As Elijah steps into this role, his forward-thinking ideas and collaborative approach will bring depth and focus to the SSA Board's work, helping to advance equitable, student-driven change across California's Community Schools initiative.

Seasonal Recipes

Using ingredients sourced from the Capay Valley

Buttery Leek Pinwheels



1 Flatbread - Traditional Lavash
2 Tablespoons Butter
1/3 cup finely chopped Leeks
Pinch of salt
3 tablespoons grated Parmesan or Pecorino cheese

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Melt butter in skillet over medium heat and add the chopped leeks and salt. Cook, stirring until leeks begin to soften. Remove from heat. On a chopping board lay out the flatbread and spoon the leeks and butter over the surface of the bread then sprinkle with cheese. Starting from the short side roll up the bread and slice it into approximately 1/2" pinwheels. Place pinwheels on baking sheet and bake in the oven until they start to brown which should take about 5 to 10 minutes. Remove from the oven and serve. These pinwheels make a tasty hors d'oeuvre much like a puff pastry and are best served warm. Makes 12 to 15 pinwheels.

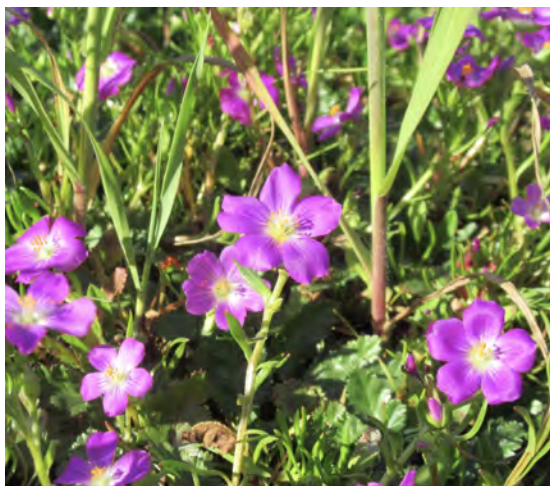
*Note

Capay Valley Flora, Fauna and Farms Capay Valley Regeneration

Red Maids Wildflowers



Springtime comes early to the mild climate of the Capay Valley. Native wildflowers begin blooming in February and sometimes earlier. One of our very showy wildflowers is called Red Maids, *Calandrinia menziesii*, an annual found in grasslands, disturbed areas and along trails and roads. Growing throughout the Pacific region this plant is a spreading annual herb that grows to about sixteen inches high with five bright pink to magenta petals with a white center and bright yellow anthers. The flowers are photonastic meaning they respond to light closing up without sunlight or when skies are cloudy. They are an important nectar source for bees and the seeds are eaten by birds, insects and small mammals.

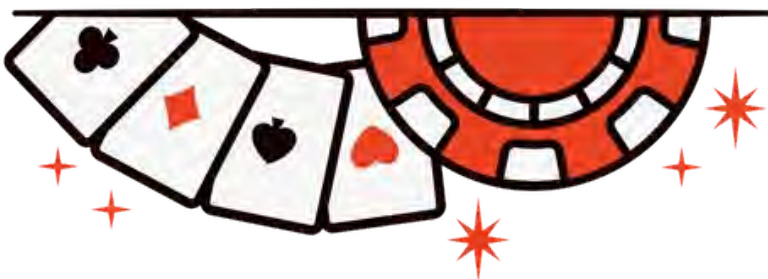
Red Maids is a myrmecochorous plant meaning that the seeds have an extra part on them that attracts ants. Myrmecochory is a plant's way of dispersing seed throughout the landscape. The ants carry the seed back to their nest to consume the elaiosome, the fleshy structure attached to the seed, yet leave the seed within or deposited just outside of the nest. Myrmecochory gives the plant several advantages namely seed dispersal, reduction of seed consumption by rodents, placement of seeds in fertile areas around the ant nest and fire protection in fire-prone landscapes as the seeds are carried underground. Since the seeds have been removed from the area right next to the mother plant they also will have less seedling competition when they germinate. The process rewards the ants with a source of food and aids the plant in reproduction.

The flowers and foliage of Red Maids are edible but do contain oxalic acid, like many other plants such as spinach, and should be eaten in small quantities. However, cooking reduces soluble oxalate. Native People highly value the flowers, foliage and black oil-rich seeds of Red Maids. When Native People practice cultural burns, a clearing of the land with controlled fire, wildflowers, including Red Maids and other plants, grow in great numbers. Historically Native People have eaten the leaves and shoots of this plant and the seeds are collected, winnowed, toasted and ground into a flour to make nutritious balls or cakes. In the past seeds were so highly valued that anthropologists have found Red Maid seeds in containers at burial sites. In February Red Maids should start making their appearance throughout the Capay Valley.

From Vision to Action: Esparto Unified's Graduate Profile Progress

Esparto Unified is excited to provide a community update on our work in developing a Graduate Profile to support college, career, and life readiness. During the 2022-2023 school year, Esparto Unified began efforts to develop a Graduate Profile. The Graduate Profile was developed with input from over 140 community members, including EUSD staff, students, parents, school board members, and representatives from local businesses and organizations. Through focus groups and workshops, this team identified six competencies that the community determined are essential for student success in college, career, and life. The six competencies that were identified are: Career, Collaboration/Teamwork/Citizenship, Critical Thinking/Problem Solving, Well-Being, Financial Literacy, and Communication. These competencies are essential skills that students will begin to develop as early as TK and Kindergarten and master in high school.

With the competencies identified, the district's next step was to move from "Poster to Practice"- we had the "what", but needed to develop the "how". Last year, during the 2024-2025 school year, a team of EUSD teachers, coordinators, and administrators joined a workgroup through the organization Scaling Student Success. This organization's mission is to, *"holistically and equitably prepare young people in CA for future success in college, career, and civic life. We pursue our mission by working with school districts and communities to redefine success, prioritizing the skills and competencies each and every child needs to reach their potential."* Through collaboration with Scaling Student Success, EUSD developed Learner Progressions for each competency of the Graduate Profile.

Learner Progressions are clearly defined pathways that describe how students develop the knowledge, skills, and mindsets of the EUSD Graduate Profile over time. They outline what growth looks like from early grades through high school. By identifying specifically what each competency looks like at each grade level, the Graduate Profile is brought to life as an attainable goal.

This school year, Esparto Unified is focusing on further developing three of the Graduate Profile Competencies: Collaboration/Teamwork/Citizenship, Well-Being, and Communication. In December of 2025, the EUSD Scaling Student Success team presented the drafted Learner Progressions for these three competencies to all EUSD teachers. Teachers had the opportunity to review the progressions and collaboratively provide feedback. The EUSD team made revisions to the Learner Progressions based upon that input.

In January of 2026, Esparto's teachers took the next step of beginning to identify the Adult Practices that will support students' progress in meeting the learner progressions. Teacher leaders from each EUSD site began collaborating on defining the Lesson Designs and Instructional Practices that grade levels will commit to implementing to ensure student mastery of the Graduate Profile's learner outcomes. Teachers will continue to further refine this work for the remainder of the 2025-2026 school year.

Implementation of these three competencies will begin in the 2026-2027 school year with a scorecard rubric to measure and monitor progress. The 2026-2027 school year will also bring a continuation of this work by repeating the process with our remaining three Graduate Profile Competencies: Career, Critical Thinking/Problem Solving, and Financial Literacy.

EUSD will continue to share updates and progress on the development and implementation of the Graduate Profile. 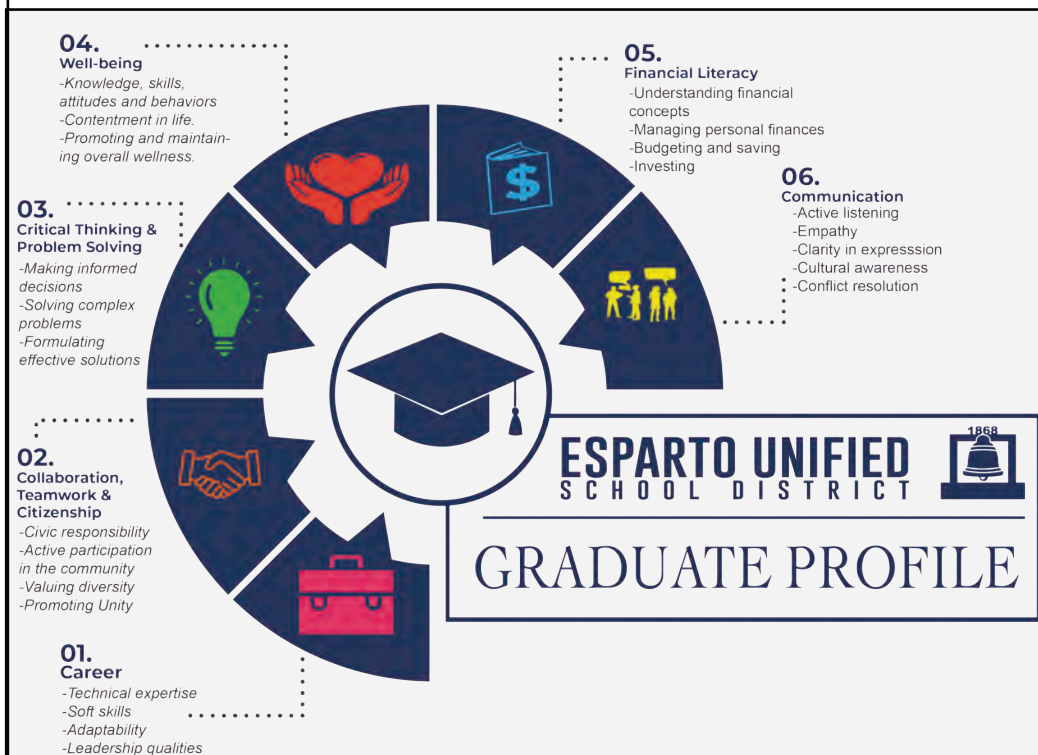
