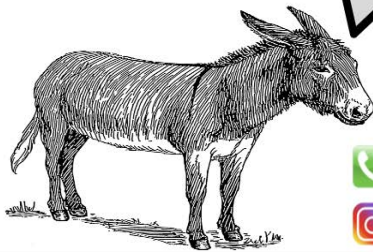

Ribbon Cutting for CR 40 Bridge over Cache Creek

(Rumsey, CA) – On November 30, Yolo County hosted a ribbon-cutting ceremony for the replacement of the County Road (CR) 40 Bridge over Cache Creek, originally constructed in 1930 and commonly referred to as the “Low Water Bridge.”

The nearly 100-year-old bridge was closed to vehicular traffic in 2008 following a Caltrans report that deemed the bridge to have a safe load capacity of zero tons. Structurally deficient, the bridge could not be used by CAL FIRE and other fire agencies to move heavy machinery into areas of the massive wildfire in 2015, causing significant delays that inhibited the efforts of the firefighters. As a key access point for firefighters crossing Cache Creek into the Capay Valley, the bridge is critical rural infrastructure and a public safety priority for what is a highly fire-prone region.



This past month the County’s contractor, Steelhead Constructors JV, completed the bridge replacement with a new three-span, reinforced concrete slab bridge. Consor Engineering served as the county’s construction management firm on the project. The new bridge, designed for the county by MGE Engineering, was constructed to accommodate CAL FIRE’s 72-foot-long tractor and trailer vehicle used to transport fire-fighting equipment across Cache Creek and into the Capay Valley.



With the assistance of Assemblymember Cecilia Aguiar-Curry and Senator Bill Dodd, the project received an initial state appropriation of \$800,000 for planning and preconstruction activities in FY2017-18 and a subsequent appropriation of \$2,200,000 for construction in FY2019-20. The total cost of construction was approximately \$4.2 million, with the remaining costs covered by the federal Highway Bridge Program. From the beginning of the project, Yolo County collaborated with the Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation to advocate for a mutually successful project.

"The newly constructed CR 40 Bridge is a huge win for public access to recreation and public safety, especially for fire protection," said Chair of the Yolo County Board of Supervisors Angel Barajas. Many community champions were instrumental in the

funding, design, and construction of this bridge. "Special thanks to my County Supervisor colleagues, including County staff, Senator Bill Dodd, Assemblymember Cecilia Aguiar-Curry, Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation, Yocha Dehe Fire Department, CAL FIRE, and all the incredible men and women who worked tirelessly to build this bridge."

The new bridge offers pedestrians, bicyclists, ATV users, and equestrian traffic access to public lands. The bridge also provides a clearance of at least 8 feet for recreational rafters during summer irrigation flows in Cache Creek.

December 7th Occultation of Mars by the Moon

If you were out on Wednesday the 7th of December, maybe you saw what I did.

I observed the occultation of Mars. The pictures were captured with my cell phone. I observed the event with unaided eye observations, telescopic observations and of course with my cell phone camera. The event took place the evening of December 7th 2022. I observed the event between 5-9pm PST.

Highlight images are below!



The first image was captured at 5 pm. The last image was captured at 9pm. As you can see Mars, the smaller object, appears 1st on one side of the Moon and ending on the other side. Actually, a right to left motion of the Moon is the cause of this change. This was orbital motion on display!

Cache Creeks Beaver: Engineers with Orange Teeth Capay Valley Regeneration

Want to increase groundwater recharge in the Capay Valley? Moderate flooding? Slow wildfire? Ask a beaver for help! Beaver have proven engineering skills and ability to deliver an impressive array of services to humans at very low cost.

Beavers build dams across creeks and streams to protect their families from predators. They tuck entrances to their lodges below the water, creating a formidable barrier against more land-loving creatures – no matter how hungry the creatures maybe. Typically, a lodge houses families of six to ten members, including parents, and first- and second-year youngsters. Beaver have orange teeth from iron in the tooth enamel.

To keep up with food and shelter needs of their growing youngsters, beavers build channels radiating into the land around the pond. Beaver float building materials and food down the channels for easy transport back to their lodges.

These dams and channels offer other services beyond protecting and nurturing beaver. The dams and channels slow and spread the water. Slowing the water **improves water quality, reduces stream temperatures extremes, traps nutrients, and builds soils** by causing sediments kept in the water by faster stream speeds to drop out. Slowing the water and spreading it also increases water surface area, even during droughts. The larger surface area absorbs energy from floods, reducing the flood peaks. And the larger area increases riparian resiliency to wildfire.

Plants growing around beaver dams, kept green by the ponds and networks of channels **support high abundance and varieties of living organisms**, from larger mammals to small insects. These **beaver-influenced areas often do not burn in wild-fires**, providing escape and refuge from the burning land outside the beaver wetlands. In addition, the green areas that beaver foster can slow fires.

Beaver dams also help recharge groundwater and restore incised streams. Stream incision—streams cutting deeply the land surround them—damages stream ecosystems. With incised streams, the water table drops, changing surrounding vegetation from wetlands, meadows and shrubs to dry shrublands. Incised streams have decreased summer low flows, higher stream temperatures, less overall habitat diversity, lost riparian areas, and declining populations of fish and other aquatic organisms. Over beaver dams across streams build up sediment behind them, raising the height of the streambed and increasing riparian areas. This effect often breaks the single stream channel into several lower-energy channels, which **reduces erosion, preventing stream incision and restoring riparian area.**

Cache Creek once teemed with beaver, its name given by beaver trappers who “cached” their beaver pelts there, amassing them for transport to markets. Fur trapping severely shrunk beaver populations. Hunting due to human-beaver conflict also took its toll.

Even so, beaver still live in Cache Creek, giving us a chance to increase their numbers and their benefits. Cache Creek have some real challenges to expanding beaver numbers. However, researchers and beaver practitioners have advanced our understanding of how to support beaver in expanding their colonies. One method involves building dam-like structures created with natural, local materials. These “beaver dam analogs” create attractive areas for beaver, giving them a leg up in setting up lodges in a new part of streams. These practitioners are also developing inexpensive and effective methods to keep beavers from building unwanted dams.
