

2026 Auglaize County Fair Campground Rules



1. **Campers may arrive 6:00AM Wednesday, July 29th, 2026.**
2. Camper permit fees cover the time period from Wednesday before fair to the Monday following fair. All campers must be removed by **MIDNIGHT** on the Monday following the fair unless prior approval.
3. Absolutely no ATV's, golf carts, rollerblades, skateboards, bicycles, etc. are allowed on the grounds.
4. **All occupants of any sleeping unit must be registered with the Fair Grounds Office. Any person found in the unit after curfew, not registered, may cause removal of the entire unit as soon as arrangements can be made.**
5. **All music, noise or any other disturbances must stop at MIDNIGHT, or violators will be subject to removal by Sheriff's deputies.**
6. The Fair Manager has the right to assign all spaces. Each camper will occupy a numbered space with the **permit legible from the drive** and must occupy the space assigned by the Fair Manager. The Fair board reserves the right to take any amount of space from any area that might be needed in order to make improvements to existing conditions. If this happens, campers will be notified 30 days in advance.
7. Trailers, campers, trucks, or other vehicles used for living purposes during the Fair must be parked in designated areas only. Owners of vehicles must secure a Parking Pass from the Fairgrounds Office prior to parking vehicles.
8. Electric hookups are to be with proper receptacles only and only one hook up per camping unit.

You must use only UL approved heavy duty ground, 3 wire cords.

9. There will be no cooking out of the camper except in containers designed for such use. No ground fires in or out of fire pits allowed.
10. No alcoholic beverages will be allowed in areas outside of camping unit. In agreement with the State of Ohio Law, alcoholic consumption will not be permitted under the age of 21.
11. You are liable for any damage to electrical or water lines at your campsite.
12. No parking permitted in the barn areas, all fire lanes are to be kept open at all times. Any disturbances requiring the intervention of the Sheriff's Dept., will, after one warning constitute reason for dismissal from the grounds and loss of camping privileges in the future.
13. The Auglaize County Agricultural Society will not be held responsible for loss or damage to any person's personal property or belongings, or parked vehicles, while utilizing the facility under this agreement. The Lessee will indemnify and save harmless the Lessor and any of its officers or employees from any claim or injury to life, person or property. The Society reserves the final, absolute right to interpret these rules and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences arising out of, or in connected with, or incidental to, the Auglaize County Agricultural Society; and also the right to amend or add to these rules as their judgment may determine.

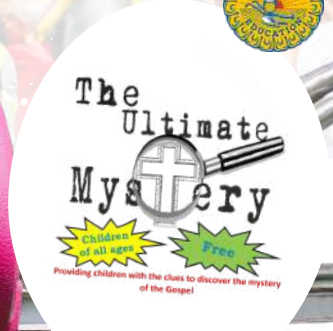

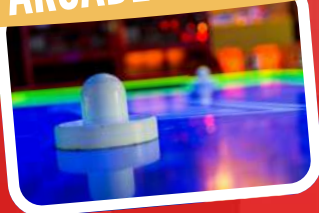

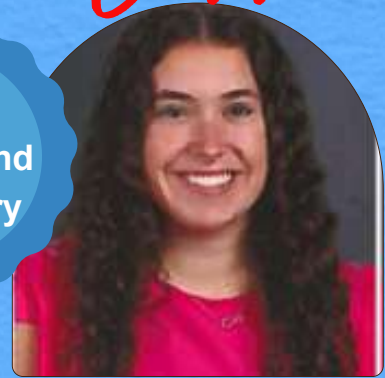

3. FCCLA Chapters, Vocational Family and Consumer Sciences, Family and Consumer Sciences classes
4. Juvenile Granges
5. Farm Bureau Youth
6. Boy and Girl Scout Troops

Junior Fair Eligibility: Youth who comply with the rules of the Junior Fair as given in this book and are regularly enrolled in any of the above named organizations are eligible to exhibit.

To be eligible to participate in the junior livestock shows or activities, exhibitor must be a current member in good standing of either Ohio 4-H or FFA. Member must be officially enrolled by the county deadline in the appropriate project corresponding to the class/animal they are exhibiting.

FFA members may show in only one Junior Fair as an FFA member regardless of location of member or Chapter. FFA recommends that a member exhibit in the county the Chapter is located rather than residence of the individual. 4-H members may show in only one Junior Fair as a 4-H member. 4-H member will exhibit in the county of 4-H membership. A member could show as a 4-H member in one county, as a FFA member in another county. Members exhibiting through both FFA and 4-H must carry separate projects and animals. The following are recognized by the Junior Fair as separate projects: Lactating Dairy Cow and Dairy Heifer/Calf not milking; Sheep Breeding and Market Lamb; Beef Breeding and Steer; Swine Breeding and Market Hog (not a part of a breeding litter).

All exhibits must be the same the member carried as projects. A member may not enter in a department in which they do not have an official project. If unauthorized substitution is attempted all premiums and other privileges of the exhibitor will be forfeited.

Age Limitations for Junior Fair Exhibitors: To participate in any Auglaize County Junior Fair activities, a person must comply with the following maximum age requirement that states that any youth must not have passed his or her 19th birthday as of January 1 of the current year. Members turning 19 on January 1 of the current year will be eligible for that year's fair.

Fair participation: Since fair participation is optional, the Ag Society and Junior Fair Board are not responsible for the lost, stolen, or damaged items.

Code of Conduct: Any exhibitor showing misconduct or poor showmanship in a judging area, show ring, show area, exhibit area or animal barn will have full forfeiture of premium to that division by decision of the Junior Fair Board.

Parking Regulations: A vehicle pass is necessary to enter the fair-grounds. There is no parking around the barns.

Fire Lane: All buildings housing livestock will have lanes 30' wide at all exits with no parking in this area. These lanes may be used for delivery and pick up but no parking. Fire lanes will be marked and vehicles parking in this area will be towed away.

Premium Payment: All Junior Fair premiums will be paid at pre-fair judging or during fair week. Members not receiving their premium at the designated time must request the premium payment by completing a form. The form is submitted to the Junior Fair office by noon Thursday of the fair. Requested premiums not picked up during the fair will be put in the 4-H club packets the last day of fair. Members not picking up premiums at the designated time or requesting them during the fair will not receive premium money.

Fair Passes: Junior Fair passes will be issued to only to junior fair members exhibiting in the fair. Information regarding the distribution of junior fair passes will be announced prior to the fair.

Commercial/business signs: no commercial/business signs may be posted in buildings/barns without permission of the Ag Society.

PROTEST POLICY: Protests must be made in writing, signed by party making protest and filed with the Executive Committee of the Junior Fair board by noon of the day following the award. This written protest must be accompanied by a protest fee of \$150.00 in cash which will be retained by the Junior Fair Board if protest is not sustained. The Executive Committee shall hear protests with the superintendent of the department involved.

For further information governing Junior Fair, see rules under the separate Junior Fair division.

GENERAL RULES ON ENTRIES AND EXHIBITS:

1. All livestock entries, including showmanship, must be made by the exhibitor online by July 1. FFA Shop & Crop entries should be made by the exhibitor with their ag teacher. No one can exhibit in any livestock (including dogs) or FFA class without entry. There are no entries required in the 4-H Special Interest, Clothing and Nutrition departments.

ALL ENTRIES ARE TO BE SUBMITTED BY JULY 1. If entries are submitted between July 2 and July 8, there will be a \$10.00 cash fee per entry, regardless of reasons or lateness. If entries are submitted between July 9 and July 16, there will be a \$25.00 cash late fee per entry, regardless of reason or lateness. NO entries will be accepted after July 16 for any reason. This rule applies to showmanship entries (no showmanship entries will be accepted during the fair). The entry will not be official until the fine is paid in full in cash. Late entry information will be submitted to the Junior Fair Board along with the cash fee.

2. All entry corrections must be done by noon Saturday before the opening day of the fair. This rule does not allow for adding additional late entries, but correction of an entry. All entries are final in all departments as of this deadline.

3. Exhibits must be on the grounds by the following times to receive premiums unless granted permission for late arrival:

- a. FFA Shop & Crop - Friday, July 31, 11:00 a.m.
- b. 4-H Booths - Monday, August 3, 2:00 p.m.
- c. School Booths - Monday August 3, 8:00 a.m.
- d. Livestock - Saturday, August 1, 8:00 a.m.

4. Entries in each class are limited to two per individual except where stated in class rules.

5. Entries are free if confined to junior classes.

6. The privilege is reserved to combine classes in case of lack of entries.

7. Still projects in the Exhibit and FFA Buildings will be released on Sunday after the fair between 8:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m. Anyone failing to comply with this dismissal time without acceptable reason or prior approval will be fined \$50.00, payable in cash by December 1 of the current year. If an exhibitor fails to pay their fine, they will be ineligible for placings the following year.

GENERAL RULES REGARDING LIVESTOCK:

1. All livestock project animals must have been in possession and cared for by the individual exhibitor on and after May 1 of the current year.

Exceptions:

Market Beef – ownership date is the original scheduled date of winter weigh-in

Yearling horses - ownership date is January 1 of current year

Market rabbits - ownership date is June 20 of current year

Market chickens - ownership date is June 30 of the current year.

Breeding project animals may be owned or leased. Lease agreements and other paperwork must be turned in by the May 1 possession date for livestock. The paperwork must include the cover sheet, pictures and an actual lease agreement written and signed by the owner, the exhibitor and parent/guardian. Market animals (including feeder calves) cannot be leased and must be fully owned by the exhibitor. Proof of ownership may be requested at any time.

2. Ownership of any animal will be considered lost if, after May 1 of the current year, the animal has been consigned or through any auction or any other type of transaction. If questions regarding ownership arise the exhibitor will be asked to produce any of the following: registration papers, bill of sale, or valid receipt.

3. To be eligible for Junior Fair premiums and awards each exhibitor must have in his/her possession that official project animal(s) that he/she is taking, and the exhibitor must feed, train, groom this same animal (or animals) from the time the project starts until it is completed.

4. Tampering or misrepresentation as to the breeding, age, ownership, and other irregularity in showing will be exposed and any premiums, trophies, awards, or sale money won by the exhibitor may be withheld.

5. In shows outside of "junior livestock show/exhibitions," a project animal may only be shown by the youth exhibitor or family members. If shown by a youth outside of the immediate family, this constitutes a change in ownership. County exceptions are noted below in rule 6.

6. Exhibitors must show their own project. The exceptions are a family emergency, one member with two animals in the same class, a member is showing in two departments, and the classes are running simultaneously, a member is physically incapacitated and unable to show. In a case of emergency during the judging, the board can approve an alternate showman immediately. In all situations, the second showman must be an Auglaize County Junior Fair member (not a 4-H Cloverbud). All exceptions must be approved by the Junior Fair Board prior to show or judging.

7. The Junior Fair Board requests that all junior fair exhibitors observe the designated arrival and dismissal times. Animals coming from another fair/show must obtain permission from the board for early/late arrival. Requests should be submitted by July 15. Animals arriving late from another show/fair will have 24 hours to be on grounds after dismissal from the other show. Junior Fair Board holds the right to remove any exhibitor who violates the arrival time.

8. Anyone failing to comply with the arrival or dismissal times without acceptable reason or prior approval will be fined \$50.00 per entry at the time of violation. In addition, the exhibitor will be fined \$50 per entry for each additional 24 hour period that passes from the time of departure until the official release time. Fine is payable in cash by December 1 of the current year. If an exhibitor fails to pay their fine, they will be ineligible for placings the following year. The Junior Fair Board reserves the right to contact show officials to confirm entry, arrival, and dismissal times.

9. All animals must be in their assigned stalls/pens/designated areas from 10:00 p.m. until 11:00 p.m. the last day of fair. Animals not in their assigned pens/stalls/designated areas during that hour may be subject to the penalty for unapproved early departure.

10. In cases of emergency situations, exhibitors must be given permission by the fair officials before any animal can leave the grounds.

11. Due to conflicting dates with the Ohio State Fair, every effort will be made to allow early release/late arrival so youth may show at both fairs. Exhibitors planning to show at both fairs should notify the Junior Fair Board to avoid penalty.

12. In the case of state fair livestock entries, projects of the exhibitor(s) and immediate family members may be released early if prior approval is granted by the Junior Fair Board. Proof of state fair entry must accompany the request. The Junior Fair Board reserves the right to contact show officials to confirm entry, arrival, and dismissal times. For all other departments, members participating in state fair will be granted an early release for their project only.

13. All exhibits and stall assignments will be determined by the department superintendents and assigned prior to the fair. All exhibitors shall abide by these assignments. Exhibitors needing special stall or pen arrangements must submit these requests with their fair entries by July 1. Requests after July 1 may be considered but not accommodated. Exhibitors moving assignments without prior approval, will be required to move back to their original assigned area. Exhibitors refusing to abide by the Junior Fair Board's assignment will be asked to remove their projects from the fairgrounds.

14. All junior fair livestock must be housed in their assigned pens, including overnight. Beef animals may be housed overnight in the designated tie out area. Market animals must be in their correct pens during tagging and loadout. Violations will result in a \$25.00 fine being deducted from the exhibitor's sale check.

15. Animals housed in the barns must be entered in the junior fair, no extra animals may be housed. Companion/support animals are not permitted in the barns. All other junior fair rules regarding entry, exhibition and sale apply.

16. Livestock health requirements for the Junior Fair are the same as for open class exhibitors (see rules and regulations for the open class). Health certificates are to be presented to the veterinarian in charge.

17. The following rule applies to market beef, market goat, market hog, market lamb and feeder calf exhibitors: A minimum of one project animal must be registered in the individual exhibitor's name at winter/spring weigh-in to be eligible to enter and show that specie at the fair. This animal may only be entered, shown and sold in that individual's name. This animal could only be transferred to another exhibitor's name using the livestock substitution rule and would not be eligible for placings if substituted. The remaining animals registered at winter/spring weigh-ins may be listed in the family's name. These "family" animals must be owned by the exhibitor or immediate family member (as defined by the Ohio Administrative Code for livestock exhibition (901-19-01 | Definitions). For winter/spring weigh-in: each family may register the maximum number of animals per department rules. For example, for steers – 3 youth in a family could register a maximum of 9 steers (3 youth x 3 steers per child), sheep and goat - 3 youth in a family could register a maximum of 15 lambs or goats (3 youth x 5 lambs/goats per child). Fair weigh-in: the designated exhibitor of the family shared animal must be stated when the animal is weighed at the fair. After fair weigh-in, this animal could only be transferred to another exhibitor's name using the livestock substitution rule and would not be eligible for placings. No animal can be exhibited (entered or shown) under more than one exhibitor's name.

18. To be eligible for Junior Fair Livestock Sale, a market animal must have been shown in the appropriate market class in the Junior Fair.

19. Livestock substitution policy: If a project animal dies or is physically impaired and cannot be shown safely, another animal may be substituted. The Junior Fair Board must be notified of and approve of all substitutions. Failure to do so will result in the forfeiture of premiums. The substituted animal may be shown only for a project grade, no placings, or awards. Substituted animals may place in showmanship classes. Market animals will be registered in an individual child's name and may not be transferred to a sibling after that time. Transfer to another exhibitor, including a sibling, sibling would be considered a substitution, and this rule would apply.

20. Exhibits must be kept clean. Periodic checks will be made by superintendent in charge. All feeding and cleaning is to be done by 10:00 a.m. daily. Cleaning cannot be done during shows and sales. Dirty pens will be tagged, and conditions corrected. Exhibitors having their pens tagged three (3) or more times during fair week, will be fined \$50.00, payable in cash by December 1 of the current year. Each pen left unclean after the conclusion of the fair on Sunday by 12:00 p.m. will be assigned a \$50 fine to the corresponding exhibitor. If an exhibitor fails to pay any of these fines, they will be ineligible for placings the following year.

21. Exhibitors must care for their animals until the animals are loaded off the fairgrounds. For market animals, if it is determined at load out that the animal has lacked food and/or water, a penalty will be deducted from the value of the animal: \$25.00 for steers, lambs, goats and hogs, \$10.00 for rabbits and poultry. This decision will be made by the packer and representatives from the Sale Committee. For breeding animals, if it is determined that the animal has lacked food and/or water, the exhibitor will not receive a fair pass the following year. This will be the decision of the Junior and Senior Fair Board superintendents of the department.

22. Pens may not be cleaned while the sale animals are being loaded out to the packers. Violators will be fined \$30.00.

23. Grade livestock will show with the breed they must closely resemble unless otherwise noted.

24. During junior shows and sales, exhibitors must wear long pants or skirts (no shorts). Tops should cover the shoulder area, no tops with straps are permitted. Junior fair exhibitors shall not wear farm shirts or shirts with any advertising while showing in the junior shows or sales, 4-H club and FFA chapter shirts are permitted. No hats are permitted, except for those designated by individual departments. The Junior Fair reserves the right to ask exhibitors to change clothing that they feel is offensive or inappropriate.

25. There are no weight limits imposed for sale purposes. There will be weight limits for the following market animals for show purposes only:
Market Beef - 900 pounds and over

Hogs - 220 pounds and over

Lambs - 90 pounds and over

Broilers - 4 pounds and over per bird

Rabbits - 4 pounds and over per rabbit

Goats, dairy and Boer – 40 pounds and over

Under weight classes will be placed 1 through 5 BUT will not be eligible to compete for champion. Only animals meeting the above weight requirements will be eligible for champion.

26. No junior fair livestock are permitted in the midway area or in the campgrounds. Animals should be walked back in the livestock barn area only.

27. Tampering and/or misrepresentation as to breeding, age, ownership, and any other irregularity in showing will be considered fraud and deception. Any premiums, trophies, awards, or sale money won by such exhibitor will be withheld.

28. To maintain a high degree of confidence in the livestock shows, the Auglaize County Junior Fair Board, reserves the right to disqualify any animal that has been fitted in an unethical manner. Unethical fitting means to alter or change the natural appearance, weight, musculature or conformation of an animal in an unnatural or artificial manner, including but not limited to, the removal of animal tissue or body part, to cut or tear the hide, to cover, dye or color the hair or hide (NO paint or pigmented products on any market animal), to add artificial tail heads, switches, polls, hair, or heels, or to administer, feed, give or inject any substance or drug to an animal exhibited, except when medically necessary or when drug used has been approved for such use by the Food and Drug Administration or United States Department of Agriculture. Non pigmented adhesives are allowed. First offense, violators will receive a letter of warning from the Ag Society. Second offense, all animals and the exhibitors involved are barred from competition for one year. Third offense, all animals, and the exhibitors involved, giving evidence of such treatment will be barred for life from competition at the Auglaize County Fair. Please read each department's rules for specie specific information.

Should fraud or deception, and deception, and proof, as determined by the Auglaize County Junior Fair Board, be discovered after the animal or animals have been shown and prior to the sale, such animal(s) shall not be permitted to sell. The animals placing next in line shall move up.

Should violation be discovered after the sale, all sale money shall be returned to the buyer and the animal or carcass returned to the exhibitor. All placings in show will stand. No animals will move up.

29. The drenching of any livestock at the Auglaize Co. Fair is prohibited. Should a violation be discovered, the violator will be punished as outlined in the previous rule.

30. If any Junior Fair project animal is suspected of being abused, malnourished, or mistreated; the Junior Fair Board reserves the right to have the animal inspected by the fair veterinarian. If the veterinarian determines that the animal has been mistreated, the result will be disqualification from competition.

31. Any exhibitor pulling their animal from competition once they have entered the show area or any exhibitor who stood first or second in their class does not return for the championship class, the exhibitor will be disqualified from the show and will forfeit all premiums and awards won at the current year's fair.

32. Members exhibiting market beef, feeder calves, market hogs, market lambs, market goats, market rabbits, market chickens, lactating goats and lactating dairy cattle must participate in a Quality Assurance program or test out of the program prior to June 10. Members, ages 8 to 11 (as of January 1 of the current year), enrolled for the first time in a QA required project, must have a parent attend an in-person quality assurance program with them. Members may attend a production animal youth quality assurance program, which is species sponsored - a certificate must be issued in the junior fair member's name. A copy of this certificate must be filed by June 10. If a parent is required to attend, they must submit proof of attendance as well. Members, 12 years and older (as of January 1 of the current year), including those enrolled for the first time in a QA required project, may choose to attend a program or use the state test out option. Members not completing this requirement will not be allowed to enter the Junior Fair. Members may complete the online YQCA training program with the exception that first year members, ages 8-11, (as of Jan. 1) must attend an in-person QA program with a parent. The YQCA test out option is not permitted.

33. Exhibitors will follow these rules for bedding:

Beef - wood products will be furnished for \$10 per animal. No dyed products may be used.

All other species - wood shavings. No dyed products or mulch may be used. Goat and sheep exhibitors may request permission from the department chair to use straw. If unacceptable products are used, the exhibitor will be given one notification by the Junior Fair Board to replace the bedding with acceptable materials. If the problem is not corrected after 24 hours, the exhibitor will be fined \$25 per day per pen. The Ag Society asks that exhibitors please dispose of all bedding in locations provided.

34. All grand and reserve champions will be tested according to Ohio law. All grand and reserve champion samples will be collected in an area designated by the Ag Society. Collection will be done under the supervision of a veterinarian appointed by the Ag Society.

35. Liability for livestock: in consideration for exhibiting livestock at the Auglaize County Fair, on the grounds at 1001 Fairview Drive, Wapakoneta, Ohio 45895, I understand that for myself and those under my leadership we hereby will covenant and agree to save said Society harmless from any and all claims of every type, character and description pertaining to or growing out of the usage of said premises, and furthermore, covenant and agree that every effort will be made to conduct exhibiting of animals in a lawful and business manner and any activity pertaining to livestock upon said premises will be handled in such a manner as to avoid injury or damage to the public or the property of said Society.

36. The Junior Fair Board reserves the right to dismiss an animal from the show area if that animal becomes uncontrollable and becomes dangerous to the public, other exhibitors, or animals in the show.

37. All market livestock sold through the junior fair livestock sale are required to be sent to harvest. In the case of illness or injury, the fair veterinarian will determine how the animal will be handled. If an animal declared as terminal is treated and has a withholding time, it will be quarantined until the withholding time has elapsed and then sent to harvest.

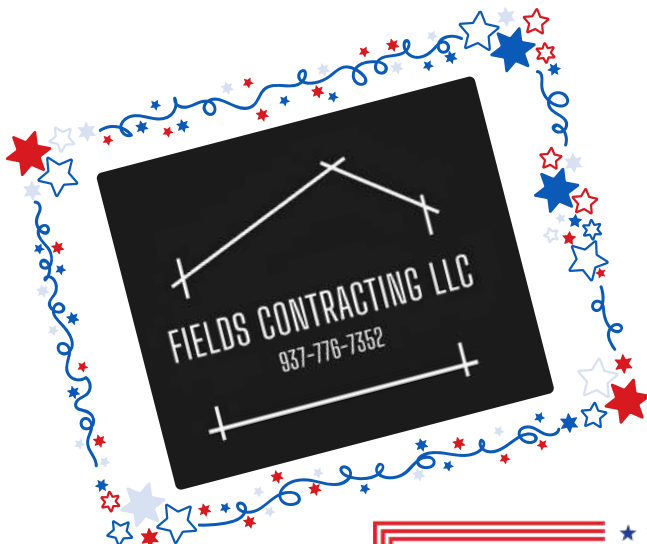
38. If an animal is removed from the fairgrounds without authorization, the following penalties will apply: the exhibitor will be banned from further competition for the next 2 years of their junior fair eligibility. If a market animal is removed from the fairgrounds without authorization after the sale, in addition to the above penalty, the exhibitor will forfeit all premium monies. The premium monies will be returned to the sale buyer with a letter of explanation.

39. Each exhibitor showing a market animal must take one animal through the Junior Fair Livestock Sale. Junior exhibitors are limited to one entry in the sale, except by exhibitors having more than one champion or reserve champion market animal. It will be the exhibitor's option to sell their remaining market animals to the packer or take them home.

40. Each animal crossing the scale must be declared terminal or nonterminal at the fair weigh-in. All declarations are final at weigh-in. If an animal is not declared terminal/ nonterminal at the weigh-in, it will be considered terminal. An animal's declaration (sale, terminal or nonterminal) at the fair weigh-in may not be changed unless it is chosen as a grand or reserve champion or under the guidance of the fair veterinarian. Grand or reserve champions will be designated as terminal. If an exhibitor has other animals, their designation will not be changed, regardless of specie. See sale rules for more details on terminal/ nonterminal designation.

41. The duties of the Fair Veterinarian are as follows:

- a. Examine animals upon arrival/check-in.
- b. Retrieve required samples from the grand and reserve champions.
- c. Examine any animal that has died before it is removed from the grounds.
- d. Determine if an animal is to be released from the fairgrounds due to illness or injury.
- e. If an animal becomes ill or injured at the fair, the individual owner/ exhibitor must contact the fair veterinarian through the Jr. Fair Office; the vet will charge a fee to the owner/exhibitor for services rendered. Any medication or treatment of livestock, whether by a licensed veterinarian or under a veterinary/client relationship, must be documented by a Drug Use Notification Form and reported.

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Junior Fair Sale Rules and Regulations

1. The 2026 Junior Fair Livestock Sales will be:

Friday, August 7, 9:00 a.m., Piehl Arena – Beef, Rabbits, Goats
Saturday, August 8, 9:00 a.m., Piehl Arena – Dairy Milk, Poultry, Hogs, Sheep

2. Each exhibitor showing a market animal must take one animal through the Junior Fair Livestock Sale. Junior exhibitors are limited to one entry in the sale including market beef, lambs, goats, hogs, rabbits, chickens, and milk; except by exhibitors having more than one champion or reserve champion market animal. All animals sold through the sale ring must go to harvest.

3. All champion and reserve champion market animals must sell as listed in rule #2. All champion and reserve champion including market beef, lambs, goats and hogs will be harvested by Kah Meats and be viewed as part of the carcass review. Grand and reserve champion market pens of rabbits, single fryers, market broilers and roasters must be harvested but will not be used as part of the carcass review.

4. This rule applies to market beef, lambs and goats. Animals must have been identified at the winter/spring weigh-in to compete in the junior fair shows. Weights from other scales will not be accepted. Animals must be present at the designated date, hours, and location to be weighed and identified unless one of the following situations occurs. If an animal is ill and cannot be present at the designated date, hours and location, the exhibitor must contact the Junior Fair Board immediately. The exhibitor will be required to present a veterinarian's certification of the illness before arrangements will be made to identify the steer. If there is a family emergency on the day of the weigh-in and the animals cannot be identified, the family must present their situation to the Junior Fair Board. The board will determine if the animals will be identified and if penalties will be imposed. If an animal is entered in another show on the day of weigh-in, the family must present proof of entry prior to the weigh-in. The sale committee will make alternate arrangements for weighing and identifying the animal that is entered in the alternate show. Family will be required to provide proof of participation for the animal entered at the alternate show. All other animals belonging to the family that are not entered in the alternate show, must be present at the designated weigh in date and hours.

5. All market animals will be weighed during the designated fair weigh in times.

6. Order of sale will be determined randomly by computer for all market species. Eartags are for identification only.

7. A sale list will be prepared from those animals that are shown as beef, market hogs, market lambs, market goats, market rabbit pens and poultry pens. Junior fair exhibitors must notify Sale Committee at time of weigh-in which animal will be sold.

8. Each exhibitor showing a market animal must take one animal through the Junior Fair Livestock Sale. Junior exhibitors are limited to one entry in the sale including beef, lambs, goats, hogs, rabbits, chickens and milk; except by exhibitors having more than one champion or reserve champion market animal. It will be the exhibitor's option to sell their remaining market animals to the packer or take them home.

9. Each animal crossing the scale must be declared terminal or nonterminal at the weigh-in. All declarations are final at weigh-in. If an animal is not declared terminal/ nonterminal at the weigh-in, it will be considered terminal. An animal's declaration (sale, terminal or nonterminal) at the weigh-in may not be changed unless it is chosen as a grand or reserve champion or under the guidance of the fair veterinarian. Grand or reserve champions will be designated as terminal. If an exhibitor has other animals, their designation will not be changed, regardless of species.

10. Animals declared as nonterminal will be identified by the Sale Committee. Nonterminal animals will observe the designated release times. Nonterminal hogs will be released Friday between 1:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. and Friday after sale through 9:00 p.m. All other species of nonterminal (home) will be released at 11:00 p.m. Saturday and must be removed by Sunday 2:00 p.m. 11. Members showing market beef must provide a good rope halter for after the sale. Please don't expect buyers of animals to lead them with makeshift halters of baling twine. If the buyers return the halter to the member, this is their favor to the exhibitor.

12. Members will receive payment for the animals when sufficient sale monies have been received. Commission and check-off money where appropriate will be taken out of all checks. The commission for selling junior fair livestock as determined by the Sale Committee will be up to 4 percent of the premium bid for all species, including dairy milk. This is for sale expenses, promotion and appreciation banner.

13. Exhibitor will stand the loss of any condemned carcass. Exhibitor will stand the cost of any extra processing fees passed on by the packer.

14. All members will be responsible for feeding, watering and general care of their animals until loaded by the packer or Sale Committee. For market animals, if it is determined at load out that the animal has lacked food and/or water, a penalty will be deducted from the value of the animal: \$25.00 for beef, lambs, goats and hogs, \$10.00 for rabbits and poultry. This decision will be made by the packer and representatives from the Sale Committee.

15. Animals will only cross the scale one time at the weigh-in.

16. Animals must be able to walk across the scale on their own to be weighed, shown and sold. Incapacitated animals will not be weighed.

17. A gallon of milk will be auctioned, and the proceeds divided among the junior fair dairy cattle exhibitors.

18. Members must be present to sell their own animal unless prior permission has been given by junior fair superintendent in charge of that department. If permission is granted, another Auglaize Co. junior fair member may walk the animal through the sale ring. If permission is granted for a specie not selling live animals, exhibitor is expected to provide a picture of their project animal for the other junior fair exhibitor to hold in the sale ring. Dairy members must be present at the gallon of milk sale to share in the proceeds unless prior permission is granted as stated above.

19. If a member is not present to sell their animal and no permission has been granted for another exhibitor to sell that animal, then the animal will not be sold through the sale ring. The exhibitor will receive the packer bid only, no premium bids.

20. All animals sold in the sale ring must go to harvest. Animals sold through the sale ring must go to the designated packer and may not be taken home by the buyer or returned to the junior fair exhibitor.

21. All market animals sold through the sale must be sent to harvest to the designated packer. Market animals not sold through the sale may be sent to the packer or declared nonterminal. Exhibitors must notify the Sale Committee at weigh-in about this animal's destination.

22. All market livestock sold through the junior fair livestock sale are required to be sent to harvest. In the case of illness or injury, the fair veterinarian will determine how the animal will be handled. If an animal declared as terminal is treated and has a withholding time, it will be quarantined until the withholding time has elapsed and then sent to harvest.

23. If a market animal is removed from the fairgrounds without proper authorization, the following penalties will apply: the exhibitor will be banned from further competition for the next 2 years of their junior fair eligibility. If removed after the sale, in addition to the above penalty, the exhibitor will forfeit all premium monies. The premium monies will be returned to the sale buyer with a letter of explanation.

24. If a market animal is sent home by fair officials for any reason, the exhibitor will not receive any payment for the value of the market animal. If sent home by fair officials prior to the sale, the exhibitor will not receive any proceeds from the sale (including online bids, sale ring bids or add on bids). If sent home by fair officials after the sale, the exhibitor will receive the premium bid minus commission from the sale only.

25. The Senior Fair, Junior Fair, and Sale Committee will take every precaution for the safe keeping of livestock on exhibition after their arrival on the grounds but will not be responsible for any animal loss that may occur. Exhibitors are requested to give every attention to their animals. Animals are the responsibility of the exhibitor until the animals are loaded to the packer or released.

26. If a market animal dies before the sale, and the exhibitor does not have another market animal that has been shown in junior fair, the exhibitor will not participate in the livestock sale. The exhibitor will not receive any proceeds from the sale (including online bids, sale ring bids or add on bids). If the exhibitor has an animal that is part of a market pen die before the sale, the exhibitor may sell the remaining animals in the pen through the livestock sale.

27. If a market animal dies after the sale, the exhibitor will receive the premium bid minus commission, but not the market value of the animal.

28. If an animal declared for sale dies prior to the sale, and the exhibitor has another market animal, the other animal must be sold through the livestock sale, regardless of previous declaration.

29. Market goats without ears are required to have their eartag secured around the goat's neck for fair weigh-in and for load out. This can be done by any means that is safe to the goat.

30. Market animals must be in their assigned pens during tagging and load out, a \$25.00 fine will be deducted from the exhibitor's sale check.

31. Exhibitors whose premium payments are over \$599, will need to have a W-9 Form completed. These forms are required by the State of Ohio to process payment.

32. All exhibitor checks are VOID AFTER 90 DAYS. If the sale committee treasurer must reprint a livestock check there will be a \$35.00 reissue fee or if exhibitor lost a check, the exhibitor will be charged \$45.00 for stop payment. All checks not cashed after 90 days will become a donation to the Auglaize Co. Junior Fair.

JUNIOR MEMBERS EXHIBITING IN OPEN CLASS

Junior fair members may compete in open class with their project animals provided they pay \$3.00 per head for dairy, beef and swine; \$.50 per head for sheep. The animals are housed in space provided for the junior division. No membership tickets are required. These entries must be on the official open class entry form and submitted directly to the superintendent of the open class show involved.

Junior fair members may instead of following the procedure suggested above pay the full open class charges, purchase a membership ticket and house their animals in space provided for the senior division. If this plan is followed, open class entries and fees must be submitted to the superintendent of the department in which they enter. The junior entries must be submitted to the Extension office with a statement that no housing will be required in the junior division.



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SHOWMANSHIP RULES

1. There shall be contests for beef, sheep, swine, dairy, rabbits, goats, horses and poultry.

2. Each contestant must show his or her own junior fair project animal in showmanship classes. Animals shown in showmanship classes must be entered and shown in the regular junior fair show.

3. The following classes* will be provided for all species except where noted in the department (see department rules):

Class 1 - Members age 16-18

Class 2 - Members age 13-15

Class 3 - Members age 11-12

Class 4 - Members age 8-10

Class 5 - Showman of Showmen

* - All ages are as of January 1 of the current year

4. The order of the showmanship contests will be as listed above, unless noted in a specific department.

5. All showmanship entries are required to be completed online by July 1. Pre-registration is required for all showmanship classes. Members need to pre-register online through FairEntry.com by July 1. There will be no showmanship sign-up during the fair.

6. All rules regarding late entries apply to showmanship classes. See rule #1 under Rules and Regulations General Rules. Members failing to pre-register prior to fair will not be eligible for showmanship classes at the current year's fair.

7. Showman of showmen is open to all exhibitors who are eligible based on their winning past showmanship classes. An individual may elect to exhibit in the Showman of Showmen Class as many years as he/she elects to or is eligible to exhibit.

8. Placing ribbons 1-5 will be given in each class.

9. Exhibitor may exhibit in only one showmanship class per department per year unless required by the specific department or as noted in rule 10 below.

10. All showmanship winners in Classes 1 (ages 16-18)/Senior Showmanship may choose to participate in Class 5 (Showman of Showmen) the same year they win Class 1. The winner of Class 1/Senior Showmanship must move into the Class 5 Showman of Showman the next year.

11. Winners of Class 4 (ages 8-10) will move into Class 3 (ages 11-12) the next year. Winners of Class 3 (ages 11-12) will move into Class 2 (ages 13-15) the next year. Winners of Class 2 (ages 13-15) will move into Class 1 (ages 16-18) the next year.

12. If there is no Class 5 - Showman of Showmen division winner, then the winner of Class 1, ages 16 to 18, or the winner of the Senior Division will be that department's representative to the Showmanship Sweepstakes.

13. In any class with less than five (5) participants, the Junior Fair Board has the right to combine classes or subdivide classes having large numbers of participants.

14. Previous winners of the Showmanship Sweepstakes are ineligible to show in any future showmanship class regardless of department.

1. All current Showman of Showmen Contest winners in beef, dairy, sheep, swine, goats, horses, poultry and rabbits are eligible to compete. If the winner of a department is not available, the opportunity to participate will be offered to the second place exhibitor. If the second place exhibitor is unavailable or chooses not to participate, the opportunity to participate will be offered to the third place exhibitor and so forth through fifth place. If none of the top five exhibitors are available, there will be no representative from that department in the contest.

2. If an exhibitor wins in more than one department, he/she must select which department to represent. See rule #1 for determination as to how the other department will be represented.

3. The winner in each department will not show that specie. The department winner will automatically receive the first place points and the remaining contestants be placed by the judge. Participants must sit in a designated chair when their specie is being shown.

4. Contestants will show each species for a period of three minutes each. Contestants may not show their own animal. Contestants can select the animal of their choice from those animals provided by the Sweepstakes Committee.

5. Eight judges will be present - one representing each department. The judges will rank each contestant.

Department Representative - 14 points	
2nd place - 12 points	6th - 4 points
3rd - 10 points	7th - 2 points
4th - 8 points	8th - 0 points
5th - 6 points	

6. If the case of a tie, the tied contestants will each draw a question at random. These questions will be written by each specie judge prior to the competition. The judge will determine if the contestant's response is correct. The tie will be broken when a contestant answers a question incorrectly, the other contestant will then be named the winner.

7. If there is no Class 5 - Showman of Showmen division winner, then the winner of Class 1, ages 16 to 18, or the winner of the Senior Division will be that department's representative to the Showmanship Sweepstakes.

8. Previous first place winners of Showmanship Sweepstakes cannot reenter this contest.

9. All contestants will receive a plaque; the overall winner will receive a trophy and have their name placed on the Gibson Memorial plaque located in the Junior Fair Building.

10. If no live animals are available for a specie, contestants will be asked showmanship knowledge questions. Diagrams, props, or models may be used.

11. The winner of the contest will be announced, no other placings or results. No scores will be available for review.

Show and Sale Order: Market classes will be determined and divided by fair weights for A, B, C grades and 1- 5 places in class. Show orders will be posted.

First place animals in each class are eligible to compete for Grand Champion. Reserve champion will be chosen from remaining first place animals and the second place from Grand Champion's class.

Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Market, Dairy, and Carcass animals will be sold at the beginning of the steer sale.

GENERAL RULES:

1. Animals must have been identified at the winter weigh-in to compete in the junior fair market show. Weights from other scales will not be accepted. Animals must be present at the designated date, hours, and location to be weighed and identified unless one of the following situations occurs. If an animal is ill and cannot be present at the designated date, hours and location, the exhibitor must contact the Junior Fair Board immediately. The exhibitor will be required to present a veterinarian's certification of the illness before arrangements will be made to identify the animal. If there is a family emergency on the day of the weigh-in and the animals cannot be identified, the family must present their situation to the Junior Fair Board. The board will determine if the animals will be identified and if penalties will be imposed. If an animal is entered in another show on the day of weigh-in, the family must present proof of entry prior to the weigh-in. The sale committee will make alternate arrangements for weighing and identifying the animal that is entered in the alternate show. Family will be required to provide proof of participation for the animal entered at the alternate show. All other animals belonging to the family that are not entered in the alternate show, must be present at the designated weigh in date and hours.
2. Animals must be hornless and steers castrated at the time of the winter weigh-in. A veterinarian's certificate must accompany any animals that may be considered "questionable". Animals must be halter broken for winter weigh-in. Animals must be able to be walked with a halter to the opening of the squeeze chute to start the weigh-in process. Animals must be able to be walked off the scales with the halter after being weighed. The Junior Fair Board and Sale Committee reserve the right to refuse to register, identify and weigh any animal. Any animals not identified at winter weigh-in are ineligible for the fair.
3. Heifers identified at winter weigh-in as market heifers must be beef breeding (no dairy) and may not be shown as a beef breeding project animal. If a beef heifer is weighed as a market heifer, it must be shown in the market heifer class. Heifers not being weighed at the winter weigh-in will be shown in a beef breeding class. Classification cannot be changed after the winter weigh-in.

4. NO horns will be permitted on any beef animals entered in the junior fair. Market animals will be checked at the winter and fair weigh-ins. Any animals with horns will be sent home immediately.

5. All animals must be tied with a neck strap or chain and halter when tied in their stalls. Each exhibitor not complying will receive one warning from the Junior Fair Beef Chairman, then premiums will be forfeited.

6. Market animals must be shown in the ring to be sold in the sale.

7. Winners of the market heifer classes will compete in the final drive against the winners of the market steer classes for Grand and Reserve Champion and 3 through 5 overall market animals.

8. Health rules same as open class.

9. Limit of two entries in each class (see carcass rules regarding market entries.

10. Any animal that is registered should be registered in the exhibitor's name or as a partnership. Beef breeding project animals may be leased. Lease papers and pictures must be on file at the Extension Office by May 1. Market animals and feeder calves cannot be leased.

11. If a steer is to be entered in the dairy steer show as a Milking Shorthorn, the exhibitor must present registration papers as proof of breed. All other shorthorn steers will be shown in the beef steer class.

12. To be shown as a dairy feeder or dairy steer, the animal must be of dairy breeding. A cross between a beef and dairy breed will show in the beef feeder or steer class.

13. Beef exhibitors must designate, at the time of fair weigh-in, which animal will sell in the livestock sale if more than one animal is entered.

14. All grand and reserve champion market animals will be harvested and viewed as part of the carcass review on the Wednesday after the fair. Market animals sold through the junior fair livestock sale are required to be sent to harvest.

15. It is suggested that feeder calves be fenced in to separate them from the steers. Exhibitors must provide their own gates for this purpose.

16. Feeder calves, beef and dairy, must be castrated at least one month before the first day of the fair.

17. Heifers shown as a feeder calf may not be shown as a breeding project animal. If a heifer is identified as a feeder calf, it must be shown as a feeder. Heifers not being tagged in the spring will be shown in breeding class. Classification cannot be changed after spring identification. Feeder heifers identified in the spring must be beef breeds (no dairy).

18. Feeder calves will be identified in the spring with RFID 840 tags. They will also receive a tag for show identification at the fair.

19. Maximum weight for dairy feeders at fair weigh in is 700 pounds and under. Any dairy feeders weighing more than 700 pounds will not be eligible for championship; they will show in a separate overweight class for project grade and premium only.

20. Beef exhibits will be bedded with mulch that is provided for \$10 per animal. No dyed wood products may be used. If unacceptable products are used, the exhibitor will be given one notification by the Junior Fair Board to replace the bedding with acceptable materials. If the problem is not corrected after 24 hours, the exhibitor will be fined \$25 per day per animal.

21. Generators used for grooming purposes may not be located outside of the Piehl Arena.

22. Butt fans may not be used, cage fans may be used.

23. Market animal possession date will be the original scheduled date of the winter weigh-in.

24. Exhibitors must care for their animals until the animals are loaded off the fairgrounds. For market animals, if it is determined at load out that the animal has lacked food and/or water, \$25.00 will be deducted from the value of the animal. This decision will be made by the packer and representatives from the Sale Committee. For breeding animals, if it is determined that the animal has lacked food and/or water, the exhibitor will not receive a fair pass the following year. This determination will be the decision of the Junior and Senior Fair Board superintendents of the department.

25. Unruly animals will be dismissed from the class at the discretion of the Junior and Senior Fair Board department superintendents.

26. Each exhibitor showing a market animal must take one animal through the Junior Fair Livestock Sale. Junior exhibitors are limited to one entry in the sale, except by exhibitors having more than one champion or reserve champion market animal. It will be the exhibitor's option to sell their remaining market animals to the packer or take them home.

27. Each animal crossing the scale must be declared terminal or nonterminal at the fair weigh-in. All declarations are final at weigh-in. If an animal is not declared terminal/ nonterminal at the weigh-in, it will be considered terminal. An animal's declaration (sale, terminal or nonterminal) at the fair weigh-in may not be changed unless it is chosen as a grand or reserve champion or under the guidance of the fair veterinarian. Grand or reserve champions will be designated as terminal. If an exhibitor has other animals, their designation will not be changed, regardless of specie. See sale rules for more details on terminal/ nonterminal designation.

CARCASS CONTEST INFORMATION:

1. There will be a limit of 1 carcass entry per exhibitor in the carcass contest.

2. Exhibitors are limited to three entries and animals must be counted in the three animals allowed to be weighed in at the winter weigh-in. Exhibitors may show three animals in the carcass or live classes in the combinations outlined below. **No more than two animals may be shown in one category. Limitation of one time through the sale ring still holds and champion and reserve carcass must sell.**

Exhibitors may exhibit:

2 beef market animals and 1 dairy steer in live show
2 dairy steers and 1 beef market animal in live show
2 animals in live show (beef or dairy) and 1 animal in carcass
0 animals in live show and 1 animal in carcass class

2. Entries for the carcass class must be made online by July 1 and will be limited to the first 16 head entered. Number of entries accepted is subject to change based on availability of processing space. An entry fee of \$120.00, payable on or before the July 1 entry date will be used to pay for processing. Entry fees are subject to change if processing fees increase. After July 1, the entry fee will increase by \$25 per entry. Entry fees are non-refundable and non-transferable. Make checks payable to the Auglaize County Junior Fair Board.

3. Animals will be evaluated, and carcasses placed on a point system with points given on live placing (not used in final rating except to break a tie), rate of gain, carcass quality grade and cutability along with a judge's overall excellence award. A copy of the scoresheet is available from Extension office.

4. All animals in the carcass class making weight will be harvested. Exhibitors will be responsible for disposing of carcasses not sold through the sale. For carcass animals sold through the Junior Fair Livestock Sale, the sale buyer will have the first option to buy the meat. If the sale buyer does not want the meat, the exhibitor is responsible for the purchasing the meat and the cost of processing. Arrangements for the sale of the meat must be finalized before the exhibitor will receive their check from the Junior Fair Livestock Sale Committee. Kah Meats will be responsible ONLY for the purchasing the meat of the Grand & Reserve Champion Carcass Animals.

5. To be eligible for Grand Champion, Reserve Champion and 3-5 Overall placings, a carcass must grade choice minus or better and have a full yield grade of 3.9 or lower (better).

6. Processing, cutting, wrapping and freezing of the carcass meat will be available from the processor and will be at the expense of the buyer or exhibitor.

7. Exhibitor will stand the loss for any condemned carcass.

8. Exhibitors, family members and others are encouraged to be present at Kah Meats during the carcass evaluation session on Wednesday after the fair at 7:00 p.m.

9. Final results will be announced, and awards presented during the show on Wednesday of the fair.

10. Cash awards of \$50.00 to the champion carcass animal and \$35.00 to the reserve champion carcass animal will be presented by Sunrise Cooperative. Trophies will also be presented to the top two places by Sunrise Cooperative. All carcasses will receive a \$5.00 premium award.

11. Pictures of the carcasses will be taken. Posters with pictures and information will be made and used for educational purposes, award presentations and for the selling of the carcasses in the sale.

12. Carcass program facilities are provided by Kah Meats, Wapakoneta.

13. Carcass contest sponsored by Sunrise Cooperative in cooperation with the Junior Fair Board.

MARKET BEEF RATE OF GAIN CONTEST:

1. Open to all 4-H and FFA market animal exhibitors.

2. Animals must have been weighed at the winter weigh-in to be eligible for this contest.

3. The top two animals with the fastest rate of gain per day will be awarded trophies. All ties will be broken by giving the animals with the heaviest starting weight the advantage.

4. The top two rate of gain animals will be named first and second place class winners (not grand and reserve champions). These animals will sell according to sale order.

ORDER OF SHOW – to be posted

GENERAL RULES:

1. Senior yearlings in production must be shown as a two-year-old.
2. Health rules same as open class.
3. Limit of two entries in each class per exhibitor. Any leadsmen, besides the exhibitor, must be an Auglaize County junior fair exhibitor.
4. Cattle will be placed on type and graded on the combination of fitting, showing and type.
5. Signs and decorations need to be limited so as not to obstruct ventilation. Dairy department officials may ask to have problem signs and decorations removed.
6. The Grand Champion from each breed will compete for the Supreme and Reserve Champion. This animal will represent the dairy department at the Gallon of Milk Sale. The only exception will be if the Supreme Champion is at the state fair, then the Reserve Supreme Champion will represent the department.
7. Exhibitors participating in the gallon of milk sale must be present in the sale ring to receive a portion of the sale proceeds. If a member cannot be present, they must request permission from the junior fair board prior to the sale to be excused.
8. Stall assignments may be changed within a club's designated area at the club advisor's discretion. Assignments may not be changed beyond the club's designated area without the prior approval of both the Junior and Senior Fair Dairy Superintendents.
9. Dairy animals may be leased. Lease papers and pictures must be on file at the Extension Office by May 1.
10. Cattle, removed from the fairgrounds, due to entry at the Ohio State Fair or another show, will be checked for participation. All animals leaving early are subject to the release time violation rule/penalty if they are removed from the fairgrounds but not shown at the alternate show. Exhibitor must request permission for an early release prior to leaving the fairgrounds.
11. If it is determined that the animal has lacked food and/or water, the exhibitor will not receive a fair pass the following year. This determination will be the decision of the Junior and Senior Fair Board superintendents of the department.
12. Beddings for dairy exhibits - no dyed wood products may be used. If unacceptable products are used, the exhibitor will be given one notification by the Junior Fair Board to replace the bedding with acceptable materials. If the problem is not corrected after 24 hours, the exhibitor will be fined \$25 per day per animal.

GENERAL RULES:

1. Health requirements are listed in health section of the fair book. All goats will be inspected for health problems at the time of unloading.

2. All goats must have some type of scrapies identification (tattoo or eartag) in order to be exhibited. Exhibitors must file their scrapies information form with the fair board.

3. Market goats may be wethers or does. All dairy breeds and meat breeds market goats must be identified during the spring weigh-in to compete in the junior fair market goat show. A maximum of five (5) goats may be identified regardless of breed. Weights from other scales will not be accepted. Goats must be present at the designated date, hours, and location to be weighed and identified unless one of the following situations occurs. If a goat is ill and cannot be present at the designated date, hours and location, the exhibitor must contact the Junior Fair Board immediately. The exhibitor will be required to present a veterinarian's certification of the illness before arrangements will be made to identify the goat. If there is a family emergency on the day of the weigh-in and the animals cannot be identified, the family must present their situation to the Junior Fair Board. The board will determine if the animals will be identified and if penalties will be imposed. If an animal is entered in another show on the day of weigh-in, the family must present proof of entry prior to the weigh-in. The sale committee will make alternate arrangements for weighing and identifying the animal that is entered in the alternate show. Family will be required to provide proof of participation for the animal entered at the alternate show. All other animals belonging to the family that are not entered in the alternate show, must be present at the designated weigh in date and hours.

4. All market goats must be dehorned by the spring weigh-in. All market wethers must be banded by the spring weigh-in. If an alternate method of castration is used, the animal must be accompanied by a veterinarian's certificate. A veterinarian's certificate must also accompany any wether that may be considered "questionable".

5. Any animal that is registered must be registered in the name of the exhibitor or in a partnership of which the exhibitor is a partner. Breeding project animals may be leased. Lease papers and pictures must be on file at the Extension Office by May 1. Market goats cannot be leased.

6. Horns:

Dairy - (including scurs) must be less than one inch long
Pygmy – permitted
Fiber – permitted
Meat Breeds – permitted
Market wether (doe & wether) (dairy & meat breeds) – (including scurs) must be less than one inch long

7. Eartags:

Dairy breeds - no eartags are permitted, except scrapies tags.
Meat breeds - permitted
Fiber - permitted

8. The ends of horns must be covered at all times unless permission is granted from the Junior Fair Goat Chairman to leave horns uncovered. Meat breed goat horns are not required to be covered. Any dairy goat or market wether with horns 1" or longer may show but not place. Market goats will still be allowed to sell.

9. Dress code: All exhibitors in the dairy breed classes (classes 11-18) must wear a white shirt. In all other classes, including showmanship, exhibitors may wear a color shirt (see general livestock rules for acceptable attire). Pants should be either white or black dress pants or jeans (not faded or torn).

10. There is a limit of eight (8) goat entries per exhibitor. This limit applies to the following classes: 1 - 8, 11 - 17, 19 - 25, 27 - 30 and class 32. The limit of 8 entries per exhibitor does not include showmanship, mother/offspring or market goat entries.

11. There is a limit of two entries per class. An exhibitor may exhibit a total of three market goats, no more than two per class. For example:
2 dairy breed market and 1 meat breed market
2 meat breed market and 1 dairy breed market
NOT 3 meat breed market, NOT 3 dairy breed market

12. For dairy breeds, if there are eight or more milkers entered by two different families, that breed will be shown separately the following year. Entries will be reviewed annually to determine breed classes.

13. All milking animals must be milked out by twelve hours prior to show time.

14. Meat breed market goats will not compete for the Grand Champion Meat Breed Goat. Dairy market does will not compete for Best Dairy Doe in Show.

15. The Supreme and Reserve Supreme Champion Goats will be selected from the: Grand Champion Meat Breed Breeding Goat, Best Dairy Doe in Show, Grand Champion Pygmy Goat and Grand Champion Other Breeds Goat.

16. No bucks, over the age of eight weeks, will be permitted on the fairgrounds.

17. Wood shavings are to be used for bedding. No dyed products may be used. Straw may be used only if permission is granted from the Junior Fair Goat Chairman. If unacceptable products are used, the exhibitor will be given one notification by the Junior Fair Board to replace the bedding with acceptable materials. If the problem is not corrected after 24 hours, the exhibitor will be fined \$25 per day per pen.

18. Mother and kid, dam and daughter classes do not receive a premium.

19. Goats exhibited as a cart goat do not need to be eligible to be shown in another class in this department but must meet all other rules in the department. If a cart goat has been shown in another class, no premium will be paid. If the goat is only shown in the cart class, they will receive a premium for the cart class.

20. Market goats, both dairy and meat breeds, must weigh 40 pounds and over by fair weigh-in to be eligible for placings. Underweight goats may show for project grade and premium only and may sell through the Junior Fair Livestock Sale. Exhibitors must be present at the sale to sell their goats unless they have received prior approval of the Junior Fair Board.

21. Champion and Reserve Champion Market Goats, both meat and dairy breeds, will be viewed as part of the carcass review on Wednesday after the fair. Exhibitors are responsible for making arrangements for the processing and purchase of the meat. If an exhibitor does not make arrangements for the disposal of the meat: first offense: exhibitor may not place the following year. Second or more offense: exhibitor will be banned from showing for 3 years.

22. All market goats sold through the junior fair livestock sale are required to be sent to harvest.

23. Market goats, both dairy and meat breeds, must have their milk teeth by fair weigh-in to be eligible for placings.

24. Age of goat is determined by the date of the show. No goats under three (3) weeks of age are permitted on the grounds.

25. Classes with 15 or more entries will be split. The split will be a gate cut (first in) with the exception that one exhibitor with two animals may elect to go into separate classes. The top five animals in each class will return to be judged for class placings. There will be no placings in the qualifying classes, the top five will be selected but not placed.

26. The following practices are unacceptable for showing: use of ice, hot shots, slapping, wet towels and aerosols which cause an "icing" effect. Violators will not be eligible to compete for awards.

27. Does identified as a market goat may not be shown as a breeding project animal in the same year. Classification cannot be changed after the spring weigh-in.

28. Market goats without ears are required to have their eartag secured around the goat's neck for fair weigh-in and for load out. This can be done by any means that is safe to the goat other than wire.

29. Exhibitors must care for their animals until the animals are loaded off the fairgrounds. For market animals, if it is determined at load out that the animal has lacked food and/or water, \$25.00 will be deducted from the value of the animal. This decision will be made by the packer and representatives from the Sale Committee. For breeding animals, if it is determined that the animal has lacked food and/or water, the exhibitor will not receive a fair pass the following year. This determination will be the decision of the Junior and Senior Fair Board superintendents of the department.

30. The Junior Fair Board requests that exhibitors with breeding animals notify them by July 1 with the total of number of pens needed per exhibitor. This total should include market goat pens if needed.

31. All blankets, coats and tubes must be removed for initial veterinary inspection. The Junior Fair Board reserves the right to have these covers removed at any time for inspection.

32. Muzzles may not be used on any goat at any time.

33. Each exhibitor showing a market animal must take one animal through the Junior Fair Livestock Sale. Junior exhibitors are limited to one entry in the sale, except by exhibitors having more than one champion or reserve champion market animal. It will be the exhibitor's option to sell their remaining market animals to the packer or take them home.

34. Each animal crossing the scale must be declared terminal or nonterminal at the fair weigh-in. All declarations are final at weigh-in. If an animal is not declared terminal/ nonterminal at the weigh-in, it will be considered terminal. An animal's declaration (sale, terminal or nonterminal) at the fair weigh-in may not be changed unless it is chosen as a grand or reserve champion or under the guidance of the fair veterinarian. Grand or reserve champions will be designated as terminal. If an exhibitor has other animals, their designation will not be changed, regardless of specie. See sale rules for more details on terminal/ nonterminal designation.

MARKET GOAT RATE OF GAIN CONTEST:

1. Open to all 4-H and FFA market goat exhibitors.
2. Market goats must have been weighed at the spring weigh-in to be eligible for this contest.
3. The top two goats with the fastest rate of gain per day will be awarded trophies. All ties will be broken by giving the animals with the heaviest starting weight the advantage.
4. Top two rate of gain class winners will be recognized at the sale according to draw number. They will not be sold at the top of the goat sale.
5. Weight limits are still in effect (over 40 pounds) for competing for the champion market goat of the show.

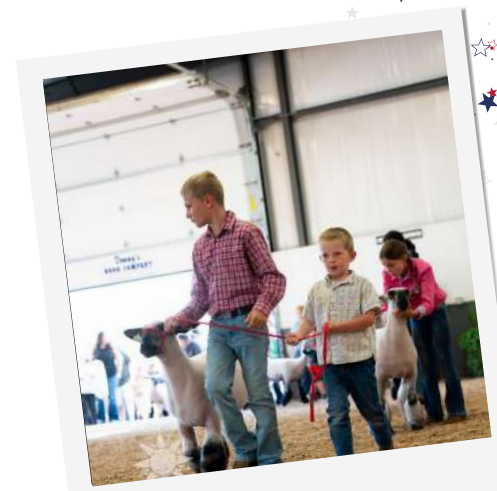

GENERAL RULES:

1. All Junior Fair Horse Shows are conducted according to the Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows. All rules within that book apply. Included in this rule book are the requirements for wearing helmets and class restrictions. The rules contained in this department are in addition to the Uniform Rules.

2. 4-H members may exhibit only two project horses/ponies.

3. All horses must be identified by the ownership/lease form and pictures which are due to Extension Office by May 1.

4. Horses and ponies used as project animals shall either be owned by the member or immediate family or leased. The purpose of a lease is to provide an educational experience for youth who might not otherwise have the opportunity. If the animal is leased, the lease agreement should have the approval of the county 4-H professional and a copy of the lease form on file in the Extension Office by May 1 of the current year.

5. The Horse and Pony Committee reserves the right to combine classes with five (5) or less entries. Large classes may also be split.

6. Yearling projects must be in the member's possession by January 1 of the current year. All other horses, including weanling projects, must be in the member's possession by May 1.

7. All exhibits must be graded during presentation to be eligible for premiums and entry into all other classes. The only exception is those exhibitors who are showing a horse at the Ohio State Fair on the day of the presentation class. The judge will go through the barn, horse in stall, exhibitor by the stall to assign project grades. Barns will be closed. If there is no presentation grading prior to a show, then advisor grade will be used to determine placings and premium.

8. Members who enter the Walk-Trot Class must be first year horse members or experienced rider with a novice horse. Horses entered in this class may not ridden in any other performance riding class. Exhibitors entering this class may enter other performance riding classes with a different horse.

9. Walk-Trot exhibitors may also enter the Walk Trot Trail, Ground Roping, Driving Reinsmanship and Driving classes. This entry is allowed because these classes are not riding classes.

10. If a horse is incapacitated and cannot lope, a member may enter in the Walk-Trot class if they provide a veterinarian's certificate at the time of entry. Horse must be entered as of July 1st. Horses entered in walk trot with a veterinarian's certificate for multiple years will have their certificate reviewed by the fair veterinarian. It is not acceptable to enter a horse in walk trot multiple years due to a chronic condition. All other rules regarding the Walk-Trot class apply.

11. Easy Gaited horses may not show in riding classes that require a trot. Correct tack and attire for Easy Gaited Pleasure is Western tack and attire. Easy Gaited classes will be two-gaited classes (no canter). Gaits will be a Show Walk and a Show Gait. Easy Gaited horses may show in Gymkhana if the class does not require a trot.

12. A member may enter and show only one horse in any showmanship class (see rule #13 for the exemption for Showman of Showmen). For example, an exhibitor may show one horse in Western Showmanship and the other in Hunter Showmanship, but not both horses in Western Showmanship.

13. First and second place winners in all showmanship classes will compete in the Showman of Showmen class. If an exhibitor has placed first or second in more than one showmanship class, they may show both horses in the Showman of Showmen.

14. According to the Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows, an exhibitor cannot show the same horse in Western and Ranch classes at the same show. Ranch discipline exhibitors may enter Reining since there is no "Ranch" option for this class.

15. Because they are riding classes, an exhibitor cannot enter two horses in horsemanship/equitation, western pleasure or ranch pleasure.

16. Members entering ground roping/moving dummy roping are expected to be enrolled in the 4-H Roping Project. If a member is entering ground roping only and not showing a horse, they will need to complete the presentation class for their project grade and premium.

17. All horses must be weaned by the time they arrive on the fairgrounds.

18. If a horse kicks, a red ribbon must be tied to the tail when the horse is out of the stall.

19. If it is determined that the animal has lacked food and/or water, the exhibitor will not receive a fair pass the following year. This determination will be the decision of the Junior and Senior Fair Board superintendents of the department.

20. Walk Trot Trail class exhibitors will complete the trail pattern with no lope, trot only. This class is open only to exhibitors entered in the Walk Trot class.

21. Horses with a body condition score of less than a 4 (ribs easily discernible, tops of spinous process easily discernible, tailhead prominent with hook pins easily discernible, withers accentuated, and neck obviously thin), obviously sick horses, and horses with a Grade 3 or greater lameness (consistently observable at the trot; marked nodding, hitching, or shortened stride; and minimal weight bearing in motion or at rest) should not be entered. Questionable animals will be reviewed by fair officials in consultation with the fair veterinarian.

Barn Hours: Barns will be open from 6:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. daily.

Release Time: Market chickens will be released to the packer as arranged by the Sale Committee. All other poultry will be released at 11:00 p.m. Saturday of the fair. Birds must be in their assigned cages between 10:00 p.m. and 11:00 p.m. The barn will be locked at midnight. Exhibitors may also remove their birds between 8:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Sunday after the fair. Exhibitors cleaning pens prior to the release time will be fined \$50, payable by December 1 of the current year. Failure to pay will result in no placings the following year.

SHOW ORDER WILL BE POSTED.

GENERAL RULES:

1. Pullets must be exactly 1 year of age or under as of date of the show. Females over 1 year as of show date will be classified as hens. Other exhibits may be of any age unless outlined in a specific class. See rules for Best Rooster Class.
2. Birds entered as a pen must be all the same breed. Mixed breed pens will show for project grade and premium only, no placing.
3. An exhibit of chickens consists of a pen of two females or a pen of three broilers/roasters (either 3 pullets or 3 cockerels, no mixed pens). All show pens, fancy or standard, will consist of 1 female and 1 male.
4. Hens used in the pen of 2 hens class may be shown as part of a show pen, fancy or standard.
5. Exhibitors must be present at the sale to sell unless they have received prior approval of the Junior Fair Board.
6. No "for sale" signs are to be posted on the pens, these signs may be posted on the bulletin boards.
7. Exhibitors may enter 1 meat pen. All meat pens must be entered as of July 1. All commercial meat type birds must be purchased and in the possession of the exhibitor by June 30. Exhibitors must provide proof of hatch date for their birds. Hatch papers must be available at weigh-in. Hatch date is June 1 or after of the current year. Any birds hatched before June 1 will not be eligible for placings but may sell.
8. After fair weights are determined, the pen will be classified as a broiler pen or a roaster pen. Pens classified as broilers will weigh between 4 pounds and 7 pounds, 7 ounces each. Pens classified as roasters will weigh more than 7 pounds 9 ounces each. Birds weighing 7 pounds 8 ounces will be considered a roaster. Any pen with one bird weighing more than 7 pounds 8 ounces will be classified as a roaster pen.
9. All exhibitors of meat chickens must also show at least one other pen of poultry. Dozen eggs entry is not considered another pen of poultry.
10. A limit of one entry in each class in this department.

11. Broiler pens will compete only for Grand and Reserve Champion Pen of Broilers. Roaster pens will compete only for Grand and Reserve Champion Pen of Roasters.

12. All first-place class winners, excluding broilers, roasters, and best rooster, will compete for the Grand Champion Pen of Poultry. Reserve champion will be chosen from remaining first place animals and the second place from Grand Champion's class.

13. Dozen eggs class will be judged on the following categories: size, size uniformity, color, color uniformity, cleanliness, shell texture, inside.

14. Dozen eggs class requires an entry submitted by July 1. Eggs may be from any type of poultry eligible to show in junior fair. Exhibitors must show a pen of poultry to enter the eggs class.

15. 2026 - Showmanship classes will be the 5 age divisions outlined in the general showmanship rules. In 2026, all exhibitors will show according to age as of January 1, except for previous participants in the poultry showman of showmen and the 2025 winner of senior showmanship, these exhibitors must enter showman of showmen for 2026. Beginning in 2027, exhibitors will follow showmanship winners' progression in the general showmanship rules. All other showmanship rules apply.

16. Production Standard classes are judged on production not as a show pen. Fancy Standard and Bantam classes are judged as a show pen.

17. All meat chickens sold through the junior fair livestock sale are required to be sent to harvest.

18. All turkeys must be NPIP or have hatch papers from a NPIP hatchery. Chickens - pullets, hens, and fancy pairs will be pullorum tested prior to the fair on a date designated by fair officials.

19. Ownership papers will be checked at random. Breeding project animals must be in the exhibitor's possession by May 1. Breeding animals may be leased. Lease papers and pictures must be on file at the Extension Office by May 1. Market chickens cannot be leased. Please see general rules regarding ownership requirements.

20. Guinea fowl, geese, standard ducks and turkeys will be judged at their pens.

21. Exhibitors must care for their animals until the animals are loaded off the fairgrounds. For market animals, if it is determined at load out that the animal has lacked food and/or water, \$10.00 will be deducted from the value of the animal. This decision will be made by the packer and representatives from the Sale Committee. For breeding animals, if it is determined that the animal has lacked food and/or water, the exhibitor will not receive a fair pass the following year. This determination will be the decision of the Junior and Senior Fair Board superintendents of the department.

22. Best Rooster Class: roosters, under 1 year of age, exhibited as a part of a fancy pen in the show; may be considered for this award. Exhibitors must bring their rooster to the ring to be judged. Best rooster will not be eligible to compete for the Grand Champion Pen of Poultry. Best rooster class will not receive premiums.

23. Wood shavings are to be used for bedding. No dyed products may be used. If unacceptable products are used, the exhibitor will be given one notification by the Junior Fair Board to replace the bedding with acceptable materials. If the problem is not corrected after 24 hours, the exhibitor will be fined \$25 per day per pen.

24. Each exhibitor showing a market animal must take one animal through the Junior Fair Livestock Sale. Junior exhibitors are limited to one entry in the sale, except by exhibitors having more than one champion or reserve champion market animal. It will be the exhibitor's option to sell their remaining market animals to the packer or take them home.

25. Each animal crossing the scale must be declared terminal or nonterminal at the fair weigh-in. All declarations are final at weigh-in. If an animal is not declared terminal/ nonterminal at the weigh-in, it will be considered terminal. An animal's declaration (sale, terminal or nonterminal) at the fair weigh-in may not be changed unless it is chosen as a grand or reserve champion or under the guidance of the fair veterinarian. Grand or reserve champions will be designated as terminal. If an exhibitor has other animals, their designation will not be changed, regardless of specie. See sale rules for more details on terminal/ nonterminal designation.

26. Birds may be carried into the judging arena by exhibitors and other Auglaize Co. junior fair members only.

Barn Hours: Barns will be open from 6:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. daily.

Release Time: Market rabbits will be released to the packer as arranged by the Sale Committee. The barn will be closed during the time the market rabbits are loaded. All other rabbits will be released at 11:00 p.m. Saturday of the fair. Rabbits must be in their assigned cages between 10:00 p.m. and 11:00 p.m. The barn will be locked at midnight. Exhibitors may also remove their rabbits between 8:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon Sunday after the fair.

SHOW ORDER WILL BE POSTED

GENERAL RULES:

1. There is a limit of one entry in each class, regardless of breed.
2. If exhibitors exhibit four breeding rabbits, they must be 1 - Sr. Doe, 1 - Sr. Buck, 1 - Jr. Doe and 1 - Jr. Buck.
3. All exhibitors of market pens of rabbits must also enter and exhibit at least two breeding rabbits, one male and one female, as part of their project exhibit.
4. Market pen weight must be 4 pounds and over for each member of the pen. Pens not meeting the weight requirement will not be eligible to compete for champion. Each of the 2 rabbits must weigh within the weight limit to be eligible for placings. Market rabbits will be tattooed at the time of fair weigh-in.
5. Market rabbits must be in the exhibitor's possession as of June 20 of the current year. Breeding rabbits must be in the exhibitor's possession as of May 1 of the current year. Breeding project animals may be leased. Lease papers and pictures must be on file at the Extension Office by May 1. Market rabbits cannot be leased.
6. Rabbits shown in the single fryer class will come from the exhibitor's pen of 2 market rabbits. Single fryers must be shown as part of the pen of 2 market rabbits. If one of the rabbits in the pen of 2 market rabbits dies or is sent home by fair officials, the remaining rabbit in the pen of 2 is eligible to place in the single fryer class as long as it was shown in the pen of 2 market class. All other rules for market rabbits apply to single fryers.
7. All ages for classes listed below are as of the date of the show.
8. Exhibitors must be present at the sale to sell their rabbits unless they have received prior approval of the Junior Fair Board.
9. Ten or more entries in any breed will designate a separate class for the current year. For the first year as a separate breed, rosettes will be awarded for the best of breed and best opposite. Current year trophies for separate breeds are based on the previous year's entries. Any breed having 10 or more entries the previous year will have a trophy for the best/best opposite of that breed.
10. No "for sale" signs are to be posted in the barn. No commercial displays are permitted in the barn.
11. Wood shavings must be used for bedding. No dyed products are permitted. If unacceptable products are used, the exhibitor will be given one notification by the Junior Fair Board to replace the bedding with acceptable materials. If the problem is not corrected after 24 hours, the exhibitor will be fined \$25 per day per pen.
12. No locks are permitted on cages.
13. Exhibitors are highly encouraged to tattoo all breeding rabbits with a personal individual tattoo. Exhibitors will be able to enter that tattoo as part of fair entry for each rabbit. These tattoos are to help identify and return rabbits if they should be mixed with other rabbits.
14. Market pens will be divided into classes by random sort.
15. Rabbits shown as a part of the pen of two market rabbits may not be shown as junior breeding rabbits.
16. There will be three judges for the show. All judges will judge the market pens for disqualifications. Judges will determine which judge will select the grand and reserve market champions, Best in Show and Reserve Best in Show. Best in Show and Reserve Best in Show will be selected before the judging of the market classes.
17. Best in Show and Reserve Best in Show winners will be selected from all Best of Breed rabbits.
18. Rabbits that are part of the Grand and Reserve Market Pen of 2 Rabbits are not eligible to be shown in the single fryer class.
19. Showmanship classes will be held oldest to youngest and then Showman of Showmen.
20. Dress code for showing: long sleeve white shirt and long pants. Exhibitors not wearing a long sleeve white shirt will be permitted to show but not place. If case of extreme heat, shorts may be allowed. This decision will be at the judge's discretion and will be made on the morning of the show.
21. All entries will be final as of noon Saturday before the opening day of the fair. Exhibitors need to check that their rabbits were entered correctly before this deadline. Changes made after noon on Saturday will mean the rabbit will not be eligible for placing.
22. Rabbits may be carried to the judging table by junior fair members and junior fair advisors only.
23. Clubs/chapters will be assigned times to supervise the rabbit barn. Two supervisors must be provided for each shift. Supervisors must personally sign in to be given credit. Groups will be fined \$10.00 for each shift they do not supervise. Any group not providing the required two supervisors will be also fined \$10.00 per shift. These fines are to be paid to the Jr. Fair Board by January 1 of the following year. Those groups not paying their fine will forfeit their club members' fair passes for the following year.
24. All market rabbits sold through the junior fair livestock sale are required to be sent to harvest. All market rabbits sell as a pen of two. The grand and reserve champion single fryers must sell and go to harvest. The second rabbit of the pens that the grand/reserve champion fryers were shown in, must go to harvest also.
25. Show boxes must be placed under the pens or placed along the outside walls of the building. No boxes may obstruct the aisles.

26. Exhibitors must care for their animals until the animals are loaded off the fairgrounds. For market animals, if it is determined at load out that the animal has lacked food and/or water, \$10.00 will be deducted from the value of the animal. This decision will be made by the packer and representatives from the Sale Committee. For breeding animals, if it is determined that the animal has lacked food and/or water, the exhibitor will not receive a fair pass the following year. This determination will be the decision of the Junior and Senior Fair Board superintendents of the department. 27. If a market rabbit dies after fair weigh-in, the remaining rabbit in the pen can be sold as a single. The exhibitor will receive the animal value for that rabbit.

28. If a breeding rabbit dies prior to the show, the market animals may still place if both of the breeding rabbits were alive for a minimum of 24 hours after the designated arrival time.

29. Every pen will be assigned a number that will be used for barn management.

30. Each exhibitor showing a market animal must take one animal through the Junior Fair Livestock Sale. Junior exhibitors are limited to one entry in the sale, except by exhibitors having more than one champion or reserve champion market animal. It will be the exhibitor's option to sell their remaining market animals to the packer or take them home.

31. Each animal crossing the scale must be declared terminal or nonterminal at the fair weigh-in. All declarations are final at weigh-in. If an animal is not declared terminal/ nonterminal at the weigh-in, it will be considered terminal. An animal's declaration (sale, terminal or nonterminal) at the fair weigh-in may not be changed unless it is chosen as a grand or reserve champion or under the guidance of the fair veterinarian. Grand or reserve champions will be designated as terminal. If an exhibitor has other animals, their designation will not be changed, regardless of specie. See sale rules for more details on terminal/ nonterminal designation.

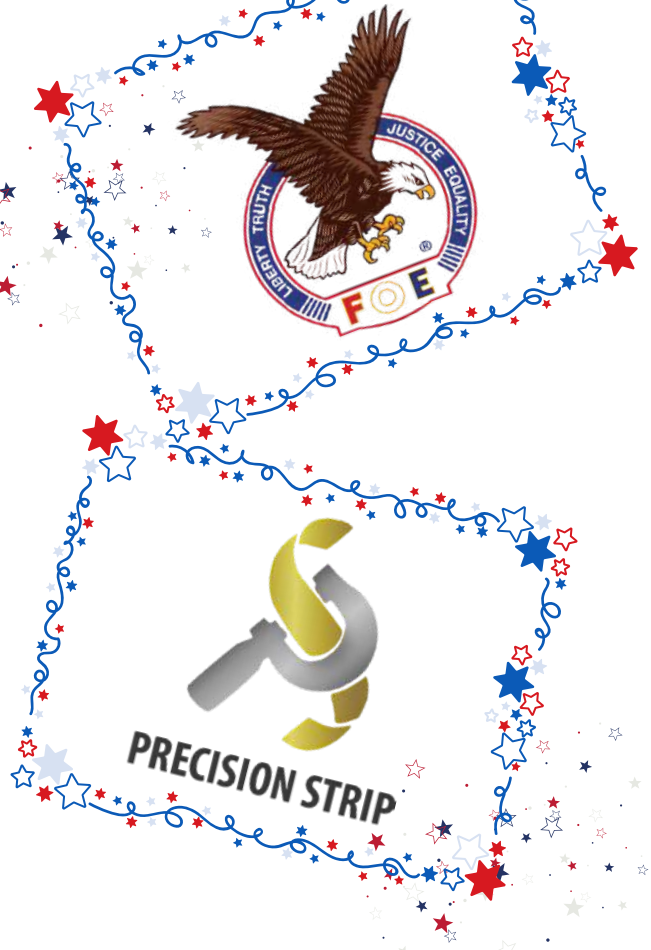

GENERAL RULES:

1. Health requirements are the same as open class.
2. Limit of two entries in each class per exhibitor. In breeding classes, exhibitors may have two entries in each class per breed. Each breed will be shown separately. Crossbreeds will be shown as a separate breed division.
3. Market lambs may be wethers or ewes. Wethers must be castrated at the time of the spring weigh-in.
4. All market lambs must be identified at the spring weigh-in to compete in the junior fair market lamb show. An exhibitor may identify a maximum of five lambs. Weights from other scales will not be accepted. Lambs must be present at the designated date, hours, and location to be weighed and identified unless one of the following situations occurs. If a lamb is ill and cannot be present at the designated date, hours and location, the exhibitor must contact the Junior Fair Board immediately. The exhibitor will be required to present a veterinarian's certification of the illness before arrangements will be made to identify the lamb. If there is a family emergency on the day of the weigh-in and the animals cannot be identified, the family must present their situation to the Junior Fair Board. The board will determine if the animals will be identified and if penalties will be imposed. If an animal is entered in another show on the day of weigh-in, the family must present proof of entry prior to the weigh-in. The sale committee will make alternate arrangements for weighing and identifying the animal that is entered in the alternate show. Family will be required to provide proof of participation for the animal entered at the alternate show. All other animals belonging to the family that are not entered in the alternate show, must be present at the designated weigh in date and hours.
5. An animal that is registered must be registered in the name of the exhibitor or in a partnership of which the exhibitor is a partner. Papers must be available day of the show. Breeding project animals may be leased. Lease papers and pictures must be on file at the Extension Office by May 1. Market lambs cannot be leased.
- 6., Market lambs may have no more than 1/4" wool remaining on the entire body at the time of arrival on the fairgrounds. Market lambs may have no more than 1/8" wool remaining on the entire body for show.
7. Market lambs will be sold according to random sort of the computer.
8. Five or more entries of a single breed in any one class will designate a separate class.
9. Every exhibitor must show his or her own animal unless granted prior approval by the Junior Fair Board. The only exception is when there is more than one animal entered in the class. Only one exhibitor per animal in any class will be permitted except in the yearling classes. Second showman in yearling classes may only assist the exhibitor and must be a junior fair member. All showmen must be Auglaize County junior fair members but cannot be a 4-H Cloverbud.
10. Champion and Reserve Champion Market Lambs will be viewed as part of the carcass review on Wednesday after the fair. All market lambs sold through the junior fair livestock sale are required to be sent to harvest.
11. The following practices are unacceptable for showing: use of ice, hot shots, slapping, wet towels and aerosols which cause an "icing" effect. All violators will be not be eligible to compete for awards.
12. Flock class shall consist of one (1) ram and two (2) ewes. The animals in the flock must be of all the same breed. Members of the flock must have been shown in their individual age classes. Members of the flock must be entered and shown in one exhibitor's name. Junior fair members (including family members) may not combine their animals to enter a flock. Flock must be entered online by July 1. Flock class does not receive a premium.
13. The Junior Fair Board requests that exhibitors with breeding animals notify them by July 1 with the total of number of pens needed per exhibitor. This total should include market lamb pens if needed.
14. All sheep, including market lambs, must have proper scrapies identification. Exhibitors must file their scrapies information with the fair board.
15. Sheep must be washed in wash racks not outside of the barn areas.
16. Ewes identified as a market lamb may not be shown as a breeding project animal in the same year. Classification cannot be changed after the spring weigh-in.
17. Wood shavings are to be used for bedding. No dyed products may be used. Straw may be used only if permission is granted from the Junior Fair Sheep Chairman. If unacceptable products are used, the exhibitor will be given one notification by the Junior Fair Board to replace the bedding with acceptable materials. If the problem is not corrected after 24 hours, the exhibitor will be fined \$25 per day per pen.
18. Exhibitors must care for their animals until the animals are loaded off the fairgrounds. For market animals, if it is determined at load out that the animal has lacked food and/or water, \$25.00 will be deducted from the value of the animal. This decision will be made by the packer and representatives from the Sale Committee. For breeding animals, if it is determined that the animal has lacked food and/or water, the exhibitor will not receive a fair pass the following year. This determination will be the decision of the Junior and Senior Fair Board superintendents of the department.
19. All blankets, coats and tubes must be removed for initial veterinary inspection. The Junior Fair Board reserves the right to have these covers removed at any time for inspection.
20. No muzzles may be used on any sheep at any time.
21. Each exhibitor showing a market animal must take one animal through the Junior Fair Livestock Sale. Junior exhibitors are limited to one entry in the sale, except by exhibitors having more than one champion or reserve champion market animal. It will be the exhibitor's option to sell their remaining market animals to the packer or take them home.
22. Each animal crossing the scale must be declared terminal or nonterminal at the fair weigh-in. All declarations are final at weigh-in. If an animal is not declared terminal/ nonterminal at the weigh-in, it will be considered terminal. An animal's declaration (sale, terminal or nonterminal) at the fair weigh-in may not be changed unless it is chosen as a grand or reserve champion or under the guidance of the fair veterinarian. Grand or reserve champions will be designated as terminal. If an exhibitor has other animals, their designation will not be changed, regardless of specie. See sale rules for more details on terminal/ nonterminal designation.
23. Slapping and any aggressive hitting of lambs is prohibited. Slapping/ aggressive hitting is defined as using open hand or fist on your animal that can be heard. The use of fingertips with no sound is permitted. First offense will be a verbal warning.

MARKET LAMB RATE OF GAIN CONTEST:

1. Open to all 4-H and FFA market lamb exhibitors.
2. Market lambs must have been weighed at the spring weigh-in to be eligible for this contest.
3. The top two lambs with the fastest rate of gain per day will be awarded trophies. Overall 3-5 will receive rosettes. All ties will be broken by giving the animals with the heaviest starting weight the advantage.
4. Top two rate of gain class winners will be recognized at the sale according to draw number. They will not be sold at the top of the lamb sale.
5. Weight limits are still in effect (90 pounds and over) for competing for the champion market lamb of the show.

GENERAL RULES:

1. Health rules are the same as open class.
2. All market hogs sold through the junior fair livestock sale are required to be sent to harvest. All packer hogs will go to one designated buyer with the exception of the grand and reserve champions.
3. An exhibitor may show two single market hogs. An exhibitor may choose to show two barrows, two gilts or one barrow and one gilt. Exhibitor may choose to enter 2 crossbreds, 2 purebreds or one of each.
4. All hogs must be entered on FairEntry by July 1. Exhibitors may change their entry at the scale - both gender and breed. For purebred hogs – registration papers must be presented at fair weigh in. Purebred animals must be registered within the immediate family as defined by the ODA definition of immediate family.
5. Each breed listed at the end of the department rules will show separately (regardless of the number of entries), there will not be an “all other breeds” class. Other breeds not on the list and crossbreds will show in the crossbred class.
6. To be eligible for championship, hogs must weigh 220 pounds and over. Lightweight hogs will be shown for project grade only. The lightweight classes will be shown first and then the competitive classes will be shown.
7. The champion from each breed will compete for an overall purebred gilt or barrow. Overall purebred champion will compete as a division winner in the final drive with the crossbreds. Overall purebred is considered a “champion” not a “Grand Champion”. Final Drive to determine top 5 overall will include the purebred overall “division winner” along with the division winners from crossbred show (this will happen for both the gilt and barrow shows).
8. A NSR representative along with a Junior Fair Board Member and a Senior Fair Board member will authenticate purebred entries through registration papers. If there is a question regarding a purebred entry, the hog will be held in a holding pen until further examination determines authenticity. If a purebred entry is deemed to not be a purebred, it will be moved to the crossbred show.
9. Wood shavings must be used for bedding. No dyed products are permitted. If unacceptable products are used, the exhibitor will be given one notification by the Junior Fair Board to replace the bedding with acceptable materials. If the problem is not corrected after 24 hours, the exhibitor will be fined \$25 per day per pen.
10. Junior fair members may show their market hogs in the on foot open class show if the required fee is paid and entries made with the Senior Fair Board Department Superintendents.
11. The club with the overall cleanest aisle, cleanest pens, well managed swine projects, and best overall show placings throughout fair week will receive the Bushman-Pleiman Memorial Award at the end of the week as determined by the swine committee. Judging will take place between 10:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m. daily.
12. No trimming or clipping of ears or tails at the fair. Violators will be disqualified from showing.
13. No hogs with noticeable ruptures will be allowed to show.
14. Grand and reserve champion market barrows and gilts will be harvested and viewed as part of the carcass review on the Wednesday after the fair.
15. Automatic water fountains are allowed in pens. Leaking waterers must be repaired or removed within 24 hours of notification. If not repaired or removed, exhibitor will not be allowed to show or sell.
16. If left in pens, feeders and waterers must be secured. Any unsecured feeders and waterers must be removed between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Any additional feedings must be supervised by the exhibitor. Violators will be given one (1) notification, if the violation continues the member is disqualified from showing. Questions or problems should be addressed to the Junior Fair Swine Superintendent.
17. Automatic feeders are allowed but must be emptied during the times listed above. All other rules listed must be followed when automatic feeders are used.
18. No unsupervised hogs are to be left in the wash racks. Hogs should be washed and returned to their assigned pens.
19. All market hogs will be identified in the spring with RFID 840 tags. They will also receive a tag for show identification at the fair prior to weigh-in. Hogs must be in the correct pen according to the exhibitor’s name or the exhibitor/parent must be at the pen when the tagging is done. If hogs are tagged incorrectly, exhibitor must notify the Junior Fair Board prior to the start of the hog weigh-in. Any hogs having to be retagged after the weigh-in due to incorrect penning will not be allowed to place in the market hog show.
20. All barrows will be checked for castration during tagging. Any questionable animals will be checked by the fair vet to determine if the animal may be shown.
21. Showmanship classes will be shown in order Classes 1 through Class 5.
22. Packer load out time will be posted when available. Barns will be closed during loadout. Pens should be cleaned after the hogs are loaded. Hogs may not be moved from their assigned pens before packer load out. Hogs being taken home will be released Friday between 1:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. and after Friday sale hours until 9:00 p.m. Tack and equipment may not be removed from the barns during the livestock sale.
23. Exhibitors must care for their animals until the animals are loaded off the fairgrounds. For market animals, if it is determined at load out that the animal has lacked food and/or water, \$25.00 will be deducted from the value of the animal. This decision will be made by the packer and representatives from the Sale Committee.

24. Each exhibitor showing a market animal must take one animal through the Junior Fair Livestock Sale. Junior exhibitors are limited to one entry in the sale, except by exhibitors having more than one champion or reserve champion market animal. It will be the exhibitor's option to sell their remaining market animals to the packer or take them home.

25. Each animal crossing the scale must be declared terminal or nonterminal at the fair weigh-in. All declarations are final at weigh-in. If an animal is not declared terminal/ nonterminal at the weigh-in, it will be considered terminal. An animal's declaration (sale, terminal or nonterminal) at the fair weigh-in may not be changed unless it is chosen as a grand or reserve champion or under the guidance of the fair veterinarian. Grand or reserve champions will be designated as terminal. If an exhibitor has other animals, their designation will not be changed, regardless of specie. See sale rules for more details on terminal/ nonterminal designation.

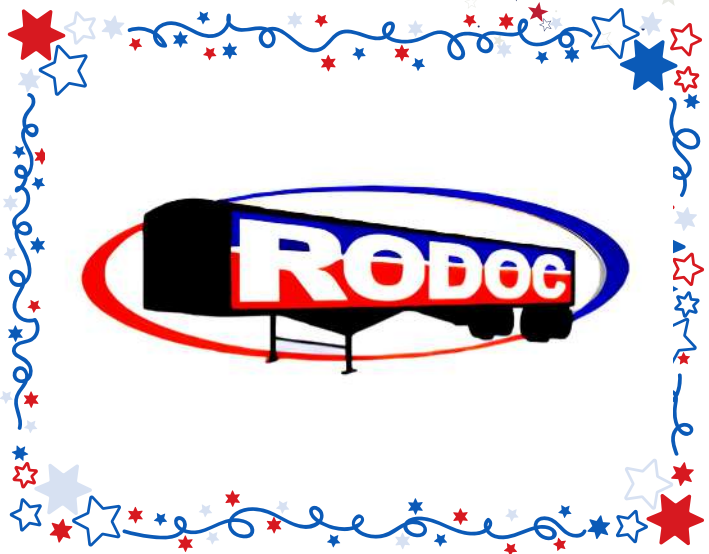

BOOTH SUPERVISION:

1. Each club will be assigned times to supervise the booth building. Three supervisors must be provided for each shift. Supervisors must sign in to be given credit for supervision.
2. All supervisors must wear identification badges.
3. Jr. Fair Board will randomly check the numbers and presence of supervisors.
4. All complaints for non-supervision should be filed with the Jr. Fair Board.
5. Clubs will be fined **\$10.00** for each shift they do not supervise the building. Any club not providing the required **three supervisors** will be also fined \$10.00 per shift. These fines are to be paid to the Jr. Fair Board by January 1 of the following year. Those clubs not paying their fine will forfeit their club members' fair passes for the following year.

GENERAL RULES:

1. All 4-H members with clothing projects are eligible but not required to compete in the Style Revue contest. To receive any clothing awards and premiums, members must be present at county clothing judging and model in the correct category at the Style Revue.

2. If an exhibitor does not participate in the county clothing judging, the child may model in the correct modeling contest but will not be eligible for any modeling or project awards.

3. During the style revue, clothing winners will be announced at the end of each class. Modeling winners will be announced at the end of the modeling contests.

4. **Guidelines for Enrolling in Clothing Projects** - younger members may enroll in projects designed for older members (although it's not generally encouraged and they have to meet all the same requirements as the older competitors).

5. All items that constitute an outfit should be wearable at the same time. A carry-on garment (for example, extra pair of slacks) is not acceptable. This does not apply to accessories. No additional stand-alone props may be used during judging or the style review.

6. Multiple Projects - 4-H members who take more than one clothing project must complete separate learning experiences related to each, including creating a separate, complete total-look outfit for each clothing project.

7. Repeating Projects - Members who repeat projects should attempt new challenges each year such as doing more advanced experiments and surveys and sewing more complicated patterns or harder-to-handle fabrics.

8. Each project class will be placed 1 - 5.

9. The Style Revue will feature the following projects: Sundresses and Jumpers, Clothing for Middle School, Clothes for High School and College, Loungewear, Ready, Set, Sew Active, Dress-Up Outfit, Outerwear for Anywhere, Terrific Tops, Sew for Others, Designed By Me, Shopping Savvy, Creative Costumes, Accessories for Teens, Clothing for Your Career, Sew Fun!, Look Great For Less and em-bel-lish.

10. No entries are required for this department. Final judging schedule will be mailed in July.

11. 4-H members must complete the project requirements as outlined in the 4-H Project Guide.

12. To receive premium money, the actual project must be judged during the judging day, member must model in style review and project must be exhibited in club booth. Clothing project premiums will be paid at the style review.

9. Guns, bows, arrows, ammunition, and firearms of any kind are not permitted on the fairgrounds. Voting will take place at a location designated by the Junior Fair Board during the hours of judging at 4-H Clothing & Nutrition judging, 4-H Livestock Interviews, 4-H Special Interest Judging and FFA Shop and Crop Judging.

Each junior fair member is also entitled to one vote for the king and queen, respectfully. A numbered ballot will be provided for both categories. Voting hours are the same as above.

Junior fair members whose names appear on the ballot may not man the voting table nor be present in the voting area unless they are casting their personal ballot. Abuse of this rule may result in the member's disqualification from the junior fair court.

JUNIOR FAIR KING & QUEEN CORONATION

1. The Junior Fair coronation to be held on Monday, August 3, approximately 6:00 p.m. in the Gospel Tent.

2. One college scholarship will be awarded to the current year's Auglaize County Junior Fair King and Queen, respectively. The scholarship money is to be used toward tuition at any accredited college, university or trade school. Recipients must show proof of enrollment to receive the scholarship money.

3. Recipients must use the money by September 1 of the third year (including year of reign) of being awarded the scholarship. (For example, the 2026 king and queen must use their scholarship by September 1, 2029). If the money is not used within that period, the funds will return to the Junior Fair Board to award future scholarships.

4. The King and Queen will be responsible for assigning all court members to junior fair shows and events. Court members will meet immediately following the coronation to review responsibilities.

JUNIOR FAIR BOARD SELECTION

1. The Board of Directors shall consist of 33 members selected from qualified applicants selected annually based on an application and interview.

2. Members shall be selected for a term of one year and must reapply and be selected annually.

3. Applicants must be 15 years old as of August 1 of the current year.

4. Appointments shall be selected from those qualified members of the society who submit an application. These applications shall be submitted to the Junior Fair Office by 12:00 noon, the last day of the fair.

5. All current board members interested in returning to the board will be reviewed annually.

Articles will be displayed after judging.

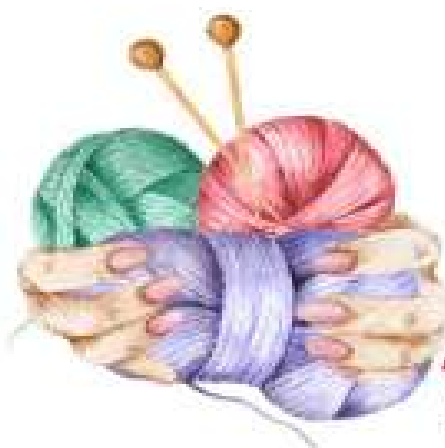

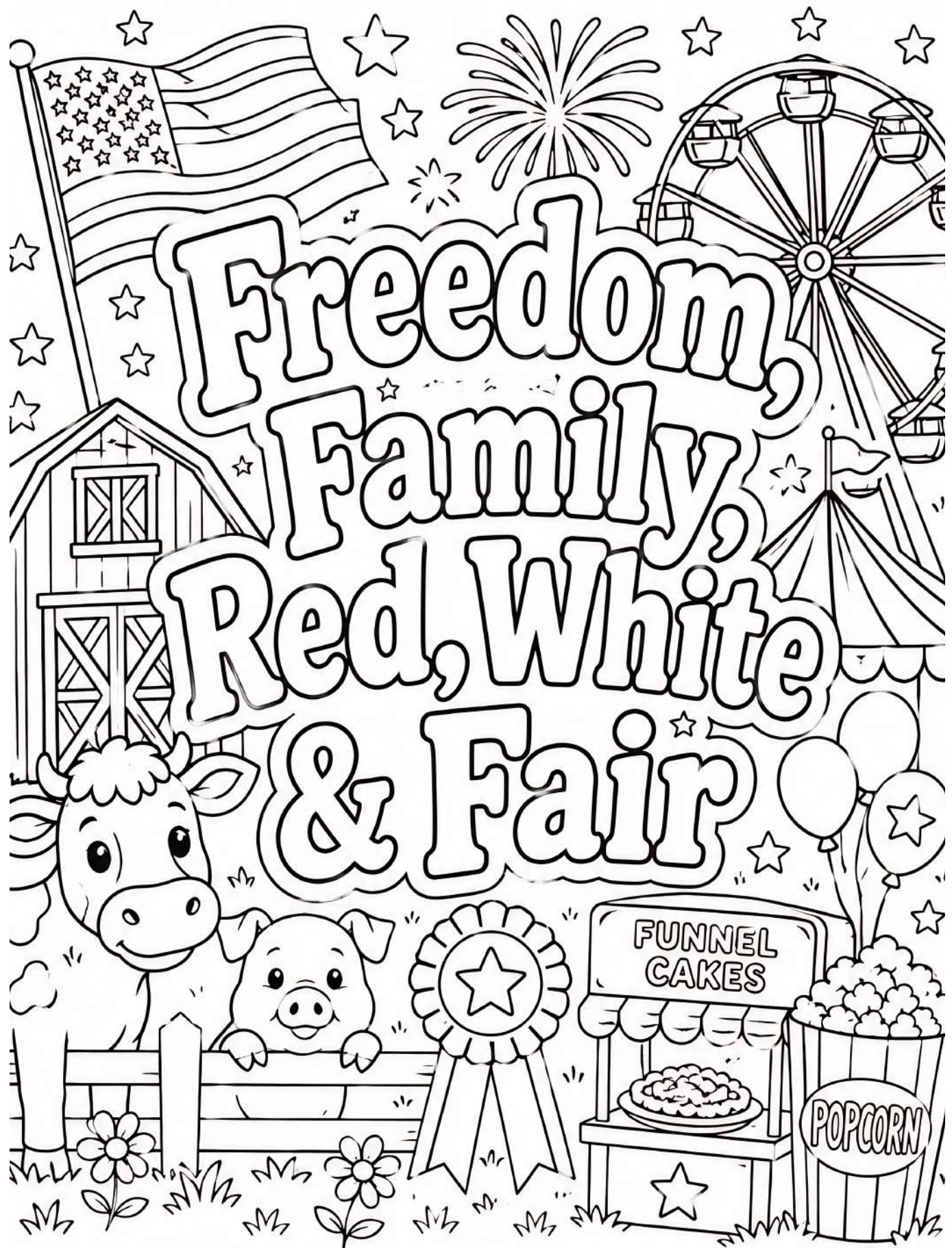
