
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#### Esparto High student to embark on German exchange program



July 31, 2021 Esparto High School
student Jose Trejo
will be packing his
bags and heading to
Germany for most of
the next year after
being one of the
Congress Bundestag
Youth Exchange
Scholarship recipients.

Trejo, who is about to be a junior, was

selected as one of 250 high schoolers across the United States to earn the prestigious CBYX scholarship allowing him to spend 10 months studying and living in Germany with a host family.

The CBYX is a two-sided exchange program co-sponsored by ic. the U.S Department of State and the German Bundestag or Parliament. Since 1983 this program has funded the opportunity for more in than 27,000 students to expand their global perspectives, with American students living in Germany and German students living and going to school in the U.S.

As a CBYX scholarship recipient, Trejo will experience German life firsthand by living with a host family and attending a German high school. During the program, conditions permitting, students will also have the opportunity to meet with both U.S. Congressional Representatives and German Bundestag members.

"I like to see the way things work," Trejo said. "I have always been a visual person, and I think going to Germany will help me visualize and see things from a different perspective. Politics have been something that has always interested me."

As a sophomore, Trejo amassed a 4.43 weighted grade point average while taking AP Human Geography and AP Computer Science. Trejo is also highly involved in FFA and was the sophomore class president.

Outside of the classroom, Trejo is the Elder Recreation program coordinator and has also worked at the local food closet. Both programs are run through RISE Inc.

Trejo has had quite the journey to get to this point. He was actually the recipient of the CYBX scholarship over a year ago after he first heard about the program while reading over a flyer that his Spanish teacher hung up while he was still a freshman.

In December of 2019, he turned in his first application to get to this point. After a round of group and individual interviews in February, he got the good news in April 2020 that he had been selected. But, he was made aware that he may not be able to go due to the ongoing COVID-19 Pandemic.

His fears ultimately came true when he received a call in July informing him that the program would be virtual for the 2020-21 school year.

"It was really disappointing," Trejo said. "I was looking forward to going and experiencing that. I didn't think I would apply again because I was disappointed. But then I decided to go for it again."

While he applied for the next round, Trejo still participated in the virtual program. He mentions one of the highlights was participating in mock trial simulated versions of the U.S. and German congresses.

"It was really interesting to see how we were able to come together and share opinions on everything without clashing heads," Trejo said. "We were able to make decisions."

After applying for it the second time, Trejo mentions he was a lot less nervous during the process. He was also encouraged by dropping COVID-19 case rates. In the end, he was glad he did.

Trejo is set to depart to Germany on Aug. 23 and be there for 10 straight months before returning in June 2022.

"It's going to be great," Trejo said. "I think that the first couple of months will be a little hard, and I'll be homesick for sure. But I think it will go well, and it will be a great opportunity."

Traveling abroad is something Trejo has always thought about. He was lucky his interest in politics allowed him the opportunity to finally do it.

"Since I was younger, traveling abroad has always been something I have wanted to go do," Trejo said. "It has always interested me. I'm really looking forward to building a connection and meeting new people and getting to experience a culture that isn't very wildly represented in the United States. I can't wait to explore out there and view some historical locations as well."

Trejo, however, has not found out where exactly in Germany he will be staying, adding to his anxiousness.

He mentioned he could end up in the tiniest village or biggest city in the European country. But the fear of the unknown still has not made him second guess his decision. He even encouraged future students that may be on the fence to go for it and apply.

"Just apply for it, even if you are a little nervous," Trejo stated. "I was super nervous and I still am nervous about leaving but do it. Even if you have a little 'what if's' in your head,"

Forty-nine outstanding FFA members were selectively chosen from across California to represent our great state at this year's National FFA Convention in Indianapolis, Indiana. Delegates are tasked with participating in committee hearings to address pressing issues within the National FFA organization. According to National FFA "The National FFA Delegate Experience ensures that the National FFA Organization remains a grassroots organization that serves students at the local level." Five hundred students representing each state association will meet on the week of Oct. 27th- 30th, to share ideas and local perspectives which will help advance the FFA organization. When asked what he most looked forward to, Thomas replied, "I am very excited to go to the National Convention and interact with the top FFA leaders from across the country". We could not be more excited to have Thomas representing the Esparto FFA Chapter at this year's National FFA Convention.

Joseph Ehcarte is a former active Esparto High School FFA member and current alumni. Throughout his four years in agriculture Joseph served on many committees and held several leadership roles. He worked diligently in his mechanics, livestock and farming operations Supervised Agricultural Experiences (SAE) to earn his Greenhand, Chapter and State FFA degrees. Joseph will be honored on stage in front of 80,000 FFA members and receive the American FFA Degree at the National FFA Convention. The American Degree is the highest degree bestowed upon an FFA member. To earn this degree students must be active in an agriculture class all four years of high school, maintain an active SAE project, invest over \$7,500 or have earned a minimum of \$1,200 in their SAE project, keep consistent records with over 2,250 hours invested in agriculture, participate in community service, and demonstrate outstanding leadership abilities. Joseph has far exceeded the qualifications of this degree. His commitment to agriculture continues into his college studies this year at Chico State as he pursues his degree in agriculture mechanical engineering.

Esparto FFA is proud to have members like Joseph and Thomas. We appreciate the commitment and dedication you have both invested into our local program, national organization and the agriculture community.

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#### **ECAC UPDATE**

The Esparto Citizens Advisory Committee (ECAC) met October 19 to take action on a couple agenda items. First, the committee recommended extending the development agreement for the Story subdivision (north of Esparanza Crossing apartments and south of Road 20X).

The current plan calls for 75 home lots and 16 units of affordable multifamily housing. The extension of the development agreement is needed to keep the project active in the planning process with the County and make changes to the agreement to reflect current conditions and needs in Esparto.

Second, the committee recommended approval of the Teichert Shifler Mining and Reclamation Project as it pertains to impacts in the Esparto area. This project and its impacts are mostly in the Wildwings / Monument Hills area closer to Woodland; however, two aspects of the project impact the Esparto area: 1) Closure of Esparto mining operations and transfer of its allocation of 1.2 million tons to the new mining proposed near Wildwings, and 2) Bar-skimming (leveling) in the creek channel between Road 87 and I-505.

The committee also discussed details of the Story subdivision map and a potential new development being considered on land north of the Esparto CSD office and south of Road 20X.

On October 26 there will be a special joint meeting between the ECAC and the Madison CAC to provide input in preparation for an EIR (Environmental Impact Report) for the Gibson Solar Project (west of Madison).

The ECAC meets on the third Tuesday evening of each month, as needed. (Meetings are currently held via Zoom.) To receive notices of upcoming meetings, including agendas and minutes, you can subscribe via the Yolo County website (https://www.yolocounty.org/government/advanced-components/subscribe)

The Esparto Citizens Advisory Committee is appointed by the Board of Supervisors to act as advisors to the Planning Commission concerning land use matters. The opinions expressed by this committee are not necessarily those shared by the Planning, Resources, and Public Works

Department.

## How Can Parents Prepare for Parent-Teacher Conferences?

November marks the end of the first trimester of school and it has been a busy start! At the 6 week mark of school teachers prepared progress reports to give parents a status update on their child's learning. Progress Reports were sent home around October 1st. Parents can always monitor progress as often as they would like through the Aeries Parent Portal. You can access the portal by downloading the app or the link on our school webpage. I recommend checking in on Aeries weekly. A good reminder to check on your child's progress is when you receive the weekly emailed update from Aeries.

Meeting with families to discuss your child's progress is an important part of parent engagement and the relationship between school and home. Our school has set aside November 15th-18th to schedule conferences. Be on the lookout for an email in Parent Square from your child's teacher to select a meeting date and time. We want to meet with the families for each and every student. It is very important that you are on time to your appointment and that you keep your appointment. Teachers are working very hard to meet with each family and with 25-32 students being timely is crucial.

Parents should talk with their child before the conference. Children should understand why the conference is taking place. Our November Parent Conferences are routine meetings held for all parents. Children should be assured that parents are seeking ways to help and learn about what their children are doing in school. Parents can also learn if their child has any specific concerns about schoolwork or relationships with classmates.

Conferences are a time to become more familiar with your child's homework assignments if you have questions. It is best to know how your child has been performing by asking yourself questions such as: Is the work getting done? Does your child seem to understand the assignments? Does the work seem too easy or too difficult? Parents can discuss their observations with the teacher.

Parents can prepare a list of questions they want to ask their child's teacher. Is my child meeting expectations for learning and behavior? How has my child performed on daily class assignments, on tests, on homework assignments? How does my child compare to others in basic skills? Does my child follow school rules or does my child exhibit any behavior problems? If my child is struggling in any area, what has been tried to improve performance? Does my child pay attention in class? What else can be done at home or at school? What are my child's strengths? Are there any concerns about my child's health, or adjustment? Are there materials or resources that you would recommend? How does my child get along with other students?

During the conference parents should listen carefully. It is perfectly acceptable to take notes. This is particularly helpful if one parent or other involved relative cannot attend. It can also help you remember details so that you can ask questions later.

Parents should offer their perspective. Many times teachers will ask you about your child's activities at home and your views of your child's strengths and areas where help might be needed. Even if the teacher does not ask, speak up and provide your observations and any concerns.

The Esparto Elementary Staff is committed to your child's education and well-being. We look forward to working with our students' families throughout the year and into the future. See you at conferences!

# ORGANICS DO'S AND DON'TS

# DO:

- Separate your **organic waste** from other trash by putting **food scraps & yard trimmings** in the GREEN LID cart.
- Separate your organic waste from other trash. Every little bit counts, saving landfill space & producing usable soil for the community.
- Line indoor collection bins with **compostable bags**. This will defend against pests and make transferring to the **green lid cart** easy.

# DON'T:

- Don't put organic waste into the trash or recycling bins. When placed in the trash, organic waste fills up the landfill unnecessarily. When placed in the recycling bin, it contaminates batches of good recyclables.
- Don't leave any inorganic packaging like food labels, plastic wrap, or rubber bands in your organic waste.



#### Esparto Chamber Business Spotlight: El Toro Meat Market & Taqueria



In 2005, a small water store was started by Miguel and Lilia Molina in Esparto. Not long after, the idea of opening a Mexican meat market was born. Miguel and Lilia had no idea how to run a grocery store, but they had the dream and knew that with hard work, they could do it. My dad and I remodeled the meat market in the summer of 2006 and we opened in November of 2006. You can still walk in and see the blue tape I used to cover one of the air vents when we painted back in 2006. I'm not kidding, it really has been there since 2006.

People would always ask if my dad showed me how to cut meat, the reality was that I showed my dad how to cut meat. I didn't know how to cut meat and there wasn't anyone to show me, so I went over to the library and checked out a book on meat cutting. I watched some Youtube videos on how to cut meat as well. Now, Youtube in 2006 was not what it is today. There weren't many videos on how to cut meat then. There were only about two videos which ultimately led me to have more questions than answers. So, I would go to other meat markets and walk their meat counters to see how I was supposed to cut and make it look. I still remember being in high school and while on lunch going to the store to cut meat to fill the meat case, then having to run back to school before lunch was over.

We quickly became known for our chicken fajitas, guacamole, homemade salsa, and of course fresh meat. Our chicken fajitas are still, by far, our most popular meat entrée and the item that has

not changed in nearly 15 years. Our guacamole is still made using fresh avocados, as well as all the salsas, made with only fresh ingredients.

Along with my three siblings Jacqueline, Briana, and Naomi, we have been able to grow the business to now include a taqueria. Not everything has come easy. Throughout the years, we have disagreed on many things as a family. Even the most uninteresting things can make the dinner conversation just a little more interesting. So just know, that anything we put out to sell, very likely involved a huge argument as to where the label should go, what size container, which container, what label we should put on it or what the label should say. If you can imagine it, we argued over it. We are one big dysfunctional family, and proud of it.

This November 17th 2021, the business that was started with just a dream, will celebrate 15 years in the community. From the entire Molina family we want to thank the community for supporting us the last 15 years. We hope to continue to serve the community for many more years. - Miguel Molina Jr

But one group seems to be flourishing- ants! In the summer they attacked our eggplants and peppers in the garden, and us as well when we stand too close to their nest (see photo). We recently had visitors that have expertise in ant identification, and now we know that we what we are seeing, at least around the nest, is warfare among ants. Scott Miller, of the Smithsonian Natural History Museum, told us that what we have are two different species of ants, the Southern fire ant, and the Argentine ant (but NOT the Argentine fire ant, which is even worse news).

Scott told us, "The southern fire ant is aggressive, but Argentine ant is even more aggressive, so what we saw in your vineyard was small black ants (Argentine) running around the opening of their nest which was covered with dead red ants (some decapitated, etc.). Both species have been around the area for awhile, so presumably this is just ongoing competition within the vineyard. But when you look closely, you see the carnage of serious warfare!"

Scott sent lots of other information, for those more curious about our ants. Did you know for example, that 21 species of ants have been recorded in the Davis Arboretum over the thirty-year period of 1985 to 2015? Or that when the warrior-like Argentine ants invade an area, they have high water requirements and in this way manage to eliminate most species of native ants? This ant has been recorded as invasive along Cache Creek – near Capay - from 1986 and seems to be very victorious in our vineyard pretty far from the river now in 2021. We might take some solace in learning that there is a species of parasitic flies that attacks fire ants, and in turn also decapitates them. It's been found near Winters- but so far, we have not seen it at work decapitating the vicious (also decapitating) Argentine ant.

Scott also sent us a key to identifying common household ants, so should this interest any of you, write to me (bg11@mac.com) and I'll send you the pdf.
