Paula Lorenzo Tackett has agreed to serve on the Board of Directors for New Season CDC in Esparto, CA. Paula Lorenzo Tackett is the former tricl chair for the Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation and was instrumental in building Cache Creek Casino Resort; Yocha Dehe Fire Department; Yocha Dehe Golf COurse and Seka HIlls Olive MIII. PAula helped lead the Tribe's move into diverse farm operastions in the Capay Valley. Her leadership helped strengthen economic development for the Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation and the nearby communities.

As a founding member of the nonprofit organization, Capay Valley Vision, Paula built additional bonds within the community. She also created multiple charitable giving programs benifiting the Capay Valley and the counties of Yolo, Solano, Lake and Sacramento. For her eforts, Paula has recieved many local and regional awards. Paula and her husband Jery live in Brooks on tribal lands.

Paula also owns the Road Trip Bar and Grill in Capay and has extensive background in all levels of food service, knowledge that will be benificial to the new Yolo Food Hub project as part of New Season CDC board.

With the help of the multiple entrepreneurs, farms, and food hub advocates, the Yolo Food Hub Network was created. Supported by Yolo County and ARP funds, a 5-acre property with existing buildings was aquired for the Yolo Food Hub project. 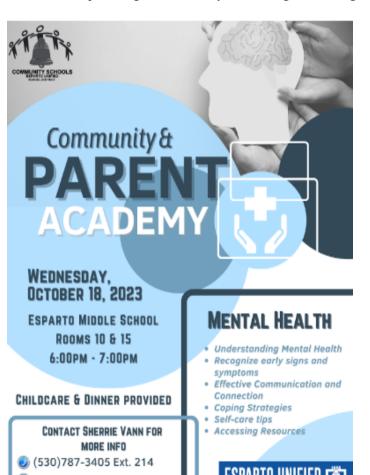




Community Schools & Esparto Scholars Program

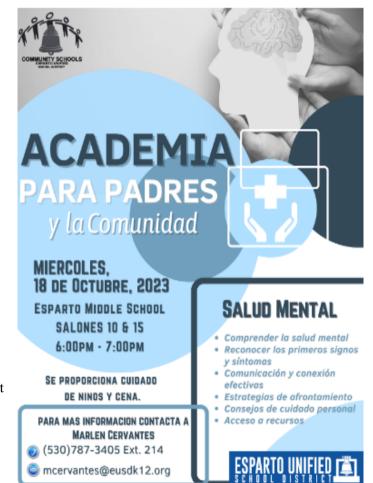

Astronomy is perhaps man's first science. One of the first things that we experiencedaas we emerge into this world is light. With that as a truism for all, let us explore the first source of light that humans would have been exposed too. The main source to beings on the surface of the earth is the sun. Even those who are born blind feel the radiant warmth of the sun. So, we can suggest that our first sensations inlife are from above!

Chapter 1

When I was small, I had several encounterst hat helped lead my towards my future interest in the heavens. I grew up in a housing project in Brooklyn, New York. One of my first memories as a child was of my father taking me up to the roof and giving me a solar filter and telling me to look at the sun. He explained that what I was looking at was an eclipse of the sun. My next experience came sometime after when I was walking with my father one evening and he pointed to the moon and asked me if I could see the man in the moon? Well I know now that there are other things there too. A woman for instance!

Chapter 2

I was now in school. I remember a field trip my class took to the American Museum of Natural History. I was fascinated with everything especially with the Planetarium. The Star show was out of this world. When I was somewhat older, looking around on my father's shelf, I found an old telescope. We lived on the 14th floor, the top of the building. We had both east and west facing windows. We had a view of Manhattan in one direction and the ocean in the opposite direction. Looking East with the telescope in hand, I saw a bright object in the sky. I looked at it with the telescope! That was my first telescopic view of the planet Jupiter.

During my lunch hour I would go out and look at the Sun and do my recording. I was out one morning on break while a solar eclipse was in progress. My boss happen to be outside at the same time. She was fascinated by what she saw at my telescope. She told me to stay out and directed my co-workers to come out to see the eclipse. I had my very own star party. That was the beginning of my outreach activities. After that I got a 90mm refractor and every Halloween, I would sit out in my front yard and show the kids and their parents some celestial object of interest! I should also mention that I enjoyed showing my children Halley's Comet as viewed through a telescope!

Conclusion

Becoming an Amateur Astronomer was a natural progression for me. Over the years I have read many books and magazines about Astronomy. I've purchased a number of telescopes.I joined the Eastbay Astronomical Society and have attended lectures, done outreach and even written astronomy related poems in the Refractor, The Society's Newsletter. The journey has been interesting. Looking forward to the Solar Eclipse! What's your story?

Zoology - A Glimpse into the Wonderful World of Animals

Have you ever wondered what is the most dangerous animal? Or how sharks chew their food? Or what the only land-dwelling crustacean is? Well, the students in Zoology this year will have the chance to find out!

Zoology is being offered to Esparto Middle School students as an elective for 6th and 7th graders. During the year we will explore all nine animal phyla. From the lowly sponge to the complex octopus to the many many fascinating chordates. We will be creating an interactive notebook complete with notes and creature reports about the different animals in the phylum. Additionally, we will create art and projects that help us understand more about those animals. Fire Season is Here: Get Prepared with Yolo County Fire Safe Council

Fire season continues and the fall months are a time of high alert for Western Yolo Couonty. AFter the heat of summer, weedy vegetation along the roadways and in open spaces is extremely dry, making for hazardous fuels for wildfire. Those fuels paired with windy conditions and little (or no) fall rains create prime wildfire conditions. Wildfire prevention and community vigilance is the best way to prevent wildfires that could result in loss of property or life.

One simple strategy to protect your family and your home is by installing a reflective address sign. The Yolo County Fire Safety Council continues to offer FREE reflective address signs (and optional posts) to residents living west of Winters and throughout the Capay Valley (residents living west of Esparto and Capay, Brooks, Guinda and Rumsey). The Reflective Address SIgn Program provides residents with high quality emergency responder-approved 6 by 24 inch signs to clearly mark the location of your residence or property. The highly reflective signs are fade resistant and last for years. Reflective address signs aid first responders in locating homes in emergencies under all conditions such as wildfire smoke, night -time, fog and rain. When you install a reflective address sign, you make it easier for first responders to find you in case of an evacuation or medical emergency, or to find your home to protect it during a wildfire.

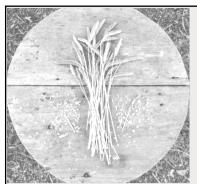

Capay Valley Flora Fauna and Farm Capay Valley Regeneration White Sonora Wheat by Pamela Bateman

When most of us think of flour we think of All Purpose White Flour readily available in the grocery store. Many of us may even use Whole Wheat Flour as a more nutritious alternative to plain white flour. However, there is a renaissance happening in the world of wheat and Capay Valley farmers are part of the trend towards expanding the availability of different wheat cultivars. Wheat was first cultivated approximately 10,000 years ago in the Middle East. It was brought to northern Mexico and the Southwest by Spanish colonizers during the 1600's and the Akimel O'odham were the first native people to grow wheat. The Akimel O'odham lived along the Gila river south of what is now Phoenix, Arizona and were expert agriculturalists using canal irrigation, crop rotation, and wind breaks. They grew summer/fall crops of corn, beans, squash and cotton. The newly introduced wheat offered a winter/spring crop increasing the availability of cultivated food throughout the year. They began selecting wheat plants that did well in their dry climate and developed a wheat cultivar that we now call White Sonora Wheat. Incorporating wheat into their cuisine resulted in the now familiar flour tortillas that had traditionally only been made with corn.

White Sonora Wheat is defined as a soft white wheat that belongs to the spelt and common wheat species. It is considered a heritage wheat because it was developed before the introduction of hybridized, high-yielding wheat in the late 1800s. This wheat is suited to growing on small farms and grows well without environmentally damaging inputs of toxic chemicals such as fertilizers, pesticides and herbicides. It is well adapted to drought and variable weather because of its deep root system. It produces seeds that exhibit genetic variation from generation to generation which gives it the ability to adapt to local conditions. The wheat spike is beardless, lacking a long hair or awn, and the hull or husk is easily removed from the wheat berry. After milling this whole grain wheat produces a soft white flour with a flavor that is described as sweet and light. Easy to grind the grain is high in protein but it is low in gluten forming proteins making it good for flour tortillas, crackers, pie crusts and pastries.

According to the Food and Agriculture Organization 75% of food crop varieties have been lost since the advent of monocultural practices in the 1900s. Our local farmers are increasing plant diversity by growing crops like White Sonora Wheat thereby giving us a healthy varied diet. Industrial agriculture has produced high quantities of food but much has been lost in the race to produce grain with the highest yields. Heritage seeds and local food connect us as a community. Historically seeds were closely linked to a farming region and the people that grew the plants. By selecting and saving seeds farmers were guaranteed food sovereignty and security. Humans as a keystone species have the power to choose farming practices that support plant diversity, soil health, and crops that are grown for quality and not merely quantity. White Sonora Wheat is an excellent example of this holistic system.



Seasonal Recipes Using ingredients sourced from farms in the Capay Valley

Caramelized Peppers with Cheese

5 or 6 mixed peppers chopped *

2 cloves garlic chopped

1 small red onion sliced

1/4 teaspoon salt

3 Tablespoons Extra Virgin Olive Oil

8 oz. Monterey Jack Cheese grated

Fresh Cilantro chopped

Flour or Corn Tortillas

In a skillet sauté peppers, garlic, onion and salt in the olive oil until lightly caramelized and soft.

You may need to add more olive oil during this process.

Remove skillet from heat and add cheese stirring until melted.

Sprinkle cilantro over the cheese mixture and serve in flour or corn tortillas.

*Note:

Farms in the Capay Valley grow many types of delicious peppers such as Jimmy Nardello, Pimento, Bell, and Poblano.
