EHS Students Raise API Score by 97 Points

Last year's students proved their excellence last spring by increasing the EHS Academic Performance Index (API) score by a whooping 97 points.

EHS increased from 572 to 669, placing it ahead of Winters and Woodland high schools. The only school in the county to place higher was Davis High School.

The API is a score based on student performance on standardized tests; the CST (California Standards Test), CAT6 (California Achievement Test), and CAHSEE (California High School Exit Exam).

Principal Stan Dodd believes there is more than one factor that contributed to this increase. He said the kids are better prepared, more serious, and the teachers are doing their jobs well.

When the kids take the test this year, Dodd hopes scores will go up again, but doesn't expect a bi

When the kids take the test this year, Dodd hopes scores will go up again, but doesn't expect a big increase again.


Science teacher Pat Collins has a different opinion. He thinks the change is due to the students being more acquainted to the exam, and the environment being better. Collins also believes teachers are teaching more of the test subjects.


When the students take the test this year, Collins thinks the scores will level out. This spring freshmen, sophomores, and juniors are going to take the exam again.

The Esparto Citizen Advisory Committee would like to involve community members in process of



Access to Quality Health Care Initiative Passed by Yolo County Children & Families Commission

Commission adopts "first in the state" regional health care insurance approach for children ages 0-18

WOODLAND - As part of its strategic plan to ensure children and families in Yolo County can access quality health care services, the Yolo County Children & Families Commission voted last evening to pursue a plan that would provide health care coverage to children ages 0-18 from 0 to 300% of the poverty level.

Developing and implementing a plan to cover all children up to 300% of poverty level requires the Commission's commitment to long-term funding in the amount of \$500,000 per year for access to quality health care for all children in Yolo County. The Commission funding can only be used to cover costs for children 0 to 5. Other partners will be sought to cover the costs for children 6 to 18. "This vote demonstrates this Commission's commitment to providing access to quality health care to the children in Yolo County," said Commission Chair and County Supervisor Helen Thomson. "We are ensuring that children not eligible for other health plans will be covered under this initiative and not left

In addition to approving implementation of the Access to Quality Health Care Initiative, the Commission also voted in favor of participating in regional and local planning efforts through the Sacramento Sierra Valley Children's Health Coverage Regional Charter and to apply to the Packard Foundation for a regional Technical Assistance grant to support those efforts. Yolo County will be joining El Dorado, Yuba, Colusa, Sacramento, and Sutter counties in planning a regional approach to health care coverage. If successful, this will be the first regional health plan for children in the state.

"It makes great sense to bring our resources together to provide the best health care coverage in our region. This will be a model for the rest of the state," said Assembly Member Lois Wolk, who served as Chair when the Commission prioritized access to quality health care in its 2002 strategic plan. Since July 2003, a task force – a group of health providers and plans operating in Yolo County – has provided input to the Commission on a number of issues including the barriers to access, gaps in the system, issues and concerns around mental health care and possible strategies for improvement. The

Commission also held public forums where policy leaders and commission officials from other counties discussed their respective programs and provided Commissioners and staff with key recommendations.

About The Yolo County Children and Families Commission In November 1998, California voters passed a statewide ballot initiative to add a 50 cent-perpack tax on cigarettes. The funds collected are utilized to fund education, health and child care programs that promote early childhood development from prenatal to age 5.





RICE STRAW ROLLER AVAILABLE THROUGH YOLO COUNTY RESOURCE CONSERVATION DISTRICT (RCD)

Rice straw rollers are a farm implement used to help break down rice straw after harvest. There are a number of approaches to getting rid of the large amounts of straw left after a rice harvest, but this method is one of the best for also providing habitat for migrating waterfowl and shorebirds. The advantage to this method is that, besides putting the straw in contact with the soil so that breakdown can begin, it leaves the grain that typically spills out of a harvester on the soil surface for waterfowl to feed on during the winter. The Yolo County Resource Conservation District (RCD) has a rice straw roller available for the low rental rate of \$3.00/ acre. This low rental rate is designed to encourage a field management practice that also benefits local and regional wildlife. The hollow cage roller is designed to be pulled through a shallowly flooded (approx. 4 inches) harvested rice field to mix the straw with the mud and begin the decomposition process. The best straw decomposition occurs if rolling is done right after harvest. This takes advantage of the warmer temperatures in the early fall, and water for re-flooding is also more easily available.

If you have questions about how to use a rice straw roller or the field conditions it creates, call the RCD and ask for John or Jeanette. Rental of the roller is arranged on a first-come, first-served basis, but it can be reserved ahead of time if you have an estimate for when you will need it. The RCD phone number is 662-2037. 





From the Desk of Superintendent Tom Michaelson:

COMMUNITY MEETING ON NEW CAPAY PARK



A second community meeting will be held on **Monday December 1, 7:00-9:00**PM, in the community room at the Esparto Regional Library to present and discuss the proposed <u>Draft Master Plan</u> for a new open space park on Cache Creek. As part of Granite Construction's mining permit amendment approved by the Yolo County Board of Supervisors in December 2002, a 42-acre parcel along the north bank of Cache Creek, east of County Road 85 will soon be dedicated to Yolo County for public use. The park will provide access to Cache Creek, and there are opportunities to create trails, picnic areas, environmental education sites and other amenities at the park.

A survey was distributed to local residents and groups, and a public workshop was held in October to get input from area residents about what types of activities

and facilities should be included. The survey is still available on Yolo County's website, www.yolocounty.org, as well as County offices and other community facilities, or by contacting Jeff Peters at 510-236-6114 x 206 or by email at jpeters@questaec.com.

Input received as part of the community meeting and other outreach efforts has been incorporated into the Draft Master Plan, which features trails, an education pavilion, picnic tables, interpretive displays, parking area, restroom and extensive areas of planting with native species including grassy meadow, riparian grove and oak savanna.

Copies of the Draft Master Plan will be available for review at the Esparto Library reference desk and the counter of Yolo County Planning and Public Works Department, 292 West Beamer Street, Woodland. The Draft Master Plan will also be posted on the County's website.

Questa Engineering Corp. is coordinating the design effort, under the direction of the Yolo County Parks and Resources Management Division of the Planning and Public Works Department to design this open space park. This effort is being led by Jeff Peters, and landscape architect Margaret Henderson. Linda Fiack (530-666-8019) is the County Parks and Resources Manager. Capay Valley Vision is co-hosting the community meeting with Yolo County.

Off the football field, Josh Lopez is laid back, nonchalant. "Lopes," goes to classes equipped with the bare essentials and occasionally catches up on some shut-eye. But on the gridiron he's a predator prowling his prey. When those Friday night-lights shine down on a 100-yard battleground, he simply becomes an animal! Playing middle linebacker for the varsity Spartans, standing at 5 feet 9 and 180 lbs., Lopez packs a big punch, and he packs it often.

He's had 68 tackles through Oct. 10, which ranks second in the Mid-Valley League (The leader has 69 tackles). He is an opposing ball carrier's worst nightmare.

"Lopez with the tackle," is a repeated term used by announcers during EHS football games.

When asked if he remembered the last time he missed a tackle, Lopez replied, "I don't miss, baby. The only time I miss a tackle is when someone else beats me to it."

Varsity head coach Matt Wahl is impressed with Lopez's ability and pleased with his work ethic and leadership. "He is the heart and soul of our team. He is the hardest worker out there," Wahl said of his senior captain.


On the other side of the ball, Lopez is the Spartan's hardnosed fullback. He has had 109 carries for 674 yards, which is the second most rushing yards the M.V.L. "The Punisher," is averaging a healthy six yards per carry and a solid 112 yards per game.

He just tramples over pathetic to-be tacklers and when he finds the open field, he turns on the jets, and good luck trying to catch him, 'cause he's gone!

Lopez says that when he takes a handoff, he only focuses on one thing, "The end-zone," and he's taken it to the house four times this season.

"The Punisher" also has a comical side to him. When asked what his secret to success was, he confided, "My secret... is so secret... that I don't even know what it is!"

Lopez has been one the best this season for the Spartans. He sports the number two on the front and back of his jersey. Hopefully, opposing teams will be seeing a lot of the back of his jersey when he runs and a lot of the front when he's pummeling ball carriers into the ground. So, Mr. Lopez, what do you have to say to your opponents on the gridiron? "Look out for the Big Duce!"



Babies Need Books

It is never too early to introduce your child to books. Although infants will be unable to follow a plot or understand a theme, infants will benefit from exposure to books. In addition to the bonding that is inevitable when you hold your baby in your lap and communicate with her, reading to your baby is valuable in the development of language skills. Lo0g before your

baby utters her first word, she is absorbing sounds that will first help contribute to the development of speech, and later reading. Books also stimulate your baby's imagination, helping her to make sense of situations she has experienced . and introducing her to new ones.

Reading to your infant today promotes good reading habits tomorrow. There is a difference in the attention spans of children who have been read to regularly, says · Bernice Cullinan, Professor of Early Childhood and Elementary Education at New York University an a highly acclaimed reading specialist. Dr. Cullinan is the author of Read to Me: Raising Kids Who Love to Read and Invitation to · Read


As infants are particularly responsive to the sounds of language, the best books for babies emphasize rhythm, melody, and repetition, such as nursery rhymes and books with patterned language. Rhythm, rhyme, repetition and familiar language sequences will captivate babies. Books for infants usually have minimal text; the words often function like labels or captions for the pictures. Infants enjoy looking at pictures of other people, especially other babies. They recognize facial · features and expressions. Babies and small children love seeing familiar objects · like a stuffed bear or a rubber duck, or people doing things that they have had some experience with in their daily experience, such as getting dressed or taking bath.

 Infants see books as toys. They will explore books the same way they explore everything else in their world: by grabbing, tossing, turning them upside down and putting the books in their mouths. For these reasons, small durable board books, designed for small fingers and to endure harsh treatment by babies, are the most appropriate for young book lovers. The following board books should encourage your budding bookworm:

Books are not just educational and developmental devices. Babies, like adults, are entertained by books. Parents and other caregivers find that books are a very effective way to keep babies entertained. Indeed, early enjoyment of books will help form a foundation for the vital role books will play in your child's formal education.

Mommy & Me Group Update!




News from the: "TODDLERS TOO!"

COLIC: CAUSES AND CURES



You've fed him, changed him, and checked that he's not tired, hurt, or sick. And he's still wailing endlessly. What's wrong? It could be colic, which experts define as inconsolable crying that lasts at least three hours a day, more than three days a week, for about three weeks in a row. Colic usually kicks in when a baby is about 3 weeks old and almost universally goes away by 10 weeks. No one knows for sure what's behind it. Some experts blame digestive problems; others think it's simply the result of an immature neurological system. All agree, however, that it's not a malady but simply a normal and predictable part of early development for many

HERE ARE SOME WAYS TO CALM THOSE COLICKY CRIES.

Respond Right Away! When your baby cries, go to her as soon as you can before she gets "worked up" and harder to soothe. Studies show that letting babies cry only enhances their wailing.

Try Motion! Rock him, put him in an Infant swing, take him for a car ride, or place him in a stroller and push him, even if it's only inside the house.

Soothe with Sound! Rhythmic white noise-radio static, the hum of a fan can help calm your baby down. Some experts theorize that it mimics the swishing noises your baby heard while in the womb.

Swaddle! When infants cry uncontrollably, their arms and legs may flail, upsetting them even further. Tightly wrapping your baby in a soft, lightweight blanket keeps his hands and feet close to his body and makes him feel safe, snug, and secure.

Vary Your Technique! Try one calming strategy for about ten minutes, and if your baby is still crying, try another one for ten more minutes. And so on. Remind yourself that eventually he'll calm down.



November 17, 2003 (Esparto, California) Esparto High School competitive


cheerleading squad finished fourth in the small varsity category at the Northern California Cheerleading Championships held at California State University, Sacramento.




Disciplina sin gritos y mucho más...



Disciplinar no es gritar; Mi esposo es un gritón. Cuando el niño está teniendo una de sus rabietas solo se calma con un par de gritos. Es acaso gritar disciplinar? Cuando alzamos la voz a un niño por primera vez o de forma ocasional, usualmente su reacción es de sorpresa y por lo general se queda callado y con los ojos atentos hacia la persona que le ha gritado. Si, en ocasiones, al dirigirnos al niño lo hacemos no sólo elevando la

voz sino de forma agresiva, además de sorprenderlo, desencadenarán sensaciones de miedo en el niño. Bajo ningún concepto debemos confundir esto con disciplina. Disciplina es la estrategia que usamos para modificar el comportamiento, en este caso de un niño durante su crianza. La Academia Americana de Pediatría recomienda que las estrategias que usemos para disciplinar a nuestros hijos tengan los siguientes elementos: 1) una relación amorosa y de apoyo hacia el niño. 2) El uso de refuerzos positivos para lograr comportamientos deseados. 3) Retirar el refuerzo o aplicar un castigo para disminuir comportamientos no deseados. Al aplicar castigos debemos recordar que deben ser acordes con la edad del niño, que deben estar enmarcados en una relación de respeto y amor. Ejemplos de castigos considerados apropiados: algunos minutos en la "silla triste" (time-out); restricción de algún privilegio. Y, al dar refuerzos positivos no olvidar que un abrazo y reconocimiento del bien, es para ellos muy importante.


