The reading from Isaiah comes from a section of First Isaiah known as the Apocalypse of Isaiah (24 - 27). It envisions a future time when a city in chaos is destroyed by God, the mountain (Presumably Zion, Jerusalem's mountain) will be the site of God's salvific action. To celebrate God's victory over the tyrants, a feast of rich good and pure, choice wines (v.6) will be provided not only for Israel, but for all people. On this mountain of Jerusalem, God will destroy death, and the reproach of God's people will be removed (v.8). The prophet envisions a future of hope, filled with sumptuous food and drink, the absence of death, and rejuvenation of God's people. Though found within the work of Isaiah of Jerusalem (Chapters 1 - 39), the Apocalypse likely comes from the oracles of a later prophet in the school of Isaiah, who was writing during the Exile.

A good part of Paul's joy over the Philippian community has to do with their spiritual growth and financial support of Paul. "For even when I was at Thessalonica you sent me something for my needs, not only once but more than once" (Philippians 4:16). But Paul has maintained that he is self-sufficient, supporting himself by his own hands (1 Thessalonians 2:5-9); 1 Corinthians 9:15-18) so as not to be a burden on the local community. Hence, he writes, "I know how to live in humble circumstance." The support that the Philippians provides is to live in humble circumstance." The support that the Philippians provides is deeply appreciated by Paul because it results from their affection for the apostle.

Matthew's Gospel is filled with more than sixty allusions to the Old Testament, evidencing the evangelist's purposeful characterization of Jesus as the fulfillment of scripture. In today's Gospel reading, Matthew has taken a parable from "Q" (a source of sayings material shared by Luke and Matthew), and inserted allegorical elements. That the kingdom of heaven is likened to a banquet picks up the image of the eschatological banquet of Isaiah and points toward the consummation of God's kingdom. But Matthew cautions that while this kingdom is already present 22:1 - 10), entrance into it requires scrutiny and judgment by the king (22:11 - 14). Scholars see the final verses as addressed specifically to Matthew's community, much as his unique parables have been elsewhere. "Many are invited, but few are chosen" (Matthew 22:14).

K ochani Parafianie,

W dzisiejszej Ewangelii i w pierwszym czytaniu jestesmy zaproszeni na uczte. Ta pierwsza uczta, z proroctwa Izajasza, to obraz przyszlego szczescia. Uczta – to czesto w Biblii obraz wiecznej szczesliwosci. Dokladnie – to jednak tylko jeden z elementow tego lepszego, wiecznego jutra. Ludzie, ktorym dane bedzie korzystac z tego szczescia, raz na zawsze pozbeda sie smutku i zaloby. Co wiecej! Obdarzony takim szczesciem czlowiek nie bedzie sie obawiał zadnych chorob ani smierci.

Uczta w Ewangelii – to niewatpliwie obraz szczescia wiecznego. Krol zapraszajacy na uczte – to bez watpienia Pan Bog. Ilez bolesnego nietaktu, aroganckiej obojetnosci wykazali zaproszeni na uczte! Ale to własnie my jestesmy zaproszeni na uczte. Nie potepiajmy nikogo, przyjrzyjmy sie wlasnemu zyciu, wszystkim opuszczeniom niedzielnych Mszy sw., tepej obojetności na glosy parafialnych dzwonow. Martwi nas tak bardzo zmniejszajaca sie ilosc dzieci i mlodziezy na Mszy sw.

No i to najstraszniejsze: Niektorzy sposrod zapraszanych nie tylko, ze nie udali sie na uczte, ale jeszcze pochwycili wyslannikow krolewskich i zelzywszy ich, pozabijali. Nie zdarzaja sie zbyt czesto takie zbrodnie u nas, ale przeciez ciagle na swiecie gina misjonarze, kaplani i biskupi. To nastepcy w prostej linii ewangelijnych wyslannikow krola, zapraszajacego na uczte.

Ale zapraszac trzeba nadal, az do skonczenia swiata, zeby mozna tylko powiedziec, ze wielu jest wezwanych.

Ludzie odmawiajacy przyjcia na uczte, nie mowiac juz o tych, ktorzy dopuscili sie morderstw zapraszajacych – z pewnoscia byli pozbawieni wiary. Otoz o mocy wiary w potrzebie mowi wlasnie sw. Pawel w drugim czytaniu z dzisiejszej liturgii Slowa. Pawel oswiadcza: wszystko moge w Tym, ktory mnie umacnia. I tacy ludzie zdarzaja sie po dzien dzisiejszy. Trzeba nam reagowac jak Pawel na wyrazy ludzkiej dobroci. Najbardziej jednak trzeba nam dziekowac za dar wiary, bedacej wyrazem wrazliwosci Boga na duchowe potrzeby czlowieka.

Confessions are heard during Adoration. Holy Mass begins at 6:30 p.m.


During Eucharistic Adoration, we "watch and wait", we remain "silent" in His Presence and open ourselves to His Graces which flow from the Eucharist.


