

Esparto Middle School Words Take Wing

Esparto Middle School 6th grade students recently finished reading an incredible novel in English class. Inside Out & Back Again, written by Thanhhà Lai, is a Newberry Honor Book and winner of the National Book Award. The novel was inspired by the author's childhood story as a refugee fleeing VietNam during the fall of Saigon and escaping to Alabama.

The story is unique in that it is written in verse. This provided a wonderful opportunity to review figurative language. Students identified examples of figurative language in the story. Then they created Google slides that included student generated visual representations of idioms, similes, hyperboles, onomatopoeia and other types of figurative language. A written explanation of what the author used the literary device to describe, and how it personally impacted their understanding of the story was also included.

The reading of the novel was also utilized to introduce the concept of themes in literature. Some of the themes in Lai's novel included change, resiliency, loss, hope and bullying. Students worked with a partner to identify one theme that stood out to them, created a theme statement, and then found 4 quotes in the book that supported their theme. The final product was a poster. Students then used the poster as a graphic organizer to write individual paragraphs on the theme they chose.

In addition to the incredible hands-on work the students produced, they were also invited to the Robert Mondavi Performing Arts Center to see a presentation by the author. Lai was the guest author for Words Take Wing: Honoring Diversity in Children's Literature. The opportunity was due to the California Art Council Arts Exposure grant that was applied for and received by the Mondavi Center, UC Davis. The Mondavi Center administers the grant and works with Esparto Middle and Elementary Schools on the shows they will attend.

As a culminating activity, Sacramento Area Youth Speaks (SAYS) presented a workshop to the 6th graders at Esparto Middle School. SAYS elevates the voices of students as the authors of their own lives and agents of change. Presenters Denisha Bland and Kai Uchio helped students generate poems that illustrated where they come from and who their life stories are for. Ask your student to share their story!

The reading of this novel provided such rich learning experiences! It was exciting to observe students reading an actual paperbound book, and enriching themselves by exploring literary devices, themes, and culture. It was impressive to see students take the words from the novel and create their own expression of a theme.

87th Annual Lions Club Student Speaker Contest

This year represents the 87th annual Lions Club Student Speaker Contest. The topic is "For a Better World, What Would You Change?" On the local level, the following Esparto High School Junior students participated: Leo Tafolla, Leslie Galvan, Areli Frausto, and Angel Torres. Moving forward from the Local Level Contest and the recent Zone Level Contest is Areli Frausto, who will now compete at the Regional Level on April 7. Congratulations to all student speakers for your work this year in the contest. Esparto Lions thanks English teachers Mrs. Geach & Mrs. Rowland for supporting students in this process.

For the contest, the Foundation will provide all of the prizes above the Region Level, as it has done now for many years. The contest starts at the Local level and then moves to Zone, Regional, District, Area, and then the Final Contest which will be in Sacramento this year.

Each of the 15 District winners will receive a scholarship for \$4,500. The four Area winners will each receive an additional \$6,500. scholarship. The Final MD-4 winner will receive a scholarship for the amount of \$10,000. The final student speaker of the contest will have accumulated \$22,000. in scholarships from the Lions Club Student Speaker Foundation.

In 1937, Fred Smith became the first District Governor of District 4-C. The idea was approved as something that would give all the Clubs in the District something in common. The foundation funds for the student speaker contest come entirely from voluntary donations and income from the accumulated assets.



New Season and Esparto: Beautification Lasts

Art and history were brought to Esparto by Maria Mcvarish and Eduardo Pineda with the help of New Season Community Development Corporation. What is the story?

Maria had a lifelong love for the Capay Valley reflective of visits to the Almond Festival as a child. That translated years later into purchasing the historic Train Station with design and rehabilitation in mind. Her work as an award-winning landscape designer brought a unique art in history project to Esparto. Maria was teaching at both the Berkeley College of Environmental Design and the California College of the Arts. She created a project for her students to help beautify and reiterate our history. The project directed the students to interview local residents about the importance and history of the Capay Valley and translate that into an art installation sin the train station. The designs were unique and brought out many residents to enter the train station for the first time in their lives and imagine its future.

Enter Eduardo Pineada was Professor at the California College of the Arts and a worldwide respected muralist. Building on the idea of history and art, his students researched both throughout the Capay valley with the help of New Season. The art board murals are meaningful and beautiful as they now sit on the Train Statin property. This is seen by the thousands who travel through our Valley. The work has been preserved over many years, since 2015, because of Eduardo's knowledge of how to make outdoor art work stand up to the elements. With the help, of Durst Organic Farms and locals Larry Heitman and Jim Rix, the murals were put into permanent place on the property. Take a walk there and read the history legend and descriptions of this work. It's another example of art and history for Esparto and the entire Capay Valley.

The Breeze



Seasonal Recipes

Using ingredients sourced from farms in the Capay Valley By Pamela Bateman



Farmers Potatoe Salad

The addition of greens and radish make this a wonderful, farm fresh salad

5 or 6 Yukon Gold Potatoes* - medium size boiled until tender and cut into bite size pieces

6 Eggs - hard boiled and chopped

1/2 cup Red Onion - chopped

1 cup Arugula* - chopped

1 Watermelon Radish* - grated

Salt to taste

Dressing

2 1/2 Tablespoons Mayonaise

2 1/2 Tablespoons Plain Yogurt

1 teaspoon Dijon Mustard

1 Lemon- grated rind and juice

In a large bowl mix the potatoes, eggs, red onion, arugula, and radish. Salt to taste. In a smaller bowl mix the dressing ingredients and then pour over the potato mixture.

Chill until ready to serve Makes approximately 4 servings

*Notes

The Yukon Gold Potatoes can be substituted with any other potato.

The arugula can be substituted with chopped mustard greens or other greens of your choice.

The watermelon radish can be substituted with a daikon radish

Barbara Gemmill-Herren Capay Valley Regeneration Birds of a feather flock together and paint the sky!



In this cold and windy weather, you've probably seen large numbers of black birds rise up out of leafless orchards and swoop across the sky in a shape-shifting group. The overall effect – to me – looks like someone painting with black watercolor on the sky. Technically these are called "murmurations". What are these birds, and how do they do that, staying together while changing the overall shape?

The birds are starlings, and they're not actually native birds- they were brought over from Europe at some point. But they are totally naturalized and thriving here. They are very social birds, always staying in flocks of various sizes. In winter, they gather at night, roosting close together in trees to maintain warmth and possibly share information, as they chatter away. Then in the mornings, they zoom out- swooping, diving and wheeling, but staying altogether in a big shifting "cloud"- to find food. But how do they manage to keep the group together?

An early hypothesis was that starlings had psychic powers to operate together as a flock. But it turns out, based on some clever "citizen science" research, that starlings need only observe three simple rules to build these clouds: nearby birds should move further apart, all birds should fly in the same direction and speed, and more distant birds should move closer. Research showed that starlings sought to match the direction and speed of only the nearest seven or so neighbors, rather than responding to the movements of all the nearby birds around them.

Starlings aren't psychic, they are just good at following rules!

Yolo County CWPP Project Update

Last year, Yolo County RCD received funding to continue developing the RCD's Community Wildfire Resilience Program. The program encompasses initiatives including the Yolo County Fire Safe Council and the Yolo Prescribed Burn Association and is centered around community-driven, on-the-ground fuels management for wildfire resilience. The funding is through CAL FIRE's Wildfire Prevention Program and the Early Action Funding granted to the County of Yolo through Senator Dodd's Office.

In early 2023, Yolo County RCD completed the Yolo County Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP), a planning document that was created in collaboration with CAL FIRE, community groups, local fire officials, and the Yolo County Office of Emergency Services. The CWPP contains a list of priority projects that are now underway! Funding from CAL FIRE and the County of Yolo supports project planning and implementation for the following projects:

Capay Valley State Highway 16 Fuels Reduction: prescribed fire along the roadsides of Highway 16 outside of Esparto to reduce the likelihood of ignition from passing cars

Ingress/Egress Evacuation Planning in eastern Capay Valley: evacuation and access planning and possibly improving shallow-water crossings


Rumsey Ditch Vegetation Management: clearing along the Rumsey Ditch to improve ingress/egress on Rumsey Canyon Road

Rumsey Fire Buffer and Fire Wise Certification: fuels reduction work around the town of Rumsey, CA using a combination of prescribed grazing, prescribed burning, and vegetation management. This will protect the community and also help them to become a certified FireWise Community, a program that reduces wildfire risks at the local level.

West Winters Highway 128 Fuels Reduction: mechanical vegetation control along State Highway 128 from Pleasants Valley Rd to Canyon Resort, approximately 4.5 miles - CURRENTLY UNDERWAY

Store flashlights alongside extra batteries & charge portable chargers for electronics when storms are forecasted.

Save memories and important documents on a USB or on the Cloud. If evacuation is possible, fill your gas tank and park your car so it is ready to go in case of quick evacuation.

Make a go-bag for each person in the family (including pets) that includes extra water, clothes, important documents, prescriptions, and medicines.

Prepare emergency planning for pets - keep leashes, harnesses, and crates handy and make sure pets are indoors where you can find and access them.

Know multiple evacuation routes from your home. Check on your neighbors to be sure they are safe.
