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

Dear Parishioners & Friends,

Today's first reading from Third Isaiah is remarkable in its universal imagery. After the sufferings of exile and God's redemption of Israel, the saving hand of God will extend to all nations: "I come to gather nations of every language; they shall come and see my glory" (Isaiah 66:18). The new heaven and a new earth (Isaiah 65:17) are now to include the nations, traditionally all who were not Israelites. And as these outsiders are drawn to Jerusalem, they will bring with them the scattered remnant of Israel living among them (Isaiah 66:20). Jerusalem will become the place of holy worship for all peoples.

Like the nations streaming to Jerusalem in the reading from Isaiah, Hebrews envisions a similar homecoming (Hebrews 12:>14). But the way of return is not without hardship. The author of Hebrews takes to heart the Greek maxim mathein pathein, "to learn it is necessary to suffer." "Do not disdain the discipline of the Lord . . . he scourges every son he acknowledges" (Hebrews 12:5). The metaphor connects the believers who endure faithfully with Jesus, of whom the author wrote, "Son though he was, he learned obedience from what he suffered" (Hebrews 5:8). The goal is clear: discipline is for our benefit so that we might see God's holiness (Hebrews 5:10). In all three of our readings, those who have sinned are chastened in order that they might be worthy of salvation. In the

Gospel, Jesus turns from parables about the kingdom (13:13 -21) to the requirements for entrance into that kingdom. The time is shortening, and once the door is locked, it will not be reopened (13:25). Claiming to accompany Jesus (13:26) does not equate to true discipleship. Though set in the time of Jesus, these sayings were understood to refer to the Jews who did not accept the message of Jesus during Luke's day. The Gentiles ("people . . . from the east and the west . . .) would receive a seat at the table formerly only available to the Jews. Likely Luke's Gentile community was particularly happy hearing that "some are last who will be first" (13:30).

Dzisiejsza Ewangelie według sw. Lukasza mozna zatytulowac "Panie, czy tylko nieliczni beda zbawieni?" Ma ona character przestrogi. Jezus stawia sprawe w sposob uczciwy. Jego słowa sa zdecydowane: "Usilujecie wejsc przez ciasne drzwi; gdyz wielu, powiadam wam, bedzie chcialo wejsc, a nie zdolaja", czy tez w nastepnym stwierdzeniu: "odstapicie ode Mnie wszyscy, ktorzy dopuszczacie sie niesprawiedliwosci!".

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Powiedziane jest bardzo jasno komu nie bedzie dane dostapic zbawienia. Tymi slowami Chrystus nie stawia wymagan zaporowych, niemozliwych do zrealizowania. Kazdy czlowiek, kiedy chce cos osiagnac, podejmuje konieczny wysilek. Jezus jasno daje do zrozumienia, ze krolestwo Boze i zbawienie, ktore symbolizuje uczta u gospodarza, sa tego warte. Reszta zalezy od nas.

W tej Ewangelii znow przypomniane jest przez Chrystusa: "Tak oto sa ostatni, ktorzy beda pierwszymi, i sa pierwsi, ktorzy beda ostatnimi". Czyli Ci co sa cisi, pokorni, nie wywyzszajacy sie, nie glodni pochwal i ziemskich blaskow maja latwiejsza droge do nieba. Ziemski porzadek i hierarchie nie sa znane w niebie. Liczy sie czyste serce, trwanie w wierze i czci Bogu, wypelniajac Boze przykazania.


OUR LADY OF CZESTOCHOWA ICON

St. Hedwig Church Window Restoration Campaign

Dear Parishioners:

We are very fortunate to be able to worship in a beautiful Church. There are many reasons to make sure our "place of worship" stays in tip-top shape. A building of this size requires a lot of TLC and routine maintenance to maintain the condition it is in today. It's just like an historic home or a treasured museum... we must maintain and sustain its luster.

There are many obstacles and challenges we must address prior to beginning any project or needed restoration: the cost of materials, the availability of restoration experts, the availability of funding and the parishioner base. Our exterior window frames are in need of some painting and restoration in order to guarantee the structural integrity of our beautiful stained-glass windows. The cost of this critical project is \$44,349 and the work will be done by Barry R. Speakman of Lincoln University, PA. The Scope of Work includes: the work needed to maintain the wooden window frames on all of the church's exterior windows.

This will include pressure washing of all wood that will be painted; Scrape any loose paint and sand; Spot prime all bare wood; Reglaze windows where needed; Painting (2 coats) to all window frames; Work will include an (eighty) 80-foot-high reach. Special attention will be given to the façade window, which has received several major repairs over the past three decades. For more information, please contact Ed Lipka at (302) 454-8423



Pope Leo XIV will canonize Blesseds Carlo Acutis and Pier Giorgio Frassati together



Sept. 7, the Vatican announced. Meeting with cardinals living in and

Meeting with cardinals living in and visiting Rome for an ordinary public consistory June 13, the pope approved the new canonization date for the two young blesseds and set Oct. 19 as the date for the canonization of seven others. He announced the dates in Latin.

The canonization of Blessed Acutis, a teenager known for his devotion to the Eucharist and creating an online exhibition





of Eucharistic miracles, had originally been scheduled for April 27 during

the Jubilee of Teenagers. It was postponed following the death of Pope Francis April 21. Born in 1991 and raised in Milan, Blessed Acutis used his tech skills to evangelize and was noted for his joyful faith and compassion for others before dying of leukemia in 2006 at age 15.

Blessed Frassati, born in 1901 into a prominent family in Turin, Italy, was admired for his deep spirituality, love for the poor and enthusiasm for life. A member of the Dominican Third Order, he served the sick through the St. Vincent de Paul Society. He died at age 24 after contracting polio, possibly from one of the people he assisted.

For years, Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati has been a significant global patron for youth, young adults, athletes, and "ordinary people" - and has a special place in the hearts of many young people across the United States and around the world. His example of Gospel living continues to inspire people a century after his death. St. John Paul II declared him a patron for World Youth Days and deemed him the "Man of the Beatitudes" as he exemplified those blessings in his everyday life.



Felician Sisters with a lengthy history in Diocese of Wilmington celebrate 150 years as a religious order Sept. 21

The Felician Sisters will celebrate a Mass of Thanksgiving in the former Lodi Province in New Jersey Sept. 21 to commemorate their sesquicentennial anniversary of ministry in America. The Felician Sisters were founded in 1855 by Blessed Mary Angela Truszkowska, in a nationally suppressed Poland. At the request of Father Joseph Dabrowski, who founded the Polish Seminary in Orchard Lake, Michigan, Blessed Mary Angela missioned five Felician sisters to Polonia Wisconsin in 1874.

1896 marked the beginning of the Felician apostolate in the Diocese of

Wilmington. The sisters took over the elementary education of St. Hedwig School in West Wilmington where the Benedictine Sisters, from Sacred Heart Convent in Wilmington, established the school in 1891. In 1914, the Felicians began classes at St. Stanislaus School in East Wilmington. They staffed Holy Cross Elementary and High Schools in Dover beginning in 1952. For a time in that decade, they were on the teaching staff of St. Elizabeth High School. At their peak in 1961 with 630 sisters in the Lodi Province alone, the Felicians were able to open St. Hedwig High School in Wilmington and graduated their first class that year; also permitting the staffing of Holy Spirit School in New Castle.
