



Game Explanation & Rules

Horse Poop Bingo is a fun and unique fundraiser event hosted by Prairie Strides to support our horse-riding program for children with disabilities. The game will take place on Friday, June 26, 2026, after our Annual Celebration Dinner at West Wind Stables. The event will also be available to watch on Facebook Live, starting at 7 PM.

HOW IT WORKS:

- The barn arena is divided into a grid of 2ft x 2ft squares, each square being randomly numbered from 1 to 1998.
- Each ticket number corresponds to a randomly numbered square in the grid.
- On Friday, June 26, 2026, at approximately 7PM, one horse will be let loose in the grid area of the arena at West Wind Stables.
- The horse will freely roam the grid until it poops. The number of the square where the horse poops determines the winner.
- The holder of the ticket corresponding to the winning square will receive a cash prize equivalent to half of the total ticket sales.

RULES:

- Tickets can be purchased for \$5 each. Multiple tickets can be bought by a single participant.
- Must be 18 years or older to participate.
- Must be a resident of Manitoba or physically located in Manitoba to purchase tickets.
- Raffle administrator is not eligible to win.
- Winner must provide first name, last name and mailing address upon claiming prize.
- Raffle tickets are non-refundable. Raffle tickets are not eligible for tax receipts.
- The winning square is the one where the horse first drops its poop. If the poop lands on the line between squares, the square with the majority of the poop will be the winner.
- If the horse doesn't poop within 20 minutes, a ticket will be drawn randomly.
- The winning number will be announced and contacted immediately after the event. Prize must be claimed by July 16, 2026 at 8:00 PM. If the selected winner does not claim the prize by the above date, Prairie Strides Inc., will retain ownership of the prize.
