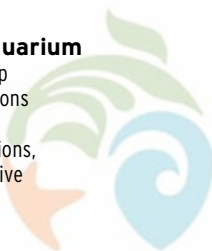

In the Net Loft Shops and in the Artisan District, many of Canada’s best artists and designers can be found.

Granville Island is home to many cultural venues and hosts numerous performing arts and cultural festivals year-round.

The “Island” has eleven restaurants and bars, with three of them distilling and brewing on site, 7 indoor theatres and performance venues, and dozens of outdoor performance spaces. Granville Island also has a 60 room boutique hotel, making it a perfect destination for a staycation for locals, and a lovely location for visitors outside of the busy downtown core.

Operationally self-sustaining, Granville Island receives no funding from any level of government and is not part of the City of Vancouver, operating in a not-for-profit model, home to more than 300 businesses and employing more than 3,000 people. granvilleisland.com

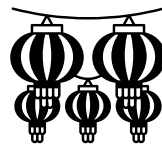

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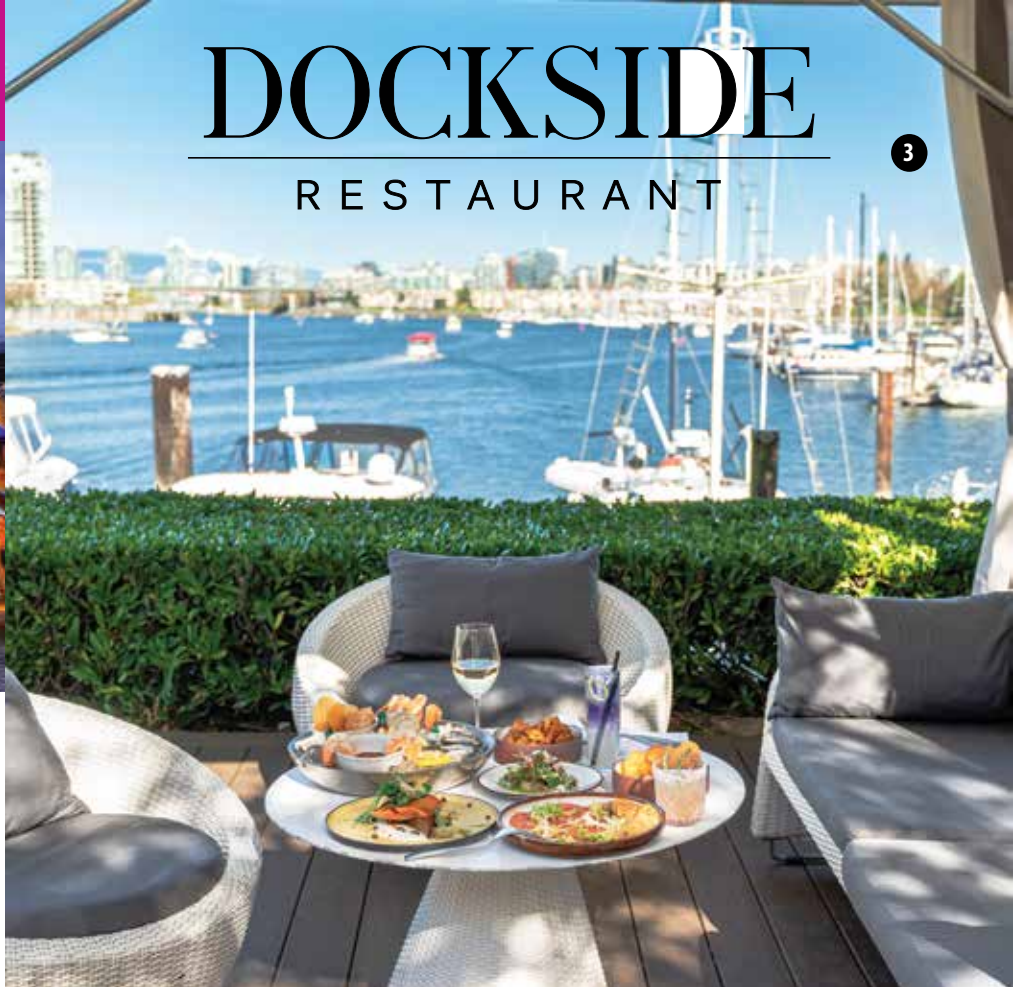

Robson Street

In the 1950s and '60s the three-block area from Burrard to Jervis called Robsonstrasse was the centre of German culture and commerce. Today, Robson Street west of Burrard includes excellent shopping, cafés and restaurants. Georgia Street

Georgia Street was named in 1886 after the Strait of Georgia, and ran between Chilco and Beatty Streets. After the first Georgia Viaduct opened in 1915, the street's eastern end was connected to Harris Street, and Harris Street was subsequently renamed East Georgia Street.

Feature Story: Stanley Park

A green jewel in an urban setting: Stanley Park's history

Stanley Park has been Vancouver's favourite urban playground for as long as the city itself has been in existence. When members of city council convened for their second meeting on May 12, 1886, just five weeks after the city was incorporated, high on the agenda was the matter of a civic park. Council drafted a petition asking the government of Canada to hand over the 1,000-acre military reserve located on the peninsula of land jutting into Burrard Inlet at the "First Narrows". The federal government complied, and in October, 1888, Governor General Lord Stanley came to town to dedicate the park. In the rest of the country, Stanley is best known for donating the silverware that became the National Hockey League's championship trophy. Here in Vancouver, he is known for the park that bears his name.

The city's founders prided themselves on their farsight-edness. Urban parks were, and still are, considered the hallmark of a progressive community. But more than community spirit motivated these pioneer politicians, who were mainly merchants and land speculators. By forestalling the possibility that the military reserve might ever be sold off as real estate, they were protecting the value of their own property investments elsewhere in the city.





No one had consulted the park's original inhabitants, the First Nations people who had used the peninsula for generations before the arrival of outsiders. The Squamish people had occupied seasonal camps at Whoi Whoi (*Lumberman's Arch*), Staitwouk (*Second Beach*), and Chaythoos (*Prospect Point*) and were still living there when the park was created. There were several fishermen and millhands living with their families near Brockton Point on land they were never allowed to acquire, and a group of "Kanakas" (Hawaiians) living in Coal Harbour. All of these people were eventually displaced by the government in order to create a pristine wilderness for the residents of the city to enjoy.

Of course, there was nothing pristine about the park. Loggers had been busy since the 1860s hacking down the original tree cover, and the first thing the city did after taking control was to carve out a scenic road around the perimeter of the peninsula. There is still a First Nations presence in the park. A cluster of totem poles near Brockton Point serves to remind visitors of the first inhabitants.

The original park reserve was an island, cut off at high tide by the rising waters of Coal Harbour and English Bay as they merged in the low area now occupied by Lost Lagoon. The water was crossed by a log bridge until the stone causeway was built in 1916, creating the small lake. The name Lost Lagoon comes from a Pauline Johnson poem: *It is dusk on the Lost Lagoon And we two dreaming the dusk away, Beneath the drift of a twilight grey, Beneath the drowse of an ending day, and the curve of a golden moon.*

The ashes of the famous poet, who lived out her final years in Vancouver, are buried beneath a cairn near Third Beach. Between the world wars, the biggest change to the park was the construction of the main road linking the Georgia Street entrance with Lions Gate Bridge. A group of British investors built the bridge to provide access to their North Shore real estate development, the British Properties. It opened in November 1938, by which time work crews had completed the road, known subsequently as The Causeway. It had been approved by voters in a public plebiscite and carried out largely as a Depression-era make-work project. For many years this thoroughfare featured one lane of traffic in each direction and a middle lane, known aptly as the "suicide lane" because it was open to traffic for passing in either direction. Nowadays, traffic is controlled by signal lights.

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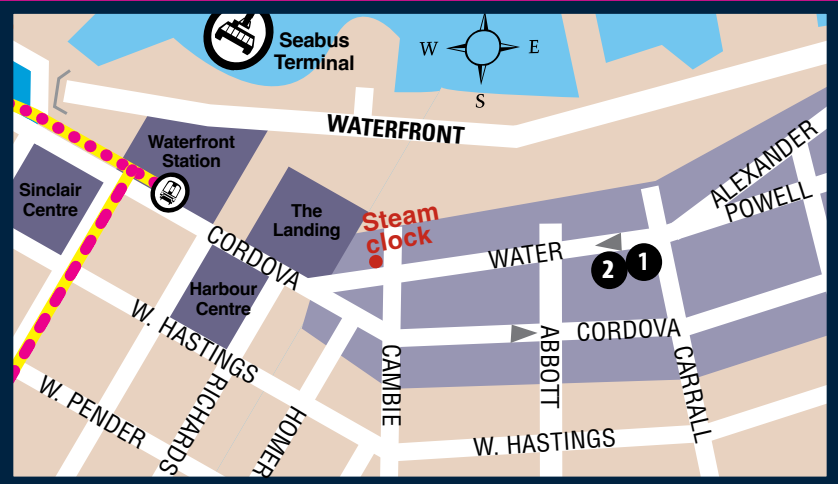

Feature Story: Mosaics

Art Under Foot

Whether a long-time resident or a visitor, the next time you are walking in downtown Vancouver, take a moment to look down. An exciting discovery is literally at your feet and provides an impressive visual tour of historical and contemporary Vancouver through beautiful mosaic tiles.

Back for its 15th year anniversary, the Downtown Vancouver Business Improvement Association (DVBIA) launched the mosaic public art project aimed at beautifying downtown streetscapes.



In partnership with the City of Vancouver and the Creating Employment Through Art co-op (CETA), the DVBIA commissioned accomplished mosaic artists - Liz Calvin and Bruce Walther - to spearhead the design and production of the mosaics. Calvin became passionate about mosaics traveling through Europe where she attended a mosaic art school in Italy for one year.

Walther, a self-employed artisan for more than 15 years, has done numerous stained glass commissions for private residences as well as public art projects, residential tile work, and community mosaic workshops.

The concepts behind the twelve original tile mosaics - each measuring nine square feet and containing between 3500 and 4500 hand cut ceramic pieces - reflects the culture, history and geography of downtown Vancouver.

Each mosaic took approximately 160 hours to create. Calvin and Walther worked with CETA, a collective of artists who are residents of the Downtown Eastside, some of whom are challenged with addictions or mental illness, to develop the mosaics. The group's purpose and philosophy is explained on its website: ***"Just as CETA pieces broken tile together into a beautiful mosaic, CETA also strives to act as a catalyst for putting lives back together through art and enterprise."***

One of the mosaics tributes Dal Richards; a Vancouver legend. With a career spanning over a half century, and with all of the charisma and style it takes to be a Big Band leader, Dal is an icon of Vancouver's music scene. The success of his impressive orchestra, boasting an amazing five night-a-week 25-year run at the Panorama Roof of the Hotel Vancouver and 25 years of live CBC National Radio broadcasts has led to friends and fans affectionately dubbing him Dr. Swing.

Some of the other mosaics feature historic Granville Street's entertainment district awash in the neon glow of the 1950s, The Hudson Bay Company circa 1670, tributes to notable architecture including the 1929 nurse from the Art Deco Georgia Medical Dental Building, and the Princess Marguerite II, a historic steamship, passing under the Lions Gate Bridge.

Mountain Biking

Heralded as the birthplace of freeriding, Vancouver's famed North Shore Mountains are an internationally regarded destination. Mount Fromme, Mount Seymour and Cypress Mountain have routes that are so steep it's hard to believe someone could actually maneuver them.

Further north, Squamish is renowned for its excellent cross-country, downhill and freeriding opportunities, and has a trail for every experience level.



Grouse Grind

The Grouse Grind in North Vancouver is a very challenging 2.9-kilometre (1.8-mile) trail up the face of Grouse Mountain. Commonly referred to as "Mother Nature's Stairmaster," this one is a workout. With an elevation gain of 853 metres (2,800 feet), you'll be climbing 2,830 steps up a mountain, so you'll need strong hips and legs. There are rest stops and a few benches at the halfway mark for hikers to take a breather, but they are limited. Until you emerge at the very top there are few viewpoints through the forest, but once you see it for yourself, the panoramic view of Vancouver below will make the tough climb worthwhile. Over 100,000 people hike the trail annually.

teveston's heritage homes and waterfront walks is in complete contrast to the bright lights and excitement of Richmond's city centre, which a vibrant Asian community has helped shape. Here you'll find the city's dramatic new city hall complex, an amazing array of shops and restaurants where award-winning dim sum, Vietnamese pho, and seafood with a twist will satisfy any appetite. The city's many malls - legendary for their size and variety - bring you a world of shopping not found anywhere else in the Lower Mainland.

To get a closer look at the sea, arrange a sea kayaking trip around the island. The island is also home to a thriving artist community—take a stroll around Artisan Square for a unique island shopping experience.

Sea To Sky

Every journey through Sea to Sky Country starts with an epic drive along one of the most spectacular stretches of road in the world. Although stunning, Highway 99 (better known as the Sea to Sky Highway) provides only a snapshot of the beauty that lies ahead. Starting just 30 minutes from downtown Vancouver in picturesque Horseshoe Bay and stretching all the way to Lillooet, the highway acts as a gateway connecting the Lower Mainland to an incredible outdoor adventure playground. Along the way, you'll be captivated by the glistening waters of Howe Sound, the tumbling waters of Shannon Falls, the view from the Sea to Sky Gondola, and any number of other outdoor adventures in this breathtakingly wild place.

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Shannon Falls Provincial Park Shannon Falls

Flows adjacent to the Sea to Sky Highway near Squamish, and is composed of a series of cliffs 335 metres (1,099 feet) tall, making it the third highest waterfall in BC. The well maintained and easily accessible trail through Shannon Falls Provincial Park will take you right to the base, where you'll be able to see and feel the clouds of mist as they billow out from the roaring falls. (Take the Great Canadian Sightseeing Whistler/Squamish tour; www.greatcanadianrolley.com)

Sea to Sky Gondola

Squamish is home to the region's newest must-see attraction - the Sea to Sky Gondola. Having opened to rave reviews in the spring of 2014, the 10-minute gondola ride takes you 885 metres (2,904 feet) above sea level and provides sweeping views of Howe Sound and the surrounding coastal mountains.

Once at the top, visitors can enjoy a wide array of outdoor experiences, including two interpretive walking trail loops, three viewing platforms, the Sky Pilot Suspension Bridge,

and access to eight main hiking trails. There are also a variety of food and drink options to manage post-adventure hunger including the Summit Restaurant and Edge Bar.



Burnaby

Burnaby is just east of Vancouver, home to North America's only mountain top university; Simon Fraser University, and has the largest retail and entertainment complex in British Columbia, namely Metrotown. Burnaby also has many outstanding sports and recreational facilities.

The Metrotown area, a 15-minute SkyTrain ride from downtown Vancouver, is where you'll find over 500 stores and an equally impressive entertainment complex, enough to keep even the most dedicated shopper (and the rest of the family) happy! And it's just a short walk to Central Park, an immense urban forest, with wide pathways, pitch & putt golf, tennis courts and an outdoor pool. If you're interested in outdoor recreation, don't miss the chance to rent a paddleboat at Deer Lake Park, or just enjoy the music in the Park. Deer Lake is also home to the beautiful Hart House Restaurant, and cultural attractions such as the Burnaby Village Museum & Carousel, the Shadbolt Centre for the Performing Arts, and Burnaby Art Gallery.

TRI-CITIES - COQUITLAM, PORT COQUITLAM & PORT MOODY

The Tri-Cities area is to the east and north-east of the City of Vancouver, and is made up of three municipalities: Port Moody, Port Coquitlam and Coquitlam. The area brings together Port Moody's railway heritage, Coquitlam's golf and wilderness recreation, and Port Coquitlam's revitalized city centre and riverside trails, providing plenty of interesting options for visitors to experience.

At the centre of Port Moody, an easy 30 minutes by car from downtown Vancouver, is a compact business district, where you'll find a variety of quaint shops and places to grab a bite to eat. Nearby Rocky Point Park is a popular spot, with shoreline trails to stroll. The city's railway heritage is celebrated in an annual festival and a heritage railway station survives as a museum. The surrounding area offers a variety of outdoor recreation opportunities, such as Belcarra Regional Park—home to great beaches, hiking trails, picnic areas and a host of water activities. In the park you'll also find

the Buntzen Lake Reservoir Recreation Area, a perfect day trip destination for families.

Getting out and into nature is easy in Coquitlam, with over 70 local parks including the 176-hectare (435-acre) Mundy Park Forest. Many people enjoy the Como Lake hike, featuring a 1-kilometre (0.6-mile) loop trail, lakeside benches, picnic amenities and a variety of bird and wildlife species, Como Lake offers a rich park experience. This little known gem located in the heart of Coquitlam is also a popular fishing hole for anglers. The lake is stocked with rainbow trout, making for great fishing opportunities in the spring and fall.

Coquitlam also has a thriving arts and culture scene, and the past is evident with the preservation of a number of historic homes in the area. Maillardville, home to British Columbia's oldest francophone community embraces its roots with a museum, art gallery and an annual arts festival.

Metro Vancouver

Delta - Ladner, Tsawwassen & North Delta

Three distinct communities make up the largely agricultural municipality of Delta, to the south of the City of Vancouver: Ladner, North Delta and Tsawwassen. The area is well known for its wildlife, especially the bird species that can be found here. An undulating carpet of white can be seen in Delta's fields in the fall as the snow geese stop to rest on their journey south for winter. They are among the many species that stop in the area during this annual ritual of nature.

To get up close & personal, you will want to visit the George C. Reifel Migratory Bird Sanctuary, forming part of the Fraser River Estuary in Delta, this 300-hectare (740-acre) protected area is home to over 250 avian species.

Historic Ladner is an active fishing village with 19th century homes sitting behind the dykes that hold the Fraser River at bay. North Delta is home to the 4046 hectare (10,000 acre) Burn's Bog, one of the most important natural habitats in the province, with more than 200 species of migratory birds using the area for resting, staging, and breeding.

Speaking of birds, a well-kept secret is Ladner is home every winter to hundreds of bald eagles. Drive down highway 17 or 17A and you will witness a display of as many as 2000 eagles during a peak year. From December through March, the nearby landfill is a magnet for bald eagles (which get their name from the old English word

"balde", meaning white). Eagles are drawn to the Fraser River delta after coastal fish spawning runs decline, feeding largely on ducks and gulls in the area, including productive Boundary Bay, only a few wing beats south of the landfill.

Tsawwassen is best known as the departure point for BC Ferries vessels bound for Vancouver Island and the Gulf Islands. With long, sandy beaches, it is also perfect for lounging or trying your hand at windsurfing in the shallow bays.

Heading to Victoria, leave some time to stop in Tsawwassen, soon to be known as a great shopping destination with the opening of the new Tsawwassen Mills shopping mall on First Nations land here in Delta. Drop off the kids on the way to the mall at the refurbished Big Splash Water Slide Park. They will thank you for it. TourismDelta.com or call 604.946.4232



New Westminster

Just 20-minutes south-east from downtown Vancouver, you can discover Western Canada's oldest city, New Westminster. Known as the "Royal City," explore the historic downtown's 19th century architecture, poke around the waterfront with its public markets and boardwalk or discover the Fraser River's ever changing parade of tug boats and freighters.

New Westminster offers an interesting and eclectic array of shopping. Columbia Street is the centre of downtown, and you'll find antiques of all sorts tucked away on Front Street's "Antique Alley." History, arts and culture are in abundance, with plenty of local museums, galleries, and performing arts venues.

Don't miss the River Market at Westminster Quay. Feast and fun come together at the River Market, where the hungry and curious gather to eat, shop and play. Showcasing independent restaurants and shops, this 7,000-square-metre (75,000-square-foot) marketplace on the banks of the Fraser River has become a hub for community life in New Westminster.

In the city's heritage neighbourhoods, distinguished architecture by some of British Columbia's best known architects, is found along tree-lined streets, such as those in the Queens Park area. If nature is more your thing, visit one of New Westminster's many parks, from the 19th century plan of Queen's Park and its rose gardens, to the natural landscape of the 4.8 hectare (12-acre) Glenbrook Ravine.

The Fraser River is yours to discover through rotating exhibits and hands-on programs at the Fraser River Discovery Centre in New Westminster. At 1,375 kilometres (850 miles) long, the Fraser River is one of the largest salmon spawning waterways in the world.

It is also one of only three rivers in BC in which North America's largest freshwater fish, the white sturgeon, spawn. Come experience the history of this important natural resource and learn about the mighty river's contribution to British Columbia and its people.

Metro Vancouver

Surrey

Stretching between the Fraser River and the United States/Canada border, southeast of the City of Vancouver, Surrey is Metro Vancouver's largest city in terms of area, and with an estimated 500,000 residents, is second largest behind Vancouver in terms of population. Getting there is easy: the Skytrain's Expo lines takes passengers from downtown Vancouver to Surrey in just over 30 minutes.

This rapidly growing urban centre continues to maintain strong ties to its rural heritage and natural environment. Cloverdale is the historic heart of the area and is home to Canada's second largest community rodeo, the Cloverdale Rodeo and Exhibition, as well as a historic general store, the city's first bank and original city hall. Antique hunters will find a cornucopia of stores, and those looking for country fun will love the experience of exploring a corn maze.

With almost one third of the city protected as park or agricultural land, Surrey truly is the "City of Parks". The area is home to 400 parks, including the 2-hectare (5-acre) Bear Creek Gardens, considered one of Metro Vancouver's finest public gardens. At Boundary Bay there

are opportunities for bird enthusiasts with 200 species of birds attracted to the tidal marshes. Surrey is also a golf-lovers dream with an astounding 16 golf courses! Strolling the sandy shores at Crescent Beach is also a popular pastime; while you're there, enjoy a west coast lunch at one of the many intimate neighbourhood restaurants.

Surrey's cultural life is surprisingly active, with an award winning arts centre and internationally acclaimed art gallery. It's also home to a significant Indian population—the city hosts a huge Diwali festival and Vaisakhi parade during the year, and boasts a Punjabi Market neighbourhood perfect for strolling.

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White Rock

A 490-ton white rock first spotted by Spanish explorers has given its name to this beachside city. A 60-minute drive south from downtown Vancouver, close to the U.S./Canada border, White Rock is a tiny, hidden gem in Metro Vancouver. The 8-kilometre (5-mile) sandy beachfront on Semiahmoo Bay is its most popular summer attraction, with sand perfect for creating sandcastles!

Its famous promenade runs almost the entire length of the beach, offering plenty of access points for swimming, kayaking and exploring the tide pools. After a day by the sea enjoying beautiful views of Mount Baker and the San Juan Islands in Washington State,

Marine Drive, running parallel to the beach, is the main thoroughfare, where you'll have fun looking through the stores and galleries that showcase local artists. You'll also find a

museum in the former train station, and the famous White Rock pier where you can cast a line or crab trap with local fishermen. Naturally, seafood is the specialty of many restaurants and cafes in White Rock.

Neighbouring Crescent Beach, in Surrey, is close by, and the two areas as very popular with families for day trips looking for a "beach resort feel."

Fraser Valley



Langley, Abbotsford & Chilliwack

Located an hour east of Vancouver, the Fraser Valley is home to trending restaurants, over 30 wineries, and a growing number of breweries, all emphasizing farm fresh and local ingredients.

Explore this area on a day-trip, or stay locally for the long weekend and see how convenient relaxing in the countryside can be. From outdoor adventures like river rafting with Chilliwack River Rafting (800-410-7238) to attending romantic wine tasting dinners and gourmet retreats, this region offers the perfect ticket to escaping the city grind. Taste produce fresh from the farm it was grown on, sip some wine served by local winemakers. Whether you launch the boat, kayak or your stand-up paddleboard, whatever you do it will be a day to remember as you visit the Fraser Valley.

Langley

Human occupation of the area we now call Langley can be traced back to the retreat of the last glaciers some 10,000 years ago. First Nations people, known as the Sto:lo, or “river people” are thought to have been the principal occupants of most of the Fraser Valley throughout the last several millennia.

The Kwantlen (Qw’ntl’en) First Nation were recorded in 1827 as the largest group on the lower Fraser, with a traditional territory extending from Mud Bay in Tsawwassen, through the Serpentine and Salmon Rivers and along the Fraser River, east past Mission. The First Nations continue to be an important part of the Langley communities.

One of the top tourist attractions in the area is the Fort Langley National Historic Site. This is the exact location where, a century and a half ago, the Hudson’s Bay Company, a huge fur trade organization, established a small post to trade with the First Nations of the West Coast. The enterprise grew, evolved and influenced history, leading to the creation of the colony of British Columbia.

Today you can visit the fort and explore the historic buildings, watch coopering and blacksmithing, demonstrations, gold panning, and you can even sleep there overnight in an oTENTik, exclusive to Parks Canada.

An oTENTik, is a cross between an A-frame cabin and a prospector tent mounted on a raised wooden floor. This water resistant accommodation is built to withstand diverse weather conditions and no set-up is required by campers. Each of the five units inside Fort Langley’s historic walls represents the heritage of Fort Langley’s diverse workers.

Langley is also known as a “Community of Communities”. Langley consists of two municipalities working side by side, the Township of Langley and the City of Langley, and is part of the Fraser Valley region of British Columbia.



Fraser Valley

Abbotsford

Urban amenities that include sophisticated dining, shopping and arts venues are set in a landscape of working farms, art studios and refurbished historic communities.

Coupled with its temperate climate, Abbotsford is a year-round destination packed with activities for the entire family including hiking, mountain biking, fishing, and golf. With several provincial parks, rivers and lakes in and around Abbotsford, there are many outdoor activities to experience.

Abbotsford is also home to the Abbotsford International Air Show. As Canada's largest air show, this three day spectacular attracts in excess of 350,000 visitors. The Abbotsford International Air Show includes on-the-ground static exhibits such as the B-52, F-14 Top Cat, V-8B Harrier and F-117 stealth fighter alongside other armed forces tactical equipment and demonstrations.

Aerial displays are at the show's heart, usually wowing visitors with the showmanship of the CAF Snowbirds, Canada's national aerobatic team, demonstrations of Corsair, Spitfire and Sea Fury aircraft as well as freefall acrobatics with the CAF Skyhawks parachute team, championship wing walkers and international flight participants. It's a great family show, that takes place August 7-9, 2026 this year.

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Indigenous Attractions



Discover the ancient wisdom and traditions of the region's First Nations. Through interpretive centres, archaeological sites, museums, galleries, guided First Nations adventure tours and cultural performances you'll come to understand how these dynamic cultures have evolved through history.

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First Nations Cuisine

Drawing inspiration from the countless generations that came before, Aboriginal chefs fuse traditional techniques with modern cooking methods to create delicious new edible expressions.

For a unique Aboriginal meal, Salmon n' Bannock Bistro in Vancouver serves up wild local fish, organic and free range meats, bannock (naturally) and many other delightful Aboriginal dishes.

The Museum of Anthropology at UBC

Known for its spectacular architecture and unique setting on the cliffs of Point Grey in Vancouver, this museum is home to one of the world's finest collections of rare Aboriginal artifacts and artwork. MOA houses over 40,000 ethnographic objects from almost every part of the world, including Bill Reid's best-known sculpture, The Raven and the First Men. Fun fact: you'll find an illustration of his sculpture on the \$20 bill (from 2001 - 2006). in Vancouver's historic Chinatown.





Bill Reid Gallery of Northwest Coast Art

This downtown Vancouver public art gallery is named after the acclaimed Haida artist, Bill Reid (1920 - 1998). The gallery is dedicated to understanding and appreciating contemporary Aboriginal art from the Northwest Coast of North America. Gallery highlights include over 40 pieces of Bill Reid's gold and silver jewelry, Reid's bronze masterpiece: Mythic Messengers, and a full-scale totem pole carved by James Hart of Haida Gwaii.

Takaya Tours

Have a group of 10 or more; enjoy Takaya's 35 foot traditional style ocean-going canoes on an unforgettable journey across the waters and back through time. Belcarra Park known as Tum-Tumay-Whueton, the park has been occupied for thousands of years and was the large winter gathering place. Close by Whey-ah-wichen or Cates Park, is an ancestral village site located on the inlet in North Vancouver. Enjoy kayak or paddleboard rentals at both of these locations.



Squamish Lil'wat Cultural Centre

The Squamish Lil'wat Cultural Centre in Whistler embodies the spirit of partnership between two unique Nations who wish to preserve, grow and share their traditional cultures. Step into a world where ancient customs meet modern day. Enjoy a welcome song, guided tour, captivating film and a fun craft activity to help discover the meaning behind their traditional ways of life.

Parks & Gardens



Stanley Park

The crown jewel of Vancouver's nearly 200 city parks, Stanley Park is a 400-hectare (1,000-acre) evergreen oasis connected to the city's West End by a narrow strip of land. An 8.8-kilometre (5.5-mile) seawall surrounds the park's perimeter offering breathtaking views at every turn and making it a hotspot for cyclists, runners, walkers and rollerbladers. Recently named the world's best city park by TripAdvisor, Stanley Park is home to wildlife, beaches, the Vancouver Aquarium, a pitch & putt, water park and miniature railway. Other landmarks worth visiting include the Stanley Park Rose Garden, Prospect Point Lookout, the 9 O'Clock Gun, Siwash Rock, Lost Lagoon, the nine totem poles at Brockton Point and the Stanley Park Hollow Tree, a 700 to 800-year-old western red cedar tree stump. Designated a National Historic Site of Canada, Stanley Park is deserving of an itinerary unto itself.

VanDusen Botanical Garden

This Vancouver garden will inspire you with 22 hectares (54.4 acres) of elegant landscapes representing a range of ecosystems found in such places as the Himalayas, the Mediterranean, the Louisiana swamps and the Pacific Northwest. VanDusen Botanical Garden's stunning Visitor Centre, with its orchid-inspired design, is an iconic building and a model of sustainability.



Queen Elizabeth Park

Queen Elizabeth Park, Vancouver's horticultural jewel, is a major draw for floral display enthusiasts and view-seekers. At 152 metres (499 feet) above sea level, it's the highest point in Vancouver and allows for spectacular views of the park, city and North Shore Mountains. The 52-hectare (128-acre) park is home to an arboretum, and a gorgeous quarry garden with a collection of exotic and native trees and sculptures, including one by internationally renowned artist Henry Moore. If that isn't enough to keep you entertained, the park also features the stunning Bloedel Conservatory and a variety of recreational offerings.

Dr. Sun Yat-Sen

Classical Chinese Garden This garden in Vancouver is the first of its kind outside of China, and is representative of the private spaces within a Ming scholar's residence. With its asymmetrical arrangement of rocks and plants, winding paths and corridors, and views that overlook its courtyards, the garden emulates the rhythms of nature and offers quiet moments for contemplation in Vancouver's historic Chinatown.





UBC Botanical Garden & Nitobe Memorial Garden

Glimmerse yourself in a world of wild plants at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver. Stroll through the impressive Asian garden with over 400 kinds of rhododendrons, travel the continents in the alpine garden, explore the native rainforest garden, discover food growing techniques, and visit the internationally recognized collections of magnolias and maples. For a unique vantage point take the Greenheart Canopy Walkway, a 308-metre (1,010-foot) aerial trail system which gives you a bird's eye view of the forest canopy ecosystem.

Queen's Park

Queen's Park in New Westminster provides visitors with a wide range of outdoor pursuits. Stay active with a game of tennis, run along the trails, take your dog for a walk to the off-leash dog area, enjoy a picnic, or stop and smell the roses in the garden featuring over 600 floribunda and hybrid roses, a gazebo and decorative entrance trellises.



Rocky Point Park

Rocky Point Park is Port Moody's best-known park. A popular destination for hikers of the Shoreline Trail, or a starting point for boaters using the boat launch, Rocky Point has a large variety of amenities including a seasonal outdoor pool, skateboard park and biking trails.

Sendall Gardens

Located in Langley, Sendall Gardens features 1.9 hectares (3.67 acres) of beautiful and unique plants, shrubs and trees. Walk along the nature trails and stop at the two ponds, where several varieties of birds can be found. Visit the tropical garden greenhouse between April and September and marvel at the wide variety of colourful and exotic plants.



Cultus Lake Provincial Park

Located in Chilliwack, Cultus Lake Provincial Park is characterized by a large, warm freshwater lake and scenic, forest-clad mountains. There are several campgrounds in the park that are popular, along with many day-use areas that are perfect for swimming, kayaking and picnicking.

Get Outside!



Ziplining

If you're looking for a thrill, head to Grouse Mountain for a ziplining adventure that will have you soaring through the air with the beauty of nature all around you. The dual-line, five-line circuit at Grouse Mountain offers an adrenaline-pumping tour across the peaks and canyons of Grouse and Dam Mountains. Don't blink because you'll be travelling at speeds of up to 80 kilometres/hour (50 miles/hour) and you don't want to miss the amazing views!

Whitewater Rafting

There are few places in the world where so many rafting rivers are so close to a major city. Choose from single or multi-day trips, with both motorpowered and paddle-powered rafting available. Perhaps the best place to begin your adventure is in Lytton, since its location at the confluence of the Thompson and Fraser Rivers has earned it the reputation of being the "rafting capital of Canada." Or you could check out the nearby Nahatlatch, Coquihalla and Stein Rivers as well. There's also the Chilliwack River, which drops 10 metres/kilometre (52.8 feet/mile), creating numerous long and continuous rapids.



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Cycling

The Metro Vancouver area is also well known for its great cycling opportunities. Right in the heart of Vancouver, the Seawall is a scenic 22-kilometre (13.7-mile) path that wraps around the city's waterfront and Stanley Park. The trail is divided into two clearly marked sections - one for walkers and joggers, and one for cyclists and inline skaters. Richmond is also a great spot for cycling as a result of a system of dykes topped with 80 kilometres (50 miles) of flat, easily-accessible, interconnected trails that meander past heritage sites, parks, wildlife areas and spectacular scenery.

Mountain Climbing

Squamish, another climber's paradise, is recognized as one of the world's top rock climbing destinations, largely due to the incredibly sticky granite found all over town including the Stawamus Chief. At present, there are over 3,500 routes and boulder problems in the Squamish area. Your first stop should be the Squamish Adventure Centre where you can discover all the access points, and decide whether or not you want a personal guide (or even a lesson).

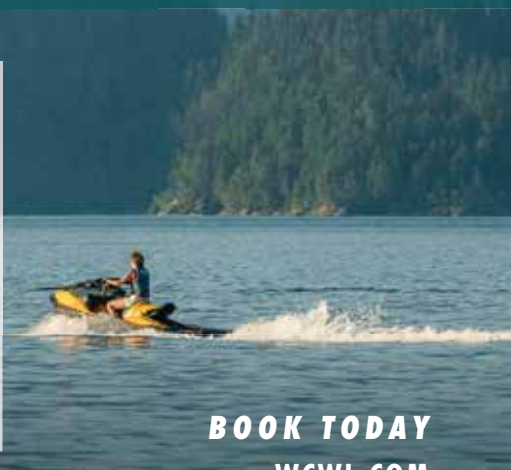
