Valarie Worthy's Bio Valarie Clark Worthy, a registered nurse for over 40 years and a 23-year breast cancer survivor, is a Patient Navigator Manager at the Duke Cancer Institute. She manages teams to facilitate seamless care for cancer patients. In 2003, she along with five breast cancer survivors founded the local chapter of Sisters Network, Inc.; (Triangle NC.). Currently, Valarie is the co-founder of TOUCH, a nonprofit breast cancer advocacy organization for African American women. Valarie is very active in the community (River Durham) and her hometown church, (New Ahoskie Baptist) raising awareness about cancer and clinical trials. Valarie received the American Cancer Society's

Lane Adams Quality of Life Award, which recognizes the unsung heroes of cancer care and are referred to as the "warm hand of service.

Ricki co-founded and serves as CEO of TOUCH, The Black Breast Cancer Alliance



She's founding member of #BlackDataMatters, in partnership with Breastcancer.org, Morehouse School of Medicine and the Susan G. Komen Foundation. Ricki serves on the Board of Trustees for the Triple Negative Breast Cancer Foundation, board member for the Center for Healthcare Innovation; and Ambassador and Advisor for the Live Humanly Campaign.



Dr. Monique Gary is the Medical Director of Grand View Health (GVH)/Penn Cancer Network Cancer Program

Dr. Gary serves as the Director of their NAPBC-accredited Breast Program; and founded and directs the Cancer Genetics and Risk Assessment Program at GVH. She holds Clinical Associate faculty positions in surgery at the Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine, Penn Medicine, and University of North Texas Health Sciences/Texas Christian University in Ft. Worth, TX. Her board memberships include American Society of Breast Surgeons, and Cancer Support Community of Greater Philadelphia. Dr. Gary earned both her M.Sc. in Molecular Biology and DO from Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine; completed a residency in general

surgery at UMass/Berkshire Medical Center and a fellowship in Breast Surgical Oncology at MedStar Georgetown University Hospital.

She completed her residency training in Pediatrics at UTMB, where she was honored as the Resident of the Year from 2008-2010, and was also recognized as the Outstanding Overall Resident in 2010. She remained at UTMB, later completing a Chief Residency there, where she also worked as a hospitalist and received an award for excellence in resident teaching. Dr. Rouce then relocated to Houston and graduated from Baylor College of Medicine after completing the Fellowship Program in Pediatric Hematology/Oncology at Texas Children's Cancer

Center. Dr. Rayne Rouce is an avid volunteer, and has volunteered for several years for programs for children with cancer and other life-threatening diseases.
