## 54 Boston Road contracts with Wooster Roofing for New Roof

54 Boston Road Condominiums had their roof shingled with fiberglass shingles in the late 1980's. After only 12 years, the roof has to be redone. The service life of fiberglass shingles is supposed to be a minimum of 20 years for the lowest quality. However, back in the 80's, the fiber glass roofing shingles were a new product and unfortunately had manufacturing defects. These defects are now surfacing and the roofs need to be replaced. The good news for 54 Boston Road condominiums is the manufacturer, Bird & Sons in this case, has agreed, after some negotiations, to supply new shingles free of charge.

54 Boston Road is managed by Kevin Riney of Riney Property Management. Two of the board members, Sal Barbo & Elliot Blaisdell, take a hands-on interest in the maintenance of the condos and work very closely with Kevin. The defective shingles started cracking and leaks developed. Kevin Riney negotiated with Bird to get the replacement shingles. They then put the job up for bid and awarded it to Wooster Roofing. "The homeowners prefer to do their business locally. We hired Wooster Roofing because they are a local company that has an excellent reputation and came in with a very competitive bid," says Riney.

Steve Wooster inspected the site and found the shingles were cracking on all of the roofs that have the fiberglass shingles. "The problem is that they are not flexing properly during extreme temperature change and consequently develop splits, "says Steve. The only solution is a reroofing job. All of the problems

incurred with the fiberglass shingles of the past have been resolved and today's' fiberglass products are great performers.

Besides replacing the shingles, Wooster Roofing installed new drip edges along with six feet of ice and water shield on the eaves and down each valley. They also brought the roof up to code by installing a continuous ridge vent. Sal, Elliot and the rest of the condominium owners don't have to worry about any damage occurring because of a leaky roof. They can rest comfortably for at least the next 25 years.
