### **An Enduring Holiday Tradition!**

It was a magical day last month when the Friends of the Esparto Regional Library (FERL) hosted Children's Shopping Day for all the children of the Capay Valley. This local celebration of giving has endured for decades thanks to dedicated volunteers and community support. The Esparto Elementary School cafeteria was transformed into a mini shopping mall for a few hours with gifts donated by community members from all over the Valley. Almost 80 children waited patiently for their turn and then left their families in the hallway to pick out gifts for everyone in the family. Once they checked their list twice, a team of wrappers made sure that each gift would look beautiful under the tree.

Parents like Faviola remember shopping for their families at Children's Shopping Day as kids, and now they are bringing their own children to carry on the tradition. Faviola said, "It's amazing that it's still going on!" Frances, another mom who brought her kids to shop, appreciates the convenience, so they don't have to worry about going to the store.

Student volunteers from Esparto High School and Middle School greeted shoppers and led them around the tables laden with gifts. When it's a child's first time, it can be a bit of a challenge to get them to separate from their parents and shop with someone they don't know. Parents can have a hard time, too, when they're instructed to wait in the hall. After a few minutes, everyone is on board. "It's a great way for kids to learn how to be independent," said Laudia, whose child was back for the second year, "I'm glad I'm not allowed to go in; I want to be surprised too!"

The spirit of giving showed on everyone's face. Sisters Valentina, 11, and Keyla, 9, participate every year. Valentina said, "I like that we can get gifts for our friends and family." Keyla remembers getting her sister a fennec fox stuffed animal that she still treasures. Thomas, 8, said "I got my mom something I'm excited to give her!" Abby, 15, participated when she was younger and recalls: "I loved children's shopping day when I was younger because it gave me a chance to do something special for the people I love."

Volunteer Robert Richeal said "Working alongside the volunteers from EHS and EMS is such a pleasure. Watching the older kids interact and helping the little kids brings warmth and hope to the soul."

Many thanks to all the community members who donated gifts, the businesses that hosted collection boxes, and the community and student volunteers who made this holiday favorite happen!

It is with great pride and genuine excitement that I welcome you to the 111th Annual Capay Valley Almond Festival, taking place Saturday, Feb 21,10-4 (Family Day) all day Sunday, 9-4 February 22, 2026, throughout the beautiful Capay Valley. A cherished Northern California tradition since 1915, the Almond Festival remains one of the region's most beloved annual celebrations—honoring community, agriculture, and the breathtaking pink and white almond blossoms that signal the coming of spring.

What began more than a century ago as a post-harvest gathering has blossomed into the **only known six-town festival in California**, stretching from **Madison** through **Esparto**, **Capay**, **Brooks**, **and Guinda**, and ending in **Rumsey**. Each community along scenic Highway 16 proudly offers its own unique flavor of festivities—local foods, arts and crafts, live music, family activities, and even a vintage car show. One of the most anticipated traditions of the weekend is the **Almond Queen Pageant** Feb 14th @ 6:00 PM at the Guinda Hall. Culminating in the crowning of our 2026 Almond Festival Queen and her court, who will greet visitors in each town.

The almond is not only a symbol of the Capay Valley—it is one of California's most valuable and recognizable crops. As the only place in North America where almonds are grown commercially, California's almond industry now exceeds \$2 billion, supported by more than 6,000 growers cultivating approximately 530,000 acres. The festival offers a special opportunity to celebrate these growers and the tight-knit community that supports them.

This year, the **Esparto Regional Chamber of Commerce** welcomes vendors and nonprofit organizations to participate in the festivities at **Esparto Community Park.** In a continued effort to spotlight community service groups, **Saturday**, **February 20**, **2026**, will be dedicated exclusively to **local nonprofits**, giving them a unique platform to share their missions and connect with visitors.

On **Sunday, February 21**, the celebration expands to welcome **artisans, crafters, food vendors, and local businesses & Music,** offering an excellent opportunity to showcase products and services to thousands of festival-goers. Vendor and nonprofit applications are being accepted now, with all submissions due or postmarked by **January 31, 2026.**



### Capay Valley Flora, Fauna and Farms Capay Valley Regeneration

### **American Kestrel**

The American Kestrel is the smallest falcon in North American and also native to the Capay Valley. Although they are a common falcon throughout North and South America their population has been in decline due to many factors including deforestation, land clearing for agriculture, pesticide use, nest site competition, expansion of urban areas and other changes in their environment. American Kestrels nest in tree cavities that have been excavated by Northern Flickers or other woodpeckers. Described as secondary cavity nesters, American Kestrels do not have the ability to carve out a nest in a tree so they rely on cavities made by others. Research has found that American Kestrels readily inhabit man made nesting boxes. These boxes mimic natural nesting cavities providing a secure place to rear their young thus helping their survival rates.

American Kestrel are small birds of prey weighing only 2.8 to 5..8 ounces. For their size they have strong talons and beaks which can easily dispatch their prey. They are intelligent birds with keen senses and the ability to fly with speed and agility. They prefer to hunt from tall perches where they can scan the ground for voles, lizards, insects and other small birds. With rapid wing beats the kestrel can hunt by hovering above the ground, often described as kiting, waiting for the perfect moment to capture their prey. Kestrels can see ultraviolet light which enables them to see vole urine trails as bright paths that help them to locate the prey.

American Kestrels are sexually dimorphic with the female having less variation in plumage color than the male. The female is typically slightly larger than the male. Often mating for life, the pair begin courtship in the cold months to secure a bond before breeding season. In early spring once the kestrels have chosen a nesting site the female will lay 3 to 6 eggs. Both the female and the male will incubate the eggs with the female doing most of the work. The eggs require constant brooding the first 10-14 days and after approximately 28 days the eggs begin to hatch. The babies fledge at 4 weeks but may continue to return to the nest for several more weeks. The adults will feed the fledglings for the first month but eventually they begin hunting on their own.

There are several ways to participate in American Kestrel conservation. Across the Capay Valley we can work to protect and restore riparian corridors, grasslands and meadows which are important hunting grounds for the kestrel. Planting hedgerows and native plants create biodiversity on farms. In residential gardens planting natives and native wildflowers attract insects that kestrels need to feed their young. The installation of nest boxes decreases nest site competition and will help with American Kestrel research. And finally we can volunteer and/or donate to American Kestrel conservation efforts.

### **Napa Cabbage with Peanut Dressing**

1/2 Napa Cabbage chopped1 carrot shredded1 Asian Pear peeled, cored and dicedSalt

\* Dressing

1/4 cup smooth peanut butter

1/4 cup soy sauce

1 clove garlic chopped

1 teaspoon peeled and chopped fresh ginger

Zest and juice of one lemon

2 tablespoons olive oil

2 or more tablespoons honey

Water

In salad bowl toss together Napa cabbage, carrot and Asian Pear. Salt lightly.

In a small bowl mix together salad dressing ingredients. Thin the dressing with a little water if it is too thick to pour. Add only enough dressing to thinly coat the salad. You will probably have some dressing left over. Serve

Mark your calendars for January 31, 2026! Guinda's first-ever annual Evacuation Drill invites everyone in the 95637 Zip code to join. This event is a chance for our community to enhance safety and teamwork in preparation for any natural disaster.

We're partnering with Yolo County OES, California OES, the Red Cross, and Yolo County Health & Human Services to help residents learn essential emergency response skills for wildfires, floods, earthquakes, and more.



### **Event Details**

Date: January 31, 2026 Time: 10:00 AM – 12:00 PM

### What to Expect:

10:00 AM: Residents of the 95673 Zip code registered with Yolo Alert will receive a drill message instructing them to report to the Grange Hall in Guinda immediately.

If you're not registered, set a reminder for 10:00 AM and evacuate to the Grange Hall as if it were a real emergency.



### What to Do

- 1. Grab your go-bag and drive safely to the Grange Hall.
- Follow CVERA traffic directors into the parking lot and remain in your vehicle.
- 3. CVERA members will ask you a couple of quick survey questions.
- 4. Pull forward to receive helpful Red Cross brochures about real-life evacuation shelters and emergency services.
- 5. And, you are done!

### Prescribed Grazing in the Capay Valley: Learn How!

(Capay Valley) – Wildfire threatens every community in the Capay Valley. How will you plan for this upcoming fire season? Perhaps after the rainy season comes to a close, you will pull out the lawnmower and weed whacker to manage dry fuels. However, there is an alternative – prescribed grazing using cattle, sheep, or goats!

Even if you have no experience with grazing, the Yolo County Fire Safe Council is here to help! We have funding from CAL FIRE to facilitate prescribed grazing projects for fuels management in the high fire areas of Yolo County. Prescribed grazing uses ruminants to consume fuels that propel wildfire (grasses and other groundcover) to lessen the amount of fuel available for wildfires. Well-managed grazing has other benefits for the land beyond fuels reduction, such as weed management, soil health, and reduced erosion.

The Yolo County Fire Safe Council, in partnership with grazing expert Sarah Keiser (Wild Oat Hollow) is hosting the Capay Valley Grazing Workshop: Managing Wildfire Fuel with Grazing Ruminants on January 24, 2026, from 12:30 PM to 4:30 PM. This hands-on grazing workshop is open to anyone in the Capay Valley and broader Yolo County interested in learning about prescribed grazing for fuels reduction, animal husbandry, and community grazing cooperatives. The workshop will be presented by Sarah Keiser and Roselle Busch, DVM with UC Davis and will feature information and hands-on opportunities on:

- basic animal stockmanship
- animal husbandry (hoof trimming, inoculation, breeding programs)
- feeding and care (small ruminant health, teeth and age, mineral needs, managing health and care)
- prescribed grazing overview and portable electric fencing
- · community grazing cooperatives

Join us on Saturday, January 24, 2026 from 12:30 PM to 4:30 PM; location in the Capay Valley TBD. This event has a cap of 25 people and there is <u>no cost</u> to attend. REGISTRATION IS REQUIRED!




