

Wisdom literature (Job, Psalms, Ecclesiastes, Song of Songs, Wisdom, and Ben Sira) is a collection of texts that present God's revelation not primarily in historical events but in the ordinariness of life. The goal of such wisdom is practical. How are we to live, love, and prosper in the face of the challenges of life? Jewish Wisdom theology held that God was the prime author of ordered creation, so fear of the Lord was the beginning of wisdom. Writing in the second century B.C., Ben Sira, from whose writings our first reading is taken, attempts to counter the influence of Hellenism. He reminds the Jews of his day that the traditions of Israel and not Greek philosophy and culture were the foundations of true wisdom. The choice is simple: keep the commandments and be saved.

Paul's eschatological biases are showing in today's second reading. Like many first-century Jews and early Christians, Paul believed that the current evil age would be ended when the Messiah came (Jewish perspective) or the Son of Man returned (Christian understanding). Through this lens, we see that the "wisdom of this age" and "rulers of this age" likely refer to the cosmic powers that are ultimately responsible for the crucifixion of "the Lord of glory". But Paul preaches against this evil age, proclaiming God's wisdom, a mystery hidden from the rulers of this age but available to believers.

Following the Beatitudes (Matthew 5:1-11) and two parables (Matthew 5:12-16), Jesus turns to questions about the law and the prophets in today's Gospel reading. Jesus assures His disciples that His intent is not to abolish the law, but to fulfill it (Matthew 5:17). He proposes six reinterpretations of scripture that address murder (vv. 21-26), Adultery (vv. 27-30), divorce (vv. 31-32), the taking of oaths (vv. 33-37), retaliation (vv. 38-42), and treatment of the enemy (vv. 43-48). In order to enter the kingdom of heaven, the disciples are to possess righteousness that exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, whom Matthew critiques as the very purveyors of inadequate interpretations.

Sw. Pawel przestrzega nas, ze w podejmowaniu decyzji, w dokonywaniu wyborow zgodnych z madroscia Boza bedziemy natrafiali na pokuse roznych powabow zgodnych z madroscia Boza bedziemy natrafiali na pokuse roznych powabow ze strony madrosci tego swiata. Tak jest po dzien dzisiejszy: madrosci Bozej przeciwstawia sie tzw. nowoczesnosc zycia zbiorowego, szerokosc horyzontow, wizje przynalezenia do wspolnoty narodow w pelni cywilizowanych - czytaj: bardziej pelnego wejscia do Europy i tym podobne. Otoz Pawel precyzuje tamte starotestamentalne kryterium naszych wyborow: madrosc Pana, wspomniana w pierwszym czytaniu, ujawnia sie wdlug Pawla najpelniej na krzyzu, czyli w zbawczym dziele Jezusa Chrystusa. Wiadomo zas, ze to zbawcze dzielo - to wyraz najwiekszej milosci do czlowieka. Nie wolno nam podjac zadnej decyzji, nie wolno dokonac zadnego wyboru, ktory by kolidowal z przykazaniem milosci blizniego. Nigdy nikomu nie wolno swiadomie, dobrowolnie zrezygnowac z milosci blizniego. Gdyby sie na to zanosilo, stanelibysmy wobec niebezpieczenstwa wybierania smierci a nie zycia i ponadto dawalibysmy do zrozumienia, ze zbawcze dzielo Jezusa Chrystusa nie wydalo w nas zadnego owocu. Mamy tedy decydowac, wybierac zawsze poprzez milosc do Boga objawiajacego sie w naszych bliznich.

Ewangelista podsuwa nam jeszcze jedna wartosc: sprawiedliwosc; ale nie taka zwykla, znana ze Starego Testamentu, widoczna w zewnetrznych czynach. Od nas domaga sie Chrystus czegos wiecej: "Jesli wasza sprawiedliwosc nie bedzie wieksza niz uczonych w Pismie i faryzeuszy, nie wejdziecie do krolestwa niebieskiego". W praktyce chodzi o to, zeby sprawiedliwe były nie tylko nasze uczynki lecz najbardziej skryte mysli, uczucia, pragnienia; cale nasze wnetrze, w ktorym Jezus wszystko dostrzega. Jest to takze wezwanie nas do ciaglego doskonalenia naszego zycia.

Chrzescijanin – to człowiek, ktory nie tylko unika zla, a wybiera dobro, ale jest takze zatroskany o to, by nie poprzestawac na dobrym, wybierac to, co lepsze.






PRAYER GROUP
