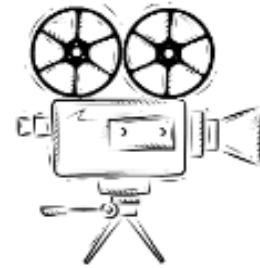

Seasonal Recipes

Using ingredients sourced from farms in the Capay Valley

Kaleidoscope Carrot Salad



Dressing

- 1 garlic clove finely minced
- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 3 tablespoons apple cider vinegar
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard

In a small bowl whisk together the above ingredients and set aside.

- 4 or 5 carrots of differing colors * julienned or thinly sliced
- 3 large handfuls of Ruby Streak mustard greens lightly chopped
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

In a salad bowl combine the above ingredients and toss. Drizzle with dressing and serve.

*Note

*Our local farms grow carrots of many colors from the typical orange, to pink orange, purple and yellow. All are delicious, fresh and sweet this time of year. Ruby Streak mustard greens are a beautiful lacy vegetable.

Firewise USA Community

CVERA, Capay Valley Fire District and with the support of the Yolo Fire Safe Council is establishing an Upper Capay Valley Firewise USA community. The goal is to help everyone better prepare for wildfire by ensuring all that is reasonable and possible can be done to maintain defensible space and harden homes towards wildfire embers. CVERA already has several community members who have been trained in making defensible space assessments.

Firewise USA Community Meeting Wed March 6, 7:00pm Rumsey Town Hall, 14380 Manzanita St., Rumsey, CA. All are welcome for this informative event.

The ultimate goal is to improve the community's resilience towards wildfire. By becoming a Firewise USA community we can tap more resources to support everyone in the community with education, outreach. If we can develop enough volunteers to support those who are unable to financially pay for or physically unable maintain defensible space around their home we will organize limited support volunteer crews.

The goal of becoming a Firewise Community is to demonstrate to insurers that our community is prepared for wildfire. A large incentive to get most of the community involved so we can obtain Firewise USA certification is that California Insurers, including the Fair Plan, are required to provide a 10% discount to homes in the community that meet the maintenance requirements for defensible space and home hardening against embers. We don't have to get to 100% compliance in year one, but we need the community support to document and show progress year over year. However, we must meet the data collection and certification requirements and will need community outreach and participation to obtain Firewise certification. The data submitted is on a community basis indicating percentage of properties meeting varying levels of wildfire reliance, so it is anonymized community data.

For this meeting we are going to be providing more information on the process required to capture the data to meet Firewise USA requirements. Currently most residents need to be able to document time spent or having a service maintain defensible space in the zones around their residence, clean gutters, check vents screen. The minimum work requirement is an hour per year for defensible space. Many will spend more hours, we need the community to provide input and we need to survey the community to determine and document the current community wildfire reliance.

To ensure we have a manageable area we have decided to include the communities of Gunida and Rumsey, generally along and north of County Road 68 to include Rumsey Canyon Road. For communities North and West of Esparto as much as CVERA would like to support, there are limits to the program so we needed to keep the Firewise community within a reasonable number of homes and areas. The national Firewise USA recognition program provides a collaborative framework to help neighbors in a geographic area get organized, find direction, and take action to increase the ignition resistance of their homes and community and to reduce wildfire risks at the local level.

Any community that meets a set of voluntary criteria on an annual basis and retains an "In Good Standing Status" may identify itself as being a Firewise Site.

The Firewise USA program is administered by NFPA® and is co-sponsored by the USDA Forest Service and the National Association of State Foresters. While the NFPA administers this program, individuals and communities participate on a voluntary basis.

Esparto: New Season and the Wyatt Property, Part 2

After the Wyatt building had been demolished and hauled away, what remained was a hole in the ground where the basement once existed. The landowner had a 6' fence encircling the lot with a scattering of bricks and debris remaining from the demolition. It was an eyesore for a crucial corner in Esparto. The property consisted of two lots fronting Yolo Ave. and one lot fronting Woodland Ave.

New Season worked with local artist/photographer, Susan Cohen Byrne, to create murals to put around the safety fence to improve the site. It was during this time that New Season learned two important things about the property:

1) It had underground contamination. This prohibited any building upon it without remediation and clean-up.

2) Pastor Bob and his church, current owners of the property, had signed a balloon payment due to the lawyers in Poway who "donated" it to them. He and his church could not afford to move forward with clean-up or this payment or even property taxes! (Some donation huh?)

Overtime, Yolo County foreclosed on the property and put it up for tax sale. New Season's board knew that while individuals were no longer eligible for cleanup funds from the State of California, nonprofits were still eligible. The Board decided to take a chance. With the help of Board members Linda Pillard and Lynn Rolston, they monitored the tax sale and placed a bid. The County accepted the bid and New Season now owned a critical if contaminated property.

Once New Season became the owner of the Wyatt property, it became possible to apply to the California Water Quality Control Board for grants to monitor and clean up the site. Backed by grant funds, New Season is working with an engineering firm to ensure that monitoring wells are maintained and measured. We are hopeful for closure on the site sometime in 2025.

In the meantime, New Season had dirt hauled in and filled the hole and leveled the lot. This allowed for the removal of the fence. Flowers were planted each spring by Durst Organic Growers and the Esparto Farmer's Market set up on the back of the property. New Season endeavored to keep it looking better for our community with the goal of clean-up finally in our view.

When you go around that corner coming in or out of Esparto, think of its history. It is a story to remind us that property speculation without local connections, often leads to abandoned properties that are detrimental to our community.

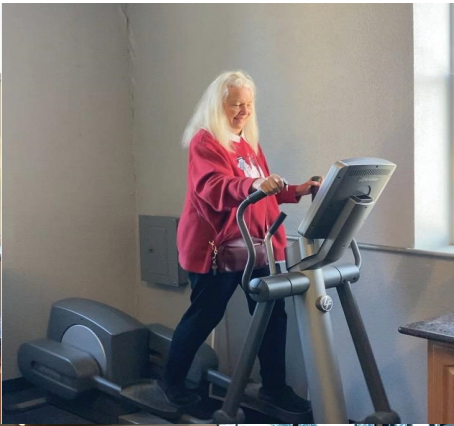

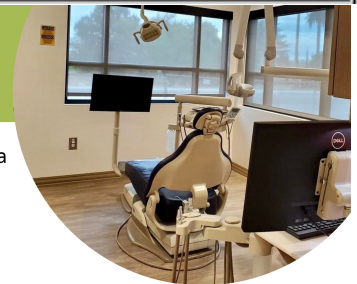

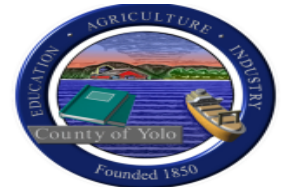
