence, independence and resilience, whilst supporting social and emotional growth in children. A balanced approach of explicit instruction and exploration creates an authentic learning environment.

Our Community - Your Involvement

Parent Volunteers

Parents are the first educators of their children. The school supports the family in this role. Together parents and staff will share the responsibility of teaching Catholic values. The school encourages parent volunteers to assist with class activities, to listen to reading or to help out in the library. Parent involvement in the school results in improved outcomes for their children. Parents are encouraged to come and see their class teacher if they would like to assist with class activities from time to time.

Parent and Friends (P&F)

Parents and Friends Groups have been established by the Catholic Education Commission of Western Australia (CECWA) to support the Principal to fulfil their responsibilities in leading the Catholic Identity, Education, Community and Stewardship functions of the Catholic school in pursuit of Catholic Education Western Australia's vision to be Christ-centred and child-focused.

Parent and Friends Groups play an important role in supporting the Principal and teachers of our school, to partner with parents and caregivers as the first educators of their children.

They also serve a vital function providing local and contextual support for schools as we work together to build strong, positive Catholic school communities.

The P&F collaborates with the Principal to coordinate activities that create opportunities for community engagement between parents, school staff, parish and students. Whilst supporting the principal in the facilitation of fundraising events for the benefit of students that complement the school budget.

School Advisory Council

The School Advisory Council plays an important role in the operation of the school's finances and the general management of the school's resources.

The functions of the School Advisory Council include:

- Planning for the present and future operation of the school
- The management of finances associated with the school
- Advising the Principal with school policy that has financial implications

Members are elected to the Advisory Council at the AGM and membership is for a two-year period with renomination available for up to a six year period.

Our Assemblies and Awards

Assemblies

Each Monday at 8.40am, children are involved in a morning assembly, led by our Year 5/6 class. This is to inform children of what is happening in the week.

Parents are invited to attend Friday afternoon Merit Assemblies which are scheduled regularly throughout the term, as seen on the Parent Planner on our school website. Each classroom takes it in turns to host a Friday afternoon Merit Assembly throughout the year.

At these assemblies, Merit Awards are given out in addition to general information being shared with the community. If a child is receiving an award, parents and carers are contacted by classroom teachers on the Monday before the assembly and followed by a reminder SMS on the Thursday evening beforehand.



Making Jesus Real (MJR) Awards

When students regularly demonstrate a behaviour and attitude that reflect the H.E.A.R.T. values, at school, we recognise this with a golden ticket. These tickets are placed in a box over the week, and at each Monday assembly, we randomly draw a ticket from the box. That student receives an MJR Award.

At the end of term, all the MJR Award recipients get to take time out of class and have a milkshake with Mr Shaun, to celebrate how they are striving to be more like Jesus in their daily life at school.

Our Pastoral Care

Pastoral Care

Sacred Heart places a strong emphasis on the pastoral care of children, parents, families and staff. Children are encouraged to see themselves as valued and respected members of their class and school community. A sense of caring concern and responsibility towards others is fostered in all children.

Becoming Your Best Self (BEES)

Sacred Heart Catholic School is proud to offer the BEES Program which is open for children in Year Three to Year Six to help them recognise and explore their feelings and emotions, as well as give authentic experiences in social situations.

Berry Street

In February 2024, Sacred Heart Catholic School introduced the Berry Street Education Model (BSEM), which offers practical, classroom-based strategies to enhance student engagement - particularly for those with complex learning needs. This approach enables staff to more effectively identify and support students who arrive at school in an escalated emotional state.

By intervening early, we can better meet their needs and foster a more regulated learning environment. Additionally, our "calm down corner" spaces provide students with a clear, structured opportunity to self-regulate, and help reinforce consistent expectations across classrooms. This initiative supports both staff and students to maintain a safe, inclusive, and emotionally supportive school culture.

Behaviour Engagement

The foundation of engaging children in appropriate, positive behaviour at Sacred Heart is through the building and maintaining of quality relationships with the child and family.

Our staff aim to be positive with the children in their care and encourage positive behaviours. When children demonstrate behaviour that is not appropriate for school, staff will re direct the children to ensure the behaviour does not continue.

At Sacred Heart:

- We share our Catholic values in the way we relate to others.
- All children have the right to learn, work and play in a friendly, safe and helpful school.
- Each child is respected as an individual and is made to feel valued.

By working together through a school wide approach to engaging children in positive behaviours, we can increase the probability that students will learn responsibility and respect from one another. Children will be encouraged to develop empathy toward others. They will be asked to realise they have responsibilities, and they should be aware of their rights and the rights of others.

Our Health & Medical

Crunch and Sip

Sacred Heart Catholic School is a Crunch and Sip school.

All children are required to bring in a piece of fruit or vegetable to eat in class during the morning session. The children are also required to have a **water bottle** with them in class. **We promote healthy eating at all times at school** and lollies, chocolates and soft drinks are discouraged to ensure that children have healthy foods to help them with learning while growing healthy and strong.

Lunch Orders

Lunch orders are provided by various local businesses at various times throughout the year. This is not necessarily consistent. When available, orders can be made through the Spriggy Schools app and lunch order days are Monday and Friday.

Birthdays

We celebrate each child's birthday at Sacred Heart and acknowledge them at Monday morning's assembly. Parents may wish to send in a birthday cake or cupcakes for the class to share to help celebrate a child's birthday.

However, parents are asked to be **mindful of our healthy eating policy** and avoid sending lollies with the cake. Parents are also asked to be mindful that we are an '**Allergy Aware**' school.

Allergy Aware

Sacred Heart Catholic School is an 'Allergy Aware' School.

This means that we ask parents **not to bring any nut related products** onto the school site. Additionally, we have a number of students allergic to **bee products** and so **honey** is also asked to be left at home. We ask that all parents follow these instructions to ensure the safety of other children at school.

Medical Information

At any time that there are new allergic reactions or ailments that arise for a child, parents are requested to contact the school in writing as soon as possible.

Any medication that need to be administered to children during school hours must be done so by parents. Staff are only permitted to give medication when parents provide a signed form which clearly explains the administering process.

In no circumstance are children to carry medication with them to pass on to school staff. This must be done by parents and carers.

Our Catholic Faith & Identity

Parish Priest

The Parish Priest has an important role to play in the Pastoral Care program of the school. Teachers and the Parish Priest work together to develop a Sacramental Program that will be of most benefit to the children concerned.

Religious Education and Sacraments

Sacred Heart Catholic School offers a Catholic education, teaching Catholic values and perspectives. Our Catholic faith is at the core of our school's existence. In accordance with Catholic Education W.A policy, all teachers gain Accreditation to Teach in a Catholic School and to teach Religious Education. Religious Education follows the Perth Archdiocese Religious Education Units of Work. This program is to promote understanding of Catholic beliefs and practices. Religious Education is taught with the same demands and rigour as other learning areas.

All classes are active in planning for school community Masses and Liturgies throughout the year. Masses and Liturgies will be regularly communicated to parents and parents and community members are encouraged to join us for these occasions.

The Religious Education program includes preparation for the Sacraments of Baptism (if required), Reconciliation, Eucharist and Confirmation.

Please speak with Mr Shaun and/or Fr Daniel if you and your child are wanting to participate in the Sacraments.

Liturgical Singing

Liturgical singing is provided to students from Kindy to Year Six on a Friday. Liturgical singing provides the children with an opportunity to learn more about the music sung in our Masses and Liturgy while developing the art and skill of singing and movement in a liturgical context.

Gospel Story Time was introduced in 2025 as a way of celebrating the Gospel stories in the bible with students throughout each term. Gospel Story Time is now incorporated into the Liturgical singing sessions on Fridays - connecting the lyrics to the bible readings.

Celebrations and Events

Feast days provide an opportunity for us to gather as a school community to not only apply the learning from Religious Education and Liturgical Singing, but to celebrate and recognise the good examples of the Saints in how they lived to be more like Jesus and grow closer to God. We encourage families to join us for these special days and evenings.

Our Administration

Student Accident Insurance Cover

All students are covered by a comprehensive insurance policy. The policy provides 24 hour protection against everyday accidents.

Sign In/Out

If parents need to take their children out of class during the school day, or they are arriving late to school, they must sign them in/out. A sign in/out iPad, for this purpose, is located in the School Office.

Sacred Heart Catholic School is a feeder school to St Joseph's Northam meaning children who attend our school have a place at St Joseph's in Northam in Year Seven, providing they submit an enrolment by the end of the Year Four. This relationship means that your child can remain at Sacred Heart until the end of Year Six before moving to St Joseph's to continue their secondary Catholic education.


