The reader remains at large. The lobby remains peaceful. No one is doing crimes. And no one has been unalived.

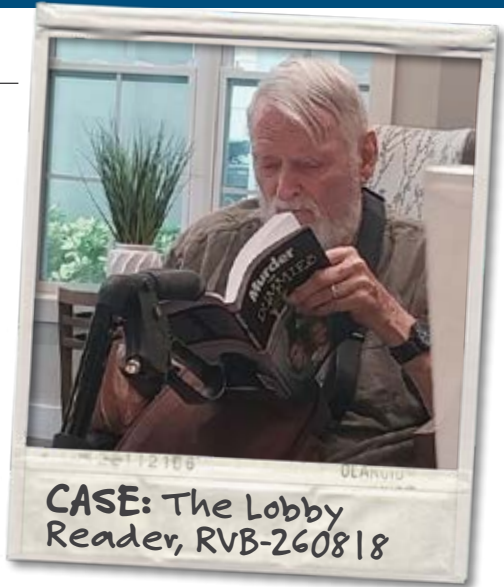
As far as we know.

A LIFE MEASURED IN GRACE:
The Story of Mary Jane "Mike" Stanley



Editor's Note: Mary Jane “Mike” Stanley passed away peacefully on Sunday, August 23, just shy of 94 years and just before this newsletter was published. We share this tribute with her family’s blessing, holding them in our thoughts as we remember a life so well lived. Mike will be deeply missed by all who knew her.

If you listened closely, you could almost hear the rhythm of Mike Stanley’s life — the steady tap of tennis balls on a summer court, laughter echoing from a crowded kitchen, the click of a lipstick tube before the evening’s cocktail hour, the low hum of a train bound for Manhattan. Hers was a story of traditions, resilience, and a love that kept its own calendar.

Mary Jane “Mike” Stanley came into the world in Poughkeepsie, New York, a late-in-life surprise for Anna and Charlie O’Brien. With her mother 45 and her father nearly 50, she was cherished from the start—but it was her three older brothers, all at least nine years ahead, who took the lead in raising her. They saw their little sister as a project and a promise. She was the only girl, the baby of the family, and they decided early on that she wouldn’t get by on just parental doting. Her brothers made it their mission to toughen her up, to make sure she knew how to handle herself, and to teach her about the world beyond their doorstep. The name “Mike” began as a joke—a bit of ribbing, maybe even a subtle wish for another brother—but it became her badge. They called her Mike to make her strong, to give her an edge, and in doing so, helped shape the confident, unforgettable woman she became. She never had a chance to be a shrinking violet—

with those three as her guides, she was always meant to stand out.

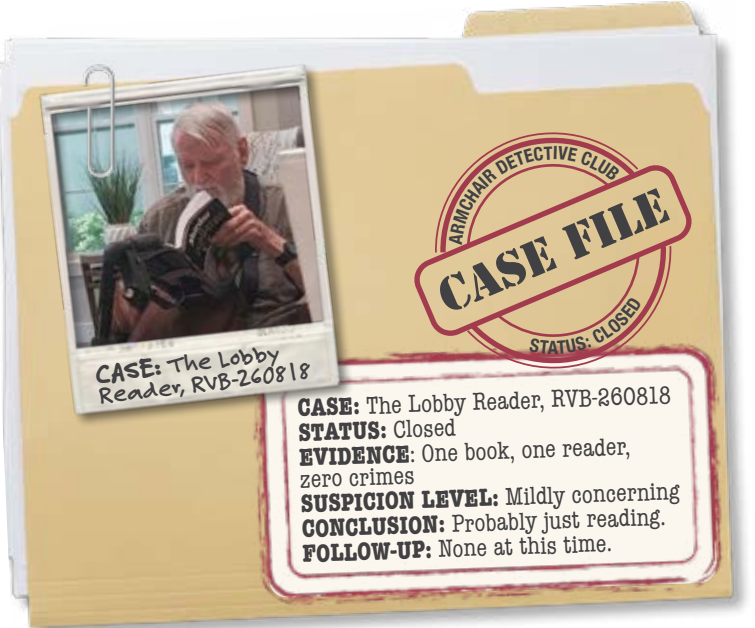
The O’Brien household hummed with energy and a sense of duty. Mike’s father, Charlie, was Commissioner of Highways for Dutchess County and a proud WWI veteran—a man whose work often put him at the center of the community. He was the one giving steady, heartfelt speeches at the train station as local boys shipped out to war, and it was his career that earned him a place among the dignitaries invited to President Roosevelt’s funeral at Hyde Park. Mike was just thirteen when she stood beside her father that day, rows of folding chairs stretching before them, and Fala, the president’s Scottish terrier, darting through the crowd, blissfully unaware of the moment’s weight. Even as a young girl, Mike was learning to see history not as something far away, but as something that happened right in front of her.

There were other moments, too, that pressed themselves into memory. In 1939, Mike stood with her grandparents in the crowded heart of Hyde Park as a procession of vehicles rolled through town—King George VI and Queen Elizabeth making their historic visit to President Roosevelt’s home. It was the first time British royalty had ever set foot on American soil, and the whole town felt the importance of the occasion. Looking back,

it’s clear that the visit carried the weight of history—the world teetering on the edge of war, and leaders searching for common ground. For Mike, it was a day when the extraordinary swept right through her own backyard.

Mike’s school years kept her close to home but always moving forward. She attended Oakwood Friends School, a venerable co-ed institution founded by Quakers, where the values of quiet confidence and service were as much a part of the curriculum as any textbook. Mike was a day student, returning each evening to the familiar rhythms of her family, but the school’s legacy left its mark on her. After graduation, she went on to Endicott College—then a two-year women’s college—where she earned an associate’s degree in merchandising. Her first job took her to Boston, working at Filene’s Department Store, surrounded by the city’s bustle and promise. Little did she know, Boston would become the backdrop for the next chapter of her life.

The night Mike met George Stanley, the stars weren’t aligned so much as mischievously rearranged. It was supposed to be a simple double date: George paired with a friend of Mike’s, Mike paired with another young man. But as the evening unfolded, George’s attention kept drifting to Mike, and by the end of the night, there was no question who he was interested in. George



couldn't help himself, and when his date wasn't paying attention, he asked Mike out on a date. Mike came home positively electric, called her mother, and declared she'd just met the man she was going to marry. Her mother, ever practical and wanting to keep her daughter's feet on the ground, gently warned, "Be very, very, very careful!"—after all, Mike hadn't even been on a real date with him yet. But she felt it in her bones. Some things, Mike just knew.

Their love was a partnership built on small rituals and deep laughter. George, a WWII veteran and Dartmouth-educated chemist, began his career at Dow Chemical in Michigan before the couple settled in Fairfield County, Connecticut. There, George first worked for a textile firm, Latta Nordin & Stanley, then struck out on his own, building a textile brokerage in Manhattan from the ground up—a business he ran for years with steady resolve and quiet pride. Every morning, George joined the tide of fathers in suits and hats on the train into the city, while Mike kept the household running smoothly and filled with warmth.

Home for the Stanleys was a place of order, warmth, and the kind of humor that could light up a room. George's dry wit was a constant, and Mike cherished his ability to make her laugh—no matter the circumstance

or the setting. Each evening, George would swap his work clothes for something more comfortable, while Mike "freshened up"—a touch of powder, a swipe of lipstick, a spritz of perfume, sometimes even a new dress. From six to seven, cocktail hour was sacred: just the two of them, reconnecting and unwinding, a ritual as steady as the ticking of a clock. The children knew to give their parents this hour alone. If there'd been trouble at school that day, a boy might be summoned into the parlor—but only after Dad's first drink. For that moment, the room became a gentle court of family justice, and once the verdict was given, the child was dismissed back into the fold. Then, as if nothing had happened, the family gathered together at the dinner table, the day's rhythms restored and the routine never once broken.

After dinner at seven, life resumed its lively pace. Tennis was a constant—summers at the Shore and Country Club, winters spent indoors playing padel, a fast-paced racquet sport that kept their competitive spirits sharp. Mike and George's love for the game was rivaled only by their love for each other.



When retirement brought them to Vero Beach in 1988, they traded tennis for golf, joined the Vero Beach Golf Club, Sea Oaks Tennis Club, and the Vero Beach Yacht Club, and settled into a new rhythm. About ten years before George's passing, the couple began a tradition that became the



centerpiece of their week: Saturday night date night at the Yacht Club. Though invitations from friends were plentiful—often even from those seated across the same dining room—George made it clear that Saturday nights were for Mike, and Mike alone. Every week, they dressed in their best and arrived promptly for their 6pm cocktail hour in the Club's bar. They'd speak to their friends and mingle with others, then promptly at seven, they made their way to the same table, reserved just for the two of them. The meal was theirs to savor together, their attention fixed only on each other as conversation and laughter echoed around the room. When dinner wound down, they would take to the dance floor, rounding out the night with music and the easy joy of each other's company. It was a ritual of devotion—undisturbed, unwavering, and cherished.

Travel was another thread. Each March, the family headed to the Caribbean Islands, and summers meant two weeks at Martha's Vineyard—days of salt air, the faint echo of history. Her family recalled watching the moon landing from there, the same weekend as Senator Ted Kennedy's accident on Chappaquiddick, just shy of a couple hundred yards from where

they stayed. The world's events, always brushing up against the family's private moments.

But perhaps nothing defined Mike more than her fierce devotion as a mother. When Jim was diagnosed with juvenile diabetes at five, doctors gave him a prognosis that would have devastated most. In those years, children with the disease were rarely expected to live past fifteen. Mike refused to accept the odds. She became an expert, an advocate, and a tireless guardian—never leaving Jim's side when his health was fragile, sometimes sitting up through the night by his side just to make sure he was safe. She poured herself into the Juvenile Diabetes Association, setting aside time from her active role in the Junior League, and became a fixture at Camp Joslin, always searching for new information, better treatments, and a sense of hope for families like hers. Jim remembers her as a mother who fought for his life with the same determination her father once brought to public service. Today, at seventy, he credits her vigilance and love for the healthy life he now enjoys. Bill, his brother, says simply: if it weren't for Mom, Jim might not be here today.

Mike and George always knew they wanted three children. After Jim's diagnosis, the uncertainty surrounding juvenile diabetes made them hesitant to risk passing the illness on to another child. So, with the same sense of resolve and love that shaped their family from the start, they chose to adopt. Kerry, welcomed into their family very soon after her birth, completed the circle and was greeted with all the joy and anticipation that Mike and George had long held in their hearts.

Their home—already spacious,

with five bedrooms and five baths—became a canvas for Mike's creative energy. She filled it with carefully chosen antiques, treasures discovered at estate sales and auctions, each piece reflecting her eye for history and beauty. She was endlessly talented with needle and thread, decorating pillows, drapes, and clothing with her own embroidery and needlepoint. Every room in the house bore Mike's touch—a blend of artistry, tradition, and warmth that made the Stanley home truly theirs.

Mike was always active, always present—the kind of person who made a stranger feel like an old friend, who listened more than she talked, who asked after you before answering about herself. Clubs and causes filled her days, but her truest legacy is her family: three children, seven grandchildren, and six great-grandchildren, each carrying a piece of her quiet confidence and warmth. Her children's lives are a testament to her influence—Jim, now a mortgage lender at Marine Bank, and Bill, who imports renewable building supplies from across the world, both make their homes in Vero Beach, never far from their mother's orbit. Kerry, the daughter who completed their circle, lives in Palm Bay, carrying forward the same resilience and devotion that defined her family growing up.

It's hard to capture a life like Mike's in just a few pages. But for those who sat with her, even in her later years, they felt the pulse of history—the echo of Fala's paws at Hyde Park, the laughter of children on Martha's Vineyard, the soft



click of a perfume bottle before cocktail hour. When asked how she's getting along, she would say, "I'm fine, dear, but how are you?" And she always meant it, because her life was measured not in grand gestures, but in the accumulation of daily grace, steadfast love, and an unwavering belief in the people she held close.

Mike Stanley's story isn't just told. It lives on, in every room, every ritual, and every memory that still lingers in the air. 🐾
