The Exemption is included under Section 110: "Limitations on exclusive rights: Exemption of certain performances and displays and reads as follows (6) performance of a nondramatic musical work by a government body or a nonprofit agricultural or horticultural organization, in the course of an annual agricultural or horticultural fair or exhibition conducted by such body or organization; the exemption provided by this clause shall extend to any liability for copyright infringement that would otherwise be imposed on such body or organization, under doctrines of vicarious liability or related infringement, for a performance by a concessionaire, business establishment, or other person at such fair or exhibition, but shall not excuse any such person from liability for the performance."

2019 AUGLAIZE COUNTY FAIR CAMPING RULES

Any person who violates any of the following rules will forfeit all privileges and premiums and will be subject to such penalty as the Board may order.

1. **ABSOLUTELY NO ATVS, GOLF CARTS, ROLLERBLADES, SKATEBOARDS, BICYCLES, ETC. ARE ALLOWED ON GROUNDS.**
2. Trailers, campers, trucks, or other vehicles used for living purposes during the Fair must be parked in designated areas only. Owners of said vehicles must secure a camping pass from the Secretary's office prior to parking vehicle.
3. All campers must enter the grounds by the back, **EAST gate, only**. There will be no exhibitor trailer space except by the back gate.
4. Any trailer or camper occupied by a youth under the age of 18 must be registered by their parent or legal guardian, who will be responsible for their conduct at the Fair.
5. All occupants of any sleeping units must be registered with the Secretary's office. Any person found in the unit after curfew, not registered, will cause removal of the entire unit as soon as arrangements can be made.
6. **All music, noise or any other disturbances must stop at MIDNIGHT**, or violators will be subject to removal by Sheriff's deputies.
7. The Secretary shall have the right to assign all spaces. Each camper will occupy a numbered space — and must occupy the space assigned by the Secretary. The Fair board will reserve the right to take any amount of space from any area that they might need to use in order to make improvements to existing conditions. If this happens, campers will be notified 30 days in advance.
8. **CAMPER PERMIT FEES COVER THE TIME PERIOD FROM FRIDAY, JULY 27 , STARTING AT NOON; THROUGH SUNDAY, AUGUST 5, UNTIL NOON ONLY. CAMPERS USING ELECTRICITY PRIOR TO OR AFTER THIS STATED PERIOD WILL BE ASSESSED AN ADDITIONAL \$ 20.00.**
9. Electric hookups are to be with proper receptacles only, & **ONLY ONE HOOKUP PER CAMPING UNIT You must use only UL approved heavy dutyground. 3 wire cords.**
10. There will be no cooking out of the camper unit except in containers designed for such use. No ground fires in or out of fire pits allowed.
11. No alcoholic beverages will be allowed in areas outside of camping lot. In agreement with the Ohio State Law, alcoholic consumption will not be permitted under the age of 21.
12. You, as a camper, are liable for any damage to electrical or water lines at your campsite.
13. **NO PARKING PERMITTED IN THE BARN AREAS AT ANYTIME. ALL FIRE LANES ARE TO BE KEPT OPEN AT ALL TIMES!**
14. Any disturbances requiring the intervention of the Sheriffs Dept, will AFTER ONE WARNING, constitute reason for dismissal from the grounds and loss of camping privileges in the future.

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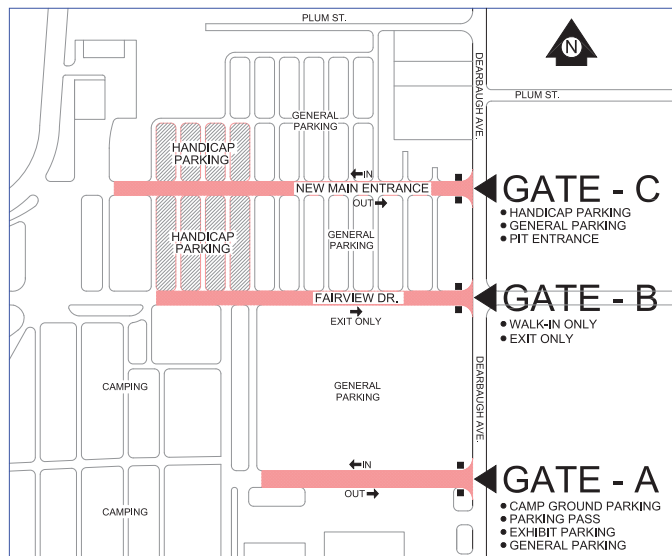

CONSTITUTION OF THE AUGLAIZE COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

ARTICLE 1 - TITLE

Section 1. This organization shall be known as the Auglaize County Agricultural Society.

ARTICLE 2 - OBJECT

Section 1. The object of the Society shall be to promote and encourage Agriculture, Horticulture, Stock Raising, Industry, Education, Science, Art and other interests of Auglaize County, which the Society deems proper and in the best interests of the Community.

ARTICLE 3 - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Any resident of Auglaize County and at least 18 years of age may become a member of Auglaize County Agricultural Society by paying the annual membership fee set annually by the Board of Directors of the Auglaize County Agricultural Society to obtain a membership certificate.

Section 2. All membership certificates shall be issued in name of an individual. No membership shall be issued in the name of a corporation, organization, partnership or firm. The person whose name appears upon the certificate shall be considered a member and have the right to hold office and vote in the annual election. Each certificate shall bear the signature and printed name of the holder.

Section 3. Each certificate shall bear the dates denoting the period of membership.

Section 4. Membership certificates will be sold at certain times of the year. The notice of membership sales will be published in a local newspaper when certificates go on sale and again seven days before the sale is terminated. Membership shall NOT be sold five (5) days before the annual fair begins and until midnight of the last day of the fair. Memberships certificates may be purchased from fair secretary of fair treasurer during office hours or at the monthly fair board meeting. Any sales at different places or times must have the approval of the Board of Directors before any sales can take place.

ARTICLE 4 - OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS

Section 1. The management of the Society shall consist of a Board of 21 Directors. One Director from each of the Fourteen Townships in said County and One from the City of St. Marys, one from the City of Wapakoneta, one from the Village of New Bremen and one from the Village of Minster and 3 members at large.

Section 2. The terms of the Directors elected shall be for Three Years, and the terms so arranged that the terms of one-third of the members of the Board expire annually.

Section 3. Any vacancy caused by death, resignation, removal from office or otherwise, may be filled by the Board until the next annual election, when a Director shall be elected for the unexpired term.

Section 4. Candidates for Director of this Society, must declare their Candidacy by petition signed by ten or more members of the Society and file same with the Secretary not later than Seven Days preceding the day of Election.

ARTICLE 5 - ELECTION

Section 1. The annual election of the Board of Directors shall be held at the Auglaize County Fairgrounds on the first Saturday of November of each year from 8:00 A.M. to 12:00 Noon.

Section 2. Said election shall be by Ballot. Ballots must be marked with a "X" opposite the name of each candidate voted for.

Section 3. Only persons holding valid membership certificates, fifteen days before the date of election are eligible to vote.

Section 4. Only regularly nominated candidates who have met the filing requirements will be eligible for election as a Director.

Section 5. The President shall appoint Three Judges and Two Clerks who are members of the Society, but not candidates for election to conduct the election of Directors. These Judges and Clerks must have in their possession the current Membership Roll and verify the voting right of all persons before receiving their ballots. The Clerks shall register the names of all voters and tally correctly the count. The person receiving the highest number of votes in each Township, City or Village, or member at large votes shall be declared the winner.

Section 6. The term of office of retiring Directors shall expire and that of the

Director elect shall begin on the first Saturday in December of each year.

ARTICLE 6 - ORGANIZATION ON THE BOARD

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall meet annually not later than the first Saturday in January of each year and elect a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer and such other Officers as it may deem proper.

Section 2. The term of office of President, Vice President and Treasurer shall be for One Year, and the Secretary not more than Three Years as the Board may determine, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Section 3. The President and Vice President shall be Directors. The Secretary and Treasurer may or may not be Directors.

Section 4. Before election of Officers the newly elected Directors shall qualify by taking the following oath before a competent Authority - "I do solemnly swear that I will support the Constitution of the United States, the Constitution of the State of Ohio, Laws of Ohio and the rules and regulations of the Department of Agriculture of Ohio pertaining to Agriculture Societies and to the best of my ability perform the duties of Director of the Auglaize County Agriculture Society, so help me God."

ARTICLE 7 - ANNUAL MEETING

Section 1. The annual meeting of the members of Society shall be held at the Fairgrounds on the first Saturday of November of each year commencing at 9:00 A.M.

Section 2. At this meeting, the Officers and Directors of the Society shall make reports to the membership of the Society concerning the past Fair and make recommendations for the betterment of future Fairs. The members shall be given opportunity to make suggestions and recommendations for the improvement of the society and its Fair, such other business may be presented as may be deemed proper by the Board of Directors. The regular meeting of the Board of Directors shall be held each month on a date decided upon by the Board. Special meetings of the Board may be held when necessary, at the call of the President, Secretary, or upon written request to the Secretary by at least 3 members of the board. Notice of any meetings of the Board must be given in writing at least 2 days before the meeting.

ARTICLE 8 - AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Constitution of By-Laws of the Society shall not be amended except by a majority vote of the membership voting at the Annual Meeting. Said Amendments may be proposed by:

A. A majority of the Board of Directors at a scheduled meeting voting in favor of placing an amendment on the Ballot or

B. Filing a petition with the Secretary of the Society at least 14 days prior to the Annual Meeting of the membership. Said petition must set forth the proposed amendment and be signed by not less than 25 members of the Society.

Section 2. When more than one amendment shall be submitted at the same time, they shall be submitted as to enable the members to vote on each amendment separately.

ARTICLE 9 - FAIR

Section 1. There shall be annual expositions held at the Fair Grounds by the Society. The Board of Directors shall fix the dates of said exposition, subject to the approval of the Ohio Directors of Agriculture.

Section 2. A premium list of all animals and articles for which premiums will be awarded by the Society shall be published as may be directed by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The Board of Directors shall engage one or more competent Judges who will judge the merits of the various classes of Animals or Articles and make the awards for same. Judges decisions to be final.

ARTICLE 10 - RULE

Section 1. The Board of Directors may enact such Rules and Regulations for conducting the affairs of the Society as they deem proper which do not conflict with the Constitution or By-Laws, Regulations of the Ohio Department of Agriculture or laws of the State of Ohio.

ARTICLE 11 - COMPENSATION

Section 1. Officers and Directors of the Society shall receive as their compensation such an amount as is determined by the Board of Directors at the annual meeting of the Board which is held in compliance with Article 6 in this Constitution. Directors shall receive compensation for monthly meetings attended, compensations for attendance, Fair Week, and allowance for meals, Fair Week.

BY-LAWS

Governing the Auglaize County Agricultural Society (Revised in 1981)

Section 1. The Auglaize County Agriculture Society at the Annual Meeting Voted by majority vote to appoint three (3) members at large to be elected the name as directors.

Section 2. A majority of the Board of Directors shall constitute a Quorum for the transaction of business. Said Board may fill any vacancy that may occur in their number by appointment. Any member of the board failing to meet with said Board for three consecutive meetings duly called; without satisfactory excuse to the Board, thereby vacates his office, which vacancy shall be filled as in other cases of vacancy. Compensation of the Directors shall be in compliance with the regulations of the Ohio Department of Agriculture.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the President of the Board to carefully keep the Bond on the Secretary and Treasurer of the Society. To preside at all meetings of the Board. To appoint an Executive Committee of three including himself as the Chairman. To appoint an Auditing, or Finance Committee, a Grounds Committee and any other Committees that might at any time become necessary. To appoint Superintendents of the various Departments. To call meetings of the Board and of the various committees when and at any time that the interest of the enterprise require same. And to perform such other duties that may develop upon him by virtue of his office.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Vice President to assist the President in the performance of his duties, and to officiate in his absence.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to direct and to assist the Secretary in the purchase of Advertising, Supplies, etc. And to make preliminary arrangements for the molding of the annual Fair; and collect all Privilege money during the fair; and turn over to the secretary all money received by them for Privileges, Rents, etc. taking his receipt for the same, and transact such business in the absence of the full Board that might be necessary and as the Board may direct.

Section 6. It shall be the Duty of the Finance Committee to confer with the Secretary and Treasurer, to determine the kind and number of all tickets to be used. Assist in the purchases of the same. Have a correct accounting of all Grandstand and other tickets delivered to the Treasurer taking his receipts for the same. To inspect all bills, and sign all vouchers before being paid by the Treasurer. To inspect and audit the books of the Secretary and Treasurer and render to the Board a true account of its findings.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse all money belonging to the Society. To supervise and sell all Membership, Admission, and all other tickets from which the Society derives a revenue. To keep a record of all receipts and disbursements. And to pay out no money except as ordered by the

Board, and accompanied by a voucher bearing the endorsement of two or more of the Finance Committee. He shall also make a report to the State Agricultural Commission. Before entering his duties as Treasurer he shall give a bond with two or more sureties, acceptable to the Board, in the Sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) payable to the Society for the faithful discharge of his duties. And to pay his successor all money in his hands as such treasurer. And shall receive for said services such compensation as the Board may approve.

Section 8. The Secretary shall give bond with two or more sureties acceptable to the Board in the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00).

Conditioned on the faithful discharge of his duties and the transfer of all money that may come into his hands belonging to the Society, to the Treasurer. He shall give due notice of the Annual Election of Directors by having the same duly and legally published. He shall also keep a correct journal of all the proceedings of the Board of Directions, also keep a description that may be in the hands of the Treasurer to be sold during the Fair of Said Society. He shall also keep an account of all Entry Fees received by him and paid to the Treasurer. And also perform all other duties required by him by law and usage.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS

The Auditing Committee would like to have the board to go along to set up some new rules and regulations concerning the Auglaize County Agricultural Society. The rules should be passed by the board and go into effect immediately.

1. That all horse stables must be numbered and marked and that the rent is collected by or paid to our secretary one month in advance. The board should give full charge to our secretary of renting the horse stables the year around except the week of the fair, and have a map of the marked stables of each barn, and the paying of removal of the horse manure, and must show a duplicate receipt to the auditing committee at the end of each month. A record book must be kept by our secretary giving the number of the stall, the name of who occupies the stall, and the money he has collected. This record book must be presented to the auditing committee for inspection at each meeting of the year.

2. The secretary shall have full charge of renting of the grounds, and of the buildings, pertaining to sales, booths, boats, cars, implements, picnics and reunions. All reunions must be paid in advance when booked and must be paid to our secretary and a duplicate receipt given by him. A separate record book must be kept by the secretary showing the date when rented, to whom rented, and for what amount. A record book of the money collected each month should be presented to the auditing committee at each meeting for inspection. The secretary must keep a separate record of all ads in our premium book, to whom the ad belongs, the amount due, and when paid.

3. The secretary must give a report to the board at this time of outstanding rent money pertaining to horse stall rent, or any other rental due to the society, who owes, the amount, what for, and for what length of time he or they owe.

4. The secretary must give a duplicate receipt to every person that pays him cash or by check.

5. A separate record book must be kept of all expenses of each month which includes salaries, labor bills, electricity, water, gas and oil. All bills must be itemized stating the date, what bought, what price and who purchased them. All labor bills must state date of each day, and number of hours and signed.

6. All long distance telephone calls made by any board members or secretary when asked by the auditing committee must have an explanation why, to whom, showing that the call was pertaining to the Auglaize County Agricultural Society.

7. The auditing committee would like to have the right to check anytime of the year any horse barn, any rental of buildings, concessions, or booths, or picnics or reunions, the money that they are paying, or to check their duplicate receipt which must be given by the secretary.

8. All money that is handled by our treasurer, secretary, board members, or any association like the Kiwanis Club, as to gates, pen rentals, entry money, comes up short must be paid by them or taken off of their wages.

9. If any board member, caretaker, secretary or treasurer when questioned before the entire board is found guilty of being dishonest, pertaining to money, time or possessions such as tools, umber, etc. that belongs to the Auglaize County Agricultural Society, shall be asked to resign. No one has anything to fear as long as he is honest and knows right from wrong.

REGULATIONS GOVERNING RESTAURANTS, LUNCH AND DRINK STANDS OPERATING AT COUNTY AND INDEPENDENT FAIRS

The following Regulations will be enforced by the Division of Foods and Dairies, Ohio Department of Agriculture:

Reg. 1. All kitchens shall be thoroughly cleaned and free from dust, dirt and contamination and debris of every kind and character. No coal or wood burning stoves will be permitted.

Reg. 2. Garbage and all waste material subject to decomposition shall be removed daily to outside and deposited in a can provided exclusively for this purpose and made of impervious material and provided with tight fitting cover. Covers shall be kept on cans at all times except when depositing or removing material. Cans shall be emptied and garbage hauled away at least once a day.

Reg. 3. Where cotton candy, snowball and other similar machines are operated in connection with food stands such machines shall be protected by being enclosed on three sides and top; where taffy, candy, caramel corn, potato chips or similar products are processed or packaged, separate enclosures properly screened shall be provided and the product shall be protected from flies, dust and other contamination at all times.

Reg. 4. Lunch stands, in which dairy products such as ice cream, milkshakes, malted milk drinks, etc. are not sold in the original package or container but are dispensed by the process of dipping, mixing or other manner and served by the glass or other container shall be completely screened with 12 mesh wire screen, or equivalent thereof.

Reg. 5. No person shall live or sleep in a restaurant or food and drink stand. Cats, dogs or other animals are prohibited.

Reg. 6. All employees shall be clean in person at all times and kitchen employees shall wear clean washable aprons and caps. The use of tobacco in restaurants and food and drink stands where food is processed or packaged is forbidden.

Reg. 7. Suitable means and appliances shall be provided for the proper cleansing and sterilizing of the dishes, pans, pails, utensils, etc. They shall be thor-

oughly cleansed and scalded in boiling water not less than thirty seconds, or submerged in water at a temperature of not less than 170 degrees F. for two minutes. The water supply for washing utensils shall be free from contamination. A plentiful supply of hot water shall be maintained. All dirty and used dishes and utensils shall be washed after each serving. Dishwater shall be changed as often as necessary. The wash and rise vats shall be of the two compartment type and supplied with hot and cold running water, or so constructed that a gasoline or kerosene stove, other heating device may be placed either in or under the vats for heating the water. Where the above provision for washing and sterilizing dishes used in serving cannot get complied with, paper service shall be provided.

Reg. 8. Carbonated and non-carbonated beverages, when not served in the original container or bottle, shall be served in sanitary paper cups.

Reg. 9. Meats, milk, butter and all similar perishable foods shall be kept in a refrigerator held at a temperature of 45 degrees, or less. Refrigerators shall be thoroughly cleansed at least once a week and more often if necessary. All shelves, racks, etc. shall be thoroughly scalded with boiling water and dried. No decomposed, decayed, fermented or rancid food materials shall be placed in or permitted to remain in a refrigerator.

Reg. 10. All bottled milk, cream, chocolate milk and any other dairy products, and all bottled drinks with paper cap closures shall not be kept in wet refrigeration, such as pop coolers, tanks, etc.

Reg. 11. Hot plates, grills, stoves, etc., used in restaurants, shall be enclosed on three sides and top and kept in a clean and sanitary manner.

Reg. 12. Foods shall be kept covered and protected from flies, dust, dirt and other sources of contamination at all times.

Reg. 13. That part of all restaurants or lunch stands where food or drinks are cooked prepared, or processed must be screened against flies, insects, etc.

Reg. 14. The proprietors or managers of all restaurants or food and drink stands shall require all employees, including himself, to submit to a physical examination at least once a year, or as often as deemed necessary.

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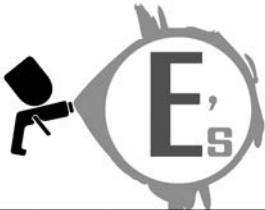
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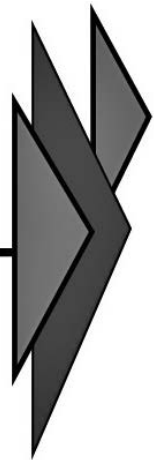

 - a. Must be boys and girls between the ages of 16-18.
 - b. All entries must be turned into the Auglaize County Fairboard Office or mailed to Auglaize County Fairgrounds, 1001 Fairview Drive, P.O. Box 431, Wapakoneta, Ohio 45895. **Limited to the first 35 participants per class**
3. Participants and calves will be placed in the arena as directed by the arena director.
4. Participants will wear football helmets. No football shoes can be worn. The committee agrees heavy boots or clodhoppers. Long pants will be required, **NO SHORTS**.
5. Participants will take into the arena a rope halter. halter cannot be used as a lariat. halter must be placed on head of animal in the usual way. Rope halter will be supplied.
6. At no time will participants be permitted to tie rope to his body or belt.
7. If a participant has hold of a calf, no other participant will be allowed to touch the calf until it breaks away.
8. If a participant catches the calf by the tail, they shall be given a reasonable amount of time (30 seconds) to work around to its head, otherwise the referee will order them to let go of the calf.
9. If two or more participants catch the same calf, the calf will be turned loose.
10. Participants will secure and properly halter a calf and lead him into the winners circle without aid. There will be a winner when so indicated by the referee.
11. Undo roughness will not be tolerated by the referee. Poor Sportsmanship automatically disqualifies any contestant.
12. Calf Scramble will be refereed by a group of not less than four referees selected by the committee in charge.
13. Participants will not be permitted to hold a calf down or lead a calf by putting fingers in nose or applying pressure as a bullring.
14. No body piercing jewelry may be worn during the scramble.
15. After all minor releases and application have been checked (applications must be properly signed by contestants and parents). The calf scramble committee will notify each participant of their acceptance and where and when to meet on the date they are to participate.
16. At anytime a calf or calved break out of arena all calves not caught must remain loose and scramble started over. Calves in possession will not be turned loose.

8. Judges decision final on time and forward progress. (Approximately 20 minutes to get into the winner's circle.)
9. Undo roughness will not be tolerated by the referee.
10. At anytime a pig or pigs breaks out of the arena, all pigs not caught must remain loose and the scramble started over. Pigs in possession will not be turned loose.

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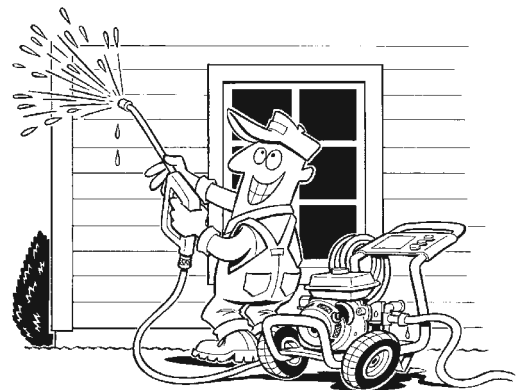

Voting will take place at a location designated by the Junior Fair Board from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on the days of 4-H Livestock Interviews/ Clothing judging, 4-H Special Interest Judging, 4-H Nutrition judging, 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon on the day of FFA Shop and Crop Judging, from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. on Sunday of fair, and 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon on Monday of the fair.

Separate numbered ballots shall be provided for each individual Junior Fair Board election. Members carrying family and consumer sciences related projects will receive only family and consumer sciences ballots. Members carrying non-livestock and agriculture related projects will receive only agriculture ballots.

Members will vote only in the appropriate election for their township of residence. If a member does not live in Auglaize County, but is a junior fair society member, he or she will receive a ballot for the township closest to his/her residence. A valid proof of participation in a Junior Fair related group must be presented upon request of election committee officials (current 4-H records will be available to the committee).

Each junior fair member is also entitled to one vote for the king and queen, respectfully. A numbered ballot will be provided for both categories. Voting hours are the same as above.

Junior fair members whose names appear on the ballot may not man the election table nor be present in the voting area unless they are casting their personal ballot. Abuse of this rule may result in the member's disqualification from the Junior Fair Board or the royal court.

JUNIOR FAIR KING AND QUEEN CORONATION

1. The Junior Fair coronation to be held on Monday, July 29, approximately 6:30 p.m. in front of the grandstand.

2. One college scholarship will be awarded to the current year's Auglaize County Junior Fair King and Queen, respectively. The scholarship money is to be used toward tuition at any accredited college, university or trade school. Recipients must show proof of enrollment to receive the scholarship money.

3. Recipients must use the money by September 1 of the third year (including year of reign) of being awarded the scholarship. (For example, the 2018 king and queen must use their scholarship by September 1, 2021). If the

money is not used within that period, the funds will return to the Junior Fair Board to award future scholarships.

4. The King and Queen will be responsible for assigning all court members to junior fair shows and events. Court members will meet immediately following the coronation to review responsibilities.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE JUNIOR FAIR

Junior Fair Membership: Any youth belonging to any of the following organizations in Auglaize County:

1. 4-H Clubs
2. FFA Chapters or Vocational Agriculture classes
3. FCCLA Chapters, Vocational Family and Consumer Sciences, Family and Consumer Sciences classes
4. Juvenile Granges
5. Farm Bureau Youth
6. Boy and Girl Scout Troops

Junior Fair Eligibility: Youth who comply with the rules of the Junior Fair as given in this book and are regularly enrolled in any of the above named organizations are eligible to show with the exception that FFA members living in Auglaize County but enrolled in an out of county school may show when the chapter provides one adult advisor and one superintendent to the fair.

Age Limitations for Junior Fair Exhibitors: To participate in any Auglaize County Junior Fair activities, a person must comply with the following maximum age requirement which states that any youth must not have passed his or her 19th birthday as of January 1 of the current year. Members turning 19 on January 1 of the current year will be eligible for that year's fair.

Parking Regulations: A vehicle pass is necessary to enter the fairgrounds. There is no parking around the barns.

Fire Lane: All buildings housing livestock will have lanes 30' wide at all exits with no parking in this area. These lanes may be used for delivery and pick up but no parking. Fire lanes will be marked and vehicles parking in this area will be towed away.

Premium Payment: All Junior Fair premiums will be paid at pre-fair judging or during fair week. Members not receiving their premium at the designated time must request the premium payment by completing a form. The form is submitted to the Junior Fair office by noon Thursday of the fair. Requested premiums not picked up during the fair will be put in the club packets the last day of fair. **Members not picking up premiums at the designated time or requesting them during the fair will not receive premium money.**

Fair Passes: Junior Fair passes will be issued to all members through the advisors. All advisors will receive the passes prior to the fair and will distribute the passes to the members prior to the first day of the fair. Only members exhibiting in the fair should receive a fair pass.

RULES ON ENTRIES AND EXHIBITS

GENERAL RULES:

1. All entries are to be made on official entry blanks, filled out by the exhibitor and submitted online by July 1. No one can exhibit in any livestock, dog or FFA class without entry. There are no entries required in the 4-H Special Interest, Clothing, Foods and Nutrition and Small Animal Departments.

ALL ENTRIES ARE TO BE SUBMITTED BY JULY 1. If entries are late, there will be a \$25.00 cash late fee, regardless of reason or lateness. The entry will not be official until the fine is paid in full in cash.

2. Exhibits must be on the grounds by the following times to receive premiums unless granted permission for late arrival:

- a. FFA Shop & Crop - Friday, July 26, 11:00 a.m.
- b. 4-H Booths - Monday, July 29, 2:00 p.m.
- c. School Booths - Monday July 29, 8:00 a.m.
- d. Livestock - Saturday, July 27, 8:00 a.m.

3. All projects exhibited must have been actually owned and cared for by the individual exhibitor on and after May 1 of the current year. Exceptions - steers - effective date of ownership is the original scheduled date of the winter weigh-in and yearling horses - effective date of ownership is January 1 of current year, market rabbits - effective date of ownership is June 20 of current year and broilers - effective date of ownership is June 30.

Ownership of any animal will be considered lost if, after May 1 of the current year, the animal has been consigned or through any auction or any other type of transaction. If questions regarding ownership arise the exhibitor will be asked to produce any of the following: registration papers, bill of sale, or valid receipt. Leasing is acceptable in the dairy and horse departments only.

Tampering or misrepresentation as to the breeding, age, ownership, and other irregularity in showing will be exposed and any premiums, trophies, awards, or sale money won by such exhibitor may be withheld.

FFA members may show in only one Junior Fair as an FFA member regardless of location of member or Chapter. FFA recommends that a member exhibit in the county the Chapter is located rather than residence of the individual. 4-H members may show in only one Junior Fair as a 4-H member. 4-H recommends exhibiting in the county where the 4-H club is located. A member could show as a 4-H member in one county, as a FFA member in another county depending on the location of the club or Chapter, but the member must carry separate animals and projects. The following are recognized by the Junior Fair as separate projects: Dairy Herd Management (cows in production) and Dairy Heifer not fresh; Sheep Breeding and Market Lamb; Beef Breeding and Steer; Swine Breeding and Market Hog (not a part of a breeding litter).

To be eligible for Junior Fair premiums and awards each exhibitor must have in his/her possession that official project that he/she is taking, and the exhibitor must feed, train, groom this same animal (or animals) from the time the project starts until it is completed.

4. Since fair participation is optional, the Junior Fair Board is not responsible for the lost, stolen or damaged items.

5. All exhibits must be the same the member carried as projects. A member may not enter in a department in which they do not have an official project. If unauthorized substitution is attempted all premiums and other privileges of the exhibitor will be forfeited.

6. Entries in each class are limited to two per individual except where stated in class rules.

7. Entries are free if confined to junior classes.

8. Exhibitors must show their own project. The exceptions are: a family emergency, one member with two animals in the same class, a member is showing in two departments and the classes are running simultaneously, a member is physically incapacitated and unable to show. In a case of emergency during the judging, the board can approve an alternate showman immediately. In all situations, the second showman must be an Auglaize County Junior Fair member. All exceptions must be approved by the Junior Fair Board prior to show or judging.

9. The privilege is reserved to combine classes in case of lack of entries.

10. Any exhibitor showing misconduct or poor showmanship in the show ring, show area, or animal barns will have full forfeiture of premium to that division by decision of the Junior Fair Board.

11. The Junior Fair Board requests that all junior fair exhibitors observe the designated arrival and dismissal times. Animals coming from another fair must obtain permission from department superintendents for earlier arrival. Junior Fair Board holds the right to remove any exhibitor who violates the arrival time. Anyone failing to comply with the arrival or dismissal times without acceptable reason or prior approval will be fined \$50.00, payable in cash by December 1 of the current year. If an exhibitor fails to pay their fine, they will be ineligible for placings the following year. The Junior Fair Board reserves the right to contact show officials to confirm entry, arrival and dismissal times.

In cases of sickness or other emergency situations, written notice must be given to Junior Fair Board before any animal can leave the grounds.

12. Due to conflicting dates with the Ohio State Fair, every effort will be made to allow early release so youth may show at both fairs. Exhibitors planning to show at both fairs should notify the Junior Fair Board to avoid penalty.

In the case of state fair livestock entries, projects of the exhibitor(s) and immediate family members may be released early if prior approval is granted by the Junior Fair Board. Proof of state fair entry must accompany the request. The Junior Fair Board reserves the right to contact show officials to confirm entry, arrival and dismissal times. For all other departments, members participating in state fair will be granted an early release for their project only.

Still projects exhibited in the Exhibit and FFA Buildings must be signed out in the Junior Fair Board office when leaving for the Ohio State Fair. Projects may be signed out no more than 24 hours prior to the state fair judging date.

13. All exhibits and stall assignments will be determined by the department superintendents and assigned prior to the fair. All exhibitors shall abide by these assignments. Exhibitors needing special stall or pen arrangements must submit these requests with their fair entries by July 1. Requests after July 1 may be considered but not accommodated. Exhibitors moving assignments without prior approval, will be required to move back to their original assigned area. Exhibitors refusing to abide by the Junior Fair Board's assignment will be asked to remove their projects from the fairgrounds.

14. All junior fair livestock must be housed in their assigned pens, including overnight. Beef animals may be housed overnight in the designated tie out area. Market animals must be in their correct pens during tagging and loadout. Violations will result in a \$25.00 fine being deducted from the exhibitor's sale check.

15. **PROTEST POLICY:** Protests must be made in writing, signed and sworn by party making protest and filed with the Executive Committee of the Junior Fair board by noon of the day following the award. This written protest must be accompanied by a protest fee of \$100.00 in cash which will be retained by the Junior Fair board if protest is not sustained. The Executive Committee shall hear protests with the superintendent of the department involved.

AGRICULTURE RULES:

1. Livestock health requirements for the Junior Fair are the same as for open class exhibitors (see rules and regulations for the open class). Health certificates are to be presented to the veterinarian in charge.

2. To be eligible for Junior Fair Livestock Sale, a market animal must have been shown in the appropriate market class in the Junior Fair.

Livestock substitution policy: If a project animal dies or is physically impaired and cannot be shown safely, another animal may be substituted. The Junior Fair Board must be notified of and approve of all substitutions. Failure to do so will result in the forfeiture of premiums. The substituted animal may be shown only for a project grade, no placings or awards. Substituted animals may place in showmanship classes. Market animals will be registered in an individual child's name and may not be transferred to a sibling after that time. Transfer to a sibling would be considered a substitution and above rule would apply.

4. Exhibits must be kept clean. Periodic checks will be made by superintendent in charge. All feeding and cleaning is to be done by 10:00 a.m. daily. Dirty pens will be tagged and conditions corrected. Cleaning cannot be done during shows and sales. Exhibitors not cleaning their pens during or after the fair will be fined \$50.00, payable in cash by December 1 of the current year. If an exhibitor fails to pay their fine, they will be ineligible for placings the following year.

5. Exhibitors must care for their animals until the animals are loaded off the fairgrounds.

For market animals, if it is determined at load out that the animal has lacked food and/or water, a penalty will be deducted from the value of the animal: \$25.00 for steers, lambs, goats and hogs, \$10.00 for rabbits and poultry. This decision will be made by the packer and representatives from the Sale Committee. For breeding animals, if it is determined that the animal has lacked food and/or water, the exhibitor will not receive a fair pass the following year. This will be the decision of the Junior and Senior Fair Board superintendents of the department.

6. Pens may not be cleaned while the sale animals are being loaded out to the packers. Violators will be fined \$30.00.

7. Grade livestock will show with the breed they must closely resemble unless otherwise noted.

8. For further information governing Junior Fair, see rules under the separate Junior Fair division.

9. During junior shows and sales, exhibitors must wear long pants or skirts (no shorts). Tops should cover the shoulder area, no tops with straps are permitted. Junior exhibitors shall not wear farm shirts or shirts with any advertising while showing in the junior shows or sales, 4-H club and FFA chapter shirts are permitted. No hats are permitted, except for those designated by individual departments. The Junior Fair reserves the right to ask exhibitors to change clothing which they feel is offensive or inappropriate.

10. There are no weight limits imposed for sale purposes. There will be weight limits for the following market animals for show purposes only:

- Steers - 900 pounds and over
- Hogs - 220 pounds and over
- Lambs - 90 pounds and over
- Broilers - 4 pounds and over per bird
- Rabbits - 4 pounds and over per rabbit
- Goats, dairy and boer – 40 pounds and over
- Turkeys – 20 pounds and over

Under weight classes will be placed 1 through 5 BUT will not be eligible to compete for champion. Only animals meeting the above weight requirements will be eligible for champion.

11. No junior fair livestock are permitted in the midway area or in the campgrounds. Animals should be walked back in the livestock barn area only.

12. Tampering and/or misrepresentation as to breeding, age, ownership and any other irregularity in showing will be considered fraud and deception. Any premiums, trophies, awards or sale money won by such exhibitor will be withheld.

To maintain a high degree of confidence in the livestock shows, the Auglaize County Junior Fair board, reserves the right to disqualify any animal that has been fitted in an unethical manner. Unethical fitting means to alter or change the natural appearance, weight, musculature or conformation of an animal in an unnatural or artificial manner, including but not limited to, the removal of animal tissue or body part, to cut or tear the hide, to cover, dye or color the hair or hide (neutral coloring only may be used), to add artificial tail heads, switches, polls, hair, or heels, or to administer, feed, give or inject any substance or drug to an animal exhibited, except when medically necessary or when drug used has been approved for such use by the Food and Drug Administration or United States Department of Agriculture. First time offense, violators will receive a letter of warning from the Ag Society. For subsequent offenses by the same violators, all animals, and the exhibitors involved, giving evidence of such treatment will be barred from competition at the Auglaize County Junior Fair.

Should fraud or deception, and deception, and proof, as determined by the Auglaize County Junior Fair Board, be discovered after the animal or animals have been shown and prior to the sale, such animal(s) shall not be permitted to sell. The animals placed next in line shall move up.

Should violation be discovered after the sale, all sale money shall be returned to the buyer and the animal or carcass returned to the exhibitor. All placings in show will stand. No animals will move up.

13. If any Junior Fair project animal is suspected of being abused, malnourished or mistreated; the Junior Fair Board reserves the right to have the animal inspected by the fair veterinarian. If the veterinarian determines that the animal has been mistreated, the animal will be disqualified from competition.

14. Any exhibitor pulling their animal from competition once they have entered the show area or any exhibitor who stood first or second in their class does not return for the championship class, the exhibitor will be disqualified from the show and will forfeit all premiums and awards won at the current year's fair.

15. The drenching of any livestock at the Auglaize Co. Fair is prohibited. Should a violation be discovered, the violator will be punished under rule 12 (above) of the General Agriculture Rules.

16. Members exhibiting market steers, hogs, lambs, goats, rabbits, turkeys, broilers and lactating goats and dairy cattle must participate in a Quality Assurance program or test out of the program prior to June 10. Members, ages 8 to 11 (as of January 1 of the current year), must attend a quality assurance program. Members, ages 8 to 11 (as of January 1 of the current year), enrolled for the first time in a QA required project, must have a parent attend a quality assurance program with them. Members may attend a production animal quality assurance program, which is species sponsored - a certificate must be issued in the junior fair member's name. A copy of this certificate must be filed by June 10. If a parent is required to attend they must submit proof of attendance as well. Members, 12 years and older (as of January 1 of the current year), including those enrolled for the first time in a QA required project, may choose to attend a program or use the test out option. Members not completing this requirement will not be allowed to enter into the Junior Fair.

17. Exhibitors will follow these rules for bedding:

Beef and Dairy - wood products will be furnished for \$10 per animal. No dyed products may be used.

All other species – wood shavings. No dyed products or mulch may be used. Goat and sheep exhibitors may request permission from the department chair to use straw.

If unacceptable products are used, the exhibitor will be given one notification by the Junior Fair Board to replace the bedding with acceptable materials. If the problem is not corrected after 24 hours, the exhibitor will be fined \$25 per day per pen.

The Ag Society asks that exhibitors please dispose of all bedding in locations provided.

18. All grand and reserve champions will be tested according to Ohio law. All grand and reserve champion samples will be collected in an area designated by the Ag Society. Collection will be done under the supervision of a veterinarian appointed by the Ag Society.

19. **Liability for livestock** – In consideration for exhibiting livestock at the Auglaize County Fair, on the grounds at 1001 Fairview Drive, Wapakoneta, Ohio 45895, I understand that for myself and those under my leadership we hereby will covenant and agree to save said Society harmless from any and all claims of every type, character and description pertaining to or growing out of the usage of said premises, and furthermore, covenant and agree that every effort will be made to conduct exhibiting of animals in a lawful and business manner and any activity pertaining to livestock upon said premises will be handled in such a manner as to avoid injury or damage to the public or the property of said Society.

20. The Junior Fair Board reserves the right to dismiss an animal from the show area if that animal becomes uncontrollable and becomes dangerous to the public, other exhibitors or animals in the show.

21. All animals shown as market livestock must go to harvest. In the case of illness or injury, the fair veterinarian will determine how the animal will be handled. If the animal is treated and has a withholding time, it will be quarantined until the withholding time has elapsed and then sent to harvest.

22. If a market animal is removed from the fairgrounds without authorization, the following penalties will apply: the exhibitor will be banned from further competition for the next 2 years of their junior fair eligibility. If removed after the sale, in addition to the above penalty, the exhibitor will forfeit all premium monies. The premium monies will be returned to the sale buyer with a letter of explanation.

23. The duties of the Fair Veterinarian are as follows:

- a. Examine animals upon arrival/check-in.
- b. Retrieve required samples from the grand and reserve champions.
- c. Examine any animal that has died before it is removed from the grounds.
- d. Determine if an animal is to be released from the fairgrounds due to illness or injury.
- e. If an animal becomes ill or injured at the fair, the individual owner/exhibitor must

contact the fair veterinarian through the Jr. Fair Office; the vet will charge a fee to the owner/exhibitor for services rendered. Any medication or treatment of livestock, whether by a licensed veterinarian or under a veterinary/client relationship, must be documented by a Drug Use Notification Form and reported.

JUNIOR FAIR SALE RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. The 2019 Junior Fair Livestock Sales will be:

Friday, August 2, 9:00 a.m., Piehl Arena – Steers, Rabbits, Goats
Saturday, August 3, 9:00 a.m., Piehl Arena – Poultry, Hogs, Sheep, Dairy Milk

2. Junior exhibitors are limited to one entry in the sale including steers, lambs, goats, hogs, rabbits, broilers, turkeys and milk; except by exhibitors having more than one champion or reserve champion meat animal.

3. All champion and reserve champion meat animals must sell as listed in rule # 2. All champion and reserve champion steers, lambs and hogs will be harvested by Kah Meats and be viewed as part of the carcass review. Grand and reserve champion market goats, pens of rabbits and poultry will be harvested but not used as part of the carcass review.

4. Market animals requiring identification must be tattooed on the designated date, hours and location. If an animal is ill at the time of tattooing, the exhibitor must contact the Junior Fair Board immediately. The exhibitor will be required to present a veterinarian's certification of illness before arrangements will be made to tattoo the animal.

5. All market animals will be weighed during the designated times.

6. Order of sale will be determined randomly by computer for all market species. Eartags are for identification only.

7. A sale list will be prepared from those animals that are shown as steer, market hogs, market lambs, market goats, rabbit pens and poultry pens. Junior fair exhibitors must notify Sale Committee at time of weighing which animal will be sold.

8. Members showing steers must provide a good rope halter for after the sale. Please don't expect buyers of steers to lead them with makeshift halters of baling twine. If the buyers give members the halters after the steers are on the truck, this is their favor to the exhibitors.

9. Members will receive payment for the animals when sufficient sale monies have been received. A commission and check-off money where appropriate will be taken out of all checks. The commission for selling junior fair livestock as determined by the Sale Committee will be up to 4 percent of the premium bid for all species, including dairy milk. This is for sale expenses, promotion and gratitude ads in local newspapers.

10. Exhibitor will stand the loss of any condemned carcass. Exhibitor will stand the cost

of any extra processing fees passed on by the packer.

11. All members will be responsible for feeding, watering and general care of their animals until loaded by the packer or Sale Committee. For market animals, if it is determined at load out that the animal has lacked food and/or water, a penalty will be deducted from the value of the animal: \$25.00 for steers, lambs, goats and hogs, \$10.00 for rabbits and poultry. This decision will be made by the packer and representatives from the Sale Committee.

12. Animals will only cross the scale one time at the weigh-in.

13. Animals must be able to walk across the scale on their own to be weighed, shown and sold. Incapacitated animals will not be weighed.

14. A gallon of milk will be auctioned and the proceeds divided among the junior fair dairy cattle exhibitors.

15. Buyers must make arrangements for hauling or picking up animals at the time of the sale with the Livestock Sale Committee. All accounts must be settled immediately following the sales.

16. Members must be present to sell their own animal unless prior permission has been given by junior fair superintendent in charge of that department. If permission is granted, another Auglaize Co. junior fair member may walk the animal through the sale ring. If permission is granted for a specie not selling live animals, exhibitor is expected to provide a picture of their project animal for the other junior fair exhibitor to hold in the sale ring. Dairy members must be present at the gallon of milk sale to share in the proceeds unless prior permission is granted as stated above.

17. If a member is not present to sell their animal and no permission has been granted for another exhibitor to sell that animal, then the animal will not be sold through the sale ring. The exhibitor will receive the packer bid only, no premium bids.

18. All animals sold in the sale ring must go to harvest. The animal may be sent to the packer or for custom processing by the sale buyer. There is no custom harvesting for hogs available. Animals sold through the sale ring may not be taken home by the buyer or returned to the junior fair exhibitor.

19. All market animals must be sent to harvest. Market animals not sold through the sale may be sent to the packer or used for custom processing. Exhibitors must notify the Sale Committee at weigh-in about this animal's destination. All animals will be handled by the Sale Committee, not the exhibitor.

20. All animals shown as market livestock must go to harvest. In the case of illness or injury, the fair veterinarian will determine how the animal will be handled. If the animal is treated and has a withholding time, it will be quarantined until the withholding time has elapsed and then sent to harvest.

21. If a market animal is removed from the fairgrounds without proper authorization, the following penalties will apply: the exhibitor will be banned from further competition for the next 2 years of their junior fair eligibility. If removed after the sale, in addition to the above penalty, the exhibitor will forfeit all premium monies. The premium monies will be returned to the sale buyer with a letter of explanation.

22. If a market animal is sent home from the fair for any reason, the exhibitor will not receive any payment for the value of the market animal. If sent home after the sale, the exhibitor will receive the premium amount from the sale only.

23. The Senior Fair, Junior Fair, and Sale Committee will take every precaution for the safe keeping of livestock on exhibition after their arrival on the grounds but will not be responsible for any animal loss that may occur. Exhibitors are requested to give every attention to their animals. Animals are the property of the exhibitor until the animals are loaded to the packer or custom processor.

24. In the event that a market animal dies before the sale, and the exhibitor does not have another market animal that has been shown in junior fair, the exhibitor will not participate in the livestock sale. If the exhibitor has an animal that is part of a market pen die before the sale, the exhibitor may sell the remaining animals in the pen through the livestock sale.

25. In the event that a market animal dies after the sale, the exhibitor will receive the premium bid minus commission, but not the market value of the animal.

26. The locations for the custom processing of large animals (beef, sheep and goats) will be limited to the following: Kah Meats, Keystone Meats, Curley's Meats and Winner's Meats. Exhibitors must notify the Sale Committee at weigh-in about the animal's destination. Custom harvest for small animals (rabbits, broilers and turkeys) will be done at a processor approved by the Sale Committee. All animals will be handled by the Sale Committee, not the exhibitor. There is no custom harvesting of hogs available.

27. Market goats without ears are required to have their eartag secured around the goat's neck for fair weigh-in and for load out. This can be done by any means that is safe to the goat.

28. Market animals must be in their assigned pens during tagging and load out, a \$25.00 fine will be deducted from the exhibitor's sale check.

29. Exhibitors whose premium payments are over \$599, will need to have a W-9 Form completed. These forms are required by the State of Ohio in order to process payment.

30. All exhibitor checks are stamped VOID AFTER 90 DAYS. If the sale committee treasurer has to reprint a livestock check there will be a \$35.00 reissue fee or if exhibitor lost a check, the exhibitor will be charged \$45.00 for stop payment. All checks not cashed after 90 days will become a donation to the Auglaize Co. Junior Fair.

JUNIOR MEMBERS EXHIBITING IN OPEN CLASS

Junior fair members may compete in open class with their project animals provided they pay \$3.00 per head for dairy, beef and swine; \$.50 per head for sheep. The animals are housed in space provided for the junior division. No membership tickets are required. These entries must be on the official open class entry form and submitted directly to the superintendent of the open class show involved.

Junior fair members may instead of following the procedure suggested above pay the full open class charges, purchase a membership ticket and house their animals in space provided for the senior division. If this plan is followed, open class entries and fees must be submitted to the superintendent of the department in which they enter. The junior entries must be submitted to the Extension office with a statement that no housing will be required in the junior division.

SHOWMANSHIP RULES

1. There shall be contests for beef, sheep, swine, dairy, rabbits, goats, horses, dogs and poultry.

2. Each contestant must show his or her own junior fair project animal in showmanship classes. Animals shown in showmanship classes must be entered and shown in the regular junior fair show.

3. The following classes* will be provided for all species except where noted in the department (see department rules):

Class I - Members age 16-18

Class II - Members age 13-15

Class III - Members age 11-12

Class IV - Members age 8-10

Class V - Showman of Showmen

* - All ages are as of January 1 of the current year

4. The order of the showmanship contests will be as listed above, unless noted in a specific department.

5. Horse and dog showmanship entry is required to be completed online by July 1.

6. For beef, sheep, swine, dairy, rabbits, goats and poultry departments: Pre-registration is required for all showmanship classes. Members need to pre-register during designated times and location for each department. Sign up sheets will be taken down at 3:00 p.m. the day prior to the department's showmanship classes. Any exhibitor requesting to sign up after 3:00 p.m. will be pay a \$25.00 late fee for entry. Late entries will be accepted until the Junior Fair Board office closes the day prior to the show. NO sign up will be allowed on the day of the show in any department. Members failing to pre-register will not be eligible for showmanship classes at the current year's fair.

7. Showman of showmen is open to all exhibitors who are eligible based on their winning past showmanship classes. An individual may elect to exhibit in the Showman of Showmen Class as many years as he/she elects to or is eligible to exhibit.

8. Placing ribbons 1-5 will be given in each class.

9. You may exhibit in only one showmanship class per department per year unless required by the specific department or as noted in rule 9 below.

10. All showmanship winners in Classes I (ages 16-18)/Senior Showmanship may choose to participate in Class V (Showman of Showmen) the same year they win Class I. The winner of Class I/Senior Showmanship must move into the Class V Showman of Showman the next year.

11. Winners of Class IV (ages 8-10) will move into Class III (ages 11-12) the next year. Winners of Class III (ages 11-12) will move into Class II (ages 13-15) the next year. Winners of Class II (ages 13-15) will move into Class I (ages 16-18) the next year.

12. If there is no Class V - Showman of Showmen division winner, then the winner of Class I, ages 16 to 18, or the winner of the Senior Division will be that department's representative to the Showmanship Sweepstakes.

13. In any class with less than five (5) participants, the Junior Fair Board has the right to combine classes or subdivide classes having large numbers of participants.

14. Previous winners of the Showmanship Sweepstakes are ineligible to show in any future showmanship class regardless of department.

1. All current Showman of Showmen Contest winners in beef, dairy, sheep, swine, goats, horses, poultry and rabbits are eligible to compete. If the winner of a department is not available, the opportunity to participate will be offered to the second place exhibitor. If the second place exhibitor is unavailable or chooses not to participate, the opportunity to participate will be offered to the third place exhibitor and so forth through fifth place. If none of the top five exhibitors are available, there will be no representative from that department in the contest.

2. If an exhibitor wins in more than one department, he/she must select which department to represent. See rule #1 for determination as to how the other department will be represented.

3. The winner in each department will not show that specie. The department winner will

automatically receive the first place points and the remaining contestants be placed by the judge. Participants must sit in a designated chair when their specie is being shown.

4. Contestants will show each species for a period of three minutes each. Contestants may not show their own animal. Contestants can select the animal of their choice from those animals provided by the Sweepstakes Committee.

5. Eight judges will be present - one representing each department. The judges will rank each contestant.

Department Representative - 14 points

2nd place - 12 points 6th - 4 points

3rd - 10 points 7th - 2 points

4th - 8 points 8th - 0 points

5th - 6 points

6. If the case of a tie, the tied contestants will each draw a question at random. These questions will be written by each specie judge prior to the competition. The judge will determine if the contestant's response is correct. The tie will be broken when a contestant answers a question incorrectly, the other contestant will then be named the winner.

7. If there is no Class V - Showman of Showmen division winner, then the winner of Class I, ages 16 to 18, or the winner of the Senior Division will be that department's representative to the Showmanship Sweepstakes.

8. Previous first place winners of Showmanship Sweepstakes cannot reenter this contest.

9. All contestants will receive a plaque, the overall winner will receive a trophy and have their name placed on the Gibson Memorial plaque located in the Junior Fair Building.

10. If no live animals are available for a specie, contestants will be asked showmanship knowledge questions. Diagrams, props or models may be used.

Show and Sale Order: Steer show classes will be determined and divided by fair weights for A,B,C grades and 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th places in class. Show orders will be posted.

First place animals in each class are eligible to compete for Grand Champion. Reserve champion will be chosen from remaining 1st place animals and the 2nd place from Grand Champion's class.

Grand Champion and Reserve Champions Market, Dairy, and Carcass Steers will be sold at the beginning of the steer sale.

GENERAL RULES:

1. Steers must have been identified at the Winter Steer Weigh-in to compete in the junior fair steer show. If a steer is ill and cannot be tattooed at the designated date, hours and location, the exhibitor must contact the Junior Fair Board immediately. The exhibitor will be required to present a veterinarian's certification of the illness before arrangements will be made to tattoo the steer. If there is a family emergency on the day of the weigh-in and the animals cannot be identified, the family must present their situation to the Junior Fair Board. The board will determine if the animals will be identified and if penalties will be imposed.

2. Steers must be hornless and castrated at the time of the winter weigh-in. A veterinarian's certificate must accompany any steers which may be considered "questionable". Steers must be halter broken for winter weigh-in. The Junior Fair Board and Sale Committee reserves the right to refuse to register, identify and weigh any steer considered to be unruly or uncontrollable. Steers that are refused at the winter weigh-in will be ineligible for the fair.

3. NO horns will be permitted on any beef animals entered in the junior fair. Steers will be checked at the winter and fair weigh-ins. Any animals with horns will be sent home immediately.

4. All animals must be tied with a neck strap or chain and halter when tied in their stalls. Each exhibitor not complying will receive one warning from the Junior Fair Beef Chairman, then premiums will be forfeited.

5. Steers must be shown in the ring to be sold in sale.

6. Health rules same as open class.

7. Limit of two entries in each class (see carcass rules regarding steer entries).

8. Any animal which is registered should be registered in the exhibitor's name or as a partnership.

9. If a steer is to be entered in the dairy steer show as a Milking Shorthorn, the exhibitor must present registration papers as proof of breed. All other shorthorn steers will be shown in the beef steer class.

10. To be shown as a dairy feeder and steer, the animal must be of dairy breeding. A cross between a beef and dairy breed will show in the beef feeder or steer class.

11. Beef exhibitors must designate, at the time of fair weigh-in, which animal will sell in the livestock sale if more than one steer is entered.

12. All grand and reserve champion steers will be harvested and viewed as part of the carcass review on the Wednesday after the fair. All steers shown in the junior fair are required to be sent to harvest.

13. It is suggested that feeder calves be fenced in to separate them from the steers. Exhibitors must provide their own gates for this purpose.

14. Feeder calves, beef and dairy, must be castrated at least one month before the first day of the fair.

15. Heifers shown as a feeder calf may not be shown as a breeding project animal. If a heifer is weighed as a feeder calf, it must be shown as a feeder. Heifers not being weighed will be shown in breeding class. Classification cannot be changed after the weigh-in.

16. Feeder calves will be identified at fair weigh-in.

17. Beef exhibits will be bedded with mulch that is provided. No dyed wood products may be used. If unacceptable products are used, the exhibitor will be given one notification by the Junior Fair Board to replace the bedding with acceptable materials. If the problem is not corrected after 24 hours, the exhibitor will be fined \$25 per day per animal.

18. Generators used for grooming purposes may not be located outside of the Show Barn.

19. Butt fans may not be used, cage fans may be used.

20. Steer possession date will be the original scheduled date of the winter weigh-in.

21. Exhibitors must care for their animals until the animals are loaded off the fairgrounds.

For market animals, if it is determined at load out that the animal has lacked food and/or water, \$25.00 will be deducted from the value of the animal. This decision will be made by the packer and representatives from the Sale Committee. For breeding animals, if it is determined that the animal has lacked food and/or water, the exhibitor will not receive a fair pass the following year. This determination will be the decision of the Junior and Senior Fair Board superintendents of the department.

22. Unruly animals will be dismissed from the class at the discretion of the Junior and Senior Fair Board department superintendents.

CARCASS CONTEST INFORMATION:

1. Exhibitors are limited to three entries and steers must be counted in the three steers allowed to be weighed in at the Winter Steer Weigh-in. Exhibitors may show three steers in the carcass or live classes in the combinations outlined below. No more than two steers may be shown in one category. Limitation of one time through the sale ring still holds and champion and reserve carcass must sell.

Exhibitors may exhibit:

2 beef steers and 1 dairy steer in live show

2 dairy steers and 1 beef steer in live show

1 steer in live show (beef or dairy) and 2 steers in carcass

2 steers in live show (beef or dairy) and 1 steer in carcass

0 steer in live show and 2 steers in carcass class

2. Entries for the fair contest carcass class must be made on regular entry cards, by July 1st in the Extension Office and will be limited to the first twenty-five (25) head entered. An entry fee of \$60.00, payable on or before the July 1st fair entry date will be used to pay for hauling, slaughter and pictures. After July 1, the entry fee will increase to \$85.00. Entry fees are non-refundable and non-transferable. Make checks payable to the Auglaize County Junior Fair Board.

3. Steers will be evaluated and carcasses placed on a point system with points given on live steer evaluation (but not used in final rating only to break a tie), rate of gain, carcass quality grade and cutability along with a judge's overall excellence award. A copy of the scoring chart is available from Extension office.

4. All steers in the carcass class making weight will be harvested. Exhibitors will be responsible for disposing of carcasses not sold through the sale. For carcass steers sold through the Junior Fair Livestock Sale, the sale buyer will have the first option to buy the meat. If the sale buyer does not want the meat, the exhibitor is responsible for the disposal of the meat and the cost of processing. Arrangements for the sale of the meat must be finalized before the exhibitor will receive their check from the Junior Fair Livestock Sale Committee. Kah Meats will be responsible ONLY for the disposal of the meat of the Grand & Reserve Champion Carcass Steers.

5. To be eligible for the championship, a carcass must grade choice minus or better and have a full yield grade of 3.9 or lower (better).

6. Processing, cutting, wrapping and freezing of the carcass meat will be available from the processor and will be at the buyer's or exhibitor's expense.

7. Exhibitor will stand the loss for any condemned carcass.

8. Exhibitors, family members and others are encouraged to be present at Kah Meats during the carcass evaluation session on Wednesday after the fair at 7:00 p.m.

9. Final results will be announced and awards presented during the steer show on Wednesday of the fair.

10. Cash awards of \$50.00 to the champion carcass animal and \$35.00 to the reserve champion carcass animal will be presented by Sunrise Cooperative. Trophies will also be presented to the top two places by Sunrise Cooperative. All other carcasses will receive a \$5.00 premium award.

11. Pictures of the carcass will be taken. Posters with pictures and information will be made and used for educational purposes, award presentations and for the selling of the carcasses in the sale.

12. Carcass program facilities are provided by Kah Meats, Wapakoneta.

13. Carcass contest sponsored by Sunrise Cooperative in cooperation with the Junior Fair Board.

STEER RATE OF GAIN CONTEST:

1. Open to all 4-H and FFA steer exhibitors.
2. Steers must have been weighed at the Winter Weigh-in to be eligible for this contest.
3. The top two steers with the fastest rate of gain per day will be awarded trophies. All ties will be broken by giving the animals with the heaviest starting weight the advantage.
4. The top two rate of gain steers will be named first and second place class winners (not grand and reserve champions). These steers will sell according to draw number.

1. Senior yearlings in production must be shown as a two year old.
2. Health rules same as open class.
3. Limit of two entries in each class per exhibitor. Any leadsman, besides the exhibitor, must be an Auglaize County junior fair exhibitor.
4. Cattle will be placed on type and graded on the combination of fitting, showing and type.
5. Signs and decorations need to be limited so as not to obstruct ventilation. Dairy department officials may ask to have problem signs and decorations removed.
6. The Grand Champions from each breed will compete for the Supreme and Reserve Champion. This animal will represent the dairy department at the Gallon of Milk Sale. The only exception will be if the Supreme Champion is at the state fair, then the Reserve Supreme Champion will represent the department.
7. Stall assignments may be changed within a club's designated area at the advisor's discretion. Assignments may not be changed beyond the designated area without the prior approval of both the Junior and Senior Fair Dairy Superintendents.
8. Dairy animals may be leased. Lease papers and pictures must be on file by May 1.
9. Cattle, removed from the fairgrounds, due to entry at the Ohio State Fair will be checked for participation at the state fair. If the animals are removed from the grounds and not shown at the Ohio State Fair, exhibitor will forfeit their portion of the gallon of milk sale.
10. If it is determined that the animal has lacked food and/or water, the exhibitor will not receive a fair pass the following year. This determination will be the decision of the Junior and Senior Fair Board superintendents of the department.
11. Dairy exhibits will be bedded with mulch that is provided. No dyed wood products may be used. If unacceptable products are used, the exhibitor will be given one notification by the Junior Fair Board to replace the bedding with acceptable materials. If the problem is not corrected after 24 hours, the exhibitor will be fined \$25 per day per animal.

- All market hogs brought on the fairgrounds will leave the fairgrounds only for harvest. **All hogs will go to one designated buyer with the exception of the grand and reserve champions.**
- An exhibitor may show two single market hogs. An exhibitor may choose to show two barrows, two gilts or one barrow and one gilt.
- To be eligible for championship, hogs must weigh 220 pounds and over. Light weight hogs will be shown for project grade only. The light weight classes will be shown first and then the competitive classes will be shown.
- Wood shavings must be used for bedding. No dyed products are permitted. If unacceptable products are used, the exhibitor will be given one notification by the Junior Fair Board to replace the bedding with acceptable materials. If the problem is not corrected after 24 hours, the exhibitor will be fined \$25 per day per pen.
- Junior fair members may show their market hogs in the on foot open class show if the required fee is paid and entries made with the Senior Fair Board Department Superintendents.
- The club with the overall cleanest aisle, cleanest pens, well managed swine projects, and best overall show placings throughout fair week will receive the Bushman-Plieman Memorial Award at the end of the week as determined by the swine committee. Judging will take place between 10:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m.
- No trimming or clipping of ears or tails at the fair. Violators will be disqualified from showing.
- No hogs with noticeable ruptures will be allowed to show.
- Grand and reserve champion market barrows and gilts will be harvested and viewed as part of the carcass review on the Wednesday after the fair.
- Automatic water fountains are allowed in pens. Leaking waterers must be repaired or removed within 24 hours of notification. If not repaired or removed, exhibitor will not be allowed to show or sell.
- If left in pens, feeders and waterers must be secured. Any unsecured feeders and waterers must be removed between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Any additional feedings must be supervised by the exhibitor. Violators will be given one (1) notification, if the violation continues the member disqualified from showing. Questions or problems should be addressed to the Junior Fair Swine Superintendent.
- Automatic feeders are allowed, but must be emptied during the times listed above. All other rules listed in #11 must be followed when automatic feeders are used.

14. No unsupervised hogs are to be left in the wash racks. Hogs should be washed and returned to their assigned pens.

15. All swine exhibitors must sign up for showmanship prior to the show. Sign-up sheets will be posted in the swine barns.

16. All market hogs will be eartagged for identification prior to weigh-in and tattooed during the weigh-in. Hogs must be in the correct pen according to the exhibitor's name or the exhibitor/parent must be at the pen when the tagging is done. If hogs are tagged incorrectly, exhibitor must notify the Junior Fair Board prior to the start of the hog weigh-in. Any hogs having to be retagged after the weigh-in due to incorrect penning will not be allowed to place in the market hog show.

17. All barrows will be checked for castration during tagging. Any questionable animals will be checked by the fair vet to determine if the animal may be shown.

18. Showmanship classes will be shown in order Classes I through V.

19. Barns will be closed during load out of hogs. Load out times will be posted when available. Pens should be cleaned after the hogs are loaded. Hogs may not be moved from their assigned pens before load out.

20. Exhibitors must care for their animals until the animals are loaded off the fairgrounds. For market animals, if it is determined at load out that the animal has lacked food and/or water, \$25.00 will be deducted from the value of the animal. This decision will be made by the packer and representatives from the Sale Committee.

The board will determine if the animals will be identified and if penalties will be imposed.
- An animal which is registered must be registered in the name of the exhibitor or in a partnership of which the exhibitor is a partner. Papers must be available day of the show.
- Market lambs may have no more than 1/4" wool remaining on the entire body at the time of arrival on the fairgrounds. Market lambs may have no more than 1/8" wool remaining on the entire body for show.
- Market lambs will be sold according to random sort of the computer.
- Five or more entries of a single breed in any one class will designate a separate class.
- Every exhibitor must show his or her own animal unless granted prior approval by the Junior Fair Board. The only exception is when there is more than

compete in the Showman of Showmen class. If an exhibitor has placed first or second in more than one showmanship class, they may show both horses in the Showman of Showmen.

14. Easy Gaited Pleasure - correct tack and attire is Saddle Seat or Western tack and attire, respectively. Easy Gaited classes will be two gaited classes (no canter). Gaits will be a Show Walk and a Show Gait.

15. All horses must be weaned by the time they arrive on the fairgrounds.

16. If a horse kicks, a red ribbon must be tied to the tail when the horse is out of the stall.

17. If it is determined that the animal has lacked food and/or water, the exhibitor will not receive a fair pass the following year. This determination will be the decision of the Junior and Senior Fair Board superintendents of the department.

18. Walk Trot Trail class exhibitors will complete the trail pattern with no lope, trot only. This class is open only to exhibitors entered in class #718 Walk Trot.

19. Horses with a body condition score of less than a 4 (ribs easily discernable, tops of spinous process easily discernable, tailhead prominent with hook pins easily discernible, withers accentuated, and neck obviously thin), obviously sick horses, and horses with a Grade 3 or greater lameness (consistently observable at the trot; marked nodding, hitching, or shortened stride; and minimal weight bearing in motion or at rest) should not be entered. Questionable animals will be reviewed by fair officials in consultation with the fair veterinarian.

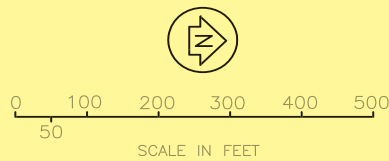

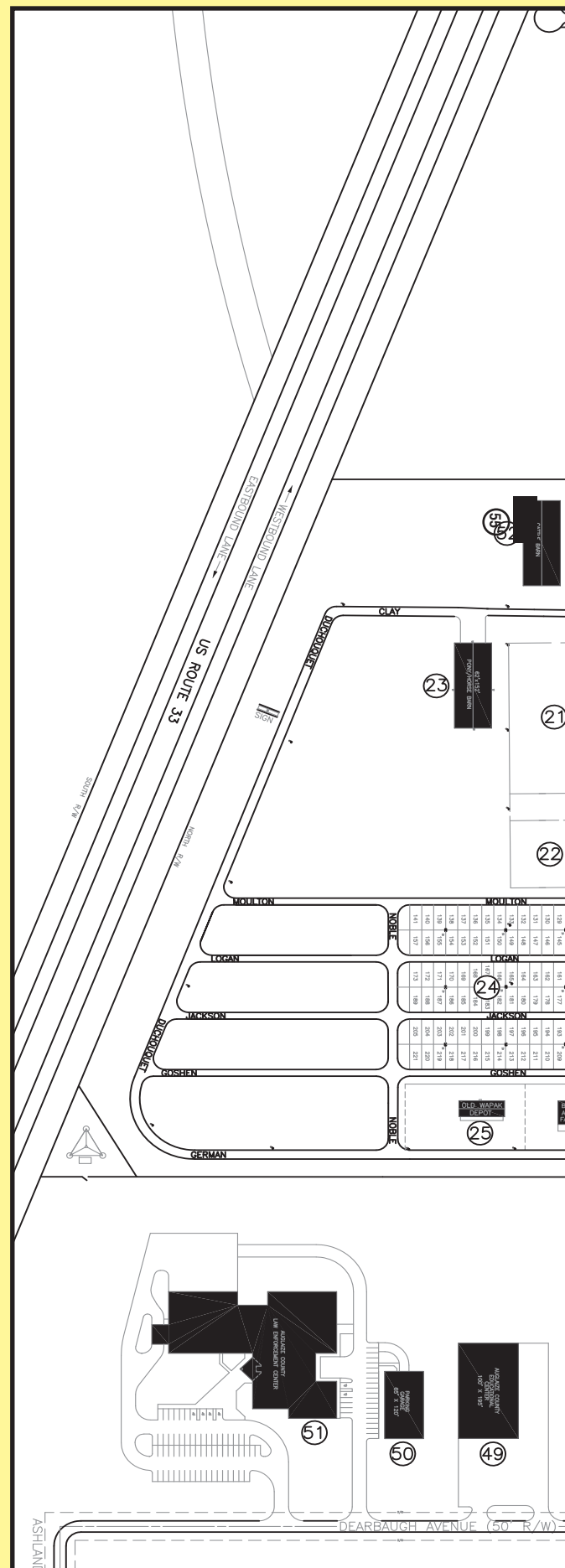
1. The exhibit must have been raised in the current year with the exception of classes 208, 209, 210, 211, 212, 213, 214, 215 and 216.
2. Birds in the pens must be all the same breed. Mixed breed pens will show for project grade and premium only, no placing.
3. An exhibit in chickens is to consist of a pen of two females or a pen of three broilers (either 3 pullets or 3 cockerels, no mixed pens.) All show pens, fancy or standard, will consist of 1 female and 1 male.
4. Hens used in the pen of 2 hens class may be shown as part of a show pen, fancy or standard.
5. Exhibitors must be present at the sale to sell their animals unless they have received prior approval of the Junior Fair Board.
6. Exhibitors will not receive a fair exhibitor's pass the following year if they fail to (1) care for their animals throughout fair week or, (2) clean their pens the last day of the fair. Each exhibitor will receive one warning from the Junior Fair Poultry Chairman.
7. No "for sale" signs are to be posted on the pens, these signs may be posted on the bulletin boards.
8. Broiler meat pen animals must weigh 4 pounds and over each and will consist of commercial meat type broilers hatched after June 1 of the current year. Broilers must be purchased and in the possession of the exhibitor by June 30. Each of the 3 birds must weigh within the weight limit for be eligible for placings. Exhibitors must provide proof of hatch date for their broilers.
9. Market turkeys must weigh a minimum of 20 pounds and will consist of meat type hen hatched before April 1 of the current year. Turkeys must be purchased and in the possession of the exhibitor by May 1.
10. All exhibitors of broilers and market turkeys must also show at least one other pen of poultry. The other pen cannot be a market entry. Dozen eggs entry is not considered another pen of poultry.
11. A limit of one entry in each class in this department.

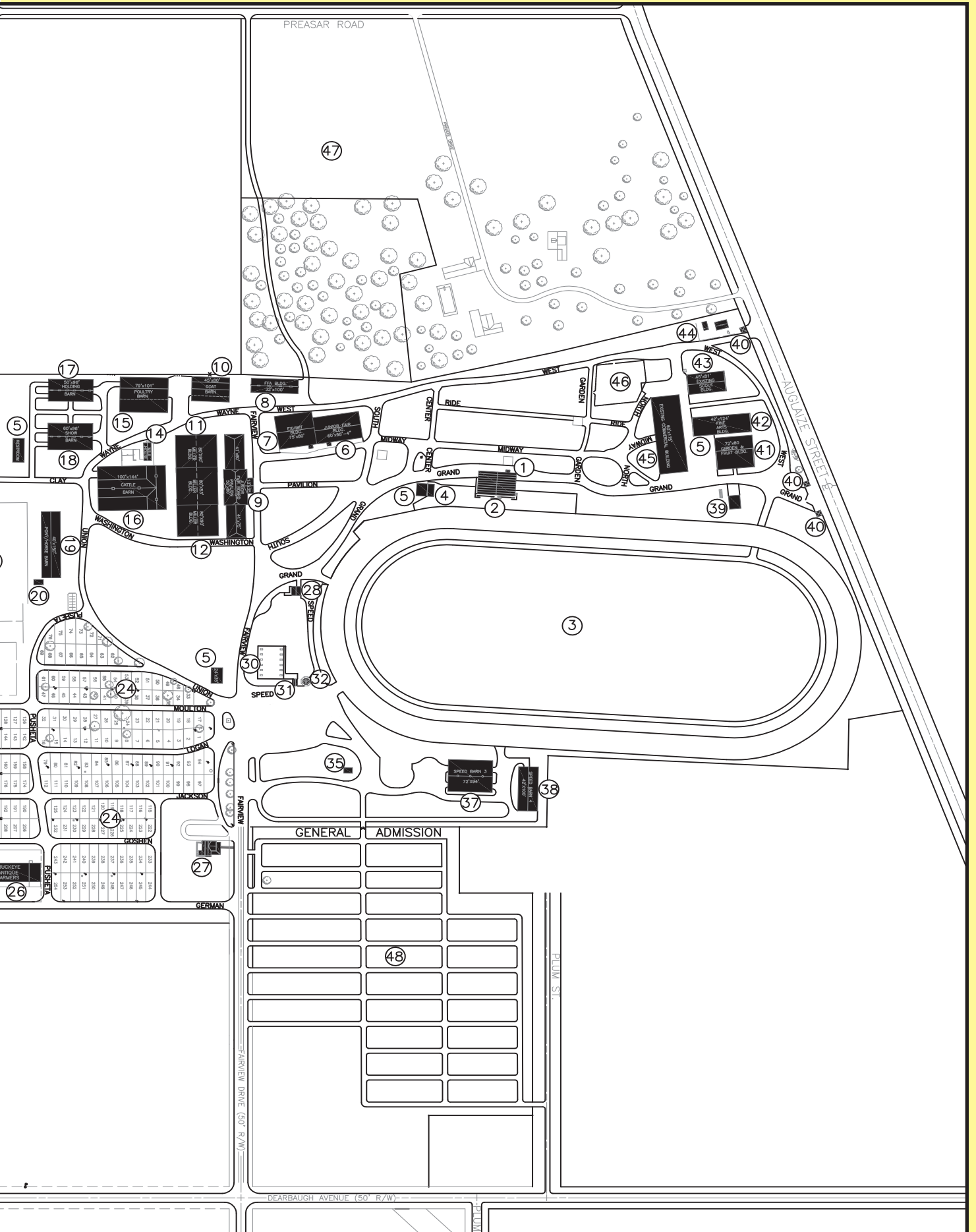

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12. Class 200, broilers will compete only for Grand and Reserve Champion Pen of Broilers. Class 201, market turkey, hen will compete only for Grand and Reserve Champion of Market Turkey, Hen.

13. All first place class winners, excluding market classes and best rooster, will compete for the Grand Champion Pen of Poultry. Reserve champion will be chosen from remaining 1st place animals and the 2nd place from Grand Champion's class.

14. Dozen eggs class will be judged on the following categories: size, size uniformity, color, color uniformity, cleanliness, shell texture, inside.

15. Dozen eggs class requires an entry submitted by July 1. Eggs may be from any type of poultry eligible to show in junior fair. Exhibitors must show a pen of poultry to enter the eggs class.

16. Winner of the junior showmanship class will move into the senior division the following year. Senior Showman may choose to participate in Showman of Showmen in the same year they win Senior Showmanship. Winner of the senior showmanship class must move into the Showman of Showmen class the following year.

17. Production Standard classes are judged on production not as a show pen. Fancy Standard and Bantam classes are judged as a show pen.

18. All broilers and market turkeys shown in the junior fair must go to harvest.

19. All turkeys must be NPIP or have hatch papers from a NPIP hatchery.

20. Exhibitors must own their own birds, leasing is not permitted in this department. Ownership papers will be checked at random. Please see general rules regarding ownership requirements.

21. Geese and breeding turkeys will be judged at their pens.

22. Exhibitors must care for their animals until the animals are loaded off the fairgrounds. For market animals, if it is determined at load out that the animal has lacked food and/or water, \$10.00 will be deducted from the value of the animal. This decision will be made by the packer and representatives from the Sale Committee. For breeding animals, if it is determined that the animal has lacked food and/or water, the exhibitor will not receive a fair pass the following year. This determination will be the decision of the Junior and Senior Fair Board superintendents of the department.

23. Best Rooster Class: Roosters, under 1 year of age, exhibited as a part of a pen in the show; may be considered for this award. Exhibitors must bring their rooster to the ring to be judged. Best rooster will not be eligible to compete for the Grand Champion Pen of Poultry. Best rooster class will not receive premiums.

24. Wood shavings are to be used for bedding. No dyed products may be used. If unacceptable products are used, the exhibitor will be given one notification by the Junior Fair Board to replace the bedding with acceptable materials. If the problem is not corrected after 24 hours, the exhibitor will be fined \$25 per day per pen.

- Market pens must weigh must be 4 pounds and over for each member of the pen. Pens not meeting the weight requirement will not be eligible to compete for championship honors. Each of the 2 rabbits must weigh within the weight limit for be eligible for placings. Market rabbits will be tattooed at the time of fair weigh-in.
- Market rabbits must be in the exhibitor's possession as of June 20 of the current year. Breeding rabbits must be in the exhibitor's possession as of May 1 of the current year.
- All ages for classes listed below are as of the date of the show.
- Exhibitors must be present at the sale to sell their rabbits unless they have received prior approval of the Junior Fair Board.
- Ten or more entries in any breed will designate a separate class for the current year. For the first year as a separate breed, rosettes will be awarded for the best of breed and best opposite. Current year trophies for separate breeds are based on the previous year's entries. Any breed having 10 or more entries the previous year will have a trophy for the best/best opposite of that breed.
- Exhibitors will not receive a fair exhibitor's pass the following year if they fail to (1) care for their rabbits throughout fair week, or (2) clean their pens on the last day of the fair. Each exhibitor will receive one warning from the Junior Fair Rabbit Chairman.
- All pens must be cleaned by 10:00 a.m. daily. Exhibitors must clean pens after the fair or their fair pass will be forfeited for next year's fair.
- No "for sale" signs are to be posted in the barn. No commercial displays are permitted in the barn.
- Wood shavings must be used for bedding. No dyed products are permitted. If unacceptable products are used, the exhibitor will be given one notification by the Junior Fair Board to replace the bedding with acceptable materials. - The Junior Fair Board Rabbit Department makes the following recommendation to all exhibitors: all rabbits, breeding and market, should be tattooed by the exhibitor. These tattoos are for your protection, to help identify and return your rabbits if they should be mixed with other rabbits.
- Market pens will be divided into classes according the sale order.
- Rabbits shown as a part of the pen of two market rabbits may not be shown as junior breeding rabbits.
- There will be three judges for the show. All judges will judge the market pens for disqualifications. One judge will select the Grand and Reserve Champion Market Pen of Rabbits from all eligible pens. One judge will determine the Grand Champion Doe. One judge will determine the Grand Champion Buck. Grand and Reserve Buck and Doe will be selected before the judging of the market pens.
- Showmanship classes will be held youngest to oldest and then Showman of Showmen.
- Dress code for showing: long sleeve white shirt and long pants. Exhibitors not wearing a long sleeve white shirt will be permitted to show but not place. If case of extreme heat, shorts may be allowed. This decision will be at the judge's discretion and will be made on the morning of the show.
- All entries will be final as of noon Monday of the fair. Exhibitors need to check that their rabbits were entered correctly before this deadline. Changes

made after noon on Monday will mean the rabbit will not be eligible for placing.

21. Rabbits may be carried to the judging table by junior fair members only.

22. Clubs/chapters will be assigned times to supervise the rabbit barn.

Two supervisors must be provided for each shift. Supervisors must personally sign in to be given credit. Groups will be fined \$10.00 for each shift they do not supervise. Any group not providing the required two supervisors will be also fined \$10.00 per shift. These fines are to be paid to the Jr. Fair Board by January 1 of the following year. Those groups not paying their fine will forfeit their club members' fair passes for the following year.

23. All market rabbits shown in the junior fair must go to harvest.

24. Show boxes must be placed under the pens or placed along the outside walls of the building. No boxes may obstruct the aisles.

25. Exhibitors must care for their animals until the animals are loaded off the fairgrounds. For market animals, if it is determined at load out that the animal has lacked food and/or water, \$10.00 will be deducted from the value of the animal. This decision will be made by the packer and representatives from the Sale Committee. For breeding animals, if it is determined that the animal has lacked food and/or water, the exhibitor will not receive a fair pass the following year. This determination will be the decision of the Junior and Senior Fair Board superintendents of the department.

26. If a market rabbit dies after fair weigh-in, the remaining rabbit in the pen can be sold as a single. The exhibitor will receive the animal value for that rabbit.

27. Every pen will be assigned a number that will be used for barn management.

GENERAL RULES:

1. Health requirements are listed in health section of the fair book. All goats will be inspected for health problems at the time of unloading.

2. All goats must have some type of scrapies identification (tattoo or eartag) in order to be exhibited. Exhibitors must file their scrapies information form with the fair board.

3. Market goats may be wethers or does. All dairy and boer market goats must be tattooed during the spring weigh-in at the fairgrounds. A maximum of five (5) goats may be identified regardless of breed. If a market goat is ill and cannot be tattooed at the designated date, hours and location, the exhibitor must contact the Junior Fair Board immediately. The exhibitor will be required to present a veterinarian's certification of the illness before arrangements will be made for the goat to be tattooed. If there is a family emergency on the day of the weigh-in and the animals cannot be identified, the family must present their situation to the Junior Fair Board. The board will determine if the animals will be identified and if penalties will be imposed.

4. All market goats must be dehorned by the date of spring weigh-in. All market wethers must be banded and dehorned by the date of spring weigh-in.

If an alternate method of castration is used, the animal must be accompanied by a veterinarian's certificate. A veterinarian's certificate must also accompany any wether which may be considered "questionable".

5. Any animal which is registered must be registered in the name of the exhibitor or in a partnership of which the exhibitor is a partner.

6. Horns:

- Dairy - (including scurs) must be less than one inch long
- Pygmy – permitted
- Fiber – permitted
- Boer – permitted
- Market wether (doe & wether) (dairy & boer) - (including scurs) must be less than one inch long

7. Eartags:

- Dairy - no eartags are permitted, except Scrapies ID tags.
- Boer - permitted
- Fiber - permitted

8. The ends of the horns must be covered at all times unless permission is granted from the Junior Fair Goat Chairman to leave horns uncovered. Boer goat horns are not required to be covered. Any dairy goat or market wether with horns 1" or longer may show but not place. Market goats will still be allowed to sell.

9. Dress code: All exhibitors in the dairy breed classes (classes 11-18) must wear a white shirt. In all other classes, including showmanship, exhibitors may wear a color shirt (see general livestock rules for acceptable attire). Pants should be either white or black dress pants or jeans (not faded or torn).

10. There is a limit of two entries per class. An exhibitor may exhibit a total of three market goats, no more than two per class. For example:

- 2 dairy market and 1 boer market
- 2 boer market and 1 dairy market
- NOT 3 boer market, NOT 3 dairy market

11. For dairy breeds, if there are eight or more milkers entered by two different families, that breed will be shown separately the following year. Entries will be reviewed annually to determine breed classes.

12. All milking animals must be milked out by twelve hours prior to show time.

13. Boer market goats will not compete for the Grand Champion Boer Goat.

14. The Supreme and Reserve Supreme Champion Goats will be selected from the: Grand Champion Boer Breeding Goat, Best Dairy Doe in Show, Grand Champion Pygmy Goat and Grand Champion Other Breeds Goat.

15. No bucks, over the age of eight weeks, will be permitted on the fairgrounds.

16. Wood shavings are to be used for bedding. No dyed products may be used. Straw may be used only if permission is granted from the Junior Fair Goat Chairman. If unacceptable products are used, the exhibitor will be given one notification by the Junior Fair Board to replace the bedding with acceptable materials. If the problem is not corrected after 24 hours, the exhibitor will be fined \$25 per day per pen.

17. Mother and kid, dam and daughter classes will not receive a premium.

18. Goats exhibited as a cart goat do not need to be eligible to be shown in another class in this department, but must meet all other rules in the department.

19. Market goats, both dairy and boer, must weigh 40 pounds and over by fair weigh-in to be eligible for placings. Underweight and overweight goats may show for project grade and premium only, and may sell through the Junior Fair Livestock Sale. Exhibitors must be present at the sale to sell their goats unless they have received prior approval of the Junior Fair Board. All market goats shown in the junior fair must go to harvest.

20. Market goats, both dairy and boer, must have their milk teeth by fair weigh-in to be eligible for placings.

21. Age of goat is determined by the date of the show. No goats under three (3) weeks of age are permitted on the grounds.

22. Classes with 15 or more entries will be split. The split will be a gate cut (first in) with the exception that one exhibitor with two animals may elect to go into separate classes. The top five animals in each class will return to be judged for class placings. There will be no placings in the qualifying classes, the top five will be selected but not placed.

23. The following practices are unacceptable for showing: use of ice, hot shots, slapping, wet towels and aerosols which cause an "icing" effect. Violators will be not be eligible to compete for awards.

24. Building of legs with adhesives is not permitted. Violators will be not be eligible to compete for awards.

25. Does identified as a market goat may not be shown as a breeding project animal in the same year. Classification cannot be changed after the spring weigh-in.

26. Market goats without ears are required to have their eartag secured

1. All 4-H members with clothing projects are eligible but not required to compete in the Style Revue contest. To receive any clothing awards, members must be present at county clothing judging and model in the correct category at the Style Revue.

2. If an exhibitor does not participate in the county clothing judging, the child may model in the correct modeling contest, but will not be eligible for any modeling or project awards.

3. Once a 4-H'er has taken project 406, 408, 411, 412, 415, 417, 418, 420, 424, 425, 426, she/he may not go back and take projects 407, 409, 410, 413, or 419.

4. During the style revue, clothing winners will be announced at the end of each class. Modeling winners will be announced at the end of the modeling contests.

5. Guidelines for Placing in Clothing Projects - Older members aren't eligible to win in categories that are limited to younger members. But younger members may compete in project categories designed for older members (although it's not generally encouraged and they have to meet all the same requirements as the older competitors).

6. All items that constitute an outfit should be wearable at the same time. A carry on garment (for example, extra pair of slacks) is not acceptable. This does not apply to accessories. No additional stand alone props may be used during judging or the style review.

7. Multiple Projects - 4-H members who take more than one clothing project must complete separate learning experiences related to each, including creating a separate, complete total-look outfit for each clothing project.

8. Repeating Projects – Members who repeat projects should attempt new challenges each year such as doing more advanced experiments and surveys and sewing more complicated patterns or harder-to-handle fabrics.

9. 1 – 5 placings will be given in each class.

10. The Style Revue will feature the following projects: Sundresses and Jumpers, Clothing for Middle School, Clothes for High School and College, Loungewear, Ready, Set, Sew Active, Dress-Up Outfit, Outerwear for Anywhere, Terrific Tops, Sew for Others, Designed By Me, Shopping Savvy, Creative Costumes, Accessories for Teens, Clothing for Your Career, Sew Fun!, Look Great For Less and em-bel-lish.

11. No entries are required for this department. Final judging schedule will be mailed in July.

12. 4-H members must complete the project requirements as outlined in the 4-H Advisors and Members Project Guide.

13. To receive premium money, the actual project must be judged during the judging day and exhibited in club booths. Clothing project premiums will be paid at the style review.

14. Projects judged in this department must have been completed specifically for the project enrolled. Items made for school projects or other youth participation may not be evaluated as a 4-H project.

15. Required for judging: bring your pattern (or instructions), a 2"x2" sample of your fabric and a 4"x6" photo (digital or print) of member in your project to attach to your judging sheet.

16. Members must model in the items made for their current project for the entire Style Review, the only exception is members enrolled in Sew for Others.

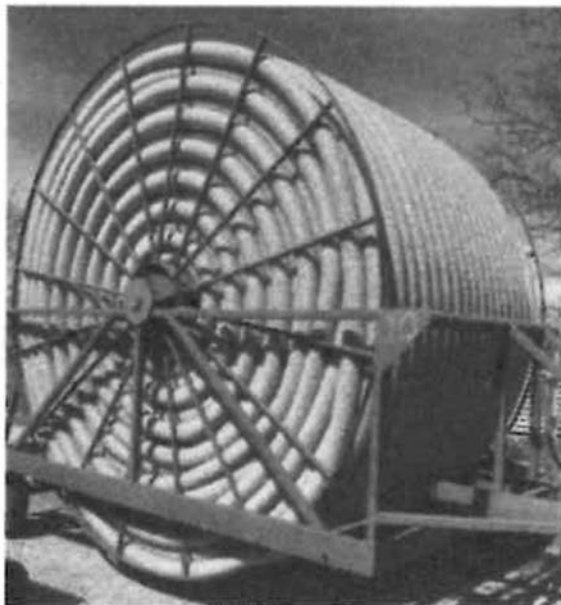
1. All entries need returned by July 1, 2019 to the Fair Board Office.

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2019 SEASON/OHIO'S LIVESTOCK HEALTH EXHIBITION RULES

(Current as of press-time, 2012)

901:1-18-01 Chapter's Application

(A) Animals listed in this chapter when moved or imported into Ohio for exhibition purposes only shall comply with the requirements of this chapter and when in compliance with provisions of this chapter shall, with the exception of rules governing movement and importation of quarantined animals, be exempt from any other rules governing movement with or importation into Ohio.

(B) Animals moved within or imported into Ohio for any purpose in addition to exhibition shall meet all movement and import requirements of Chapter 901:1-17 of the Administrative Code.

901:1-18-02 Definitions

As used in this chapter:

(A) "**Exhibition**" means any public show of animals which is sponsored by or under the control of an Ohio county or independent agricultural society organized under Chapter 1711. of the Revised Code; or the Ohio State Fair or which is assembled for a period which exceeds thirty-six hours or contains animals of origins other than Ohio.

(B) "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection" means a form from the state of origin which has been issued and completed by a licensed accredited veterinarian attested to the health status and identification of an animal listed thereon.

(C) "Approved Veterinarian" means any licensed and accredited veterinarian approved by the Ohio Department of Agriculture, or an employee of the Ohio Department of Agriculture of the United States Department of Agriculture, Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, Veterinary Services.

(D) "Licensed and Accredited Veterinarian" means a person who is licensed by the State of Ohio to practice veterinary medicine and who is certified by the United States Department of Agriculture, Agricultural Research Service, to be an accredited veterinarian.

(E) "Residue" means any poisonous or deleterious pesticide governed by 40 C.F.R. 180, any poisonous or deleterious substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 109.6, or any other substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 556.

(F) "Contagious or Infectious Disease" means any disease, including any foreign animal disease, or vector, capable of transmission by any means from a farrier animal to a human or to another animal and includes dangerously contagious or infectious diseases.

(G) "Tuberculosis accredited free herd" is one that has passed at least two consecutive annual negative official tests for tuberculosis in accordance with the "Uniform Methods and Rules - Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication", and has no other evidence of bovine tuberculosis.

901:1-18-03 Exhibitions: Sanitation, Inspection and Records

(A) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall have in attendance an approved veterinarian for the duration of the exhibit.

(B) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall:

(1) Immediately, prior to an exhibition and under the direction of the approved veterinarian, thoroughly clean and disinfect each building, pen, stall, ring or other enclosure in which animals are to be quartered for exhibition;

(2) Have the approved veterinarian:

(a) Examine the certificate of veterinary inspection when required for an animal brought to the exhibition;

(b) Inspect within a reasonable time of arrival each animal brought to the exhibit for symptoms of any infectious or contagious diseases;

(c) Daily inspect each animal present at the exhibition for symptoms for infectious or contagious disease.

(3) Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibit. The record shall contain the name and address of the owner of each animal and the species and breed of the animal.

(4) May order the immediate removal of any animal which in the opinion of the approved veterinarian places other animals at unacceptable risk of disease.

(C) An exemption from the requirements of paragraph (B) (1) of this rule may be requested from the department and will be granted when, in the judgment of the department, cleaning and disinfection will serve no purpose. By way of example only, cleaning

and disinfection will generally serve no purpose in a newly constructed building that has never been occupied.

901:1-18-04 Exhibitors

(A) No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he knows or has reason to suspect is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease or residue.

(B) The owner or bailee of an animal with symptoms of an infectious or contagious disease shall, when directed by an exhibition official, the approved veterinarian, or an employee of the Ohio Department of Agriculture, immediately remove the animal from the exhibition premises.

(C) Upon request, each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits an animal, shall make available any certificate of veterinary inspection, registration certificate, vaccination certificate and other documents to exhibition officials, the approved veterinarian or an employee of the Ohio Department of Agriculture.

(D) Each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits an animal for which a certificate of veterinary inspection is required by rules 901:1-19-01 to 901:1-18-11 of the Administrative code shall forward a copy of the certificate of veterinary inspection to the Ohio Department of Agriculture's Division of Animal Industry.

901:1-18-05 Poultry and Fowl

(A) All turkeys, chickens and gamebirds moved within or imported into Ohio for exhibition must:

(1) Originate directly from a flock or hatchery which is a participant in the National Poultry Improvement Plan for the Eradication of Disease an be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph: or

(2) Originate directly from a flock which has had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease within twelve months preceding the opening date of exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or

(3) Have had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease, within ninety days, preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or

(4) Be tested for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease upon arrival at the exhibition by a tester approved by the Ohio Department of Agriculture and found negative.

(B) The rapid whole blood test shall not be used to test turkeys for compliance with the requirements of paragraph (A) (2),

(A) (3) and (A) (4) of this rule.

(C) Waterfowl, doves and pigeons are exempt from this rule.

901:1-18-06 Cattle

(A) Cattle moved within Ohio for exhibition:

(1) The animals presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.

(B) All cattle imported into Ohio for exhibition must:

(1) Be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition;

(2) Originate from a tuberculosis-accredited free herd, an accredited free state or zone, or a modified accredited advanced state or zone;

(3) If originate from a modified accredited state or zone must comply with Rule 901:1-17-03 of the Administrative Code;

(4) If originate from an accreditation preparatory or a non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition;

(5) If from a brucellosis class A state or area/zone must be negative to an official brucellosis test within thirty days of the opening date of the exhibition unless: they are under six months of age, steers, or official vaccinates under twenty months of age (dairy) or twenty-four months of age (beef); and

(6) If from a brucellosis class B or C state or area/zone must meet all requirements for pre-entry testing as specified in 9 C.F.R. 78.9 and obtain an Ohio permit prior to movement.

(C) Cattle from a brucellosis certified free herd or class free state or area/zone are not required to be brucellosis tested.

901:1-18-07 GOATS

- (A) Goats moved within Ohio for exhibition:
The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (B) Goats imported into Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition;
 - (2) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and
 - (3) The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary inspection "the goats in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie."
 - (4) Originate from a tuberculosis accredited free herd as defined in rule 901-18-02 (G) of the Administrative Code for bovine tuberculosis eradication; or
 - (5) Originate from a bovine accredited free state or zone, or a bovine modified accredited advanced state or zone; or
 - (6) Originate from a bovine modified accredited state or zone must comply with Rule 901:1-17-06 of the Administrative Code.
- (C) If originate from a bovine accreditation preparatory or a bovine non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition.

901:1-18-08 Horses, Mules and Ponies

- (A) Horses, Mules and ponies moved within Ohio for Exhibition:
- (1) If not under quarantine and if they are free of any signs of a contagious or infectious disease; and
 - (2) If the animal is twelve months of age or older, the exhibition manager may require that the animal has been tested and classed negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within twelve months of the opening date of the exhibition.
- (B) Horses, Mules and ponies imported into Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) Shall be accompanied by an official certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days of the opening date of the exhibition or obtain a permit for extended time granted by the chief of the division of animal industry as authorized in paragraph (C) of rule 901:1-17-01 of the Administrative Code; and
 - (2) If the animal is twelve months of age or older, it shall be accompanied by evidence the animal was negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within twelve months of the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - (3) Upon request by an authorized representative of the Ohio Department of Agriculture, the person responsible for each animal must make available a chronological list of dates, places and events attended by this animal within thirty days prior to entry into Ohio.

901:1-18-09 Sheep

- (A) Sheep moved within Ohio for exhibition: The Animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of infectious or contagious disease.
- (B) Sheep imported into Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) Must have a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within ninety days preceding the exhibition opening date of the exhibition; and
 - (2) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of infectious or contagious disease; and
 - (3) The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary inspection "the sheep in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie."

901:1-18-10 Swine

- (A) Swine moved within Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) At a terminal show must:
 - (a) Show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and
 - (b) Originate from a county which sixty days prior to the exhibition opening date had no pseudorabies quarantined herds; and
 - (c) Have no breeding swine present and all swine removed are delivered for immediate slaughter or to a licensed livestock facility.
 - (d) Notwithstanding any other provisions of these rules, the manager or sponsor of the exhibition may, prior to permitting the exhibition of any porcine animal at a terminal show require proof, for example a VS form 4-33, animal disease diagnostic laboratory submission form, or a certificate of veterinary inspection, the animal has been tested and classed "negative" to an official test for pseudorabies within forty-five days immediately preceding the opening date of the exhibition.
 - (2) At all other shows, must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within forty-five days preceding the exhibition opening date; and Must be negative to an official pseudorabies test within forty-five days of the exhibition opening date unless:
 - (a) They originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies qualified herd; or

- (b) Are suckling pigs accompanying a negative dam; or
 - (c) They originate from a pseudorabies vaccinated herd and meet the following conditions:
 - (i) the herd has had a negative monitored test within twelve months, and
 - (ii) the swine presented for show are negative to a pseudorabies differential test; or
 - (3) Will be exempt from the requirement of a certificate of veterinary inspection if they originate immediately and directly from a stage V area and show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
 - (4) Are exempted by a written permit issued by the department.
- (B) Swine imported into Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the exhibition opening date; and
 - (2) Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within thirty days of the exhibition opening date unless:
 - (a) They originate immediately and directly from a stage V area or from an area or country recognized by United States Department of Agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary serves as pseudorabies free; or
 - (b) They originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies qualified herd and have not been previously exhibited this show season; or
 - (c) Are exempted by a written permit issued by the department.
- (C) Swine moved within or imported into Ohio for racing shall:
- (1) Be separated at all times from any other swine on the exhibition grounds by the greatest distance reasonably possible; and
 - (2) Be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - (3) Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within thirty days of the exhibition opening date unless:
 - (a) They originate immediately and directly from a stage V area or from an area or country recognized by United States Department of Agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary serves as pseudorabies free; or
 - (b) They originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies qualified herd and have not been previously exhibited this show season;
 - (c) Are exempt by written permit issued by the Department.
 - (4) Be exempt from the immediate slaughter requirement of paragraph (A) (c) of this rule.

901:1-18-11 Llama

- (A) Llama moved within Ohio for exhibition when presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of infectious or contagious disease.
- (B) Llama imported into Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within ninety days preceding the exhibition opening date.
 - (2) When presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of contagious disease.

2019 SEASON OHIO'S LIVESTOCK TAMPERING EXHIBITION RULES

901:19-01 Definitions

As used in Chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code:

- (A) "Accessory reproductive tissue" includes but is not limited to epididymis.
- (B) "Agricultural society" or "society" means a county agricultural society or an independent agricultural society that is organized under the laws of the state of Ohio.
- (C) "Approved" when used in reference to drugs, means approval by the United States food and drug administration for use in the species indicated on the label.
- (D) "Breed show or class" means a show or class limited to breeding stock of a specific breed of livestock.
- (E) "Class" means a division within a show or exhibition as defined by a sponsor.
- (F) "Department" means the department of agriculture created under section 121.02 of the Revised Code.
- (G) "Designee" when used in reference to an exhibitor, means a member of the exhibitor's family or household or any other registered or authorized representative of the exhibitor.
- (H) "Director" means the director of agriculture appointed pursuant to section 121.03 of the Revised Code.
- (I) "Drug" means drug as defined in division (C) of section 4729.02 of the Revised Code and its metabolites.
- (J) "Drug use notification form" means the document completed in accordance with rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.
- (K) "Exhibition drug residue legal" means an animal has not been

administered a drug; or if administered a drug the withdrawal period has elapsed at the time the drug use notification form is completed.

(L) "Exhibitor" means any person who shows, displays, or exhibits livestock at an exhibition.

(M) "Extra label use" means the actual or intended use of a drug in livestock in a manner other than in accordance with the drug label directions.

(N) "Fair" means the annual exhibition held by the Ohio expositions commission, pursuant to division (A)(1) of section 991.03 of the Revised Code, or a county agricultural society or independent agricultural society, as reported to the director pursuant to rule 901-5-11 of the Administrative Code.

(O) "Family" means the immediate family of an exhibitor, including but not limited to the exhibitor's parent, step-parent, foster parent, grandparent, step-grandparent, foster grandparent, brother, sister, step-brother, half-brother, son, daughter, step-son, step-daughter, or guardian.

(P) "Grand champion" means the highest placing livestock entry of a show.

(Q) "Household" means the permanent residence address of the exhibitor.

(R) "Immediately" means the time period between the cessation of administration of a drug and the point at which drug residues in the livestock are within tolerance levels or at zero tolerance, unless a safe level has been established by the United States food and drug administration.

(S) "Internal rule" means any rule adopted by a sponsor or applicable to the sponsor's exhibition, and includes all mandatory rules and those optional rules from which the sponsor does not exempt itself or its exhibition.

(T) "Junior livestock show" means a show limited to exhibitors nine years of age or in the third grade through nineteen years of age, or as authorized to participate in either 4-H, FFA or other youth organization.

(U) "Label" means the attached label or the accompanying brochure that lists the approved species, dose, route of administration, withdrawal time and any cautionary statement; a prescription label; the requirements of labeling for an extra label use drug as permitted by the United States food and drug administration; and information provided by the food animal residue avoidance databank (FARAD).

(V) "Licensed livestock facility" means a livestock facility licensed pursuant to Chapter 943, of the Revised Code or a similar law of another state.

(W) "Mandatory rule" means any rule adopted by the director relating to food safety or the health, safety, or welfare of livestock and from which a sponsor may not exempt itself or its exhibition.

(X) "Market livestock" means exhibition livestock bred, raised and intended for slaughter for food purposes.

(Y) "Non-terminal show" means a show in which no livestock is required to be slaughtered.

(Z) "Original rule" means any rule adopted by the director from which a sponsor may exempt itself or its exhibition.

(AA) "Outstanding market project" means the exhibitor ranking highest in the outstanding market project competition in a show.

(BB) "Over the counter drug" means any drug that lawfully may be purchased without a prescription.

(CC) "Partial terminal show" means a show in which no fewer than the grand champion and reserve grand champion in each show or market class of livestock are sent directly to slaughter or to a licensed livestock facility no later than or immediately following the conclusion of the exhibition.

(DD) "Prescription" means prescription as defined in division (G) of section 4729102 of the Revised Code.

(EE) "Quarantine" means isolation pursuant to section 941.07 of the Revised Code.

(FF) "Reserve grand champion" means the second highest placing livestock entry of a show.

(GG) "Residue" means residues as defined in division (I) of section 941.01 of the Revised Code.

(HH) "Show" means that part of the exhibition restricted to exhibiting a single species and category of livestock such as, by way of example, but not limited to, market steer, dairy goats and market lambs.

(II) "Slick clipping" or "body shaving" means having hair that is less than one half inch in length on the body of market hogs.

(JJ) "Terminal show" means a show in which all livestock entered in the show are sent directly to slaughter or to a licensed livestock facility no later than or immediately following the conclusion of the exhibition.

(KK) "Tolerance level" means the detectable level of a residue or other substance in livestock, in a livestock test sample, or in food, as that word is defined in division (A)(5) of section 3715.01 of the Revised Code, in a level less than or equal to the

maximum level determined to be safe, acceptable or non-violative by the United States food and drug administration.

(LL) "Unlawful substance" means any of the following:

(1) Any drug prohibited by division (E)(1)(b) of section 901.76 or section 2925.04 of the Revised Code; or

(2) A substance which is not normally found in or does not naturally occur in livestock; or

(3) A substance which is normally found in or does naturally occur in livestock, but is detected or discerned in an amount or area greater than normal; or

(4) Any drug required to be listed, but which is not listed on a drug use notification form; or

(5) Any drug present in an animal regardless of how the drug came to be present if the drug was not administered under paragraphs (A), (B) or (C) of rule 901-19-04 of the Administrative Code.

(MM) "Veterinarian" means any person licensed to practice veterinary medicine under Chapter 4741, of the Revised Code or under the similar laws of another state.

(NN) "Withdrawal period" or "withdrawal time" means the interval from the time livestock is removed from medication until all residues are within the tolerance level.

901-19-02 Types of shows; slaughter.

(A) The sponsor of an exhibition shall designate each of the shows held at the exhibition as one of the following types: terminal show, partial terminal show, or non-terminal show.

(B) All of the following junior livestock shows or classes at a fair must be terminal shows or partial terminal shows: market beef steer, market hog, market lamb, market dairy steer, veal calf and market goat unless at least thirty days prior to the opening of the show, the sponsor has submitted a written request to exempt a show from this provision, and the director has provided written authorization granting this request prior to the start of the fair.

(C) All livestock which participate in a terminal show shall be slaughtered. The livestock shall be consigned to slaughter either at the conclusion of the show or immediately following the exhibition.

(D) In a partial terminal show at least the grand champion and the reserve grand champion shall be slaughtered. Prior to the show, the sponsor of the exhibition may require that additional livestock from a partial terminal show shall be slaughtered. The livestock shall be consigned to slaughter either at the conclusion of the show or immediately following the exhibition.

(E) All livestock required to be slaughtered under this rule shall be slaughtered at a meat establishment either licensed by the department or granted inspection by the United States department of agriculture.

(F) Notwithstanding paragraphs (B), (C) or (D) of this rule, livestock required to be slaughtered under this rule may, at the option of the sponsor of the exhibition, be consigned to a licensed livestock facility for salt provided that:

(1) The livestock is consigned either at the conclusion of the show or immediately following the exhibition; and,

(2) the livestock is sold only for slaughter.

(G) From the beginning of the exhibition until departure for slaughter or consignment to a licensed livestock facility, the exhibitor or the exhibitor's designee shall be responsible for caring for the livestock.

(H) Livestock destined for slaughter or consignment to a licensed livestock facility shall not be removed from the exhibition grounds until the livestock is transported to slaughter or to the licensed livestock facility or until the sponsor approves movement of the livestock to another secure area for:

(1) Disease control in accordance with paragraph (B) (4) of rule 901:1-18-03 of the

Administrative Code; and

(2) Quarantine for residue to allow a withdrawal time as determined by the approved fair veterinarian or in accordance with the instructions listed on the drug use notification form to elapse and may be subject to testing.

(I) All livestock destined for slaughter shall be subject to testing by the director in accordance with section 901.73 of the Revised Code.

(J) Livestock carcasses passing inspection may be released for normal disposition.

(K) During inspection or testing, if the livestock carcass is preliminarily determined to have been tampered with or found to contain an unlawful substance, one of the following shall occur:

(1) If the livestock carcass must be trimmed or reconditioned to comply with the meat inspection requirements, the carcass shall be trimmed and reconditioned and released to the exhibitor, unless the successful bidder accepts the trimmed or reconditioned carcass.

(2) If the livestock carcass cannot be trimmed or reconditioned, it shall be condemned in accordance with the meat inspection requirements.

(L) Livestock entered in or eligible for a carcass contest prior to or during a terminal, partial terminal or non-terminal show must be exhibition drug residue legal at the time of show and eligible for immediate slaughter.

901-19-03 Auction sales at terminal or partial terminal shows.

(A) A sponsor may hold an auction sale of livestock exhibited at a terminal or partial terminal show.

(B) An exhibitor who exhibits livestock at a terminal show or partial terminal show consents to participating in the subsequent auction sale.

(C) All bidders at an auction sale following a terminal show or partial terminal show consent to the slaughter of the livestock or delivery to a licensed livestock facility.

(D) Title to livestock sold at an auction sale and subsequently presented for slaughter or sale at a licensed livestock facility shall remain vested in the exhibitor, or if the exhibitor is not the owner, in the owner until the livestock has been passed by inspection and released in accordance with paragraph (K)(1) and (K)(2) of rule 901-19-02 of the Administrative Code and passes all testing performed by or at the direction of the department or the sponsor.

(E) At the discretion of the sponsor, the sponsor may collect the sale proceeds from the successful bidder and retain the proceeds until the carcass of the livestock has been released, or may allow the successful bidder to withhold payment of the proceeds until the carcass is released. In the event the carcass is not released, the sponsor shall return the sale proceeds to the successful bidder.

(F) Prior to the auction, the sponsor shall announce the identification of the exhibition livestock which have been administered drugs for which the withdrawal time has not elapsed.

901-19-04 Prohibited practices.

No person shall:

(A) Administer or cause or permit to be administered a prescription drug to livestock either immediately before an exhibition or during an exhibition unless the prescription drug is administered:

- (1) By or under the supervision and direction of a veterinarian; and,
- (2) Only in accordance with label directions; and,
- (3) In conjunction with a valid veterinarian-client-patient relationship; and,
- (4) For a valid medical purpose; and,
- (5) A drug use notification form is completed and filed in accordance with the applicable requirements of rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.

(B) Administer or cause or permit to be administered an over the counter drug to livestock either immediately before an exhibition or during an exhibition unless the over the counter drug is administered:

- (1) By or under the supervision or direction of the exhibitor, the exhibitor's designee, the owner of the livestock or a veterinarian; and,
- (2) Only in accordance with label directions; and,
- (3) Only for a valid medical purpose; and,
- (4) A drug use notification form is completed and filed in accordance with the applicable requirements of rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.

(C) Administer or cause or permit to be administered either a prescription drug or an over the counter drug other than in accordance with the drug's label directions unless extra label use of the drug is:

- (1) By or under the supervision and direction of a veterinarian; and,
- (2) Only in accordance with the extra label directions provided by the veterinarian; and,
- (3) In conjunction with a valid veterinarian-client-patient relationship; and,
- (4) For a valid medical purpose; and,
- (5) A drug use notification form is completed and filed in accordance with the applicable requirements of rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code; and,
- (6) An extended withdrawal time is assigned to the drug by the veterinarian as part of the extra label directions and reported on the drug use notification form.

(D) Show, sell, or offer for sale any livestock which contains an unlawful substance or has been subjected to unacceptable practices.

(E) Show any livestock which contains a drug in an amount which exceeds the tolerance level if established or sale level; or, a drug for which the withdrawal period has not elapsed unless administered in accordance with paragraphs (A), (B) or (C) of this rule.

(F) Sell or offer for sale in an auction at a terminal or partial terminal show an animal that contains a drug in an amount which exceeds the tolerance level if established or sale level; or, a drug for which the withdrawal period has not elapsed unless administered in accordance with paragraphs (A), (B) or (C) of this rule.

(G) Exhibit an animal which has been tranquilized.

(H) Make a false statement on a drug use notification form.

(I) Fail to file or update a drug use notification form as required by 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.

(J) Negligently cause an unlawful substance to be present in an animal.

(K) Fail to sign a chain of custody form.

(L) Violate a mandatory rule.

(M) Violate any optional rule from which a sponsor could have exempted itself or its exhibition, but did not.

(N) Fail to render assistance as provided by section 901.73 of the Revised Code.

901-19-05 Responsibilities of an exhibition sponsor.

(A) Every sponsor of an exhibition shall appoint a person as its records official. The records official shall receive and maintain the drug use notification forms filed under rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.

(1) The records official shall reject any drug use notification form that is incomplete, illegible or unsigned. At the close of the exhibition the records official shall turn over the drug use notification forms received by him to the sponsor.

(2) The sponsor shall maintain all drug use notification forms for a period of one year from the close of an exhibition. The drug use notification forms shall be made available to the department for inspection and copying upon request.

(3) Review the submitted drug use notification forms prior to the show for compliance with paragraph (I) of rule 901-19-06 and rule 901-19-07 of the Administrative Code.

(4) Review the submitted drug use notification forms for compliance with paragraph (B) of rule 901-19-38 of the Administrative Code if applicable.

(B) The sponsor of an exhibition shall provide information requested by the director on a form prescribed by the director at least ten days before the start of the exhibition.

(C) The sponsor of an exhibition shall, prior to the start of an exhibition, establish a method of identifying each animal in a terminal, partial terminal, and non-terminal show and maintain a chain of custody for each market livestock animal from the show through consignment to either slaughter or a licensed livestock facility for sale. The sponsor shall maintain a record of the identity of each animal and its chain of custody for a period of one year from the date of the last day of an exhibition.

(D) All county and independent agricultural societies and the Ohio expositions commission shall print Chapter 901:1-18 of the Ohio Administrative Code (Ohio's livestock health exhibition rules) in their premium book for the current year.

(E) The sponsor of a county or independent agricultural society or the Ohio exposition commission shall provide a livestock exhibitor or an adult advisor, upon request, a copy of Chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code and print in their current premium book the following notice:

"Chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code (Ohio's livestock tampering exhibition rules) will be made available to a livestock exhibitor or an adult advisor, upon request."

(F) If Chapter 901-19, of the Administrative Code (Ohio livestock tampering exhibition rules) for the upcoming show season are available prior to the sponsor's printing deadline, the sponsor may elect to include the entire text of these rules within their premium book.

(G) All other exhibitions shall provide to exhibitors, upon request, a copy of Chapters 901:1-18 and 901-19 of the Administrative Code and shall include the following statement in at least one written announcement prior to the beginning of the exhibition, "the exhibition's management will provide, upon request of an exhibitor, a copy of Chapters 901:1-18 (Ohio's livestock health exhibition rules) and 901-19 (Ohio's livestock tampering exhibition rules) of the Administrative Code.

901-19-06 Drug use notification.

(A) The exhibitor and the owner of an animal are jointly and severally responsible for completing and filing the drug use notification form in the manner required by this rule.

(B) The drug use notification form shall be signed by either the exhibitor or the owner. If the person signing the form is a minor child, the form may be cosigned by a parent or guardian of the minor child.

(C) A drug use notification form shall be completed for every animal from which a test sample is collected at every terminal and partial terminal or non-terminal show and for every animal that is administered a drug either immediately before or during an exhibition.

(D) The director shall require a drug use notification form to be completed for livestock including market steer, market hog, market lamb, veal calf, market dairy steer, market goats, market poultry, lactating dairy cattle and lactating goats exhibited in a junior

livestock show at a fair.

(E) The drug use notification form shall be filed with the records official prior to the show in which the animal is entered.

(F) The director may require a drug use notification form to be completed for livestock exhibited at any type of show including a non-terminal show.

(G) If at any time after the drug use notification form is filed the information on the form regarding drug use changes or if a drug is subsequently administered, an updated drug use notification form shall immediately be filed with the records official.

(H) No person shall submit an incomplete, illegible or unsigned drug use notification form.

(I) When a drug use notification form submitted to a records official for livestock is incomplete, illegible or unsigned neither the exhibitor nor the owner shall, until the defect is corrected:

(1) Receive any prizes or awards from shows in which the livestock was exhibited prior to the time the drug use notification form was to be filed.

(2) Participate in any shows or sales held subsequent to the time the drug use notification form was to be filed.

901-19-07 Quality assurance.

Sponsors shall require exhibitors at fairs sponsored by county or independent agricultural societies or the Ohio exposition commission to annually attend or complete a quality assurance program sponsored and conducted cooperatively by the exhibition sponsor, Ohio State University extension and FFA or agricultural commodity organizations before exhibiting terminal or partial terminal market livestock, including market poultry, lactating dairy cattle and lactating goats in a junior livestock show.

901-19-09 Drug residues in non-terminal show animals.

(A) A person may, notwithstanding paragraph (E) of rule 901-19-04 of the Administrative Code, show at a non-terminal show an animal which has been administered a drug provided they are in compliance with all of the following:

(1) The drug is a prescription drug or an extra label use of a drug and the drug is prescribed by a veterinarian pursuant to a valid veterinarian-client-patient relationship; and,

(2) The drug is administered or used only in accordance with label directions or the prescription; and,

(3) The drug is administered or used only for medical purposes; and,

(4) A drug use notification form is completed and filed in accordance with the applicable requirements of rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.

(B) Milk or other food obtained from livestock administered or treated with a drug and permitted to exhibit pursuant to paragraph (A) of this rule shall not be used for human consumption.

901-19-10 Testing requirements and test results.

(A) Urine, blood, tissue and other test samples shall be collected in accordance with the Ohio department of agriculture's protocol for the collection of livestock test samples at exhibitions. Test samples may be collected before, during or immediately after a show. Deviation from the protocol shall be noted.

(B) The director may at his discretion, collect any urine, blood, tissue or other test samples from exhibition animals at the time of slaughter.

901-19-11 Humane treatment of livestock.

(A) A person shall treat livestock in a humane manner and in accordance with acceptable commercial practices so as to protect the health, safety and welfare of the livestock.

(B) All exhibitors shall comply with and abide by the policy statement and "code of practices" of the Ohio Livestock Coalition.

901-19-12 Acceptable practices.

The following practices are deemed acceptable to protect and promote the health, safety, and welfare of livestock:

(A) Adding caffeine free soda pop, gelatin, or other sweeteners to drinking water in nominal amounts to encourage water consumption;

(B) Hoof trimming;

(C) Cosmetic dehorning in market class livestock;

(D) Using collodion as a teat sealant, but for no longer than eighteen hours;

(E) Adding molasses or other sweeteners to feed to encourage consumption;

(F) Properly administered and approved growth implants;

(G) Castration;

(H) Beak trimming;

(I) Dehorning;

(J) Tattooing;

(K) Hot or freeze branding;

(L) Humane ringing;

(M) Tail docking;

(N) Ear notching;

(O) Ear tagging;

(P) Shearing;

(Q) Drenching of lambs for a medical condition at an exhibition when diagnosed by a licensed veterinarian;

(R) Acceptable surgery, including clamps, bands and chemical castration.

(S) Application of ice, ice packs, cold packs or cold compresses prescribed to relieve heat stress or a medical condition diagnosed by a licensed veterinarian at an exhibition.

901-19-13 Unacceptable practices.

The following practices are detrimental to the health, safety, and welfare of livestock and are prohibited:

(A) Applying any electrical, mechanical, or other appliance to livestock repeatedly or for a prolonged time period in violation of section 313.2 of the United States code of federal regulations;

(B) Hitting, striking, beating, or otherwise impacting livestock that induces swelling or enhances, transforms or changes the true conformation, configuration, or appearance of the livestock;

(C) Plugging of teats;

(D) Sealing of teats using unapproved substances or for longer than eighteen hours using approved substances;

(E) Injecting material into udders or teats for non-medical purposes or otherwise artificially modifying the appearance or conformation of the udder or teat;

(F) Using ice, ice packs, cold packs or cold compresses internally or externally other than in accordance with paragraph (S) of rule 901-19-12 of the Administrative Code;

(G) Using a stomach tube or pump for any purpose other than for the relief of tympany or gas on the day of exhibiting.

(H) Drenching of lambs at an exhibition is prohibited except as permitted under paragraph (Q) of rule 901-19-12 of the Administrative Code.

901-19-19 Absolute liability.

(A) Both the exhibitor and the owner of livestock are absolutely liable to discipline under rule 901-19-21 of the Administrative Code for the presence of an unlawful substance in livestock and unacceptable practices done to livestock.

(B) If the exhibitor or the owner was a minor child at the time the unlawful substance or unacceptable practice was detected, the parent or guardian of the person shall also be absolutely liable to discipline under rule 901-19-21 of the Administrative Code for the presence of an unlawful substance in livestock and unacceptable practices done to livestock.

(C) The director or the sponsor in imposing discipline under paragraph (A) of this rule upon a person, shall mitigate the discipline imposed based upon one or more of the following facts if established.

(1) The person did not introduce the unlawful substance into the animal or do any unacceptable practices to the livestock;

(2) The person had no actual or constructive knowledge that the unlawful substance was introduced into the livestock or that unacceptable practices had been done to the livestock;

(3) The unlawful substance was not introduced into the livestock and the unacceptable practices were not done to the livestock through the person's negligence.

901-19-21 Disciplinary action.

(A) Any person who violates a provision of sections 901-70 through 901-76 inclusive, or 2925.04 of the Revised Code or any provision of this chapter, is subject to any of the following disciplinary actions:

(1) Disqualification from any exhibition;

(2) Disqualification of the exhibition livestock from any exhibition;

(3) Continuing education;

(4) Written letter or reprimand;

(5) Forfeiture or return of awards, prizes, premiums or proceeds;

(6) Pre-exhibition drug testing.

(B) Disqualification may include any or all shows and classes and may be for any number of years.

(C) Anyone who violates rule 901-19-07 of the Administrative Code may be given a letter or reprimand for the first offense.

901-19-31 Responsibilities of and assistance to junior fair exhibitors.

(a) A junior livestock show exhibitor shall be responsible for the continuous care, grooming, and preparation of the livestock entered in the junior livestock show.

(b) An exhibitor may receive assistance in the care, grooming, and

preparation of the livestock entered in the junior livestock show, provided that the assistance shall be limited to explanation or demonstration provided by the following:

- (1) Family members;
- (2) Household members;
- (3) Advisors or adult volunteers of 4-H or FFA in the exhibitor's club or county;
- (4) Vocational agriculture instructors;
- (5) County extension agents;
- (6) Department representatives;
- (7) Veterinarians;
- (8) Members of the exhibitor's 4-H club, FFA chapter, or other youth organizations;
- (9) Guest speakers of the 4-H, FFA, or other youth organizations.

(C) Any person not specified in paragraph (B) of this rule who provides assistance to a junior livestock show exhibitor shall register in writing with the sponsor. The responsibility to register rests with the exhibitor. An assistant may register for more than one exhibitor. Failure to register constitutes grounds for disciplinary action against the exhibitor. Assistance shall be limited to explanation and minimal demonstration.

901-19-32 Breed shows or classes.

In breed shows or classes, the rules of the breed association shall constitute accepted grooming practices for that breed's show or class, unless otherwise modified by a mandatory rule.

901-19-33 Prohibited grooming practices.

The following grooming practices are prohibited in market classes, non-breed shows or classes, and breed shows or classes unless those grooming practices are permitted under rule 901-19-32;

- (A) Using any substance to enhance or change the color of the livestock, including the livestock's hide or hooves;
- (B) Adding any substance externally to build up, change or alter the shape or conformation of the livestock, including by way of example but not limited to rope, false hair, graphite, hemp, and powders;
- (C) Pigmented grooming aides or materials.
- (D) Slick clipping or body shaving of market hogs except on the ears and tails.

901-19-34 Outstanding market project competition.

An exhibition may provide for an outstanding market project competition in one or more classes. The competition may include an evaluation of the livestock, demonstration of the exhibitor's showmanship abilities, and a skillathon or interview judging. The skillathon or interview judging may include demonstration of the exhibitor's knowledge of quality assurance principles, as set forth in an industry publication or in a publication such as the "caring for animals" handout or by viewing the "Caring for Animals Video" available from a county extension office.

901-19-35 Recognition of disciplinary actions.

(A) Disciplinary action by a sponsor against a person for a violation of sections 901.70 to 901.76, inclusive, or 2925.04 of the Revised Code or chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code or chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code shall be given full faith and credit and shall be honored at all exhibitions.

(B) A person who has been convicted of violating section 901-70 to 901-76, inclusive, or 2925.04 of the Revised Code shall be prohibited from participating in any exhibition for a minimum period of three years.

901-19-38 False, deceptive or unacceptable practices.

(A) Castration of livestock for purposes of this rule which exceed the following criteria is an unacceptable practice:

- (1) Cattle over eight months of age;
- (2) Swine over seventy-five pounds; or
- (3) Sheep over seventy-five pounds.

(B) Show any market livestock which has been treated in accordance with paragraph (A), (B) or (C) of 901-19-04 of the Administrative Code when a side effect of the drug conceals, enhances, transforms or changes the true confirmation or condition of the livestock.

(C) Any natural occurrence or surgical process which results in testicular or accessory reproductive tissue remaining in the body of exhibition livestock except rabbits and poultry.

901-19-39 Ownership Requirements.

(A) No person shall register, enter, or exhibit in a junior livestock exhibition any of the livestock listed in paragraphs (A)(1) to (A)(6) of this rule unless the person has owned the

livestock for not less than the length of time listed:

- (1) market steers - 150 days;
- (2) market dairy steers - 150 days;
- (3) market hogs - 60 days;
- (4) market lambs - 60 days;
- (5) market goats - 60 days; and
- (6) veal calves - 60 days.

(B) No person shall register, enter or exhibit livestock in a junior breeding livestock exhibition unless the person has owned the livestock for not less than sixty days or, if the livestock is registered, the livestock has been registered in the person's name for not less than sixty days.

(C) For any exhibition other than those listed in paragraphs (A)(1) to (A)(6) and paragraph (B) of this rule, the length of time a person shall own livestock before the person may register, enter or exhibit the livestock at an exhibition may be set by either the sponsor of the exhibition or a breed association.

REGULATION FOR RACING COMPETITION

959.05

Drugging animal prior to competition restricted

No person shall administer to any animal within forty-eight hours prior to the time that the animal competes at a fair or exhibition conducted by a county or independent agricultural society authorized under Chapter 1711. of the Revised Code or by the Ohio expositions commission any drug or medicament not promulgated pursuant to Chapter 3769. of the Revised Code or under rules of the society, in respect to a county or independent agricultural society, or of the Ohio expositions commission, in respect to the Ohio State Fair. This section does not apply to any horse racing meeting conducted under a permit issued pursuant to Chapter 4769. of the Revised Code.

FURTHER REGULATIONS CONCERNING INJURY/DEATH OF AN ANIMAL

959.99

(A) Whoever violates section 959.01, 959.18 or 959.19, of the Revised Code is guilty of a minor misdemeanor.

(B) Whoever violates section 959.02 of the Revised Code, if the value of the animal killed or the injury done amounts to less than three hundred dollars, is guilty of a misdemeanor of the second degree; if the value of the animal killed or the injury done amounts to three hundred dollars or more, such person is guilty of a misdemeanor of the first degree.

(C) Whoever violates section 959.03, 959.06, 959.12, 959.15, or 959.17 of the Revised Code is guilty of a misdemeanor of the fourth degree.

(D) Whoever violates division (A) of section 959.13 of the Revised Code is guilty of a misdemeanor of the second degree.

(E) Whoever violates section 959.14 of the Revised Code is guilty of a misdemeanor of the second degree on a first offense; on each subsequent offense such person is guilty of a felony of the fourth degree.

(G) Whoever violates section 959.16 of the Revised Code is guilty of a felony of the fourth degree.

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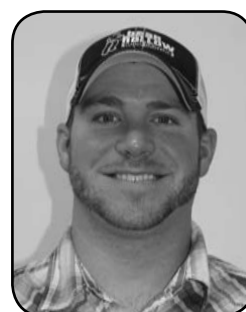

27. **Premier Breeder**, The breeder winning the most points, on not to exceed six animals, in the open single classes, bred and exhibited by them and/or other exhibitor.

THE PUREBRED DAIRY CATTLE ASSOCIATION SHOW RING CODE OF ETHICS

Adopted April 3, 2004

PDCA endorses this Show Ring Code of Ethics for all dairy breed shows and pledges its full cooperative support for its enforcement to show management, show judges, and the national breed associations.

The application of this Code of Ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this Code of Ethics. Dairy cattle exhibitors shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship.

It is recognized that there are certain practices in the proper care and management of dairy cattle that are necessary in the course of moving dairy cattle to and between shows that are advisable to keep them in a sound, healthy state so they might be presented in the show ring in a natural, normal condition. At all times, exhibition livestock shall be treated in a humane manner and in accordance with dairy quality assurance practices so as to protect the health, safety and welfare of the livestock and the consuming public. No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he or she knows, or has reason to suspect, is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease, disease, or illegal or non-approved use of drugs, medication and/or prohibited substance, or residue.

The position of the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association is that all animals presented for exhibition shall be in their natural conformation and structure, free of any alteration or modification by injection or internal or external administration of any substance or by any involvement in internal fitting.

Grooming and Preparation

Dairy cattle exhibitions are conducted under standards for evaluating conformation established by the PDCA Unified Score Card (1994), with specific breed characteristics taken into consideration by the show judge. In this connection, animals will be groomed and prepared for the judge's evaluation in order to display the animal's natural contour, conformation, performance and mobility. Specifically:

1. External applications of cosmetics that affect only appearance may be used, including by way of example hoof polishes and false switches.
2. The maximum allowable length of naturally growing hair anywhere on the topline is not to exceed 1". Exhibitors will be required to comply with this rule before the animal is allowed to enter the ring.
3. Addition of foreign objects, including but not limited to hair or hair substitutes, cloth or fiber, to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body is prohibited.
4. Externally sealing the teat end with a preparation that does not harm the animal's skin is permissible. Natural teat placement will be given preference over artificially positioned teats.

Violations: False, Deceptive or Unacceptable Practices

These practices are violations of the Code of Ethics and will be

reported to show management and may be reported to the respective national breed associations:

1. Misrepresenting the age and/or milking status of the animal for the class in which it is shown.
2. Treating the animal, particularly the udder, internally or externally:
 - a. with an irritant or counter-irritant,
 - b. using a device to artificially create or enhance the udder crease,
 - c. using other substances as detected by testing that causes changes in the udder to artificially improve the conformation.
 - d. plugging of teat canal with foreign substances.
3. Surgical or unethical insertion of any matter under the skin or into body cavities, performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body (e.g., administration of fluid via a stomach tube or other similar apparatus to fill the rumen), though not to preclude practices required or involved in normal management.
4. Criticizing or interfering with the judge, show management or other exhibitors while in the show ring or other conduct detrimental to the breed or the show.
5. Challenging, threatening or interfering with an ethics committee appointed by show management to monitor the animals on exhibit on the show grounds.

Exhibitor Responsibility

The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (hereinafter referred to as "Exhibitor") for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, milk, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Materials may also be collected by ultrasound and photographic methods and by direct examination of animal.

The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (the "Exhibitor") to have disciplinary action for violation of this Show Ring Code of Ethics taken by show management, the state in which the show occurs, and/or the national dairy breed association without recourse.

Show Ethics Committee

Each show should have an Ethics Committee. The make-up of this committee should include official breed representatives, representative(s) of show management (e.g., dairy cattle show superintendent, General Manager), the official show veterinarian, and Extension representative.

The Ethics Committee will be responsible for monitoring violations of the Show Ring Code of Ethics. The Ethics Committee will investigate the report of any violation and determine the accuracy of the allegation. The Ethics Committee will have the authority to inspect animals and related material to determine if violations have occurred.

Violations: Reporting and Investigation

Complaints of alleged violations can be reported to the breed

superintendent, the showsuperintendent, show management, and/or the Ethics Committee.

Before An Animal is Shown

If the Ethics Committee suspects that a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics will occur if the animal is shown, and that violation is reasonably well established before the animal is shown, the Ethics Committee will submit a report to show management.

Show management will discuss the violation with the Exhibitor:

1. If, at the Exhibitor's discretion, the animal in question is not shown, no violation will have occurred.
2. If the Exhibitor wishes to challenge that a violation occurred, he/she/they will have opportunity to appeal to the Ethics Committee. If its decision is not changed, the Exhibitor will be denied opportunity to exhibit the animal in question.

During and After An Animal is Shown

All animals are subject to examination during judging. The judge and Ethics Committee are instructed to examine the top five (5) animals in each class closely for violations of the Show Ring Code of Ethics. When a violation may have occurred, a milkout may be called for. This call may be by breed association rule, or by request of an authorized representative of the national breed association, the judge, the Ethics Committee, or show management.

If an animal is exhibited and a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics is subsequently suspected, investigated, and determined to have occurred, the violation will be reported to the Ethics Committee and show management for action. The Exhibitor will be notified of the violation and the supporting evidence and invited to defend or explain the allegations.

Violations are subject to the disciplinary provisions of show management, the state in which the show occurs, and the national dairy breed association. Sanctions may include any one, or combination of the following:

- forfeiture or return of awards, prizes, premiums or proceeds;
- written letter of reprimand to the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (the "Exhibitor");
- disqualification of the exhibition livestock from an exhibition;
- disqualification of the Exhibitor from the show;
- publication of offense.

Disqualification may include any or all shows and classes and may be for any number of years.

History: Adopted by PDCA in March 1969, revised March 1971, February 1977, February 1981, February 1986, February 1988, February 1989, February 1992, February 1993, November 1995, April 2002; April 2004.

About PDCA

The Purebred Dairy Cattle Association, Inc. is a federation of the national dairy breed registry associations serving breeders and owners of Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey, Milking Shorthorn and Red and White dairy cattle. PDCA and its member organizations promote the added value and profitability registered dairy cattle offer all dairy business owners.

OTHER PDCA RECOMMENDATIONS

- A. It is recommended that exhibitor and breeder be defined as follows: "Where a herd is registered in the names of different members of a family residing on one farm and where the herd is one unit, all entries may be considered as a single exhibitor for Premier Exhibitor, Premier Breeder, Dairy Herd, Junior Best Three Females, Breeder's Get of Sire, State Herd and Best Three Female Classes."
- B. For an exhibitor to be eligible to show an animal, the title of ownership of the exhibitor shall show on the registration certificate, and in the respective breed's permanent herd book or registry at the time of the exhibition. The registration papers should be checked for this purpose. It is not considered necessary to have a requirement which states that an animal must be owned for a given number of days in advance of the show.
- C. Substitutions within and outside of a class shall be permitted.
- D. Animals owned in partnership or by syndicate may be shown in the name of the partnership or syndicate only; except that at time of entry a determination shall be made that such animals will be shown in the name of one partner or syndicate member and the animals must be shown the same way in the group classes, including State Herd, as they are in the open individual classes.
- E. In states where the state breed association is carrying out a Parrish, District or Canton Show Program, it is recommended that the fol-

lowing class be added:

1. District Herd. Group to consist of eight animals including two females two years old or over, three females under two years of age, and three other females any age or one bull and two females. The cattle must be owned by not less than three exhibitors with no exhibitor furnishing more than three head.
 2. It is recommended that the state be divided into zones based upon distance from the state fair and that the money allocated to each district herd shown be on the basis of distance.
- F. It is recommended that 50% additional premium be paid to the milking classes to those cows with official milk records 30% above breed average. Records to be sent in with entry and all such cows be recognized individually in the show ring prior to hearing the judge's reasons.
 - G. In shows that do not have four milking cow classes, it is recommended that the three year old and four year old cow classes be combined to read, "Cow, three years old and under five years old."
 - H. If insufficient numbers of animals are entered in the Junior and Senior Two Year Old Cow classes, they should be combined into one Two Year Old class.
 - I. Blemishes. Evaluation of defects as listed on the Unified Dairy Cattle Score Card, published by the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association,

shall be used by the judge as his basis for placing or ruling out an animal shown with blemishes.

J. The fees and expenses offered to judges by show management should be commensurate with the size of the show and the amount of the premiums; and such fees should be agreed upon in writing prior to the show, at the time the invitation is extended to the judge.

- K. Definitions:
 - Best Three Females: any age, all are to have been bred by and at least one be owned by exhibitor. Each exhibitor limited to one entry.
 - Breeder's Get of Sire: Group to consist of four animals, either sex, not more than one bull, any age, the get of one sire, at least three to have been bred by exhibitor. Animals may be owned by one or more exhibitor. Sire must be named.
 - Senior Get of Sire: Group to consist of four (4) animals all sired by the same bull; either sex, but not more than one bull, and at least one must be two years of age or older. At least one must be bred and owned by the exhibitor, and each exhibitor is limited to one entry sired by the same bull.
 - Produce of Dam: Group to consist of two animals, any age, either sex, the produce of one cow. The dam must be named. Animals need not both be owned by one exhibitor.

SHEEP AND GOAT EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS

From The Ohio Department Of Agriculture

In order for Ohio to maintain Consistent State Status, Ohio sheep and goat exhibition will be considered Interstate Commerce.

A. Requirements for bringing sheep and goats into Ohio for exhibition, sale or breeding:

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 30 days of the opening date of the exhibition.
2. CVI must be signed by the owner and the veterinarian attesting to the following statement: "the sheep/goats in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie."
3. Show no evidence of infectious or contagious disease.
4. All sheep and goats must be identified with official USDA identification (USDA approved sheep tags, USDA approved tattoos, or identification in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program)
5. If the animal was born after January 1, 2002, it must have official USDA sheep/goat identification and be identified to the flock of birth.

B. Identification requirements for sexually intact sheep and goats moving within Ohio for exhibition including sales.

1. Official USDA sheep/goat identification in the form of an approved tag or tattoo.
2. If the animal was born after January 1, 2002, it must have official USDA sheep/goat identification and be identified to the flock of birth either by an eartag or tattoo placed by the owner of the flock of birth, or a tag or tattoo placed by the purchaser.
3. The identification requirements for flocks enrolled in the Voluntary Scrapie Flock Certification Program qualify as official USDA identification for exhibition and interstate movement; no other special identification is needed.

Ohio sheep and goat wethers that are less than 18 months of age exhibited in Ohio do not require USDA identification.

C. "Exhibition" means any public show of animals which is sponsored by or under the control of an Ohio county or independent agricultural society OR the Ohio State Fair OR which is assembled for a period which exceeds 36 hours OR contains animals of origins other than Ohio.

- Includes show lamb and goat sales, consignment sales of livestock and jackpot shows.

D. Responsibilities of an exhibition sponsor **(includes show lamb and goat sales, consignment sales of livestock and jackpot shows):**

1. Must have an approved veterinarian
2. Buildings, pens, stalls, rings and other enclosures in which animals are to be quartered for exhibition must be cleaned, and disinfected prior to the exhibition under the direction of the approved veterinarian.
3. The approved veterinarian is required to:
 - a. Examine CVI when required; and
 - b. Inspect livestock for infectious or contagious diseases within a reasonable time of arrival, and
 - c. Inspect livestock daily.
4. May order the immediate removal of any animal which, in the opinion of the approved veterinarian, places other animals at unacceptable risk of disease.
5. Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibit.

Sheep and goat sale records must be kept for 5 years. (see (F) below).

E. For livestock purchased at an exhibition: and moved out of state, an accredited veterinarian must issue a certificate of veterinary inspection before the animal moves across the state line.

F. The Code of Federal Regulations requires that sheep and goat sale records be kept for 5 years by the seller, the buyer and the exhibition/sale sponsor. The records must contain the following information:

1. Name and address of the seller, telephone number if available; and
2. Name and address of the buyer, telephone number if available; and
3. Official identification when required as indicated in part A and B of these requirements and
4. Date of sale.

NOTICE TO EXHIBITORS

1. Exhibitors of stock shall not occupy stall or pen, unless by permission.
2. No stall considered occupied unless the animal in same shall be exhibited for premium. All stalls and pens must be cleaned before leaving on last day of fair.
3. Exhibitors not residents of Auglaize County, shall be entitled to compete for premiums in departments.
4. Anything exhibited, that is not exhibited by the legitimate owner, and is awarded premium, forfeits the premium on said exhibit.
5. Premiums are offered for the best animals in the different classes in order to demonstrate the benefit of good breeding, feeding and care. Patrons of the Fair expect to see exhibits of the highest order; therefore, animals on exhibition must be in show condition, not necessarily fat, but in healthy, thrifty form and well groomed. Animals without quality and showing neglect will receive no premium.
6. Persons desiring space for the exhibit of articles in the art hall, or machinery department, not entered for competition, must make the same known to the Secretary at as early a date as possible, and give the name of articles and the space required. The Board reserves the right to dictate the class and kind of advertising matter used for free distribution by exhibitors. Nothing of this nature will be allowed that in any way interferes with concession sold. This rule is positive and will be enforced. The posting or tacking of any advertisement upon trees or building is positively prohibited and offenders will be punished according to law.
7. Any exhibitor or employee of same abusing or not treating with respect the Awarding Committee, Judge or Superintendent of Department during the awarding of premiums taken at this Fair, shall upon report to Superintendent, be deprived of his right to premium, also shall forfeit entrance money and stall rent.

PROTESTS AND APPEALS

"Protests must be made in writing, signed by party or parties making protest and filed with the Secretary by noon of day following award, accompanied by protest fee of \$100.00 which will be retained by the Auglaize County Agricultural Society if protest is not sustained.

The Secretary shall hear protests with the Superintendent of the department involved and if necessary other people will be involved as designed by the Secretary.

"All protests will be considered at a time set by the Secretary of the Auglaize County Agricultural Society and all parties will be notified."

8. Fifty percent of premiums on all livestock will be paid on the week following the Fair. The remainder will be prorated according to the receipts after all necessary expenses have been deducted. Premiums have always been paid in full.

9. All premiums not called for by December 1, of the current year marked on this Premium book, go back to the Associations.

10. Entry deadlines are listed for all departments and are to be followed as listed. For those not listed, entries close one week before the Fair in the livestock departments only; all other departments will remain open for exhibitors until noon, the first day of the Fair.

11. All articles must be entered in the owner's name to compete for premiums. Any special partnership made for the purpose of gaining premiums in any department will work a forfeit of the premiums.

12. The awarding committee will sign and return their books to the Entry Clerk as soon as they have completed a class. Said books to be the guide for the Entry Clerk to make up this book.

13. Blue ribbons or cards to be the emblem of first premium, red ribbons or cards the second, but in no case will a premium card or ribbon be a voucher for a premium.

14. Examine carefully the list of premiums, and determine for what premiums you will enter before you undertake to make your entries. Prepare your list at home to avoid errors, and cause no delay to others in making your entry.

15. No articles or animal shall be removed before the close of the exhibition without the permission of the Superintendent having charge of the department. Any articles or animal removed without such permission will forfeit all premiums that may be awarded them.

16. Only animals which have a registered certificate are eligible to register as purebred can receive premium as such. Those entering such animals for premiums are required to furnish certificate or register of application signed by the Secretary of their proper association.

17. No stables or feed stalls will be furnished any animal not entered for exhibition. Any animal not exhibited according to entry will be charged \$10.00 per day for the use of stall during the Fair. Payments for the stalls are to be made in all instances to the Superintendent of each department.

18. The competitors must appear in the ring promptly on the call of the Marshall, as Judges will be instructed not to delay their examinations and decision under any circumstance.

19. In the fine art hall and fruit hall the Superintendents will be present with competent committees to receive and take charge of all articles for exhibition and will assign space

and arrange them in their separate classes. All articles for exhibition must positively be in the hands of the committee by noon on the first day of the Fair, unless stated otherwise, and tags must be attached to articles by exhibitors.

20. All stock entered for premiums must be in good condition or it will be disqualified by the Judge.

21. All stalls and pens and aisles must be kept clean or forfeit the premium.

22. The officers of the Fair will take every precaution for the safe keeping of stock and articles on exhibition after their arrival and arrangements on the grounds but will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur. Exhibitors are requested to give every attention to their property. In no event will the Society of Board be responsible for any accident that may happen in or on the Fair Grounds or from any of the machinery or animals located therein.

The Signature Series is a late closing event with no nominating fee for horses 4 years old and up. Declarations for all Signature Series races shall be taken 3 days prior to the event. Please reference the speed program of each individual fair for conditions.

A cash bonus of \$2,000 for 1st, \$1000 for 2nd and \$500 for 3rd will be awarded for each gait to the horse with the most points accumulated during the series. If a horse changes ownership during the series, the owner at the time the series is over is eligible for this cash bonus.

Accumulated points remain with the horse. When horses are tied in summary for total points, all horses are considered a winner and the place monies are added together and divided equally.

The point system is as follows: Starting-5, Win-5, Second-4, Third-3, Fourth-2, Fifth-1. Points for cash are awarded at all Fairs participating in the Signature Series including Delaware.

Points accumulated October 2018 at Lancaster, Ohio, Fairfield County Fair, will be the starting point of the 2019 Signature Series.

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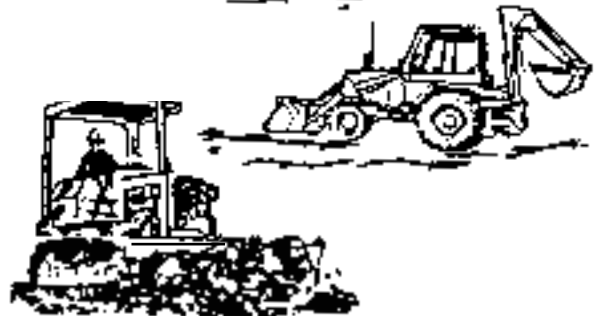

3. Each school system must indicate in writing to the County Superintendent of School if it intends to exhibit. Such notice must be filed on or before **May 25, 2019**.
4. **Set-up to be finished before Saturday morning, July 27, 2019, in the Fruit Hall**
5. Displays can be removed on **Sunday, August 4, 2019 after 9:00 A.M.**
6. The building will be locked at 10:00 p.m. every night of the fair.
7. The Auglaize County Fair Board will not be responsible for lost or stolen items, or damage to items placed on exhibit. However, every precaution will be taken by the Fairboard to protect the school exhibits.

F. Each exhibitor is allowed only one entry per lot with the exception of any not listed classes where two entries of different varieties will be allowed.

G. Any Exhibitor wishing to take home wine after show judging must bring a bottle to replace the entered one for display.

SHOW RULES FOR BEER

A. Exhibitors must have a list of ingredients taped to bottle

B. Beers must be submitted in clear, green or blown glass bottles that were made to hold beer and are closed with crown style caps, rubbered stoppers or screw caps.

C. Beers shall be judged on color, clarity, bouquet, taste, complexity, body, balance, intensity, and finish.

D. Each exhibitor is allowed only one entry per lot.

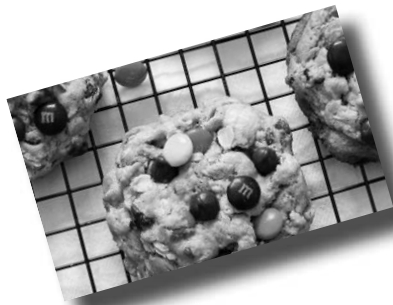
