THE HOLY GOSPEL John 10:11-18

GospellerThe Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.PeopleGlory to you, Lord Christ.

Gospeller Jesus said, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father."

Please stand as you are able.

All We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made,

of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate: he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Leader The Resurrected Christ strengthened the faith of Thomas by telling him to touch his hands and side. Reassure those who are troubled by doubts, and strengthen their faith in your goodness. Lord, in your mercy:

People Hear our prayer.

Leader The Resurrected Christ conquered death by his death and won the victory by his resurrection. Be with those who are dying, and lead them to life with you forever. Lord, in your mercy:

People Hear our prayer.

Celebrant Heavenly Father, grant that all who now celebrate these joyful holy days here on earth may finally praise you forever, with all the angels and saints in heaven. We ask this through your risen Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.



A Dr. MaultsBy Music Moment

The Fourth Sunday of Easter is always known as the "Sunday of the Good Shepherd." The liturgical readings of the scripture are organized into a cycle of three years. The thinking behind this concept is to cover the reading of the entire Bible over the three year period called "Year A," "Year B" and "Year C." This is accomplished by the daily reading of scripture. During the week, the readings are included in the Daily Office. On Sundays, the readings are a part of The Holy Eucharist.

However, every year on the Fourth Sunday of the Easter season, sometimes referred to as "Eastertide," the appointed psalm is Psalm 23 whose text begins "The Lord is my shepherd." The Gospel reading is always from the tenth chapter of the Book of John in which Jesus is described as "The Good Shepherd."

Since one of the main purposes of music in the liturgical Episcopal Church is to reenforce the themes of the scriptures appointed for a particular service, composers, not unlike many Christians, have felt the pull of Psalm 23. Consequently, there are many musical settings of The Twenty Third Psalm, for example, Leonard Bernstein in Chichester Psalm, John Rutter in Requiem and Albert Hay Mallotte's "The Twenty-Third Psalm." Mallotte is better known for his setting of "The Lord's Prayer."

Then there are the setting of paraphrases of Psalm 23 that come to us musically through the folk hymn tradition, for example, the Irish tune, St. Columba; the Scottish tune, Crimond; the American tune, Resignation. At today's service, we will hear two of these settings.

In addition, after a Lenten season of restraint, Eastertide is replete with "alleluias," i. e., "praise to God." Before the Gospel reading, we sing an Alleluia Verse. In some Episcopal churches, an Alleluia Verse is sung every Sunday except during the penitential season of Lent.






