Hello, my name is Western Yolo Grange!

In Guinda, behind the Corner Store is an old building that time forgot, and most Capay Valley residents only think about once a year when enjoying the Almond Festival. But the Grange Hall is more than pony rides, petting zoo, and Granny Wyatt's Almond Roca. The Western Yolo Grange Hall provides vital services to our rural community, and is a labor of love for a small group of local residents.

Built in 1909, the Western Yolo Grange #423 is the original home of the Almond Festival. Long before the festival moved to Esparto, The Grange was the hub for a vibrant community of small farmers who grew wheat, almonds and fresh fruit. The Almond Queen pageant, which occurs the weekend prior to the Festival, has always been hosted by the Grange. Guinda was once a thriving town that went through a boom period in the early 1900's. The residents decided to start a spring festival to celebrate the almond tree's beautiful bloom, which transformed the Upper Capay Valley into a pink and white fairyland. The railroad (yes, there was a railroad that ran down the Capay Valley) could bring fresh fruit (in the days before refrigeration) to the SF Bay Area in less than a day, making our area very profitable to farm. During the 1900's, there were almost 5,000 people living in Guinda and nearby. We had several grocery stores, a school, a bank, a hotel, an ice cream parlor, a barber shop, a meat market, and even a small jail!

Our Grange was part of a national network of Grange Halls that gave rural communities a way to organize, find markets for their produce, and have fun! Dances, such as contra dances (sort of like a line dance but with a fiddle and a caller) and harvest festivals were common in the days before TV and the internet. Old newspapers also show that the Grange Hall had many groups that met, anywhere from quilting groups to fire department meetings. The Grange Hall hosted the Multicultural Festival which was a celebration of African American culture in the Capay Valley for about a decade until the organizers passed away, and some of our members were instrumental in starting the Yolo County Historical Society.

In the last 5 years the Grange Hall has undergone a series of renovations that has allowed us to continue serving the Capay Valley. We rebuilt the foundation which was sagging after years of continuous use. During the Great Depression, people even used to play basketball in the hall! We also upgraded the kitchen and installed a brand new up to code septic system.

Both outings were a big success, giving Valley Seniors a chance to connect, create new memories, and enjoy the simple joys of shared experiences.



The Grange's primary purpose these days is to host public meetings and be an evacuation center. We host meetings such as for the Yolo County Flood Control District, the Sherriff's Department and the County Supervisor. We are an evacuation center and cooling center in case of natural disasters. We host a public food distribution from the Yolo County Food Bank twice a month on Mondays. The Hall is available to rent for all types of events, including weddings, concerts, plays, quinceaneras, dances, and fundraisers. We offer our hall free of charge for Celebration of Life/Funerals for our community members. In addition to the Almond Festival and the Almond Queen pageant, we have an annual theater production put on by the Capay Valley Players. We also host the 4-H Spaghetti Dinner, a Halloween Carnival and a Children's Christmas play that has been in continuous existence since 1911. Our commercial kitchen is available for rent, which empowers food vendors to legally sell their products to the public in a very affordable way. We currently also provide commissary services to El Vaquero Food Truck.

Wildlife Friendly Fences

All of us claim to love wildlife but how many of us are willing to accommodate wildlife when building fences? How would we feel if we knew many of our barbed wire fences have the potential to maim or kill wildlife? A quick search on the internet will show deer, owls, rabbits and other wildlife horribly caught and entangled in barbed wire like flies in a spider web. Fencing may also cut off wildlife corridors that lead to the only available seasonal water or food. However, small changes in fence design can go a long way toward working with wildlife rather than against it.

Understanding how and why wildlife moves across the landscape is the key to building wildlife friendly fences. Almost all animals move through their environment in search of food, water and shelter. Additionally in order to maintain genetic diversity they must have access to other populations of their own species to prevent inbreeding. Conservation biology describes the "50/500" rule as needing 50 individuals to avoid inbreeding and 500 individuals are needed for

long term genetic variability. Specifically in the Capay Valley many of the mammals like badgers, bobcats, coyotes, deer, and mountain lions, need room to roam from Cache Creek to the eastern and western hills and beyond. Roads are known to be extremely destructive to these necessary wildlife corridors but fences can hinder this movement too. During our hot summers animals need to move from sources of water like Cache Creek to areas where prey and forage can be found. By assisting this movement there will be less pressure on wildlife to graze in our agriculture fields and help to avoid the loss of domestic animals on our farms.


Wildlife will typically follow existing edges of woodlands or riparian ribbons which are areas of flowing or seasonal creeks. Familiarize yourself with the topography that surrounds your land. Consider leaving these areas unfenced so that wildlife can continue to move across the landscape. We can help wildlife thrive by taking fence design into consideration. Seasonal Recipes

Using ingredients sourced from the Capay Valley From the kitchen of Pamela Bateman

Scrambled Eggs with Mushrooms and Tarragon

8 Eggs- free range

1/3 cup Milk

4 Tablespoons Butter

1/3 cup Red Onion diced

4 or 5 Mushrooms sliced

3-4 Tarragon sprigs- leaves removed from stem and chopped *

1/2 cup Pecorino or Parmesan Cheese grated

In a medium bowl beat the eggs with the milk and set aside. In a large skillet over medium heat melt 3 tablespoons butter and add the onion and mushrooms. Sauté until soft. Remove the vegetables from the pan and set aside. Melt the other tablespoon of butter in the skillet and cook the egg mixture, stirring, until the eggs are soft but not dry. Turn off the heat. Add the mushroom mixture and mix into the scrambled eggs. Serve immediately with a sprinkle of chopped tarragon leaves and topped with Pecorino cheese. Delicious with buttered toast or a croissant.

Serves 2 to 4

*Note:

Tarragon is an easy to grow herb that takes little care. The combination of eggs, mushrooms and fresh tarragon is a classic and delicious dish perfect for breakfast or a light dinner.



Fire Resilience Programs 101 Workshop

(October 1, 2025) – Are you worried about wildfire impacting your home or property? The Yolo County Resource Conservation District (RCD) and the Yolo County Fire Safe Council are hosting a Fire Resilience Program 101 to bring together residents with organizations offering wildfire preparedness assistance and funding opportunities for fuels management. The Program 101 will feature short presentations about free technical assistance and funding opportunities to support wildfire preparedness and prevention in the high fire areas of western Yolo County.

Programs and speakers featured will be the California Department of Insurance, Yolo County Office of Emergency Services, Yolo Prescribed Burn Association, Yolo County Fire Safe Council, and Yolo County Resource Conservation District.

Residents interested in wildfire preparedness and prevention from Yolo County are invited to join this free, informational workshop on Wednesday, October 1, 2025, which starts at 5:00 pm with free refreshments and food. Residents that live in the high fire areas of Yolo County, like in communities in West Winters and throughout the Capay Valley, are encouraged to attend to learn how to prepare your home and property for wildfire. At 5:30 PM, seven-minute presentations will begin and continue until approximately 6:30 pm. At 6:30 pm, there will be a Q & A session and the option for one-on-ones between agency representatives and residents. Join the Fire Resilience Program 101 to learn about funding opportunities, technical assistance support, wildfire preparedness, and meet/ask questions of your local agency representatives on Wednesday, October 1, 2025 at the Capay Valley Community Hall (17340 Yolo Ave, Esparto, CA 95627). Programs featured are optional, non-regulatory, and are meant to support properties in the high fire areas of Yolo County with financial or technical assistance for fuels management and wildfire preparedness.

2025 SWIM SEASON WRAP UP AT TULI MEM PARK

The 2025 swim season at Tuli Mem Park Aquatics Center is coming to an end September 1 and WYORCA would like to thank the community, our local lifeguards, the County, Esparto Community Services District, and especially members of the newly formed Friends of Tuli Mem (see list below) for their support through another challenging summer.

As anyone who has attended the pool this summer has noticed, the wading pool was out of commission nearly the entire season. This was disappointing to everyone, especially to those families with small children that would have enjoyed spending hot summer days at the pool in the safer shallow water. As many people have asked about it, WYORCA would like to take this opportunity to explain the events that led to this unfortunate situation.

In July 2024 the wading pool was shut down when the automatic chemical controller failed. Attempts to control the chemistry (pH and free chlorine) manually were not effective due to the shallow level and smaller volume of water for that pool's system; therefore County Environmental Health determined the pool needed to be shut down. Despite the closure, water was kept in the pool initially, necessitating manual dosing of chemicals which led to an over acidity condition that was damaging the brass pump impellers. At that point, the County decided to drain the pool and prepare for the replastering work that was scheduled for the upcoming off season.

Replastering of a pool is a normal maintenance activity which is more frequent for commercial pools than a residential pool due to the stronger chemical concentrations required. In our case, replastering will be needed every 10 years for the lap pool, and every 5 years for the wading pool because it is shallower (more sunlight/UV damage). This is a significant cost (about \$100,000 for the lap pool and \$30,000 for the wading pool) that was not anticipated at the inception of the pool, and something that the County (General Services) will be budgeting for going forward.

At the end of the 2024 season, the County had set aside funds for replastering the wading pool; but those funds had to be redirected to pay for pool management costs that were higher than expected for that summer. The County was not able to secure the needed funding during the winter months; so in the spring of 2025 WYORCA decided to advance funds from the endowment to facilitate completion of the replastering work before the 2025 season started.

In June the replastering contractor was secured, but work was held up as County Environmental Health determined the tile lip at the pool entry was out of specification and needed to be reworked - which required a change order to the contract. The personnel involved in processing the change order at the County were redirected to matters related to the explosions in early July which further delayed the work.

Replastering of the wading pool was finally completed on July 29 but required a minimum two weeks for conditioning of the water before being approved for swimming. WYORCA would like to thank everyone for their patience during this situation and we look forward to a much improved season in 2026!


Our Progress: Real Gains for Esparto
