#### Esparto Middle School PBIS Team Unites to Build Positive School Culture

Esparto Middle School's PBIS (Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports) Tier 1 team is bringing together students, families, staff, and leadership in a unified effort to strengthen school culture and improve student well-being. The team has been meeting regularly to develop an action plan for the 2025–26 school year. Our team focuses on creating a safe, inclusive, and engaging learning environment where every student feels connected and valued.

The team has set two ambitious goals for the year, tied to results from the California Healthy Kids Survey (CHKS). By spring 2026, Esparto Middle aims to increase the percentage of students reporting meaningful participation at school from 27% to 34%. At the same time, the school is working to reduce harassment and bullying from 41% to 37%.

To achieve these goals, the PBIS Tier 1 team is focusing on collaboration and shared ownership. Students are providing input on activities that make school feel more engaging, while parents are partnering with staff to ensure that family voices are included in decision-making. Teachers and support staff are contributing strategies to strengthen classroom culture and reinforce positive behavior expectations. This work is not about a single program—it's about listening to our students and families, working together as a community, and building a school environment where every child feels safe and connected. Some of the action steps include increasing student-led activities, enhancing school-wide celebrations that recognize positive contributions, and providing additional opportunities for student and family voice in school decisions.

We are also sharing our work with other schools so that they can begin implementing similar strategies at their sites. It was an absolute honor for our school to be invited to the annual PBIS conference held in Sacramento on October 9th. Dr. Sherrie Vann and I took 4 parents and 5 students with us so that they could share their experiences and give advice to other schools on how they can involve students into the decision making process. It was heartwarming to see our students come out of their comfort zone and speak in front of over 100 people in the audience. We were all very proud! Our parent panel also did an excellent job of sharing why it is essential for schools to collect parent input and involve the parents in as many ways as possible.

#### You're Invited: Community-Led Prescribed Burn in Rumsey this November!

Are you interested in bringing good fire back to the Capay Valley? Join the Yolo Prescribed Burn Association (PBA) for a community-led prescribed burn in Rumsey this November! Prescribed burning is the controlled and planned application of "good fire" to manage vegetation (grasses, weeds) and promote a healthy ecosystem. The burn will include local partners; Yolo County Resource Conservation District (RCD), Capay Valley Fire Protection District, Capay Valley Emergency Response Auxiliary (CVERA), and CAL FIRE Brooks Station. This burn will increase prescribed fire capacity in Yolo County and will decrease flammable vegetation to expand the Rumsey Buffer Project, an area of reduced vegetation around the town of Rumsey that serves as a fuel break to stop or slow the spread of approaching wildfire.



This burn is a great training opportunity to participate in a safe and effective prescribed burn to help make the Capay Valley more resilient to wildfire. You can join us as a participant (helping to put live fire on the ground in a safe and methodical way), a holder (using hand tools and water to keep the fire where we want it), or as an observer. All are welcome regardless of experience level - no experience necessary!

All prescribed or controlled burns are dependent on a number of factors, especially weather. The Rumsey prescribed burn is planned for November 15-17th. Since formation in 2023, the Yolo PBA has hosted burns and training events in the Capay Valley, working closely with the Capay and Esparto Fire Protection Districts and CAL FIRE, including 8 acres in Rumsey in May 2025, a Firelighter Training in Esparto in 2024, and 27 acres in Esparto in 2023. The Yolo PBA offers expertise and planning assistance to help landowners use "good fire" for land management on their properties at no cost to you. #### Esparto Unified School District Honored with Statewide Golden Bell Award for Transformative Community Schools Work

The **Esparto Unified School District** (**EUSD**) has been recognized with the **2025 California School Boards Association** (**CSBA**) **Golden Bell Award** for its visionary **Community Schools initiative**, which is redefining what it means for a rural district to serve the "whole child" through collaboration, inclusion, and innovation.

The Golden Bell Award celebrates programs that exemplify educational excellence and equity in California public schools. Esparto Unified's Community Schools model stood out for its ability to **braid together academic, social, and emotional supports with strong community partnerships,** ensuring that every student—and family—has the tools they need to thrive.

"This award reflects the heart of Esparto—our shared commitment to the success and well-being of every child," said **Superintendent Dr. Christina Goennier.** "It's a testament to what's possible when schools, families, and community partners work side by side toward a common purpose."

Under the leadership of **Dr. Sherrie Vann, Director of Educational Community Schools,** the district has built a vibrant, community-driven approach to education. Esparto's Community Schools strategy began with a simple but powerful question: What do our students and families need to succeed?

#### Capay Valley Flora, Fauna and Farms Capay Valley Regeneration

#### California Wild Grapes

Growing along the riparian areas of the Capay Valley you will find our native grapevine (Vitis californica). This grapevine is of the same genus as the Eurasian (Vitis vinifera) grapevine that produces most of the world's table and wine grapes. The earliest historical record of wine making from grapes is approximately 6,000 to 5,800 B.C. in an area near Tbilisi, Georgia. Previously it was not believed that Native Americans made wine from grapes but recent archeological evidence in Texas suggests that Native Americans were using grapes to produce a wine like drink before the arrival of Europeans.

There are at least 81 recognized species of Vitis worldwide with most of them native to the Northern Hemisphere and most of these are native to North America or Asia. Vitis californica is native to California and Oregon. It is a deciduous vine that spreads along the ground and can grow to 30 feet tall by twisting around and growing on other shrubs and trees. It prefers to grow in part shade along waterways but once established it can take considerable drought. The spring flowers are followed by small bunches of edible purple grapes in late summer. The fruit is rather sour but can be made into wine and jam. The leaves are dark green and turn yellow or orange in September giving nice fall color to the woodlands along the creeks of the Capay Valley. The plant is an important part of riparian habitat and supplies food and cover for birds, bees, butterflies, insects, rodents, skunks and other mammals.

Vitis californica is often used for riparian restoration because cuttings root easily and the plant will quickly cover land damaged by agriculture or overgrazing by domesticated animals. As a pioneer plant the grapevine helps the succession of plants that will grow as the land heals. The deep and wide spreading roots will form a symbiotic relationship with mycorrhizal fungi that will enhance nutrient uptake for the plant. The root system will start to filter water from agriculture runoff and begin to stabilize the banks along a waterway. As the vine spreads it creates a network of growth that will slow water flow during seasonal storms. The foliage will begin to provide cover for wildlife and an environment where the progression of larger plants, such as shrubs and oaks, can take hold thus creating a healthy riparian zone. California Wild Grape shows how even one native plant can play a very important role in restoring an ecosystem.



#### **Seasonal Recipes**

Using ingredients sourced from the Capay Valley From the kitchen of Pamela Bateman

#### **Acorn Squash Appetizer**

- 2 Acorn Squash
- 1 Onion chopped
- 1 Sweet Pepper chopped
- 2 Garlic cloves chopped
- 3 tablespoons Olive Oil
- 2 teaspoons Paprika

Salt to taste

1/8 teaspoon Chipotle Powder (optional) 8-10 oz of Goat Cheese or Cream Cheese

Chips




Cut Acorn Squash in half, scoop out seeds and steam or bake until flesh is soft. Remove skin and mash the squash with a fork until smooth.

In a skillet over medium heat sauté onion, sweet pepper and garlic in olive oil until slightly caramelized and soft. Add the cooked squash, the paprika, salt and Chipotle powder. Add more olive oil and some water if mixture seems dry. Remove from heat and cool slightly. Place the cheese on a platter and top with the Acorn Squash mixture. Serve with chips.

Note: The spices in this recipe can be adjusted to your taste. The addition of powdered cumin or green salsa would make a nice variation.
