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Marijuana Issues Need Capay Valley Community Voice in Preparing Final County Ordinance

One important priority of the Capay Valley Vision mission is to "Preserve our Sense of Place" which describes the long-standing pride we have in our way of life. Potentially, this way of life is in jeopardy.

At the CVV July 20 Board meeting, many board members expressed deep concern about the impact of "marijuana farming" as an agricultural product in the Capay Valley. While growing marijuana is no longer illegal in Yolo County, there is significant concern over a new marijuana draft ordinance that needs to reflect thoughtful insight before Yolo County supervisors vote on this ordinance. John Young, Yolo County AG Commissioner is actively soliciting our community input. However this draft ordinance is on a fast-track for Board of Supervisors approval. We, as a community, need to slow this process down so that important dialogue about limitations, restrictions and oversight can take place. It is paramount that we prevent a potential "Gold Rush mentality" that threatens to upset our way of life.

The following article, by Jim Rix, CVV Board Secretary, Capay small farmer and active participant in the "Marijuana dialogue" offers an insightful look into the issues that need to be addressed before any County action can take place. On August 3 Yolo County officials met with a group of residents in the Grange Hall to hear community feedback about the rising number of marijuana grows in our Valley. The discussion was spirited, with a wide range of views on what is still an emotional and controversial issue with many residents. While not attempting to summarize the views expressed, it is safe to say that the regulatory framework being developed by the County will have a significant impact on the character of our extended community.

I don't pretend to have all or even any answers to how our local government should deal with this issue, but I'm sure that this is extremely important, and something that deserves a wide conversation to best inform the Board of Supervisors before it makes critical decisions in the coming months that will shape our future. In that spirit, the below comments are one attempt to contribute to that conversation. They revolve around three general issues: the density of marijuana grows; the regulatory environment for medicinal versus recreational grows, given the expectation that California voters will vote to legalize recreational marijuana in November; and the pace of change we should seek assuming recreational legalization in November.

I believe the County Board's decision on marijuana grow density will be the most important part of the upcoming decision, for that decision will alter how the Capay Valley develops over the next 1-15 years. If it allows too high a density, the incredible economic value/acre of marijuana could drive up land prices dramatically, prevent farmers from being able to lease land at reasonable prices, and change the character of the valley in as-yet unforeseeable ways. If the initial density levels are set too high, it will be difficult to walk regulation back to a lower density, because by then some current residents will have left on moral or Cont. on pg. 3

Cont. from pg. 1 economic grounds and the Valley will be changed for decades, perhaps forever. If the County opts for a conservative, lower density level, there's a greater chance that marijuana can co-exist with the Valley's existing personality and character. And if experience proves that the allowable density level is too low, the Board can then ease up if desired. My suggestion would be that the County opt for a low density level, giving residents, the county, and the Board the chance to assess the impact of the changes, and then adjust from there if needed. Indeed, I'd suspend issuing grow permits until the Board decides on density, so the pace and economics of the process doesn't create a fait accompli that overwhelms pending regulatory decisions before they can be made and take effect.

I don't envy the County's predicament in working to develop a framework to regulate medicinal marijuana grows at the same time the state appears to be on the verge of legalizing its recreational use. I hope the County will be very cautious and works any processes for medicinal completely separate from recreational, for the process of regulating a medicinal product versus a recreational one is fundamentally different, with a host of issues that will need addressing. For both of these processes, getting the regulatory and approval process right is more important than getting it done fast.

My final thoughts relate to the pace of change underway, or about to be underway in our Valley. There is no need or reason for Yolo to lead the state in approving marijuana grows (medicinal or especially recreational); indeed, I'm concerned that the state has not learned the lessons from Colorado, Washington, and Oregon on how to proceed on this issue. For example: Colorado is becoming a boom-town for pot tourism; while that's fine if that's what they want, I'm pretty sure the Capay Valley doesn't want to ever be that type of place. Oregon, on the other hand, one year after voter approval, has approved only 8 legal recreational grow permits statewide; clearly Oregon is following a more measured approach, to preserve the state's ability to moderate the changes it might bring as well as the long-term prospects for legal growers. I hope California and Yolo County will follow more the Oregon approach than the Colorado one, as it will be far easier to relax the regulatory environment later, having preserved an ability to control the pace of change and respond to unforeseen challenges, than to tighten up after having allowed too many grows, or too swift a process; because by that point the personality and character of the Valley will have already have been altered.

These comments are an attempt to start a conversation. They are not perfect, as they perhaps unwisely interweave the County's current effort to regulate medicinal marijuana grows and any future processes for recreational. And I'm sure they aren't the last public comments, for the County's response to the challenges and opportunities marijuana grows bring are vital to our community. As such, I encourage you to read the County's draft ordinance on medicinal grows and to make your thoughts known to the county's survey on medical marijuana at https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/yolomedmar

Esparto Unified School District Ranks With The Best

When you ask most high school seniors to describe their experiences as Esparto Unified School District students they will often talk about their favorite subjects, field trips, friends, and teachers. They remember their times in high school with fondness, in particular, events like Spartarama. Then the conversation turns to elementary/middle school and their "favorite teacher". You get the sense that our students have a shared experience. Our entire district has four schools, forty-five support staff, and about fifty teachers. Our district's size makes us unique in the greater Sacramento region.

Some might think that being a smaller district has a limiting effect on our student's college and career opportunities. Well, I'm going to share with you that smaller, in our case, is better. The US News and World Report has been ranking high schools in America for many years and bases their rankings on college readiness and academic achievement. Esparto High School has been ranked as the #224 high school and been named a "Silver Medal" recipient on the US News and World Report list in 2016. Our recognition is based on the high numbers of students who take and pass Advanced Placement (AP) exams, our SAT exam scores, and our graduation rates.

Our high school teachers and Mrs. Kersting, our high school counselor, deserve a great deal of praise for the school's ranking. It is truly a source of pride for me to be able to report that Esparto High School ranks ahead of the following schools on the US News and World Report 2016 Rankings: Folsom High School, Whitney High School, Consumnes Oaks High School, Del Oro High School, and many others. In Yolo County, only Davis High School also made the list. The common theme is that our school ranks ahead of larger schools with a reputation for having "better programs".

So I think back to my conversations with students and reflect on the fact that the vast majority of our them will tell you that they've been going to school in our district since Kindergarten. This makes our #224 Ranking a celebration for our entire district because most of our high school seniors started as EUSD Kindergarten students. Every elementary school teacher had a hand in teaching our students to read and write. Our middle school teachers have guided our students through the challenging "pre-teen" years. So unlike so many large high schools, nearly all of our high school students started at Esparto Elementary School and attended Esparto Middle School making our US News and World Report Ranking a point of pride at every school in the district.

There is an old saying at Esparto High School that is painted on the back wall of Alice Marsh Hall. It reads, 'Raise your chin and throw out your chest, Esparto High School ranks with the best." Right now would seem to be a very good time for every graduate, parent, and student associated with the Esparto Unified School District to do just that.



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



Pet Fire Safety

Pets give us comfort, friendship, and unconditional love. Our connection to them can be among the strongest relationships in our lives. But pets can cause fires. We need to be careful with pets in the home.

SAFETY TIPS

- Pets are curious. They may bump into, turn on, or knock over cooking equipment. Keep pets away from stoves and countertops.
- Keep pets away from candles, lamps, and space heaters.
- Always use a metal or heat-tempered glass screen on a fireplace and keep it in place.
- Keep pets away from a chimney's outside vents. Have a "pet-free zone" of at least three feet away from the fireplace. Glass doors and screens can stay dangerously hot for several hours after the fire goes out.
- Consider battery-operated, flameless candles. They can look and smell like real candles.
- Some pets are chewers. Watch pets to make sure they don't chew through electrical cords. Have any problems checked by a professional.

SMOKE ALARMS


- Have working smoke alarms on every level of the home. Test your smoke alarms at least once a month.
- If the smoke alarm sounds, get out and stay out.
- Never go back inside for pets in a fire. Tell firefighters if your pet is trapped.

Pets and Wildfires

Make sure pets are included in your family's wildfire evacuation plan. Build an evacuation kit for each pet in your household. Ensure each kit is a size and weight that can be quickly and easily loaded into a vehicle when packing to evacuate.

AYSO Soccer News

The 2016 AYSO soccer season is underway. **American Youth Soccer Organization (AYSO)** is a California **nonprofit** soccer organization for children aged 4 through 19. Capay Valley AYSO is run by a team of **volunteers**, including board members, coaches, referees, team parents, line painters, many of whom are parents or family of the youth they coach. There are still openings on a few teams. It is expected that each family **volunteers** in some fashion to operate the program. If you signed up your child for AYSO and have not been contacted by the coach to volunteer, please call Brian at (530) 908-9448 and he will try to get you the coach's phone number.

Here are a few rules to consider:

- No trading players between teams without speaking with AYSO Board. We seek to balance teams
- All players must be offered to play at least 3/4 of the game
- Each team must provide a trained referee for home games
- Each team must provide a person to mark fields
- Youth football has priority on Middle School South field. AYSO has priority on North Field
- 100% refunds can be made prior to September 1
- All children must wear shin guards and must have socks over shin guards at games
- No earrings at all. (cannot tape over them), no jewelry
- Fingernails trimmed, no metal hair clips
- Do not play on goals (poles or nets) Never let a child play on the goal or hang on goal.
- No coaches or parents near goals during games, sidelines only, 3 ft back.
- No dissent (talking back) towards referees allowed at games by coaches, players or spectators. This sets a very bad example to the kids. They are only allowed to cheer regardless of the referee's call. If you can't comply with this, don't come to the game. Anyone who violates this rule will be told to volunteer as a referee.
- Important Dates: Picture Day TBD, EUSD School starts Aug. 18, Back to School Nights: EES Sept. 1, EMS Aug. 31, EHS Sept.13, School off: Oct. 5
- Open House May 18 EES, May 17 Middle School
- First Game: September 10
- U10 & U12 Boys: Region Tourney November 5—Davis or Antelope U10
- U14 Area Tourney: November 19, 20—Antelope
- U16B Area Tourney: November 19, 20—Davis

CV AYSO incurs expenses including National fees (which include injury insurance for players and all registered volunteers), nets, field paint, uniforms, cones, referee uniforms, field corner flags, first aid kits, balls, ball bags, goal keeper gloves, goal maintenance and repair, pinneys, goal keeper jerseys, and administrative supplies. CV AYSO does not receive any grants from any government organization. All funds come from donations and fees.

AYSO is not affiliated with the school district. CV AYSO does have a memorandum of agreement with the district which describes details of use of school grounds. The fact is when it comes to our community's children, we must find the time. Pet Adoption Corner


