Our Mission is to encourage the creation and presentation of original visual arts, to support the cultural life of the community, and to encourage all artists to fulfill their potential.

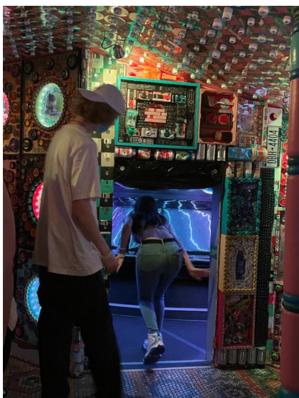
Can't make it to the Louvre to see the Mona Lisa or to the Uffizi to see Venus this year? There are plenty of other art options closer to home that can still take you away.

Immersive art is gaining popularity around the world as another way to soak in the creative spirit without stepping into a traditional museum.

Meow Wolf of Santa Fe New Mexico is one of the movement pioneers. Imagine opening a refrigerator door and stepping into a painting or discovering an "easter egg" that opens a musical or surprise visual element.

Meow Wolf was created in 2008 by a group of Santa Fe, New Mexico Artists (graphic designers, technologists, writers, fabricators, painters, sculptors and musicians) who banded together. They shared a few common passions: "Provocative Playfulness", "Audacious Courage", "Authentic Compassion", and "Creative Collaboration". The original museum project in a nondescript building provided full-time work for many in what can be a hard field to find jobs. It continues to be a popular destination in a community known for its artistic vibe.

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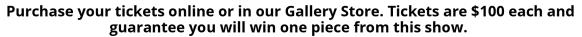
ANOTHER YEAR, ANOTHER AGA EXPLAINATION

ART AND APHANTASIA Mikki Bako Sorensen

You've probably heard of people with a photographic memory, in which they remember everything they have learned or seen as if they were looking at it again right then. If they want to remember something or think about something, it is right there in full color as a picture in their mind. You even may be such a person. Well, having aphantasia is the exact opposite of a having a photographic memory.



With aphantasia, when you want to recall something or think about something there is no picture in your mind at all. It is blank. You have thoughts and concepts, but no visuals accompany these. It is something that is believed to affect a small percentage of the population. I learned a few months ago that I have aphantasia.

Aphantasia is not a disease or a condition. It does not require treatment and it is not a handicap. It is easiest to understand if you liken it to being left-handed rather than right-handed. You can still function fully, but you may approach a given task slightly differently because of the left-handedness.

A Brief History of Aphantasia (taken from an article in the Aphantasia Network by Tom Ebeyer and Jennifer McDougall, printed on March 1, 2020.)

Aristotle used phantasia to explain cognitive processes like memory, thought, reasoning, desire and action. In a brief discussion in De Anima III 3, he describes phantasia as 'that in virtue of which an image occurs in us.' Aristotle accounts for phantasia in thoughts, dreams, memories and even hallucinations. He makes a point to distinguish this capacity for creating mental impressions from perception. A-phantasia is the lack of this ability.

Francis Galton, a British psychologist known for pioneering human intelligence studies, was among the first scientists to recognize 'non-imagers' in the 1880s. His famous Breakfast Study asked participants to visualize their breakfast and describe its vividness. Galton discovered a spectrum of visual imagery — some individuals had vivid mental images, others had faint impressions, and surprisingly, some had no mental images at all. Despite his groundbreaking observations in 1880, the phenomenon was relatively neglected for over 130 years until modern neuroscience could properly investigate it.

Dr. Adam Zeman, a neurologist from Exeter, had a patient who 'went blind in his mind's eye' after undergoing surgery, creating the first documented case of acquired aphantasia. News of this patient's experience attracted widespread media attention, leading to reports from people who could relate to similar experiences — only they had been blind in their mind's eye since birth.

Zeman coined the term congential aphantasia in 2015 to describe the phenomenon of lifelong blind imagination. This paper was picked up by media outlets, including the New York Times, which led to an outpouring of more new discoverers who also identified as having aphantasia.

In 2018, Dr. Adam Zeman and Professor Joel Pearson launched the first neuroimaging studies of aphantasia, using brain scans to understand why some people cannot create mental images.

Dr. Joel Pearson's team validated aphantasia providing objective evidence that aphantasia involves genuine differences in mental imagery rather than just self-reporting issues.



In 2019 Tom Ebeyer, one of Zeman's original 21 participants, established the Aphantasia Network to connect people with extreme imagination differences globally.

Since this time, interest in and study of aphantasia has quickly grown.

Aphantasia is on a spectrum of how people visualize:



Photographic memory (precise detailed visual memory of everything experienced)

Hyperphantasia (vivid visual memory of things experienced, but not as precisely detailed as a photographic memory)

Hypophantasia (some visual memory of things experienced but not nearly so detailed or clear)



Aphantasia (no visual memory of things experienced to very slight occasional flashes of memory and the ability to visualize some things that are involuntary, such as dreams)

My Discovery of Aphantasia and How it Affects my Art.

When I happened upon an article about aphantasia a few months ago, I read it because of my interest in science and the workings of the mind. I never expected it to be meaningful to me personally. As I read, however, I had the sensation of so many things in my life beginning to make sense.



I often used to wonder, even as a child, how other people thought. I knew what thinking felt like to me, but I wondered if it was the same for everyone or was it different for everyone. I especially wondered about my younger sister, who was my polar opposite. It often was hard to communicate with her and she did not seem to care much for rational thinking. I seriously wondered how her brain worked as we were so close in age and shared a bedroom for years, yet were so different in every way. Aphantasia doesn't explain how my sister thinks, but it confirms the idea that people "think" - process information - differently. For me, learning about aphantasia was a big a-ha moment - people actually do think differently.

I eagerly read more and joined Aphantasia Network, a great resource recommended to me by my co-President and fellow aphant, Mary Hargrave. (An aphant is a person with aphantasia.). It was quite exciting when I mentioned my discovery to her and found out she also was an aphant and knew so much about it.

My aphantasia often exhibits as a complete blankness, but occasionally (with no ability to control this on my part) I will have a flash of an image that disappears before I can grasp it. I cannot intentionally recall things in the moment very well, though I have an excellent knowledge base. I do visualize, in color, in my dreams - another involuntary state.

Understanding I had aphantasia explained a major hurdle for me when painting or drawing. I was studying art with Ann Marie Campbell in private classes tailored to me and moving at my own pace. I loved my classes and the pile of homework she gave me after each class. Yet on occasion, she would give me an instruction for homework that I completely understood, but simply could not do. For example: draw a hand, then paint it in blue and umber using the blue for the cool parts and the umber for the warm parts. Simple, right? Wrong. I couldn't do it.

I easily drew the hand as we had studied drawing and had worked on hands. But I just couldn't figure out how to apply the two colors. I understand warm and cool tones. I can tell you, depending on your light source, where the warm and cool tones should go ... but I couldn't "see" it and so I somehow couldn't do it. When I try to "see" in my mind, there is a blank. I have words and ideas, but no pictures at all. And that lack of pictures, for some reason, creates a barrier to my hands being able to do what is needed to accomplish the task.

Drawing from life creates the same barriers for me. I simply cannot translate what I see with my eyes and an idea of something I want to create into something I do with my hands.

It was different when we were in Ann's studio and she was showing me pictures to describe what she wanted me to learn or drawing beside me because I had something concrete to look at. Until I learned about aphantasia, I had no idea what the "blankness' in my mind was. I couldn't explain it to her because I had no idea that other people actually had pictures in their minds. I didn't know that when someone said, "picture a beach scene," or "imagine a scene on a beach with lots of colorful umbrellas" most people actually were picturing a beach scene or creating an actual picture of a beach with umbrellas. I just thought everyone did as I do - I think about what might be on a beach and what the colorful umbrellas might look like - but there is no visual image attached to that thinking.

I think and imagine in words, like I'm writing a story. Sometimes there is a flash of an image that occurs, but it is so fast and unclear that I cannot really describe it - and no matter how I try, I can't make it come back. This is not unusual for aphants. I can describe a made-up scene of: a narrow beach with lots of seaweed strewn near an outcropping of grey rocks at the farthest end. Greenish blue waves tease rows of colorful beach umbrellas ... red, orange, yellow and blue sentries stuck in the mottled, footprintless, tan beach, waiting for the sunbathers that soon will come.

But I don't really see this scene in my mind, I just feel it and know it as I think about it.

Once I learned about aphantasia and my inability to visualize, I was able to talk with Ann Marie and we are modifying how she teaches me new concepts so that I always will have something externally visual to help me.

For my Fellow Artists. Studies are showing that aphantasia is caused by slightly different wiring in parts of the brain such that the wiring of an aphant sort of skips around the part of the brain involved in visualizing. There probably are more ways that an individual's brain is wired just different enough to make how they process experiential information very different - and also how they access and use that experiential information.

Just as I have been able to use my new knowledge about how I process information when making art to help me find a better way to approach art learning, there may be others of you who are Aphants or Hypoaphants who could benefit from knowing this about your self. Or ...

You may have an information-processing difference that impacts how you see, imagine, and do your art. Maybe you struggle in art classes, or certain types of art classes. Before you let yourself get discouraged or think you must have no talent - consider that it may be the way the class material is being presented that is the issue, not your inherent talent. Try an instructor with a different approach, see if that helps. Talk to others to see if they have the same issues as you and see if you can figure a better way to learn. If you are an art instructor with a student who seems motivated but is struggling, maybe they need a different approach to learning.

Remember that everyone has artistic ability and if you have a desire to make art, you just need to learn how best to do that as You.

The simple test for aphantasia is to try to picture something, such as an apple and describe out loud what you are seeing in your mind. I have done this test with friends, my husband and my children. So far, all of them have been able to describe seeing an actual apple, though each of them may be seeing different apples. If someone cannot describe physically seeing an apple, as happened to me, they likely are an aphant.

If you are curious about aphantasia you can reach out to Tom Ebeyer at the Aphantasia Network, as the Network provides lots of information and resources and are helpful to people with questions about how people think and remember. There is a worldwide community of aphants sharing their stories and idiosyncrasies on the Network.

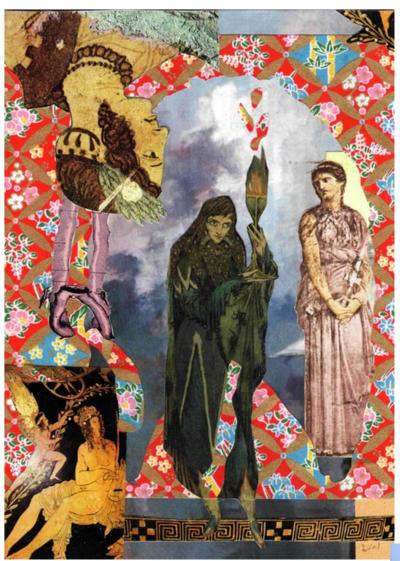

The California State Fair and the Fine Arts exhibition have an interesting history and worth a refresh to our memories. The CA State Fair opened on Oct.4, 1854, in San Francisco and was held at different cities in subsequent years. Sacramento hosted it in 1855 and again in 1859, when it was decided to purchase a site for all future California fairs. In 1860, a 6-block area was dedicated for the fair location at E St to H St. and 20th to 22nd which was home for the fair for the next 50 years! In 1909, the fair location was moved to Broadway and Stockton Blvd. where it stayed until 1967, when it moved to its present location on Exposition Blvd. The Fine Arts show is one of the most visited exhibits at the fair. It's a great honor to be juried into the California Sate Fair Fine Arts show with many entries and a strong competition of excellent art with a limited amount of art chosen to fill the gallery's limited space. Karen Cahill will demonstrate her approach to oil painting and portraiture.

Karen is a painter and draftsperson known for evocative realistic portraits, human figurative work, and still life paintings in oils on panel. Drawing inspiration from the masterful use of light and shadow by artists such as Rembrandt and Caravaggio, Karen employs techniques like the "bistre" underpainting method and glazing to create works of profound depth and emotional resonance.



In addition to studio practice, Karen Cahill values the exchange of knowledge within the artistic community and has found significant learning through teaching others. Karen's work invites viewers to appreciate the beauty of classical techniques applied to contemporary subjects, emphasizing both technical skill and emotional impact.

October 8th Guest Artist - Linda Galusha

Linda Galusha, Bold Expressions 2025 judge, will present her jury process and approach to award selection.

I use the language of visual composition and a distillation of various artistic schools of expression to construct my paintings. The subjects of the paintings are the platforms from which each piece is inspired. The past few years the subject of my works has been trees and their environs. They are for me a never-ending supply of variety for 'seeing' and discovery.



Linda lives and practices art in Grass Valley, California. Her custom mural commissions and her own personal fine art works share interchanging influences with each other. This, with a continuing exploration of the visual language of composition and various schools of art, her works have evolved to a distinct personal expression. The landscapes of the Sierra Foothills and other wild places are currently the subject of her paintings.

"Wayne Thiebaud, most known for art depicting everyday objects. A famous artist and closely tied to Northern California and the NCA."

"I knew this was not a good career choice" -Wayne Thiebaud (1920 -2021)

"OK," I ask myself, "who is the artist Wayne Thiebaud?" This came to mind with his recent exhibition at the Legion of Honor art museum. The NCA website mentions he was a member of NCA, so, I wanted to follow the breadcrumbs to see where they led.

Wayne was born in Arizona, then moved with his family to Southern California when he was just a year old. While still in high school, he worked as a summer apprentice in the animation department of Disney Studios. In 1937, he attended the Frank Wiggins Trade school in L.A., studying commercial art, lettering and sign painting.

The first mention I find of him in Northern California is during WWII, where he was stationed at Mather Army Air Base (back then...) where he worked at the Special Services Department as an artist and cartoonist, eventually moving to the Motion Picture unit. After the war, he went back to L.A., working as an art director for the Rexall Drug company. After his stint at Rexall, he spent the rest of his career and life in Northern California. First, in 1949, enrolling at San Jose State College and then transferring to Sacramento State College (now CSU Sacramento) earning a BA Art (1951) and MA Art (1952). He became an instructor at Sacramento Junior College (now Sacramento City College) while earning his MA Art degree, teaching there through the 1950's. In 1960, he became an assistant professor at U.C. Davis, until retiring in 1990. He continued to teach on an unpaid basis until 2002-forty-two years of teaching and inspiring hundreds of students. 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(Thiebaud continued) There are a few video interviews of Wayne at the Wayne Thiebaud foundation website that gave me a deeper impression of him. I think that his path to professional artist was both an easy and hard choice for him, and his move from commercial to more pure expressive art reflects that. He reflected: "I knew this was not a good career choice". Another thing that stuck with me was his reflection on calm focus that art brought to him.

His artistic style is characterized by a unique blend of realism and abstraction. His subjects, usually (but not always) ordinary objects like pies, cakes, lipstick, city streets, are rendered with detail and presented as an abstraction. He uses a thick impasto style and bold color with repetition and variation.

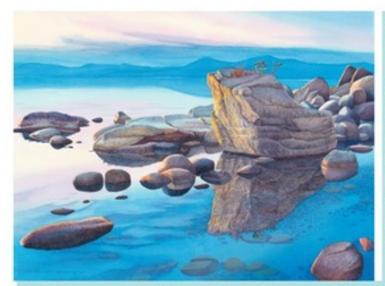
MEMBER NEWS
