Dr. Standifer is the Director of Health Policy in the Satcher Health Leadership Institute at Morehouse School of Medicine. In her role, Dr. Standifer conducts studies and administers evidence-based prevention initiatives that effectively employ targeted strategies to reduce negative health outcomes throughout underresourced, racially and ethnically vulnerable populations. She brings her wealth of experience including health program administration, evaluation and research expertise, health policy development and analysis, mixed methods research and examining social and political determinants of health. Dr. Standifer is also an Assistant Professor, and a Co-Investigator on multiple federally funded studies. Her research portfolio furthers community-based participatory research to create

culturally-tailored interventions which empowers disenfranchised populations to make healthy and informed decisions. Dr. Standifer received her Bachelor's degree at Spelman College, her Master's degree in Public Health from Rollins School of Public Health at Emory University, and with a concentration in Medical Anthropology from the University of South Florida.

Dr. Angela Hill, Professor and Associate Dean of Clinical Practice at the USF College of Pharmacy.

As Dean, Dr. Hill is also the pharmacy consultant at the USF Health Byrd Alzheimer's Institute where she is involved in comprehensive medication reviews, patient visits, drug-related research and community outreach. At the Byrd Institute, Dr. Hill works closely with the Memory C.A.R.E. Center, collaborates with clinicians on-scientific research, and speaks to groups of medical professionals, caregivers, and students. Memory Disorder Clinics in the State of Florida. Dr. Renee Reams, Professor Biochemistry, Florida A&M University

Dr. Reams received her BA Biology, Grambling State University Research Trainee in first funded MBRS Program (at Grambling)PhD. Biochemistry/Brigham Young University Postdoctoral Fellow, UCLA Molecular Biology Institute Tenured Professor of Biochemistry Florida A&M University (1991-present)contact PI for NCI U54 Health Equity Center (triad partnership: FAMU-UF-USC). Dr. Reams is a basic science researcher, her laboratory was the first to report that aggressive prostate tumors harbored immune signatures (genes). Today, immunotherapy is being used to help the body fight off cancer. She will give us an overview

of her prostate cancer research focus and update us on her findings.



Valarie Worthy, Patient Navigator Manager, Duke Cancer Institute, Co-Founder, TOUCH (African American women's Breast Cancer Advocacy)

Valarie Worthy's Bio Valarie Clark Worthy, a registered nurse for over 40 years and a 23-year breast cancer survivor, is a Patient Navigator Manager at the Duke Cancer Institute. She manages teams to facilitate seamless care for cancer patients. In 2003, she along with five breast cancer survivors founded the local chapter of Sisters Network, Inc.; (Triangle NC.). Currently, Valarie is the co-founder of TOUCH, a nonprofit breast cancer advocacy organization for African American women. Valarie is very active in the community (River Durham) and her hometown church, (New Ahoskie Baptist) raising awareness about

cancer and clinical trials. Valarie received the American Cancer Society's Lane Adams Quality of Life Award, which recognizes the unsung heroes of cancer care and are referred to as the "warm hand of service.

Ricki Farley is a Stage 3A Triple Negative Breast Cancer Survivor/Thriver. Ricki co-founded and serves as CEO of TOUCH, The Black Breast Cancer Alliance, with the overall goal of reducing the mortality rate for Black women. She founded and serves as co-host for "The Doctor Is In," a weekly live web series on the BlackDoctor.org Facebook page. She's founding member of #BlackDataMatters, in partnership with Breastcancer.org, Morehouse School of Medicine and the Susan G. Komen Foundation. Ricki serves on the Board of Trustees for the Triple Negative Breast Cancer Foundation, board member for the Center for Healthcare Innovation; and Ambassador and Advisor for the Live Humanly Campaign.
