Our Kindergarten Day











Activity	We are learning
Morning Page/Journal & Jobs, Center Time, attendance, lunch count, folder check—parent notes and dismissal changes are addressed	Students are learning independence with "Morning Jobs" (turn in folder, hang backpack, etc.). As the year progresses, Morning Work will include a variety of math and language arts activities, as well as journal writing.
Morning Meeting—Prayer time & Special Intentions, Group Greetings & Games, News, Share Time, Dance/Movement, Morning Message, Story Time Shared Writing Rhyme Time and Poetry	We build our oral language, phonics, and phonemic awareness in whole group, as well as speaking and listening skills. We practice kindness and build confidence! Beginning with Nursery Rhymes, our Rhyme Time helps us build fluency, rhyming skills, letter sounds, and concepts of print.
Handwriting Phonics	Orton Gillingham is the foundation of our phonics instruction and handwriting. A new phonics concept is introduced each week and threads throughout our morning language arts activities daily.
Shared Reading/Big.Book	This is an interactive reading activity where students join in or share the reading of a poem, book, or other text. Often, we perform the stories we read in class!
Literacy Stations	This is a chance for the teacher to pull individuals and small groups to provide instruction at each student's individual ability level. The students not meeting with the teacher are practicing previously taught literacy skills individually or with a partner.
Writers Workshop	The teacher provides writing lessons that will guide the students as they make meaning in their illustrations and writing composition. Often, students write on a topic of their own choice.
Lunch and Recess	Students eat lunch in the cafeteria. Recess is outside or in the classroom, depending on the weather.

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Cool down/Rest and Reading Readers Workshop	The teacher provides reading lessons that guide the students as they make meaning of the books they listen to and the books they read on their own.
Calendar Activities Math Workshop	We learn math and language skills in the context of our calendar. The teacher will provide math lessons to the whole group. Students will then practice these particular skills with a partner and again individually. New skills are introduced during this time.
Math Stations	Students work individually or with a partner to complete hands-on math tasks. These tasks are generally review tasks. They are highly engaging, so the students LOVE THEMI The teacher provides individual instruction or small group instruction at this time.
Math Journals	Students solve math word problems in their math journals. These words problems are given spirally, so previously taught skills can be reinforced.
Religion	This is a time of prayer, Bible stories, projects, and studies of saints. This is also the time that we learn and practice Christian values. Our goal is to become more like Jesus every day! We attend mass once a week, typically on Fridays. Religion is weaved into our entire day!
Content Area Studies—Health, Science, Social Studies, Spanish	The students learn this subject matter in a variety of ways. The subject matter is reflected in the texts/activities selected throughout our language arts block. Our Scholastic "Let's Find Out " classroom magazine guides our themes. Students take turns being the "Mad Scientist of the Week!"
Specials Tues—Art Weds—P.E. and Library/Computer Lab Thurs.—Music , Spanish Fri—P.E. and Music .	Students attend special classes at various times throughout the week (Library, Phys. Ed., Computer, Art, and Music) *Students spend time in "Learning Labs" twice a week. They combine with 1st and 2nd graders in small groups for intervention and enrichment!



Kindergarten Parent Information



Arrival

 At 8:00, each class will line up with their teachers on the blacktop (or cafeteria depending on the weather). Our principal will lead us in prayer and make announcements before sending the students and teachers off to the classrooms to start the day promptly at 8:05! Parents are welcome to stay for prayer every day! It's a beautiful way to start the day!

• We ask that you please do not walk your child to the classroom. We understand it may be a difficult transition for your child to walk in without you on the first day but please insist that they come in with their teacher and their classmates only. It will make it easier on you, your child, and the class as a whole. It will also benefit your child to get adjusted to this routine early and gain some independence at school from the start. We appreciate your support on this!

Dismissal

- <u>Bus riders</u> will be released at 2:30 from Entrance #1. A teacher will guide the Kindergartners to their buses.
- <u>Car riders</u> will be released at 2:35. Your child's teacher will walk the children out to the car line,
- If your child is attending our TCCP program after school, the TCCP leader(s) will come to the classroom to pick up those students.

Dress Code

- Kindergarten students wear the P.E. uniform as their daily uniform. Just a
 reminder Kindergarteners must wear the new royal blue shirts with the
 Trinity Logo and Kindergartners should be in uniform on the first day of
 school and thereafter. Shorts/pants do not need to have the Trinity School
 Logo but they do need to be SOLID dark/navy blue athletic shorts/pants
 (elastic waist, no buttons, no zips, etc.). Please read over the complete
 uniform policy and email us with any questions.
- Please have an extra uniform in your child's backpack in case of accidents, spills, etc.

Home Folder

Your child will receive his/her own "Home Folder" on the first day of school. Please be sure that your child brings his/her folder back to school every day! This is an easy and effective way for us to communicate and write important notes, questions, etc. Your child will turn in his/her folder every morning and they will be checked by the teacher first thing. Anything you want us to know or receive that day should be written on the correspondence sheet attached to your child's folder. For example, pick-up changes, office paperwork, field trip forms, book orders, etc. Your child will use his/her folder to collect papers, projects, and assessments that they do in class. It would be wonderful if your child could empty their folder and share their papers with you every day! Although much of our learning will be done using manipulatives and hands-on/interactive activities, the papers that you will

see coming home should give you a glimpse of what your child has been working on in class...and can be great conversation starters to help your child reflect on their day at schooll

• Lunch and milk money should also be in your child's folder. ALL lunch money, forms, etc should be placed in a plastic baggy or envelope and marked with your child's first AND last name and "K". You will also have the option of ordering and paying for lunch/milk online through FACTS.

Birthdays

• We love birthdays! On your child's birthday, he/she may bring a small snack for the class to share at lunch time. Please do not send drinks, napkins, plates, balloons, etc. Also, there is very little prep time during the day so please send cupcakes vs. a cake, ice cream cups vs. a gallon of ice cream, etc. Thank you! Parents are welcome to join their child for lunch on their birthday...or any day for that matter@! We will make it a very special day!

Kindergarten Resource Map

There are many programs that we utilize in Kindergarten at Trinity Catholic, so I have mapped out their uses for you! I hope this information is helpful!

Dojo: I will use Dojo's Classroom Newsfeed Page to share pictures and videos of what is going on in our classroom. Individual student portfolios of students' work will also be built using Classroom Dojo. Please feel free to like and comment on pictures/videos on Dojo to help build our classroom community! I just ask that you do not post pictures of other children on other social media sites. Thank you! Please feel free to message me on Dojo at any time, although I may not be able to respond until after school hours. Dojo will be our main hub for communication, so it may be helpful to turn on notifications through the app to help keep up with classroom happenings! Dojo may eventually be used for managing and communicating behavior as needed. It will assist me in tracking behavior habits consistently, which I can then use to communicate with you and support your child's needs. Positive behavior is consistently reinforced and rewarded in a number of ways throughout the school day!

ESGI- ESGI is used for progress monitoring. Frequently, parent reports and flashcards will be printed out and sent home in your child's folder following ongoing assessments in several subjects. These assessments occur one on one with your child and me at any given time throughout the week, month: These mini meetings and evaluations help me differentiate instruction for all students individually!

FACTS- Our FACTS system will be used for quarterly report cards, attendance, lunch, and school-wide information.

Lexia- Lexia is an online program that will be utilized at school only. It is an individualized program that will help build your child's literacy, phonological awareness, and phonics skills. We LOVE Lexial

IXL-IXL is a great school and home resource for practicing skills in language arts and math. This tool also helps me provide individualized practice based on each child's need for extra support and/or enrichment.

RAZ- RAZ is a leveled-reading program that will be utilized at home and at school as soon as students' reading levels are determined.
