Sweet Success: EHS Culinary Shines at Statehood 175

This year marks an important milestone in our state's history- 175 years of statehood! On September 9th, 1850 California was ratified as the 31st state in the union. To commemorate this anniversary, the city of Sacramento in conjunction with California State Parks, threw a massive block party celebration in Sacramento on Thursday, September 9th, 2025. Esparto High School's culinary department was invited to bake and serve the birthday cake for this event. Seven of our 2nd and 3rd year culinary students, led by our amazing instructor, Chef Katlyn Beggs, baked twelve sheet cakes in three gourmet flavors.

The team prepared pistachio cake with mascarpone cream and macerated strawberries, fresh fig cake with almond and olive oil, and Plumtastic CA grown prune cake with elephant heart plum icing. The three cake recipes were provided by California Grown, the lead sponsor of the celebration. Our Spartan culinary team served well over 1500 slices of cake in under two hours- a major feat for the team of seven students. In addition to the sheet cakes, Chef Beggs also prepared a 3D cake model of California. The baked sculpture served as a center



Wildfire Prevention Projects in the Capay Valley

(Capay Valley, CA) – In early 2023, the Yolo County RCD completed a wildfire planning document called the Yolo County Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP), which was approved and signed by the CAL FIRE Lake-Napa-Sonoma Unit, the Yolo County Fire Chiefs Association, the Yolo County Board of Supervisors, and the Yolo County Fire Safe Council. A CWPP is a local plan developed with input from the community, local agencies, and fire professionals to reduce wildfire risk in and around the high fire hazard areas. The result of a CWPP is a list of projects that mitigate and reduce the risk of wildfire.

Since April 2023, Yolo County RCD has been planning and implementing wildfire risk reduction projects in the Capay Valley thanks to funding from retired Senator Bill Dodd, who granted \$1.5 million dollars to Yolo County after the LNU Lightning Complex Fire in 2020. After completing permitting, the RCD and the Yolo County Fire Safe Council has implemented a number of projects to protect evacuation routes and create buffers of reduced vegetation to protect the Capay Valley from catastrophic wildfire. These projects include:

- Rumsey Ditch Shaded Fuel Break The overgrown Rumsey Ditch posed a
 fire hazard to neighbors on Rumsey Canyon Road. By trimming back
 vegetation and eliminating ladder fuels, this project improves access and
 evacuation. Completed in November 2024
- County Road 41A Shaded Fuel Break To ensure access and improve evacuation, trees, shrubs, and understory plants were trimmed back or removed along County Road 41 and 41A in Rumsey, CA. These overgrown roads often impeded first responders from easily accessing properties in emergencies. Completed in January 2025
- Rumsey Buffer Projects: in partnership with local fire protection, several small prescribed burned fuel breaks were completed on private properties around Rumsey. Completed in June 2025.
- Tree Grove Thinning along Highway 16 to improve the evacuation route along Hwy 16 south of Guinda. Currently underway expected completion-October 2025.
- Highway 16 Shaded Fuel Break To ensure access and protect evacuation, trees, shrubs, and understory plants were trimmed back or removed along Hwy 16 from the snow gate to Camp Haswell. Completed in July 2025.
- Highway Fire Awareness Signs a large metal sign will be posted along Highway 16 to alert visiting cars they are entering a high fire hazard area.
 Smaller signs will be stationed along commonly used pullouts along the highway that highlight potential common fire ignition sources.

- Knox Boxes for emergency response access These emergency lock boxes provide rapid access for the fire officials without needing to cut fences or damage gates. Keys are held by the fire protection districts of Capay Valley, Esparto, Madison and Winters.
- Neighborhood Chipper Days The RCD and a crew from the Yolo County Flood Control and Water Conservation District have hosted a number of free chipping days for landowners in the high fire areas of Yolo County. The Chipper Program chips materials from your defensible space work so you don't have to burn it. This program is ongoing and residents can request a Chipper Day at https://tinyurl.com/ycfscchipper
- Reflective Address Sign Program Neighbors in the Capay Valley
 can request a free address sign from the Yolo County Fire Safe
 Council to help first responders find your property in an emergency.

This fall, the potential for wildfire to occur will continue until late November through December due to abundant cured grasses and highly flammable shrubs in the Capay Valley. While we're all hoping for much cooler weather, the League of Women Voters of Yolo County is going to be heating up in the fall.

We begin September with advocacy for our recently released County Mental Health Position which can be found at http://bit.ly/4mezi3C.

Our League spent two years studying the Mental Health needs of residents in our county. Our members understand that mental health is a critical component of public well-being, yet too often, individuals and families struggle to find timely, affordable care. Our residents can all advocate for a stronger system.

In Yolo County, we face real challenges: growing demand for services, a shortage of providers, and the stigma that still surrounds mental illness. Competing county funding demands and changes to State financing of county prevention services will likely decrease prevention program access for some. At the same time, we are fortunate to have dedicated local organizations, health departments, and peer-led programs that offer essential support and care.

The LWVYC 's Position calls for sustained investment in mental health services, improved coordination between agencies, and equitable resource access across all communities in our county. Our advocacy is both timely and necessary. Supporting this vision means strengthening partnerships among schools, health providers, law enforcement, and community organizations who can raise resource awareness and help promote current programs and services to those in need.

We urge our leaders and fellow residents to support this work through awareness efforts, and by lifting up the voices of those directly impacted. Together, we can build a healthier, more compassionate Yolo County.

LWVYC is a strong advocate for the prevention and support services offered by county resources like YOLO NAMI. As part of our commitment to mental health, our county League will be participating in "NAMIWalks!" this September, to raise funds to support top-rated mental health programs and services, far-reaching guidance, and valuable education for our entire community.

The National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) promotes critical awareness of mental illness and promotes the well-being of every person. The League team is raising dollars and awareness and we hope to see many more community members there. Learn more at https://www.namiwalks.org/yolocounty

Seasonal Recipes

Using ingredients sourced from the Capay Valley From the kitchen of Pamela Bateman



Apple Chutney

2 tablespoons butter 1/4 cup brown sugar 1 medium onion chopped 3/4 cup water

4 apples chopped 1/4 cup apple cider vinegar

1 Asian pear chopped Pinch of salt

1 tablespoon fresh ginger chopped 1/4 teaspoon of ground cinnamon

1/2 cup raisins

In a saucepan over medium heat begin cooking the butter, onion, apples, pear, ginger, raisins, brown sugar and water. Keep cooking and stirring the mixture until the fruit starts to soften. Add more water if necessary. As the mixture begins to soften add the apple cider vinegar, the salt and the cinnamon. Cook until most of the liquid has reduced to a syrup. Remove from heat. Gently mash the fruit leaving some large pieces. Cool. Serve at room temperature and refrigerate any leftovers.

This recipe can be adapted to your taste by adding more or less vinegar and brown sugar. This chutney is delicious served with grilled sausages or other grilled meat.

Capay Valley Flora, Fauna and Farms Capay Valley Regeneration

Farm Folklore- Fairy Eggs

Approximately eight thousand years ago in Southeast Asia the Red Jungle Fowl, the genetic ancestor to our modern chicken, was domesticated. It is estimated that today there are over 34 billion chickens worldwide which makes them the most abundant bird on earth. Through selective breeding we have manipulated the size of chickens and number of eggs they lay annually. Hardy and adaptable chickens have become the animal of choice for most farmers. Living in such close proximity to these birds makes it inevitable that much folklore has developed around chickens.

Every chicken farmer knows that sometimes when collecting eggs something unusual and seemingly magical happens. Hidden in a chicken's nest along with the other eggs will be a tiny egg or what is sometimes called a Fairy Egg. Much smaller than the other eggs this diminutive egg must be the result of something otherworldly according to folklore and fairy tales. No wild bird has laid this egg because it looks much like the other normal sized chicken eggs. Perhaps a fairy secretly put this egg in the nest!

Other cultural beliefs or superstitions attempt to explain this phenomenon. Historically the tiny egg was sometimes called a Wind Egg because it was fertilized by the wind. Many ancient cultures believed the wind gave 'a breath of life' and could therefore, in the absence of a rooster, cause a chicken to lay an egg. Others thought perhaps these tiny eggs were laid by roosters. Whatever its origins it is often taken as a sign of good luck. The egg was believed to ward off evil spirits and was saved as a talisman for that purpose. Yet in some other cultures this tiny egg was thought to be a bad omen. Some believed the tiny egg would hatch into a mythical creature like a serpent with a rooster's head. These tales are of course an example of how humans create stories to explain phenomena they don't understand.

Science readily provides an answer to this curious occurrence. Young hens will occasionally produce very small eggs as a normal part of their cycle. A chicken's reproductive system sometimes creates a small piece of tissue which causes the hen's body to enclose the tissue in a tiny shell. These eggs typically do not have a yolk and it is not an indication of an unhealthy bird. As the chicken matures she will start laying normal sized eggs. If a chicken continues to lay tiny, unusual shaped or soft shelled eggs the farmer would be wise to consider the health of the chicken. Possible causes for egg anomalies could be stress, poor nutrition, or an unhealthy environment. But the occasional discovery of a Fairy Egg in the chicken coop shouldn't be a cause for worry to the farmer and may even bring good luck!
