





**A WORD FROM THE PASTOR**

Christmas is more than one day for us in the Church. Several important feasts come quickly within a couple weeks. Of course, the Christmas season begins with the Solemnity of **the Nativity of the Lord** (Christmas).

This year that was quickly followed by **the Feast of the Holy Family** which we celebrated last Sunday. We were reminded that Jesus lived in a family and experienced all the joys and sorrows associated with life in a human family.

On January 1, the Octave of Christmas, the Church celebrated the beginning of the new year with **the Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God**. It is also a traditional day to pray for world peace.

Now today we celebrate the fourth great feast of the Christmas season: **the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord**. 

The Epiphany of the Lord

Reflection: Today we celebrate the showing forth (epiphany) of Jesus to the nations beyond Israel. We hear the story of the astrologers, or magi, who saw the light of a distant star. They accepted it as a sign that a great leader had been born. Without knowing where the star would lead them or what they would find, the magi set out bearing gifts. Their journey did not lead them to a place of wealth and might. Rather, they found a newborn helpless baby in the arms his mother. Overjoyed, they offered their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And later, they returned to their distant homes.

This story is full of surprises. The astrologers were Gentiles, meaning they were not Jewish. But they paid attention to the signs. They had the wisdom to see in this baby the promised Messiah. They were the first to worship Jesus as the newborn King of the Jews. Christ shows himself to us, too. He comes into our lives in many ways and through many people. As people of faith, let us be alert and find him in these little "epiphanies." *Who or what leads you to Jesus today? Which gifts will you offer him?*

Prayer: Lord Jesus, make us attentive to the signs and wonders in which you reveal your presence to us.

Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord

Sunday, January 2, 2022

First Reading

Isaiah 60:1-6

Jerusalem shall be a light to all nations.

Responsorial Psalm

Psalm 72:1-2,7-8,10-11,12-13

Every nation on earth shall worship the Lord.

Second Reading

Ephesians 3:2-3a,5-6

Gentiles are coheirs in the promise of Christ.

Gospel Reading

Matthew 2:1-12

The Magi seek out Jesus and do him homage.



Background on the Gospel Reading

The visit of the Magi occurs directly before the story of the Holy Family's flight into Egypt. Matthew's Gospel tells a version of Jesus' birth that is different than the one in Luke. Of the actual birth of Jesus, Matthew tells us little more than, "When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod . . ." The story of the census is found only in Luke's Gospel, but we hear about the visit of the Magi only in Matthew's Gospel.

We know little about the Magi. They come from the East and journey to Bethlehem, following an astrological sign, so we believe them to be astrologers. We assume that there were three Magi based upon the naming of their three gifts. The Gospel does not say how many Magi paid homage to Jesus. In Matthew's Gospel, they represent the Gentiles' search for a savior. Because the Magi represent the entire world, they also represent our search for Jesus.

We have come to consider the gifts they bring as a foreshadowing of Jesus' role in salvation. We believe the meaning of the gifts to be Christological. Gold is presented as representative of Jesus' kingship. Frankincense is a symbol of his divinity because priests burned the substance in the Temple. Myrrh, which was used to prepare the dead for burial, is offered in anticipation of Jesus' death.

The word Epiphany means "manifestation" or "showing forth." Historically several moments in Christ's early life and ministry have been celebrated as "epiphanies," including his birth in Bethlehem, the visit of the Magi, his baptism by John, and his first miracle at Cana.
