As a Paying Public, You've a Right to Know!

An Update on the Esparto School Bond Work



You've paid your property taxes, including the new School Bond fees, two times. You voted "yes!" because you care about the kids and the community. "El Nino" has slowed everything down everywhere, but, still, you are interested: What's happening with school improvements funded by the Bond? After all, as a paying public, you've a right to know!

Land purchases for the new Middle School and the High School Athletic Field were the first items of business once the Bond Measure for the School District passed and the Bonds were sold to make some funds available. The original plan presented to the community was to purchase over 19 acres from the Parker properties on Highway 16 east of Yolo Avenue. That was enough room for, the Athletic Complex, an expanded Little League area, and the new Middle School.

After the Bond passed, the Parkers re-considered their options and opted to sell the District only enough land for the High School Athletic Field. This was a huge disappointment and tumbled the District into re-grouping and re-planning strategies. Several other parcels were considered for the Middle School and informal negotiations ensued. Finally an appropriate parcel was secured across the slough from the existing Elementary School. Next, two Environmental Clearances documents needed to be prepared one for each parcel. A number of issues were carefully considered and dealt with during this period of work, with concerns ranging from protection of the farm buffer zone to pumping sewage uphill. The process included environmentalists, attorneys, anthropologists, and just about everyone other than students!

New parcel maps had to be created; new survey monuments established; and new site plans developed. Now the School District has successfully secured two appropriate parcels of land, one for the new Athletic Complex (as planned) and one for the new Middle School (a new site plan).

Next the District had to move forward with the detailed plans based on the new and now purchased sites. The architects went to work on three areas, preparing detailed plans for approval by State Department of Education: the site and building plans for the Middle School; the site plans for the Athletic Field; and the plans for improvements to the High School and Elementary School.

This does not include another important and exciting project that is running in tandem with the Bond-funded school improvements: the new Library! This community endeavor that has had so much support from so many got a big shot in the arm through a generous gift of \$100,000 from the Cache Creek

Indian Casino; that effort also spirited another State grant for a generous amount of funding. The District Office got very active preparing plans for the movement of buildings and rearrangement of space for the community-supported new Li-

For this project, the District Administrative Office will be moved to allow a perfect lot for the new Library and a lot that will provide friendly community access to the Library while allowing the Library to also be available to high school students for research projects. The High School will also gain another classroom space when the Library moves. The new Esparto Library is a win-win for everyone and a real powerbuilder for the downtown!

The School Bond work has steadily progressed and is soon emerging from "the work you can't see" phase. The buildings for the Middle School are ordered and being constructed under carefully planned specifications; they will be available in the fall. The open public bid for site work at the Middle School was initiated and is being re-considered due to the high cost results. Technical work is being completed to re-consider every aspect, including the seasonal disadvantage of the bidding climate created by an unusual rain year, in order to bring the bids more in line with the budget.

This will delay the Middle School opening from the Christmas vacation timeline once scheduled, but will be responsible in terms of the holding to the budget restrictions while maintaining other project objectives. The plans for the High School rehabilitation and remodeling are complete and being cleared under special school facility directives; they should be approved for District action by late June. Bidding the work will be the next step.

It should be noted, however, that the Science Room improvements did not need "matching fund" approval and proceeded quickly after the Bonds sold; those classrooms were completed and used in their new, remodeled condition this entire school year!

Work will be strenuous during the coming school year. The site work planned for this summer is now delayed a couple months, dictation that a momentous year will spring forward in the fall! Site work for the Middle School with buildings waiting for immediate placement and a school blooming in the late spring is planned. The High School main halls will be periodically in transition followed by a huge summer push for a completed project. Maneuvers by Board Trustee Charles Schaupp will be designed to get the Marine-muscle as a donated kick for the High School Athletic Fields.

New Library construction will be a certain power-surge for community morale, thanks to the Friends of the Library and numerous other friendly people. The Elementary School campus, vision to be expanded by the movement of the Middle School to its new site, will have its own share of good tidings.

It is hoped that this newspaper can be a routine way to start and continue to share with you progress on the work funded by the Bond. It was a generous thing this community did funding Bond Measure - and as a supporting public, more than "thank you!" is warranted. Oh yes...and "Thank You!"

Important School Board Goals.

Earlier this year the Esparto School Board adopted five Goals. The focus of the Goals is directed towards student areas of critical need and other needs in the district that impact students. Staff and community meetings have been held and action plans have been created for each goal for the 1998-99 school year. The Goals are:

- 1. Focus district-wide (K-12) commitment on improving the reading literacy skills of our students and to prioritize funding obligations to meet this goal.
- 2. Continue to improve and update the general Board approved policies for the District. Develop a schedule for addressing new policies on a quarterly basis.
- Strengthen communication efforts to assertively reach the community at large.
- Formulate policies to improve the applied and technical sciences.
- 5. Continue to improve the District's facilities and the maintenance of those facilities.

District Receives Healthy Start Planning Grant

Recently Superintendent Jerry Elmore was notified that the District had received a Healthy Start Planning Grant from the California Department of Education. The Planning Grant developed from the continuing involvement of the Western Yolo Collaborative for Healthy Children and Families in our communities. One of the strategies established by the Yolo Collaborative for improving family and children's services in our service-isolated communities was to write this grant. The District will use Grant funds to hire a Healthy Start coordinator who will assist and facilitate active participation of the community and county agencies in uncovering strengths and needs, especially targeting economically disadvantaged children and families. We need to identify physical health needs, mental health needs, student's school success needs, parent education needs, and the resources in our families, community, and county agencies.

The most important benefits of the planning process will be the collaboration and interaction of two planning groups. The Planning Partners are an umbrella group drawn from school district staff, Yolo Collaborative members, county agencies, local service groups, and parents. The Partners will be responsible for assessing the community, selecting goals based upon needs and strengths and securing funds necessary to meet the goals and objectives. The Community Planning Representatives will be selected from school and community groups, parents, teachers, school site councils, school staff and students. The Representatives will review data, identify needs and suggest outcomes and strategies to meet those needs.

In summary, the planning process will discover needs, prioritize needs, develop outcomes and objectives to meet those needs and write a Healthy Start Operational Grant.

The process is underway. Two meetings of the Planning Partners have already taken place. It is expected that a Planning Coordinator will be hired in August. The planning activities will extend from August 1998 to February 1999.


New Library Sneak Preview

Soon to be a reality New Library will be located next to Esparto Park; it will replace the district office buildings.

The Friends have been working for seven years raising funds and public awareness, coordination efforts between other service organizations and clubs from Madison to Rumsey, from all over Yolo County and even beyond.

The hard work of dedicated people has paid off. \$1,052,483+ is needed to build the 5000 square foot library, \$100,000 remains to be raised. We are planning a capital campaign to raise the remaining money. We are planning a ground breaking for February 1, 1999, after the bidding has been completed and the contract awarded. We plan to occupy the new building the first of November 1999.

The Library serves everyone in the western Yolo region and connects them via the public access Internet to the world beyond. Esparto Library patrons have easy access to materials from all over Yolo County and may place orders through the Mountain Valley System from all over Northern California. We have access to the Sutro Library in San Francisco for genealogy patrons. These services are usually free of charge. Annual summer services for the children include a summer reading program: Deputy Reading Rangers; summer school class visits; public access Internet and Bookmobile service in Madison and Wednesday 9:00 a.m. High School parking lot, stays for one hour. Then



it moves to the Mini Mart in Brooks from 10:30 to 11:15 a.m. The third stop is the fire station in Guinda from 12:15 to 2 p.m. The last stop of the day is at the Madison Migrant Center from 2:30 to 4:15 p.m. The Bookmobile is a regular branch of the Yolo County Library system. Patrons may check out books and even request books that they would like to read. Anyone who has a Yolo County Library card may check out books. It is very easy to sign up for a card. Just ask about a card when visiting the Bookmobile or the Esparto Library.

The Esparto Library is offering a new service to those that are homebound, either permanently or temporarily, volunteers will be delivering or pick up library materials for you. All you need to do is call the librarian, Nadine, 787-3426.

Low Cost, High Quality Health, Dental & Vision Care Insurance

Your Kids May Be Eligible For Low Cost, High Quality Health, Dental & Vision Care Insurance Through The Healthy Families Program

This is GREAT news for families and parents who cannot afford health coverage for their children!!! A new program is coming that can provide assistance with health benefits. President Clinton proposed and Congress passed legislation to cover children under the age 19 who have no health insurance. The California Legislature did their part to enact the emphasis of the National push for health coverage by approving the Healthy Families Program. This Program helps parents without health insurance to purchase low cost insurance for their children. Here in the Esparto area, the Western Yolo Collaborative is

working hard to find a way to provide local accessibility to the program.

This Program could work for you! It is for families whose income levels exceed the limit for Medi-Cal, who do not have employer-provided medical benefits; but cannot afford to pay for private health insurance. Premium range from \$7 to \$27 per month with even more discounts for certain plans (depending on the number enrolled and family income).

Statewide training is starting to prepare staff to assist and enroll families. Western Yolo Collaborative, the new Healthy Start Program Planning Committee, and Yolo County Public Health are all committed to making sure our communities in rural Western Yolo County are not left out. Stay tuned for more information, as it becomes available.

Child Care Grants



Are you among the many working parents looking for affordable child care in the Esparto, Capay Valley area? There is a service available to you that help parents find child care that fits their needs. Child Care Services provides both free child care resources and referral services and subsidies to assist families using child care in Yolo County. Referral staff uses a comprehensive listing of licensed child care providers in the county (family child care and

center-based care) to assist parents seeking care in Yolo County. Families who need financial assistance can apply for a child care grant available through Child Care Services. The Child Care Grant Program provides subsidies to pay for child care, for eligible parents who are working, seeking work, in training or attending school. Parents may choose a licensed family child care provider, child care center, or license-exempt child care provider in Yolo

County. Eligibility is based on income and need for care. Child Care Services also offers free technical assistance, training, and other services to licensed providers in Care Services is located at 604 Second Street in Davis. 

They included RISE to help find the funding for Operation Graduation and write the grant.


As a result of their combined effort, a grant from Sacramento Regional foundation was awarded the school district. The students are excited about what is coming next and are anxious to get started.
