#### **Dental Health**

California's Epidemic

The December 1998 Healthy Start survey of our community (Madison, Esparto, and Capay Valley) showed that:

- Sixty-four percent of the Latino parents indicated that the most important health service needed was dental care. It ranked number one as the top concern. While the Caucasian /Other ranked dental services at seventh as their concerns.
- With the Students that responded to the same questions, on a similar survey the Latino's ranked dental services at sixth, the Caucasian/Other ranked dental care at 26%.


In response to these needs Healthy Start leased the existing dental building located on Fremont Street in Esparto to meet those needs.

The Office will be open two days a week, beginning September 1, 1999. One day a Dentist will be available and one day a Hygienist will be available. Services that will be offered are full facility services that will consist of restorative surgery, preventative diagnoses and gum treatments. CommuniCare Health Centers will run the dental program for eligible clients. Our hopes are that sometime in the future we will have a full time dentist to serve our whole community. The CommuniCare Health centers have also agreed to provide dental health education in our schools.

Stop just a moment, think about the third world countries and see a child smiling at you. Teeth broken black with decay. You think that it only happens in those far away places? Well the facts are that in California the dental heath of our children is in serious need of attention. In 1993 -94 a report from the Dental Health Foundation called "The Oral Health of California's Children: A Neglected Epidemic" showed that in California...

 31.2 % of all pre-school children and 73% of all children 6 - 8 years old had experienced tooth decay.

The State of California funds the SB 620 Healthy Start Support Services of Children Act Grant. Esparto School District K-8 was one of the fortunate grant

Esparto School District K-8 was one of the fortunate grant applications to be funded, along with 80 other operational grants in California this year.

These funds are not from the districts general budget and can not be used for anything except the categories that were approved by the state in the proposal. It is additional funds \$400,000 awarded to our community to provide support and services to all our families, so children can come to school ready to learn. 

Summer Youth Program By: Cathie Wicks

The Federal Jobs Program sponsored by the Job Training and Partnership Act (JTPA) has once again funded jobs for Esparto and Capay Valley youth who qualify. Over twenty local youth are working through the program, which is sponsored here in Esparto by RISE, Inc. Youth must work in public agencies and meet other Federal mandates to qualify, once working, they actively contribute to the workplace just like any other temporary employee!

The Jobs Program has offered summer jobs for years actually since the late 1960's. The money has come every year through several funding streams -MDTA, CETA, and now JTPA. Yolo County applies for funds through the community Partnership Agency, which has offices in Woodland, West Sacramento, and Davis. Esparto and Winters serve community youth through the RISE office, which is more accessible. It ensures that local youth, parents, and employers can work with a local entity for

Some of the activities included were swimming and a variety of other sports, which may have included basketball, football, tennis, track and field, volleyball, softball, badminton, dance/aerobics, gymnastics and wrestling. Topquality sports equipment was provided through the program to ensure safety for the kids. The educational components of the program taught science and math with an emphasis on alcohol and drug awareness.

Malabatanobanad Kacey Kaake along with others said they really enjoyed the program because of the "Swimming and meeting new people from other schools." There was much laughter and joy while they were loading on the bus even at 7:00am on a summer's day, while most of Esparto's children were still sleeping. This was a community partnership with the NYSP program, UC Davis and community participating volunteers.

services. It also provides a connected link between the career and job readiness class RISE teaches at the High school and real work.


This youth year, employees are working at the two child care centers ( Madison and Esparto), at the Esparto School District (in maintenance help and office work), assisting with the National Youth Sports Program, the Esparto Summer School as teachers' aids, and working on the UC Davis campus. Some workers are blended with hired youth from Winters, and work in the Fire departments, at Solano Park, and at the City of Winters. Training individual plans, development plans, and workshops are held as part of the program; these activities are directed on developing work ethics and clear skills training objectives for each individual youth. RISE processes the government paperwork, relieving employers of those responsibilities so they can use their time to work directly with the youth workers.

This program works because of the combined efforts of community- minded employers and supervisors, motivated youth workers, and strong staff support. Youth earn summer income while


learning lifelong employment skills and employers get help for often tedious summer tasks. Over \$27,000 will be earned by Esparto students this summer through RISE's Summer Employment Program.

RISE usually teaches a second semester Career and Job Readiness Class at the High School. It will be back next year, as funding was restored and new scheduling plans will once again accommodate its implementation. Tell your students to watch for this opportunity!



As the first day of school approaches, several construction projects are underway in the Esparto Unified School District. # Low Cost, High Quality Health, Dental & Vision Care Insurance

Your Kids May Be Eligible For Low Cost, High Quality Health, Dental & Vision Care Insurance Through The Healthy Families Program

This is GREAT news for families and parents who cannot afford health coverage for their children!!! A new program is coming that can provide assistance with health benefits. President Clinton proposed and Congress passed legislation to cover children under the age 19 who have no health insurance. The California Legislature did their part to enact the emphasis of the National push for health coverage by approving the Healthy Families Program. This Program helps parents without health insurance to purchase low cost insurance for their children. Here in the Esparto area, the Western Yolo Collaborative is

working hard to find a way to provide local accessibility to the program.

This Program could work for you! It is for families whose income levels exceed the limit for Medi-Cal, who do not have employer-provided medical benefits; but cannot afford to pay for private health insurance. Premium range from \$7 to \$27 per month with even more discounts for certain plans (depending on the number enrolled and family income).

Statewide training is starting to prepare staff to assist and enroll families. Western Yolo Collaborative, the new Healthy Start Program Planning Committee, and Yolo County Public Health are all committed to making sure our communities in rural Western Yolo County are not left out. Stay tuned for more information, as it becomes available.



Mental, health and yes even dental problems can have a deep and lasting impact on our children.

Healthy Start is working hard to get these issues to the forefront of this community. In petitioning every effort that can be made for these children to feel good about themselves and except themselves as a vital part of this community is worth the effort of the Healthy Start program. Healthy Start is a grant that will help in providing the children of this community the opportunity to succeed and become the vital community member that he or she can be.

Healthy Start will receive \$400,000. Over the next three years that will be used to promote a program, after-school programs, parenting classes, child care center and counseling programs for the children in our neighborhoods. Although Healthy Start isn't and can't be the answer to every problem in this area it can be a starting point.

A lot of people don't understand what Healthy Start can offer the community. So to touch on a few of the "Steps to the Future" for those who need more information about the program.

- These monies are not any part of the schools general funds. They are a grant that the Western Yolo Collaborative for Healthy Children and Families and the Esparto unified school district had applied for. The reason they applied for the Healthy Start grant was that when a survey to assess the needs of this community was done, indicated from the community that there was a diversity of needs. Further information from the needs assessments survey indicated that Healthy Start programs could meet the needs. This was the direct result of the need assessments done in the Dec. 1998 survey. We would like to thank all of you that participated in filling out and returning the survey forms. Healthy Start had the largest survey return response in the history of the valley: 450 community/parents, 361 6-12 grade students, and 55 EUSD
- The program is a support to the school. The Healthy Start program will help to fill in the gaps. Healthy Start is a "Step to the Future" that can help guide the way to needed resources.


Esparto Citizen Advisory By: Tammy Fullerton

- ♦ 55% of 6 8 years olds and 48% of 15 year - olds had active decay present.
- 44.3% of pre-schooler's had never seen a dentist. The figure for the Kindergarten through third grade was 21.3% and for high school, 12%.

Although these problems which are represented by these figures are looked at as minor or mere inconveniences they do represent our children's need for dental care. Meanwhile a report on the nationwide impact on children indicates:

- Dental health problems cause children to miss 52 millionschool hours each year.
- Children can suffer eating, digestive, learning and speech problems caused by excessive tooth decay, pain infection.
- Embarrassment and diminished self-esteem are less visible consequences of poor oral health but can have a powerful effect on children as they grow up.

The causes of "California's Epidemic" are a diversity of reasons. Sometimes parents don't know how to teach their children how to clean their teeth, they fail

to model good dental habits or different cultural standards and exceptions occur. Often problem is the lack of access to Dental care. Some families do not have dental insurance coverage, others who qualify for public assistance have difficulty finding dentist who accept Medicaid/Medi-Cal patients and still others in rural areas may be hindered by the lack of dentists in general. Although there are a long list of reasons to look at to justify having new programs in our community, Healthy Start has based it's programs on the results of the community survey taken December 1998.
