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

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

Esparto: A New Season is Born--Chapter 2

New Season intensified a focus on the two key things that came out of planning workshops hosted by Capay Valley Vision. Economic vitality and growth were essential for jobs to keep us vibrant as a community AND Esparto is the commercial hub of the Valley and should be the focus of new development and business.

Looking around the town, we had hopes of becoming the next Winters. But we quickly discovered after a workshop by LAFCO (Local Agency Formation Commission) that we were too small to become incorporated. Incorporation provides benefits of which unincorporated communities are not eligible, particularly funding opportunities. But it also means an incorporated town must provide funding for its own police and fire services and act as a city government. We then asked, where do we go from here?

The Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation had developed an agreement with Yolo County that provided a funding source for both county services and local programs. This fund, called ACTM (Advisory Committee on Tribal Matters) fund, reviewed applications for funding. The committee was made up of appointed county representatives from all of the Supervisors' districts. They had recently moved from one -year funding proposals to three-year funding . The rationale was they saw it as a more efficient way to maximize local organizations work without them constantly chasing funding.

The ACTM awarded New Season a three -year contract to purchase and rehabilitate one of the Esparto commercial buildings. New Season had done its due diligence and felt the Lindberg Building had the most potential. Concurrently, the New Season board members were talking with the McKenzie brothers, owners of Pacific Ace Hardware in Winters and Vacaville, as potential tenants for the building. The building was purchased, and the rehab began under Burton Construction. Pacific Ace hardware signed an agreement to tenant the property and the construction focused on their specifications for a hardware store. An added benefit was the donation of a surplus freight elevator from Cache Creek Casino. New Season was excited for this future but wait! Due to the recession in 2008, Yolo County pulled back the second- and third-year funding! In fact, they pulled back all of the funds prompting the news headline for the Woodland Record to read "County Raids Capay Community Chest."

It was devastating for the organizations in the Valley (more on that story in a future article). New Season was in the middle of rehabilitation without funds to continue. Thanks to New Seasons Board work, proposals for a USDA RBEG grant and a finishing loan from First Northern Bank were funded. Proudly, this is Pacific Ace Hardware in Esparto. In 2018, Pacific Ace Hardware purchased the building outright as it has become an asset from them and for Esparto and the Capay Valley.

The Esparto Citizens Advisory Committee (ECAC) met October 17 to provide a recommendation on a use permit application for a licensed cannabis operation southwest of Esparto.

The project includes a request to cultivate up to two acres of cannabis canopy and a request for a regional nursery license. The committee recommended denial of the use permit (5-1 vote).

The ECAC meets on the third Tuesday evening of each month, as needed (Currently at the fire station or library conference room). Soil- An Overlooked World by Pamela Bateman

A popular saying is 'you can't tell a book by its cover' now imagine trying to understand the world of soil by just looking at its surface. And yet that is what many of us do every day when when we assume we can abuse soil without any consequences. We have cleared the land of vegetation, drained the low areas, changed the course of waterways, planted monocultures, spread herbicides to kill all unwanted plants, disturbed the soil with tillage and left it bare to bake in the hot summer sun. But if we stop to consider and educate ourselves about what is below the soil surface we will discover a fantastic world full of diverse life forms, shared resources, soil structures that enable the movement of air and water, chemical communication networks, and intimate relationships between life below the soil and plants above ground that need these life forms to thrive.

Soil is a biological community that may have over 100,000 different types of organisms living there. These life forms vary in size from burrowing rodents such as moles and gophers, to termites, beetles, spiders, and continuing to microorganisms such as bacteria, fungi, protozoa, and algae. A small amount of soil may contain up to one billion bacteria and 100-200 species of fungi. The organisms consume and recycle plant material providing nutrients for plants.

Almost all plants have symbiotic relationships with soil microorganisms exchanging plant exudates for nitrogen, minerals and water in the soil.


Soil bacteria release a sticky substance that glues soil particles together to create microaggregates and fungi create net like hyphae that bind these aggregates into a porous soil structure that allows for the movement of air, water, plant roots, and microorganisms within these soil 'highways'. The film around soil particles contain microfauna and mesofauna live in the soil pores or airspaces. Water is important to all living life forms and a healthy soil with good soil structure and a diverse biological community can hold 20 times its weight in water. In light of this new scientific soil research farmers are now being advised to, among other things, reduce or eliminate tillage that damages the soil structure and to refrain from leaving the soil bare which increases the soil temperature to damaging levels for the life forms below the surface.

Biodiversity focused farming can encourage the relationships between soil organisms and plants. The more diverse the plants and crops that are grown on farm land the more diverse the organisms in the soil. With respect for the soil biota farmers can develop long term plans

that benefit both the soil and agriculture. Soil microorganisms need living plant material and the remains of plants and animals for nutrition and plants need a diverse community of soil organisms for optimum growth. This article only briefly touches on the relationships we need to form with this overlooked world within the soil. HOLIDAY POMEGRANATE ORANGE TEA

Dried or fresh mint leaves Pomegranate juice * Orange wedges with rind * Honey to taste (optional)*

This recipe uses ingredient amounts entirely suited to your taste.

Pour boiling water into tea pot and add dried or fresh mint leaves and a wedge of orange and allow to steep for a few minutes.

Strain into tea cup. Add a little pomegranate juice to give the tea a nice color.

Gently squeeze a few drops of orange juice from another wedge into the tea cup and garnish the rim of the tea cup with the orange.

Add optional honey to sweeten.

The mint leaves can be substituted with an herb of your choice.
