Seasonal Recipes

Using ingredients sourced from the Capay Valley From the kitchen of Pamela Bateman

Beet and Persimmon Salad

2 beets cooked and sliced
2 persimmons peeled and sliced
3-4 cups Arugula
1/2 cup walnuts
Salt
Pomegranate arils for garnish (optional)

Salad Dressing*

1/4 cup Elderberry vinegar *1/4 cup extra virgin Olive Oil1-2 tablespoons honey1 tablespoon Dijon mustard

Spread the Arugula on a serving plate and top with the beets, persimmons, walnuts and pomegranate arils. Add salt to taste. Whisk together the ingredients of the salad dressing and drizzle it over the salad and serve.

*Notes

Each ingredient in the salad dressing can be adjusted to your taste. Several farms in the Capay Valley make and sell Elderberry vinegar. The delicious fruity taste of this vinegar compliments the taste of beets and persimmons.

Winter has arrived and the sound of wind and rain has replaced the sound of children splashing in the pool at Tuli Mem Park. Although the pool is closed for the season, we are happy to see people are still using the park for walks, softball, basketball, and soccer. During the winter, the County and WYORCA are working to ensure everything is ready when the warm weather returns.

The County is performing inspections and needed repairs, as well as planning and coordinating staffing. Starting this fall, the County has taken over maintenance and operation of the park from the Esparto CSD to reduce costs and be involved in the park and pool more directly. WYORCA would like to take this opportunity to thank the Esparto CSD for their years of good service at Tuli Mem park. Their willingness to step into the role when a solution was needed after construction was completed, and the County was not ready to take the reins at that time, is deeply appreciated.

Meanwhile WYORCA continues to work (as it has for over 25 years!) to find ways to support the County in terms of advocacy for the park, coordination with pool management on details for the coming season, and raising funds to support programs such as lessons and free days. "There are better ways to control anxiety and other mental disorders. I feel like people should go to a therapist to get some help." – 8th Grader



Youth Leadership Group

Esparto Middle School's Youth Leadership Group recently participated in an engaging Alcohol and Drug Prevention project during their After School group session. The students explored the topic "Vaping: Fact or Myths?" as part of a broader discussion on drug prevention and the risks associated with substance use. Through research, group discussions, and creative teamwork, they identified common misconceptions about vaping and learned about its impact on physical and mental health.

The students then applied what they learned by creating an informative display board to share with their peers. Their goal was to raise awareness and encourage others to think critically about the choices they make regarding drugs and other substances. This hands-on project gave students the opportunity to take on leadership roles, promote positive decision-making, and support a healthy school community.

In addition, members of the Youth Leadership Group wrote about their understanding of the project here in the *Valley Voice*, reflecting on what they learned and how the experience has influenced their perspectives on drug prevention and healthy living.

Student Response:


"Have you ever thought about how vaping could affect your body? Vaping could damage your body in many ways. It could damage your lungs, heart, kidneys, and affect your brain and you could possibly die. Some reasons why people start vaping is because they get peer pressured to do so or they want to fit in, or they could even be stressed out, and they believe that vaping could help. Some people believe that a little bit won't harm them, or it's safe because it has flavor, or "vaping is just flavored water or steam", or "vaping is a safe way to quit smoking". Those are all just myths and are not true. Some true facts about vaping are that vaping could cause cancer and it can cause nicotine addiction, which is the chemicals that are in vapes or cigarettes that are very unhealthy. Vaping can harm young people who are still developing, which is very bad for them. If you vape too much, it can overheat and explode, causing serious injuries. There are no safe levels of vaping. If you vape or smoke, and you want to stop, you can try cutting down the amount of vaping you do a day. You could also try Nicotine Replacement Therapy (NRT) which is replacing your vape or cigarette with patches, gum, oral sprays, inhalers, or tablets."

Oats

Among the diverse crops grown by farmers in the Capay Valley are several types of grain including oats. But you are unlikely to find oats available for purchase at farmers markets because the oats grown locally are almost entirely for animal fodder in the form of oat hay. Oat hay is consumed by horses, cattle, goats, sheep and other domestic animals. Oats are often planted on dry land i.e. land that is not irrigated and the planting time is important. In California November is the recommended planting date because the weather has cooled and it is the beginning of the rainy season. In practice the planting date runs from October through January. Oat seeds can be planted alone or with a blend of barley, wheat, rye, or triticale. In order to increase the protein content of the fodder oats are sometimes planted with vetch or Austrian winter peas.

There are many wild oat species but only four oat species are cultivated worldwide. Archeological evidence shows man was collecting wild oats for consumption at least 32,000 years ago. Oat cultivation began in the Middle East, southern coast of the Iberian Peninsula and north coast of Africa. The oat species we eat today is Avena sativa and was brought to North America in the early 17th century by European immigrants.

In addition to fodder, oats provide ecological value for the farm. Oats are generally a low maintenance plant requiring little fertilizer, weed or pest control. Oats as a cover crop can increase soil biomass, improve soil biological activity and reduce weeds with its rapid growth and fibrous root system. Planting oats can reduce erosion as the crop absorbs and stores rainfall. The roots develop an association with arbuscular mycorrhiza further improving soil structure and fertility.

The timing of oat harvesting is one of the most important decisions for the farmer. The quality of the oat hay is dependent on the growth stage of the plant. The vegetative stage of oats begins with germination in the soil, then tillering, then stem elongation. The reproductive stage follows and is sometimes called the boot stage where the seed head begins swelling in the stalk but has not yet emerged. Heading is when the seed head appears above the stalk followed by the flowering stage when little spikelets of two to four florets are attached by short stems to loose panicles. The final stage is ripening when the oat grains begin to develop. Oats are sometimes cut at the early flowering stage because of the higher levels of protein and digestible nutrients. At this stage the stems will be green and pliable. Oats may also be harvested later when newly formed seed heads are soft and referred to as the soft dough or milk stage. Oat hay harvesting takes place sometime between the flowering and seed production stage. The timing of harvest determines the protein content and digestibility of the oat hay but the weather and the ability of the farmer to get machinery into the field may delay the harvesting time. Harvested oats are left in the field to dry, then tedded or raked and then baled when the moisture content is below 18%. Oat hay can be a valuable crop for the farmer and the tall stacks of golden oat hay contribute to the beautiful bucolic landscape of the Capay Valley.

They appreciated the camaraderie, loved the snacks offered and even picked up voter education materials to help our league community distribution.

This year, we are honored to recognize Dr. Lizette Navarette, President, and Dr. Shannon Reed, Dean of Arts & Sciences, both of Woodland Community College (WCC), for their outstanding contributions to our community in support of youth voter engagement on campus.

Jesse Salinas, Yolo County Registrar of Voters, gave a brief history of redistricting in California and described the impacts of Proposition 50 outcome options on our county and state congressional districts. Proposition 50 Public Presentation

LWVYC held a separate presentation called "Understanding the Proposition 50 Special Election: Nonpartisan Voter Information for Yolo County".

League members summarized the initiative's history, its proposed impacts on congressional redistricting for the 2026, 2028 and 2030 federal elections, and the arguments made by both supporters and opponents. Voter information, including registration requirements, important mail-in, drop-box, and in-person ballot return options, dates and vote center locations, were also reviewed.

Defending Democracy at the No Kings Protest Event

On October 18, several League members offered their public support for defending democracy and protecting voting rights. We provided community members with voter registration and education materials at the Countywide "NO KINGS" protest held in Davis. Our voter education table at the event attracted more inquiries for voter materials: Easy Voter Guides, voter registration online tools and Yolo County Elections Office ballot return information than many of our tabling events earlier this year.

Several community members inquired about League membership and our election information materials. It was inspiring to see the number of folks wanting to learn more about the League's mission to Empower Voters and Defend Democracy. Two New League Initiatives

Beginning in November, two new initiatives will help us grow our program and expand our county outreach. A new Issue Position Advocacy Review Committee is working with the board to revisit our advocacy history and initiate updates to our issue positions where needed. By June 2026, we hope to identify several issue positions we can bring forward to help advocate for community-based local resource priorities that impact housing, climate, education and transportation challenges.

Our Fundraising Committee is currently working to ensure we have sufficient resources for countywide outreach and public resource advocacy. Our support for good governance policies in housing, health and the public resources helps lift up our residents and strengthen our communities. We will be launching a 2026 LWVYC Funding Campaign to ensure our league has the operational resources needed to support a range of voter registration and ballot education outreach events in partnership with multiple Yolo County communities during the 2026 election cycle.




