# THE COUNTDOWN IS ON.....



If you run an adult social care service in England, it's time to get ready for the 30th June 2025 deadline to update your Data Security and Protection Toolkit (DSPT).

The DSPT isn't just a box-ticking exercise. It's an essential, annual self-assessment that shows you're taking data protection and cyber security seriously – and that you're following good practice to keep people's confidential information safe.

Whether you're completing the DSPT for the first time or republishing it for another year, you don't have to do it alone We can help with free support, guidance and training one to one.

### Why you must update your DSPT every year

Even if you completed the DSPT last year, it must be reviewed and republished at least annually, as circumstances can change. You might have implemented new IT systems, modified your services, or hired new staff—all of which impact how you handle data and what should be included in your DSPT. If you don't keep your submission up to date, it can't be used as proof of compliance, which could put your contracts and reputation at risk.

Not updating your DSPT could also have a knock-on effect when you're inspected. The Care Quality Commission (CQC) looks at how you manage data and digital security, and the DSPT is referenced as evidence that your policies, systems and training are in place.

On the other hand, keeping your DSPT up to date helps you:

- Show that you comply with data protection law
- Give confidence to people who use your services, their families and your staff
- Access NHSmail and shared care records
- Meet requirements for NHS and local authority contracts
- Strengthen your protection against cyber threats

# **DSPT - WHY SHOULD YOU HAVE IT?**

The DSPT is a free, online self-assessment of health and social care providers' data security and protection policies, procedures and processes.

It is not just about technology and digital records – it is about any information that care providers hold about any person – staff, clients, funders, partners or visitors – including paper records.



By answering a series of questions, care providers can demonstrate that they are compliant with data protection legislation, the health and social care data security standards, and good practice.

The DSPT was originally developed by the NHS and updated in consultation with care providers to ensure it is social-care friendly.

Central and local government bodies, local authority and CCG commissioners, the Care Quality Commission and the National Data Guardian recognise it as the official tool to evaluate your compliance with legal requirements, Data Security Standards and good practice. From January 2025, care providers in Sussex can access face-to-face Data Security and Protection training for their staff, completely free

of charge, thanks to funding from the Digital Care Hub.

This course, developed by the Better Security, Better Care programme, supports care providers in meeting the Data Security and Protection Toolkit (DSPT) requirements.

### The DSPT specifies:

- · 95% of staff must complete annual data protection training.
- · A minimum score of 80% in an assessment is required.
- Course Overview
- · Module 1: Staff responsibilities and people's rights.
- · Module 2: Sharing, recording, and securely disposing of data.
- · Module 3: Preventing fraud, scams, and maintaining device and paper record security.
- Module 4: Managing and responding to data breaches.
- Assessment

# CYBER SECURITY - ARE YOU CONFIDENT YOUR CARE HOME CAN SURVIVE AN ATTACK?

You have most likely read articles on the most recent cyber attacks on the well known supermarket chains Marks and Spencers and Co-op and previously Harrods, leading the shops to have empty shelves after a data security breech!







# Why this matters to social care

The NCSC's warning focused on attacks that compromised third-party suppliers, affecting multiple well-known high street brands. It's a good example of how one weak link in a supply chain can have a knock-on effect for many other organisations.

Social care providers are not immune to these kinds of risks. Whether it's ordering PPE, groceries, office supplies, or uniforms, many care providers rely on online platforms to keep their services running smoothly. A cyber attack that interrupts your access to suppliers — or compromises your staff's or residents' data — could quickly lead to serious disruption.

In some cases, email addresses used to make purchases or receive receipts may be targeted in phishing attacks, reused in other scams, or leaked in a data breach. If the same passwords are used across different accounts, the risk is even higher.

## Steps you can take

There are several practical actions you can take to reduce your risk and improve your ability to respond to incidents.

- 1. Secure your email systems
- 2. Review your password reset and IT help desk processes
- 3. Check your recovery processes
- 4. Have a business continuity plan
- 5. Use free tools to improve your cyber resilience

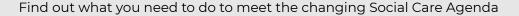
