ear Parishioners and Friends,

In today's first reading, the author of Acts of the Apostles paints a utopian picture of the Resurrection community shortly after the experience of Pentecost. This "honeymoon" stage would not last long. In Chapter 5, Ananias and Sapphira skim profits from the sale of their property before giving it to the community, and in Chapter 6, the Greek-speaking Jews complain that the Palestinian Jews are ignoring their widows. Throughout Luke-Acts, the Word is readily accepted but enthusiasm often wanes. The cycle of acceptance and rejection is repeated until the final scene in which Paul is proclaiming in Rome, "Let it be known to you that this salvation of God has been sent to the Gentiles; they will listen" (Acts 28:28).

Writing in the name of the Apostle Peter, the author of today's second reading describes the benefits of belief in a series of metaphors. We have a "new birth" to "a living hope" through Jesus Christ's resurrection (1 Peter 1:3). We are given an imperishable inheritance, stored in heaven and awaiting us (1 Peter 1.4). Our faith is "more precious than gold" that is tested by fire (1 Peter 1.7). The use of concrete metaphors tied to everyday life reaches its pinnacle when First Peter describes believers as a "spiritual household" (1 Peter 2:5) and the "household of God" (4:17). Though utilizing a letter format, the word may actually have been a baptism sermon. The use of various metaphors would help the catechumen understand his or her new reality in Christ.

The fourth Evangelist seems to have intentionally set up resonances with the creation stories of Genesis. Scholars have long noted the echo of Genesis 1:1 ("In the beginning, when God created the heavens and the earth") found in John 1:1 ("In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God"). In today's reading, we find yet another allusion. "The Lord God formed man out of the clay of the ground and blew into his nostrils the breath of life, and so man became a living being" (Genesis 2:7). The resurrected Jesus appears to the disciples, announcing peace and commissioning them. "He breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit" (John 20:22). The divine breath brings forth the new life of creation in Genesis. In John, Jesus' divine breath shares his Spirit with the disciples, who are commissioned to continue Jesus' mission on earth.

Kochani Parafianie,

Az nas zazdrosc ogarnia, gdy sie dowiadujemy dzis z pierwszego czytania, jak to wygladalo na co dzien zycie pierwszych chrzescijan: trwali w nauce apostolow, we wspolnocie dobr materialnych i w modlitwie. Chyba wszystkim biskupom, proboszczom, a z pewnościa także wielu wiernym marzy sie taki obraz Kosciola. O taki styl zycia na co dzien chodzi we wszystkich posoborowych zachetach, aby wrocic do zrodel chrzescijanstwa. Chrzescijanstwo nie bylo jeszce podzielone, nie bylo tej bolesnej wielosci wyznan, wszyscy zyli ta sama Ewangelia. Ludzie byli pelni wzajemnego zatroskania o siebie. Nikt nie cierpial dotkliwej biedy, bo ci, co posiadali wiecej, sprzedawali majatki i rozdawali pieniadze kazdemu według potrzeby. No i Bogiem zyli. Jeszcze nie mieli wlasnych kosciolow ani kaplic, wiec na sprawowanie Eucharystii czyli na lamanie chleba zbierali sie po domach, a na czytanie slowa Bozego i spiewy Psalmow udawali sie do swiatyni.

Tak zyli pierwsi chrzescijanie jerozolimscy. Jakze nam dzis, po prawie dwoch tysiacach lat, daleko do tego! Dodajmy na zakonczenie, bo od tego zaczyna sie dzisiejsze pierwsze czytanie – ze siebie samych pierwsi chrzescijanie nazywali po prostu "bracmi". Konczy zas sw. Lukasz ten opis zycia pierwszych chrzescijan takim oto stwierdzeniem: "Wielbili Boga, a caly lud odnosil sie do nich zyczliwie". Czy my jeszcze kiedys wrocimy do tego?




WELCOME TO THE CHURCH OF ST. HEDWIG
